## MOORE – LANDMAN CEMETERY

# <u>46 - 1</u>

### **Summary Report**



Moore - Landman Cemetery, Redstone Arsenal, Madison Co., AL, June, 2002.

Cemetery is located SSE of NASA-MSFC B4628, barely within wooded area south of Centaur Road. Size of enclosed fenced area is about 50 yds X 50 yds. If full, cemetery could hold about 400 graves. Evidence of many graves per sunken rectangular depressions, some with broken concrete chunks as fieldstones.

View through entrance, with gate broken off its hinges from post at right.



Moore - Landman Cemetery, Redstone Arsenal, Madison Co., AL, June, 2002. This sinkhole is too large to likely be a rootball hole from a fallen tree. It is about 8 feet deep and perhaps 12 feet in diameter at the top. It is located in the northwest corner of the cemetery. It is not known whether any graves were in the sunken area.

For such a cemetery, with few or no inscribed markers, investigations are facilitated by a search of the old land records. By understanding who owned the land when the burials started, one can begin to find clues as to who may be buried within the grounds. Normally, that would be the landowner and immediate family members. However, often burials would include surrounding neighbors who had the need for a space to inter loved ones. The research here started with a look at the original landowners of record. The cemetery is located in the southwest corner of the Southwest Quarter of Section 31, Township 4, Range 1 West. This parcel was originally purchased from the government by Asa Thompson in 1818, as shown below:

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The **INDEX TO LANDS** for this section is inserted below to show the transitions of land ownership through the 1800s:


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As a note of explanation to the reader, it should be understood that while the **INDEX TO LANDS** is a valuable resource, when it was prepared by clerks in the office of G. W. Jones & Sons, Inc., there were apparently many errors made in the notations of which quarter sections of the land were involved in the transactions. The notations of those quarters should be taken only as an approximate guide. The actual referenced deeds must be carefully examined to fully determine all of the included quarter sections for each record. Sometimes, even the actual deeds have been found to contain obvious errors, but careful research will usually reveal the problems and their needed corrections. The **INDEX** as it is provides great continuity of land ownership references by following the trail from "Grantor" to "Grantee", who in turn became a Grantor subsequently, and so forth for each change of ownership.

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
This 1830 Madison County AL census page shows landowners who were living on what is now arsenal property. Among the names on this page are George Moore and James Landman (written as "Lanman", phonetically). George Moore is shown as a single man (no wife, no children) in the 20 - 30years old age bracket. James Landman is shown as 30 - 40 years old, with another male of that age range living in his household. His wife appears in the 20 - 30 age bracket. They have 2 male children and 1 female child in the 0 - 5 age bracket. Neighbors of note include **Abraham Bransford**, Richard Jamar, Harrison Owens, Thomas J. Owens, Jason L. Jordan, James **Hatton**, George H. Fennell, and William Lanier. Many of these neighbors are addressed in the Summary Reports for other arsenal cemeteries, and Abram Bransford and the Hatton surname will be further mentioned in this Summary Report.

The slave page of the 1830 census shows the number of slaves that these pioneer landowners held. Note that George Moore had no slaves in his total household of 1 (himself):

The 1875 map segment shown below has notations of the landowners in the various sections and townships. Of course, these landowners would typically be those of record around 1870 – 1874, to allow for time to finalize and print the map by 1875. The map shows Lanier ownership of all of Section 31 in T4-R1W, while Fennell owned Section 32, along with James Landman, who also owned Section 30. There is notation of an S. A. Moore to the southwest, near Triana, in T5-R2W. That S. A. Moore held quarter sections land in Sections 11, 12, and 13 of T5-R2W. Considering the error rate in old records, this could well be S. H. Moore, especially where the old script "H" could appear to be an "A". (The preparer of this report has marked the location of the Moore – Landman Cemetery in Section 31 of T4-R1W. That marking was not on the original map.)



The article from the *REDSTONE ROCKET* newspaper below adds clues about the history of this cemetery:

# Ex-resident remembers 'Papa Pete'; had store, gin and blacksmith shop

Charles Burns remembers well the gleaming black hearse pulled by a team of big horses in bright harness. He walked alongside, struggling to keep up as his grandfather's funeral procession wended its way over back-country roads to the family cemetery.

