Colonel John Read:

Came to Huntsville in 1811, from Bedford County, Virginia. Established the first United States land office in Alabama.

Col. Read remodeled the house, adding a brick wing to the rear. This was after the original two-story log cabin was weatherboarded.

Aaron Burr was entertained here sometime before the Civil War. Jere Clements, author and United States Senator from 1849 to 1853, was a guest in this home often. It was while Clements was a guest of Colonel Read's that Aaron Burr, a friend of Clements, spent a while in this house. Jeremiah Clements had married Col. Read's daughter. A character in his book "Mustang Gray", was modeled after Aaron Burr.
