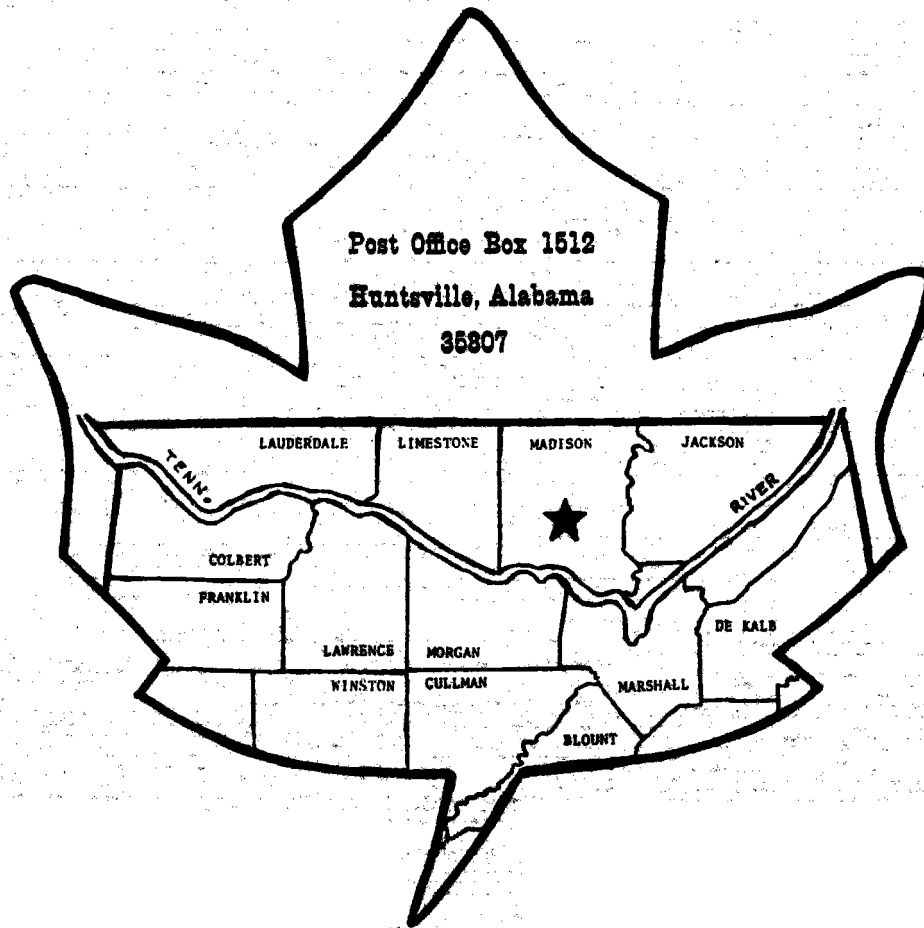

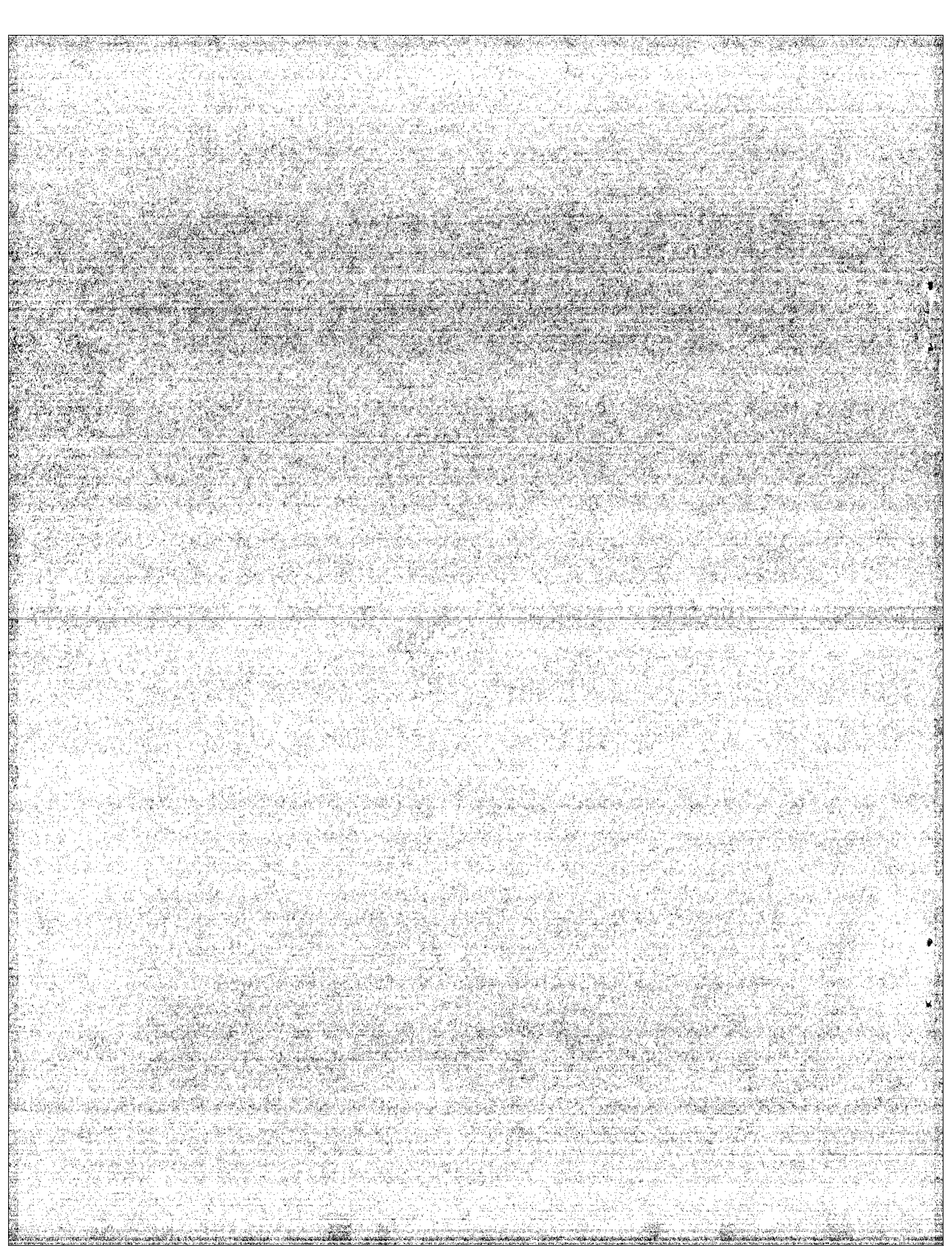

TVGS MEETING, JULY 1969

TVGS met 22 July at the Huntsville Public Library. Mrs. Richard H. Gilliam, Jr., president, presiding.

Mrs. Eugene G. Cowart introduced Mr. Elbert Watson, our new library director, who spoke on "The Place of Genealogy and Local History in American Society." Mr. Watson emphasized that: 1) Genealogy builds good citizenship for as one digs into the background of his forbears, he becomes entwined in the community and a community with an interest in its past has a greater sense of worth. 2) Great events of history come alive for us if we get personally involved in them. 3) We impart our heritage to future generations when we search out information and record it. As library director, Mr. Watson asked for our help in building a better "laboratory" in which to work.

Mrs. Theodore E. Perkins and Dr. L. Wayne Johnson were elected as new board members.

Mrs. V. William Hamner, Jr., chairman of our sesquicentennial celebration project reported on the progress of the venture.

Mrs. Gilliam advised the group of some land records which she had located on a trip to Washington, D. C.

GENERAL HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, ALABAMA  
BY JAMES ARTHUR THOMASON

(As published in The Guntersville Advertiser and Democrat)

Chapter I - Early Days On Brindlee Mountain - (28 February 1945)