That was in 1919. James Peter Burns had died of double pneumonia. Charles Burns was a little boy then, but the memory of his grandfather has not been lost over time.

James Peter Burns was a merchant and casket maker in the Mullins Flat community whose businesses were situated near where building 4488 stands today. "He would take me to the store everyday. It was a country store and I can still remember the smell of the candy," Charles Burns related. "Then we'd go to his gin and to his blacksmith shop and every now and then someone would come up to him and ask "Papa Pete' to build a casket for so-and-so who had died."

Charles Burns lived at Silver Hill, which was along Dodd Road where the test stands are located. He was born in the home of his maternal grandparents, Everett T. and Frances Lacy Horton. He is writing a book on "the life story of Huntsville and my folks."

Charles Burns' father, John Wesley Burns, sold insurance. He moved his family to Chicago in 1930 and set himself up as an insurance broker. Charles, 74 still has that business and is in the process of turning it over to his own son and daughter.

Around 1980, Charles Burns decided to visit the gravesite of the grandfather that he remembers so fondly. Things had changed so much in the halfcentury since Burns had been there that it took him five years of research to determine where the cemetery was. And once he did find it, "it was so grown up that you couldn't even walk around in there," he said. The Sam Moore Cemetery, named after the man who donated the land, is on a knoll overlooking a backwater area of Indian Creek. It is about a quarteracre in size. The ground is stippled with ornamental periwinkle plants put there many years ago. None of the graves have headstones but some are marked with field stones. Burns knows the general location of plots containing his grandfather and grandmother and a great uncle and aunt because a cedar tree was planted at the head of each grave when the relative was interred.

The cemetery is located behind NASA building 4628. Burns contacted Marshall Space Flight Center and they cleaned it up and installed a fence and gate.

Last year he and other Burns descendants bought a large granite monument to mark the final resting place of their namesakes in Mullins Flat.

"I appreciate them even in death and want my folks and everybody to know where my people are buried," Burns said.

The 1880 census of Madison County as shown below has one possibility for the Sam Moore that "donated the land for the cemetery", according to Charles Burns:

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The problem here is that this black Sam Moore was a farm laborer, not a landowner. Furthermore, he lived in Range 1 East, not 1 West. He would have been in no position to donate land for a cemetery during the memory or knowledge timeperiod of Charles Burns. The only other Sam or Samuel Moore in Madison County in 1880 that could donate land of the arsenal area was Samuel H. Moore, a 37 year old white man living in Huntsville, as shown below:

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There were several more Moore families living in Range 1E, but none "fit":

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The 1870 census shows this same Samuel (H.) Moore still in the household of Martha Patton, who was given as his mother in the 1880 census page:

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The 1870 census shows Samuel Moore with two of his siblings in his mother's household. Considering his age and the time of the Civil War (1861 – 1865), the service records were checked, and Samuel Moore of Madison County was found to have attained the rank of Major in the Confederate States Army's  $26^{th}$  Alabama Regiment. A summary of the unit's history is given below:



### **\***HISTORICAL NOTES:

The 26th Alabama Infantry Regiment was formed at Tuscumbia in December, 1861, using the 7-company 3rd AL Infantry Battalion as a nucleus.

The men were from Walker, Winston, Tuscaloosa, Marion, and Fayette counties. Two companies under Major J.S. Garvin were soon ordered to Fort Donelson and captured in that fight on February 16, 1862. After being exchanged, they joined the regiment in Virginia. It was placed in General Rains' Brigade at Yorktown, then was assigned to Rodes', O'Neal's, and Battle's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. The 26th was active in many conflicts of the army from Williamsburg to Mine Run . Later it moved to Camp Sumter, Georgia, and for a time guarded prinsoners. During the spring of 1864, the unit was attached to Cantey's Brigade and fought with the Army of Tennessee from Atlanta to Bentonville . This unit totalled 283 men in April, 1862, and reported 32 casualties at Gaines' Mill and 86 at Malvern Hill . It lost 116 at Chancellorsville , and of the 319 engaged at Gettysburg , forty-one percent were disabled. The regiment was badly cut up at Nashville and a very small group surrendered at Greensboro, North Carolina in April, 1865

The Ahnentafel implies that Martha **Patton** was a maiden name, but the census shows her as a likely widow with children (assumed relationship) having the surname of Moore. If these are indeed her children, then it is more likely that Patton was not her maiden name, but it was probably a surname from a second marriage. If so, then Martha's second husband (stepfather of her children) had also died by 1870. (That would not be uncommon during the Civil War era.) Patton is a name often found on early arsenal land records, as the Patton family bought considerable land in that area, and many former slaves kept the name after emancipation.

