Section numbers detail which graves are found together.

- 1. Fret Naughts: This dulcimer group focuses on traditional and contemporary folk songs, mountain music, and familiar hymns tapping into our country's rich musical heritage. (S1)
- 2. Oldest Marker in Cemetery (Nova Rush & Holly Rush)
  Sister and Mother pf Mary Frances Atwood; visit her
  grave (having the oldest marker) and that of her brother, Father, and grandmother. (\$1)
- 3. Elizabeth Dale Gibbons Flanagan Jeffries High Brown Routt (Jan Dorning) The black widow of Hazel Green suspected of murdering her many husbands. She visits husband #2 at Maple Hill. (\$1)
- 4. James G. Birney (Topper Birney) Buried in New Jersey, but is visiting and conferring with friends. He ran for President in 1840 & 1844. (\$1)
- Neal Rose d. 1835 (Adam Williamson) Scottish Proprietor of the Planter's Hotel who served with Andrew Jackson in the Creek Indian Wars. (S1)
- 6. Dr. Thomas Fearn 1789-1863 (Robert Reeves) Huntsville physician. First doctor to develop and use quinine in the treatment of malaria. (\$2)
- Elizabeth Adaline Hurd 1815-1840 (Susanna Leberman) Teacher at the Huntsville Female Seminary whose monument was a tribute from her students. (S2)
- 8. James H. Weakley 1798-1856 (Billy Smith) Surveyor General of Alabama. (S2)
- 9. Mary Chambers Bibb 1816-1835 (Joanna Broad) Died shortly after her marriage to William D. Bibb. Buried in Maple Hill's first mausoleum. (\$2)
- Sheriff Stephen Neal 1773-1839 (Jon Stieglitz) First sheriff of Huntsville. His house has been recreated in Constitution Hall Village, downtown Huntsville. (S2)
- **11. George Steele** 1798-1855 (Terry Long) Huntsville architect who introduced Greek Revival style to Huntsville. **(S2)**
- **12. Susan Bradley Johnson** (Crystal Woodard) Visits the grave of her husband, Union General Gilbert Motier Lafayette Johnson who commanded the 13<sup>th</sup> Indiana Cavalry while stationed in Huntsville. **(S2)**
- Lt. Albert Russel (Chase Sharp) Died at age 24 in Ft. Barancas, Florida, of typhoid fever during the Civil War. (S2)

- Albert Russel 1755-1818 (Ken Carpenter) Revolutionary War veteran & an original member of the Sons of Cincinnati. Came to Huntsville in 1816. (S2)
- 15. Artamissa (1834-1845) & Altimisou Severs (1850-1852) (Anna Dean and Grace Sarah Dean) visiting graves of their nine-year-old brother William. (S2)
- 16. Quilter & Spinner (Sue Newell & Lynn Dimock) (S3)
- 17. Lost-Cause-Unknown Confederate Soldier (Chuck Bryant) The Civil War Veteran's Monument was erected in 1901 and placed amid the burial ground of nearly 200 soldiers who are unknown. The inscription reads: "Furl that banner, for 'tis weary." (S3)
- 18. Madam Mollie Teal 1852-1899 (Christy Webb) Popular "Madam" who donated her establishment to be used as a hospital by the City of Huntsville. (S3)
- Col. Egbert J. Jones, CSA 1820-1861 (William L. Pepper) Lawyer and Colonel of the 4<sup>th</sup> Alabama Infantry Regiment. He died of wounds received at First Battle of Manassas. (S3)
- **20. Guy Collins and his Anachronistic Society Band** from Grissom High School. **(Section A)**
- 21. Pilgrimage Angel This is the Angel used by the Huntsville Pilgrimage Association for its logo (S4)
- **22. Gov. Clement Comer Clay** 1789-1866 (Charles Edgar) Lawyer, Congressional Representative, 8<sup>th</sup> Governor of Alabama & U.S. Senator. **(\$4)**
- 23. Mary Lewis Clay 1825-1898 (Roianne Little) Wife of John Withers Clay, and the ideal of Southern womanhood who held the Clay family together after "The War." (S4)
- 24. Wright Family Plot 1822-1855 (Jason Bryson) This monument was used for target practice by Union soldiers during Huntsville's occupation. (\$4)
- **25.** David Todd (Steve Johnson) Confederate officer and brother-in-law of President Lincoln. **(\$4)**
- **26. Meridian Marker** (Jerry Wise) Erected by Richard W. Anderson to designate the Meridian and in memory of his Anderson and Taber relatives. **(S4)**
- 27. Olde Towne Brass (S4)
- 28. Leroy Pope Walker 1817-1884 (Henry Turner) Brigadier General, CSA, also Secretary of War of the Confederacy. Ordered firing on Fort Sumter. (\$5)
- 29. Gov. Reuben Chapman 1799-1882 (Jan Williams) Alabama's 13<sup>th</sup> Governor. (S5)
- **30.** Alberta Chapman Taylor 1853-1912 (Lousie Reynolds) Women's Suffragist. (S5)