On Dec. 28, 1888, the late Mr. and Mrs. J.M. Thomason, their children, Walter, Arthur, Dora and Bessie; the late Mr. and Mrs. C.D. Thomason; Mr. and Mrs. J.R. Thomason; Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Leak and two children, James and Betty, arrived from Greenville County, S.C., to Marshall county, Alabama.

There were four families in two covered wagons. They had four mules, worked "Grip" and "Pete" to one wagon, "Kate" and "Jumbo" to one wagon. We were on the road for 9 days. We came to the late G.W. Thomason's 3 miles east of Arab.

This country was thinly settled and few patches of land cleared up at that time. There were five houses from where the late J.M. Thomason lived (now the Fry post office site) to Arab. Living in those five houses were the late Mrs. Sarah Ann Brown, the late W.R. Coker, the late A.M. Forrester, the late John Thrift and the late J.H. Cambron.

Most of the land was in woods. The people worked a few patches, and they would also go to Brown's Valley and work. They would get a bushel of corn for a day's work.

Didn't have any stock law. Hogs, cows, horses ran outside. The farms or patches were fenced in with rail fence, but sometimes cattle would get in and eat up the crop. The hogs were wild and they fattened on the moss, acorns, etc. You had to run them down with a dog or shoot them.

The roads had a path beaten out on the side and high in the middle. Had sage grass on the ridge. People those days worked oxen. They would graze along on the grass and get hot and loll their tongues out.

Most of the people plowed steers, let one run on the range half the day and plow the other, and change about. They had a cow bell ringing and they would go and drive up their ox.