The 1860 census has no entry that was found for either Martha Patton or Martha L. Moore. The 1860 data found for Samuel H. Moore at first glance further complicates the conclusiveness of the relationships between Martha Patton and the Moore children in that the children are found in a Barnard household:

In the above 1860 census pages the three Moore children (young adults) were not listed in a household with Martha Patton or Martha Moore, as would be expected. Rather, they are enumerated in a household headed by

Harriet A. Barnard, who was only 24 years old herself. David L. Moore in her household was 22 at the time. The even more unusual thing about this household is its significant financial status. Harriet showed a valuation of her wealth at \$310,000. David L. Moore had a value of holdings at \$317,000. Samuel H. Moore was listed with \$330,000, even though he was shown as a student at age 17. Finally, Kate F. Moore was shown with a worth of \$317,000. It appears from this data that the four were probably all brothers and sisters who had inherited an estate from deceased parents, and therefore, Harriet would be a Moore by maiden name. Harriet had no doubt inherited the house, as the reason that she was listed as head of household and with a valuation different from the others. Without a detailed examination of the estate papers or will, there is no explanation of why Samuel's worth was shown as slightly more than the other siblings'. According to the listing for William Echols next door to the family of Barnard – Moore, they were definitely living in downtown Huntsville at the time of the 1860 census, since William is known to have resided in one of the old mansions downtown.

The Ahnentafel shown earlier said that Harriet  $\underline{M}$ . Moore married R. B. Rhett. However, there is an entry in the Madison County Records Center on-line archives of the Marriage Index that shows Harriet  $\underline{H}$ . Moore licensed to wed John D. <u>Barnard</u> on 15 November 1854, per Marriage Book 4-B, page 75. A check of the Madison County Records Center data for R. B. Rhett shows that he married (second) "Mrs. Harriet M. (for "Moore") Barnard in 1867:

Additionally, there was a Samuel Moore who was licensed to wed Susanna Perkins on 27 October 1814 in Madison County. There were other Samuel Moore entries for marriage licenses in the 1820s and 1830s, so the name Samuel was apparently used for generations of the Moore families in Madison County. There was no marriage index entry for Samuel Moore for the 1850s, 1860s, or 1870s in Madison County (which does not exclude possible marriage outside this county), but in 1899 there was a license for S. H. Moore to wed Letitia **Hunt**. In fact, there was also a license issued in 1897 for Sam Moore to wed Francis Johnson in the county. However, the census records of 1900 do not include any entry at all for Sam or Samuel or S. H. Moore in Madison County, indicating that he may have died by 1900.

The Probate Record index for the county does show entries for Samuel, Samuel H., David, and David L. Moore. The listing for Probate Court Case #1204 under the name of David Moore (with no middle initial) is dated for 1846, which would indicate that he died in that year or immediately before. David <u>L.</u> Moore has two case numbers assigned: 1855 (Case #1932) and 1872 (Case #3565). In both cases, David L. Moore is noted as "NCM" – *non compes mentis*, meaning declared incompetent to manage his own affairs. The older Samuel Moore in the county must be the one listed in 1819 as Probate Court Case #935 and #936. Samuel H. Moore is the name for Probate Court Case #2050 and #5134. However, there is no date for either of them in the index. Judging from the case numbers, it would appear that both were in the latter half of the 1800s.

Considering the Probate Court case dates, marriage records, and census data, it seems that the early Samuel Moore may have been the first of the family into the county. Samuel must have died around 1819. There was either a son or a younger brother (or other close relative) of Samuel in the pioneer days of the county, and this relative was named David. It was this David Moore who died about 1846 per the Probate Court Case dating. Samuel H. and David L. were apparently sons of this David and brothers to Kate F. Moore and Harriet H. Moore Barnard, all of whom apparently inherited from their father David's estate in the 1850s. The Ahnentafel shown earlier stated that David Moore (Sr.) was a doctor.