- **31. Gov. Thomas Bibb** 1782-1839 (Jason Bruening) Alabama's second governor; delegate to the 1819 State Convention. **(\$5**)
- **32. Henry Figures** 1844-1864 (Alan Campbell) Adjutant of the 48<sup>th</sup> AL Infantry CSA. Died in 1864 of wounds received at the Battle of the Wilderness. **(S5)**
- **33.** Samuel B. Moore (Ron Cooper) Socially prominent bachelor and plantation owner who honored his prize cow, Lily Flagg, with a party in 1892. (\$5)
- 34. Lily Flagg (Van Brown) Jersey milk cow that won the blue ribbon at the 1892 World's Fair in Chicago. (S5)
- **35. Mrs. George Washington Lane** (Shontel Potts) Wife of Pro-Union activist appointed Federal District Judge by President Lincoln. **(S6)**
- **36.** Jeremiah Clemens 1814-1865 (Jim Rountree) An attorney and "loyalist" during the Civil War. He was a hero of the Mexican War and served in the U.S. Senate. He was a cousin of Samuel Clemens "Mark Twain." (56)
- **37. Gov. R.M. Patton** 1809-1885 (Robert Wilkie) Planter, 20<sup>th</sup> Governor of Alabama. **(\$7)**
- 38. Nona Plunkett Beirne 1850-1865 (Alyson Buck) (\$7)
- **39.** Mary Jane Chadick b. 1867 (Linda Coats) Diarist during the Union occupation of Huntsville. **(S7)**
- **40. Nora Davis** 1861-1936 (Mary Daniel) A novelist, known best for her book *The Northerner*, a parody of Virginia Clay Clopton. **(S7)**
- **41. Eliza Hill Thomas Cooper** 1 833-1905 (Wendy Kobler) Suggested the name Maple Hill for the city cemetery. **(\$7)**
- **42. Gypsy** (Katie Hesse) Graves include those of the Mitchell Family and an unmarked grave of a gypsy "queen." **(\$7)**
- **43. Annie Bradshaw Clopton** 1878-1956 (Stacy Moon) She painted on cobwebs, presently on display at the Smithsonian Institute and Burritt Museum. **(S7)**
- **44. Gov. David P. Lewis** 1820-1884 (Winter Forests) Lawyer and controversial 23<sup>rd</sup> Governor of Alabama. **(58)**
- **45. Kate McCalley** 1854-1936 (Amber Meador) She and her brother shared a meal with Robert E. Lee and his family before his death. She brought a most interesting souvenir back to Huntsville. **(58)**
- **46. General W.T.H. Brooks** 1821-1870 (Talbot Hackett) West Point graduate and one of two Union generals buried in Maple Hill. **(\$9)**
- 47. Mamie Fletcher Coleman 1876-1939 (Jacque Reeves) Wife of Col. John LeVert Coleman who was Gen. Pershing's attaché to Brazil and a decorated WWI verteran. Lived in San Francisco during the terrible earthquake of 1906 and was in charge of setting off dynamite charges to stop the raging fires. (Sc)