The 1850 census record inserted below adds more information about the family after David's death:

This record (above) seems to confirm the relationship of Samuel H., Kate F., and David L. Moore as children of Martha L. Moore. Close examination of the 1850 census page show that a **Benjamin Harrison** was also in the household headed by Martha L. Moore. Martha was born in Virginia and is shown as age 36. Benjamin Harrison was born in Virginia and shown as age 67. The ages and birthplaces indicate a possibility of a father and daughter relationship between them. An examination of the probate records can confirm that relationship beyond doubt, but that has not yet been accomplished. Another indication of the relationship is the realization that this Benjamin Harrison died in late 1850, according to Probate Court Case # 1658-1/2, dated 1850. At the time of the 1860 census, the 4 grandchildren of Benjamin Harrison (Samuel H., David L., and Kate F. Moore plus Harriet H. Moore Barnard) are shown with their inheritances. Their inheritances would not only have come perhaps from the death of their physician father, but also from the death of their maternal grandfather, Benjamin Harrison, who owned real estate and slaves. That is why the census showed them with significant wealth while still living in Huntsville as students, etc.

Further indications of the relationships were found by checking the slave census counts for 1850. Benjamin Harrison owned 65 slaves on arsenal area lands, while Martha L. Moore owned 14 slaves in Huntsville. The places of ownership were determined by noting the names of the neighboring slave owners. In Huntsville, Martha and her slaves lived adjacent to **Bartley M. Lowe**, a famous Army General, cotton mill owner, and prominent pioneer of Huntsville. She had several free blacks living next door, on the other side of her house from Bartley M. Lowe. This firmly places Martha's slaves in the town of Huntsville, as household servants.

By comparison, the slave census entry for Benjamin Harrison puts his slave count underneath the records for **Mary C. Lanier** and before the counts for **Abraham Bransford**, John H. **Hunt** (as agent for heirs), and **Samuel Hatton**. All of these names are recognized as pioneers of the arsenal area lands – not in the town of Huntsville. In fact, if the family lived on the arsenal areas before moving into Huntsville, they may have visited the adjacent plantation owners and thereby formed an association that had an influence on names of the children. It is considered likely that Samuel H. Moore (born in 1842) was named Samuel <u>Hatton</u> Moore, in honor of the Samuel Hatton who had the nearby plantation and slaves. Likewise for Harriet <u>H</u>. (Hatton?) Moore Barnard Rhett.

The slave records are inserted below for reference. It should be noted that the record for Martha L. Moore with her slaves in Huntsville places her not only beside Bartley M. Lowe, but also by <u>James Clemens</u> (Founder of the town of Madison and father of U. S. Senator Jeremiah Clemens – their house was located in the southwest portion of the intersection of Church Street with Clinton Avenue in Huntsville, until it was recently moved). James Clemens may have had an influence upon young Samuel H. Moore, as will be discussed later in this report. James Clemens freed his slaves during the 1850s, well before the Civil War and the Emancipation Proclamation. The slave census for Martha's holdings also shows a "**Cooperative of Huntsville**" that owned 7 slaves – possibly for maintenance duties around the town.

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Considering that the **INDEX TO LANDS** shown on page 11 of this Summary Report includes entries for land purchases in Section 31, Township 4, Range 1 West (location of the Moore – Landman Cemetery, 46-1), by both Benjamin Harrison and David Moore, there is a pretty strong indication of the family relationships presented above and of a connection to the cemetery that is the subject of this report. Benjamin Harrison bought land in Section 31 in 1838, while David Moore bought land in the section in 1839. As Thompson was the original owner of the land that Benjamin Harrison eventually bought. As a sold it in 1833 to William Weeden, builder of the Weeden House in Huntsville, where Maria Howard Weeden lived. In 1837 William Weeden sold the land to Richard Pryor (who could perhaps be the historical namesake of the current Hollywood movie actor), who in turn sold it to Benjamin Harrison. Benjamin sold the land in 1859 to William H. Lanier (one of the 3 Lanier brothers who owned much of the arsenal lands in the 1800s, at one time or another), who in turn passed it to his brother Isaac Alexander Lanier in 1867. Isaac Lanier sold the land to Samuel H. Moore in 1883. Samuel may have wanted the parcel simply because his grandfather (Benjamin Harrison) had owned it at one time. The possible connection to the George Moore who owned land in this general area per the 1830 census is not known at the time of this writing.