- 48. Albert Russel Erskine 1871-1933 (David Bowser) President of the Studebaker Corporation in South Bend, Indiana. Interred in the Erskine Mausoleum. (End of Main Street)
- 49. (Dog) Mickey 1929-1947 and his master John Lee Robinson 1891-1947 John was a cotton merchant who was entombed witth his dog in this mausoleum. "My dog stuck by me all his life, and now I'll stick by him" (S26)
- 50. Clarion Winds (Section D)
- **51.** Tracey Pratt b. 1861 (Buddy Moon) Responsible for establishing three cotton mills and many other major industries located in the Huntsville area. (Section D)
- **52.** Jessup Whitehead 1833-1889 (Susan Hessler) Nationally known chef, author, adventurer and Chef de Cuisine at the Hotel Monte Sano. His landlady visits his grave. (Section D)
- **53. Sexton** (Daniel H. Hessler) Listen for his bell to signal the end of the stroll.
- **54.** Joseph McCown 1865-1934 (Randy Kilgore) His daughter, McDill McCown, wrote the book *Daddy Was an Undertaker* about living over a funeral home in Huntsville. (Section E)
- **55. Kibble Harrison** 1857-1915 (Blake Dorning) Capt. of the 5<sup>th</sup> U.S. Volunteers in the Spanish-American War. He and his men captured the Morro Castle to free U.S. prisoners where he raised the U.S. flag **(S13)**
- 56. Thomas Percy 1786-1822 (Bob Boyer) His descendants were notable American political and literary figures: Senator Charles Percy (Illinois), and novelists, Walker Percy and William Alexander Percy. (\$13)
- **57. Dr. William H. Burritt** 1869-1955 (Marty Siebert) Hunts-ville physician who bequeathed his home atop Monte Sano, the "Burritt Museum," to Huntsville. **(\$13)**
- **58. LeRoy Pope** 1764-1845 (Will Elrick) "Father of Huntsville," lawyer, planter and influential pioneer settler of Huntsville. **(S13)**
- 59. John Williams Walker 1783-1823 (John Markow) Lawyer & US Congressman; President of convention that framed the Alabama Constitution in 1819. (S13)
- **60. Tallulah Bankhead** (Catie Wells) Visits the grave of her mother Adelaide Bankhead (1880-1902) who died shortly after giving birth to Tallulah. **(S13)**
- 61. Paul Lewellyn Jones 1842-1929 (Scott Peterson) He was descended from the last Prince of Wales, whose head was displayed on a stake at the Tower of London in the 1300s. Sgt. Paul Jones was imprisoned at Rock Island Prison during the Civil War. (S13)

- **62. Maria Howard Weeden** 1847-1905 (Linda Riley) Renowned poet and artist. **(\$13)**
- **63. Sally Carter** 1821-1837 (Leslie Gray) Legendary ghost that haunts Cedarhurst. Her grave at Maple Hill is a secret. **(S13)**
- 64. Lady Grace Hinds Curzon 1879-1958 (Gay Money) Countess and Marchioness who received Grand Cross of the Order of the British Empire from King George V. (S13)
- **65. Clement Claiborne Clay** 1817-1882 (Rob Henshaw) US and CSA Senator. Charged with complicity in the murder of President Lincoln. **(\$13)**
- **66. Virginia Clay-Clopton** 1823-1915 (Virginia Henshaw) Widow of Clement C. Clay; wrote *Belle of the Fifties*. **(S13)**
- 67. Restoration Table (Eleanor Keith, Skip Stinson, Perky Taylor) Pictures and information on the restoration of the historic section of Maple Hill Cemetery. (Main Street)
- **68. Sydney Sledge Darwin 1831-1911** (Buddy Darwin) Planter, CSA, "Huntsville's Paul Revere." **(S12)**
- **69. William M. Hundley** 1860-1934 (Zane Elrick) Visits the grave of his father who died in The War. **(S12)**
- **70.** Luke Matthews 1796-1875 (Mark Sharp) Early setter who owned Cotton Hill and Oakdale Plantations. **(S12)**
- 71. Mollie Walton d. 1899 (Shirley Mohler) Wealthy Mooresville resident whose will was settled nearly 100 years after her death. (S11)
- **72.** Annie Merts 1881-1955 (Judy Gattis) Long time Huntsville teacher and administrator for whom the Annie Merts Center is now named. (\$11)
- 73. Mary L. Schrimsher 1848-1893 (Glenda Martin) Visits the grave of her husband, Confederate soldier Russell J. Schrimsher. (\$15)
- **74. Maple Hill Band** Specializing in Celtic music of our Southern Scots-Irish ancestors. **(\$10)**
- 75. Virginia A. Betts 1836-1892 (Beverly Ketchum) Grandmother of JAG Edward C. Betts who organized the Nuremburg War Trials in WWII. (\$10)
- 76. Reverend Bannister 1818-1907 (Charles Money) A priest in the Protestant Episcopal Church for 61 years. (S10)
- 77. Betty Bernstein Goldsmith 1861-1928 (Sue Hassett)
  Active community supporter who founded United
  Charities and helped build City Hospital; in her memory Milton Frank Stadium as built. (\$10)

- 78. Lawrence B. Goldsmith, Jr. 1883-1972 (Fred Tamm-Daniels) Businessman with car dealership and specialized in commercial and farm properties, chosen to promote Huntsville area to US Army generals for Redstone Arsenal; financed construction of Russell Erskin Hotel. (S10)
- 79. Milton Frank 1910-1967 (Sandra McGuire) Madison County Hall of Famer, coached HHS to victory for 12 seasons. City Stadium named for him. Later owner of Rose Jewelers. Visited by his wife. (\$10)
- 80. Issac Schiffman 1856-1910 (Jeff Lapidus) Emigrated from Germany in 1875 to become an investment and cotton broker, built I. Schiffman Building E. Side Sq.; led building of Temple B'Nai Sholom 1898 (S10)