On the other hand, Asa Thompson sold a parcel of land in Section 31 directly to David Moore in 1839. Upon David's death by 1846, the land would have passed into his estate, from which Samuel H. Moore was an inheritor.

According to the interview of the *REDSTONE ROCKET* newspaper with Charles Burns in 1987, it was "Sam Moore" who "<u>donated</u> the land for the cemetery". Considering the trail of the land ownership transfers and the known records of the life of Samuel H. Moore, it was only he who would have been in a position to make this donation of land for a "colored cemetery". Of course, at one point, Mr. Burns called it the "old Sam Moore Cemetery", which seems to indicate that Sam Moore was already using it as a cemetery (perhaps for his own family or slaves) before he donated the land for use as a black cemetery.

It is known that Samuel H. Moore's family members for the most part were buried in the Maple Hill Cemetery in Huntsville, not on the arsenal lands. Maple Hill records from the *OLD HUNTSVILLE MAGAZINE* website show a burial for David Moore, died at age 56 on 23 September 1843, with the notation that he was a **doctor**, born in Virginia, and lived in Huntsville. There is also a record for David Leslie Moore, who died at age 50 but stated on two different death dates / records. One death date is given as 21 June 1887, with the notation of "CSA Veteran". The other death date is given as 17 July 1887, with the notation "Son of David Moore". Still another record shows a Mattie (nickname for Martha) Moore who died at age UNKNOWN on 21 March 1857. There was, however, absolutely no match on Sam / Samuel / S. / S. H. Moore in the Maple Hill Cemetery records by *OLD HUNTSVILLE MAGAZINE*.

Considering the Confederate States Army service by both Samuel H. Moore and his brother David Leslie Moore, it may appear to be strange that he would provide for a black cemetery in the 1880s. However, in spite of the common stereotypes and misconceptions about the old South's social structure, some plantation owners really did care about their slaves. Even as James Clemens set his slaves free about 10 years before the Civil War, so it is now believed that Samuel H. Moore may have wanted to provide some "reparation" for the blacks that had worked on the plantations of his father and his maternal grandfather. Even though Samuel served with distinction in the war, rising to the rank of Major while still in his early twenties, he must have observed the free blacks living next door to his family in Huntsville in the 1850 census, as well as generally living with servants in the house, since his mother Martha had 14 household slaves in the 1850 count. He could not help but grow to appreciate them as people, not property. If the South had won the war, he may well have soon followed the example of James Clemens, his nearby neighbor in Huntsville.

Furthermore, there is another intriguing possibility that has not yet been explored. Granting that the Madison County Benjamin Harrison of the early 1800s was his maternal grandfather from Virginia, it may well be that some strong and noble family influences flowed in Samuel's veins. There was an earlier Benjamin Harrison and a later one that both were somewhat famous. They all shared Virginia roots. Benjamin Harrison of Charles City County, Virginia, who lived from 1726 to 1791 was a Governor of Virginia, a delegate to the Continental Congress, and a signer of the Declaration of Independence. That Benjamin was a father of William Henry Harrison, who served as the 9<sup>th</sup> President of the United States. The elder Benjamin was also the great grandfather of **the 23<sup>rd</sup> President of the United States (1889 – 1893), Benjamin Harrison.** 

In fact, the 23<sup>rd</sup> President also served in the armed forces during the Civil War. Of course, since he was from Ohio, he was in the Union Army. He had the rank of Colonel, and saw action at the battles of **Kennesaw Mountain** in Georgia, **Peachtree Creek**, and **Nashville**. Since our Madison County Benjamin Harrison had a grandson named Samuel H. Moore who served in the Confederate forces as a Major in the same engagements, it is somewhat credible that these possible kinsmen faced one another directly in these conflicts.

While this report so far has investigated ownership of the land of the cemetery, it is assumed that Beverly Curry's interviews have covered the aspects of burials in the Moore – Landman Cemetery during the early 1900s. The Landman portion of history of the area is somewhat covered in the Summary Report of the Landman Cemetery, 34-1. The census records below are from the 1880 enumeration, as compiled in the Mormon's Family History Resource File. These census excerpts serve to show the families who lived in the area around the cemetery during that time, so that by name association and conjecture, one may find clues to burials in the late 1800s in the cemetery. Some selected white families were left in the list as "location clues", since it is generally known where those families had their houses.

An e-mail message from Beverly Curry to John Rankin in 2002 told of an interview with an old-time resident of the arsenal area lands who recalled some of the names of people buried in the "Sam Moore Cemetery":

Ovoy Horton was mentioned a rocket article. I have interviewed his wife. He worked for Kershaw and Butler, the construction contractor who built the first buildings here for the Army and continued to work for the arsenal. His wife has a photo of him at a test stand. Ovoy was the son of James Horton, Grandson of Everett Horton, and Great Grandson of Jack Horton.

His Grandfather 's brother, Yancy Horton was the one who donated the land for the black school in Pond Beat (on Buxton Road). The school, Horton School, was a "Rosenwald school". Julius Rosenwald, once a president of Sears & Roebuck, was a rich philanthropist. He wanted to help rural blacks to get an education but to help them in a manner the required community commitment and involvement. So he devised a plan to match his contribution that what the community raised. Donating the land counted in the match. I scanned a photo of the ground breaking for Horton School. According to interview info from another Horton family source (Pearl Higgenbotham), Yancy (born 1845) gave "the first acre of land" to build the school. Yancy and also his father were called Savoy.

CEMETERY: Pearl H. recorded in her small notebook that the following names under the heading of Horton's cemetery:

Deceased daughter of Ophelia Horton, died age 11, 1925, Madkin Mts. in Silver

Hill, Sam Moore Cemetery 1. Maria Russel Ernest 2. Sophia Horton 3. Maria Jacobs Langford Horton--age 9 mo (note: on the small note book, to the far right, across from this line and the one above is a note saying Berton Rd Cemetery, Pond Beat) Jacobs Joiner David Bailey Sr--neighbor, last buried King Bell Pecola (writing uncertain) Turner Fannie Robinson Boby Boy Roh... Otto Turner John Crimes

Pearl said "our cemetery was mostly on Frank Jacobs side but it was at the end of that road by the school. The raod that divided the land went down to the school, was was off the only main road that went through Pond Beat that took you all the way to Whitesburg Drive. NOTE: Today, part of this route is along Buxton Road, but then the road was changed. This is evidenced in looking at the 1928 road map versus the arsenal map today.

SILVER HILLS--Pearl said ther was a church and a school over in Mullins Flat. Was an orginal church (called Cedar Grove Church) on the mountain, then they built a church in Pond Beat and called it Cedar Grove Church. The original church was near a community cemetery--now called the Horton/Joiner. Nothing but trees and rocks where the church was today. (This is straight from my notes--I don't know if this connected to Silver Hill--or whether she skipped back to talking about Pond Beat again, which is what it seems like.)

Cowan Cemetery- "that cemetery was in a different community--but it was on Papa's (Andy Cowan's) land."

Pearl's mother had two siblings: Joseph and Oscar Cowan. Others had died before that.

JACK HORTON: Pearl's great grandfather was a white slave owner. Amanda Jacobs was a slave that came to his farm after the Emancipation Proclamation. Amanda and Jack had three children together, one being Yancy Horton Sr. (Pearl's grandfather) and another oby, and a girl named Celia. After Jack Horton died, he left Amanda Jacovs 40 acres and then she married a guy named Sheffield. Amanda Jacobs was not from Pond Beat, but Pearl doesn't know where he was from.

PEARL's mother said Pearl's birthday was Feb. 18, 1919, but SS Office said had to be Jan. 18, 1919.

Also in interviewing Pearl H. I learned that In 1928 the Cedar Grove Methodist church was moved from a mountain which was known as Cedar Grove Mountain to that area in Pond Beat--became one of the nicest in Pond Beat.

Nothing more is known of the Moore – Landman Cemetery (46-1) at this time.