Back in those days they had wagons with wooden spindles with a bar of iron on top and bottom of spindle, with a hole in one end of the irons, put a linch pin to keep the wheel from running off. They would go to the woods and get some rich pine and split up and make a kiln and run tar to put on the spindles of the axle, of the wagon. Sometimes the spindle would get dry, and a cold still morning, you could hear the shrieks of the wagon.

Those days they didn't have many grist mills. There was a water mill in Brown's Valley.

The late Robert (Bob) Hall owned a grist mill. They had a race built out of planks. A trough ran from the head of the race. They would open a gate and the water would run down and

pour on a big overshot wheel that turned the mill. The late Mrs. Sarah Ann Brown would attend to the mill when her son, J.W. Brown was gone. Mr. Brown lives at Arab now.

There were two water mills on Brindlee mountain. One mile south of Arab the late Riley Maze operated a grist mill and a sash sawmill. Three miles south east of Arab, the late Robert Hall operated a grist mill and sash sawmill.

### Chapter II - Early Days On The County Roads - (7 March 1945)

The county bought some road machines drawn by mules, used them a few years. They then bought tractors, etc.

To build the road across Brown Creek beyond Warrenton the county put a bond issue on, put a rock crusher at the Feemster Spring at Warrenton, ground up limestone rock and built a pretty good road.

The late J.B. Shumate was county commissioner, lived at Oleander. J.H. Carter was the Probate Judge.

The TVA took over and that road is covered in water and all that work was thrown away. I guess Marshall county is still paying on those bonds.

The RFC, CWA, and PWA projects built some roads. T.C. Hough was county commissioner. He lived at Union Grove. Took those big road machines and built a road on the Feemster gap, Fry gap, Thompson Falls gap, the road from Union Grove down into Parches Cove.

The people one time got up a petition to kill the road down the Fry gap, and I circulated a petition to retain it. Some of the hands lived in Brown's Valley, had to work on the Fry gap. They didn't want it. It is a useful road, the people haul their cotton to the gin and go after the doctor.

Those mountain gaps have a lot of sand on them and you can't hold a road. The roads need to be cherted.

The roads are not complete yet, but they are 50 or 75% better than they were 50 odd years ago. The war is on and the machinery is scarce and the commissioners don't have a show.

The people from Brindlee mountain used to go to Guntersville in ox wagons and stay at the camp house belonging to A.G. Henry. It would take 2 days to make the trip. They can run it now in 35 or 40 minutes.

Those days, people were social going in an ox wagon. They would stop and speak. "Hello, John. How are Sallie and the children?" Now they go in a car and pass you by, always in a hurry.

Chapter III - Early Days In The County Schools - (14 March 1945)

In 1889 the school system was poor. Had 3 months school a year. A lot of teachers just held a third grade certificate.

There were three township trustees. They would employ the teachers, sign contracts, etc.

Most of the school houses were built out of hewn logs and the seats were made out of slabs. They bored four slanting holes, two at each end, to put the legs in and I want you to know you got tired sitting on the benches. Didn't have any back to lean against.

The first school I went to was at Arab. It was a log building, had a door in the north end, one window in the end of the house. The house stood up there where the old cemetery is. It was 1890, when we went to school. The house was built in 1883. The M. E. Church folks built it for a church.

The teacher was Prof. Asberry Hedgecock. He was tall, lean, had black eyes set back in his head. When he spoke to you, you had to step. If you didn't you were called to the front.

He had a hickory switch standing up in the corner, ready to use. If he had to whip you, you would remember it. Nowadays the principal calls you to the office and uses a paddle.

We never had dreamed up a school bus and didn't know anything about a patent desk. Had old fashioned black boards up on the wall, planks dressed and blacked with lamp black. We used slate and pencil.

We carried our dinner in a tin bucket. We carried what we had from home and were glad to get it.

If more than one of the family were going to school they carried enough in one bucket for all and they would eat together. Nowadays each one has a lunch to himself.

You didn't have to have an armful of books, but you had to learn what books you did study.

MADISON COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI TERRITORY TAX LISTS  
 Part IV in a series beginning in Vol. 3, No. 2

This series was discontinued after Part IV when microfilm of the original records became available, thus permitting a more detailed study. The list was republished in its entirety in Valley Leaves, Vol. 4, #4, June 1970.

The original Tax Lists are located in The Dept. of Archives & History, Jackson, Miss. Dr. Frances Roberts of Huntsville, Ala. has allowed TVGS to use her copy of these lists in making the following compilation. Alphabetizing was done by Mrs. F. Edward Williams. The 1810 Tax List was compared with similar lists by Mr. Richard S. Lackey of Forest, Miss. and the late Mrs. Howard C. Jones, Sr. of Huntsville, Ala. Each "X" represents payment of property tax for the year. As is common in most old records, there is a wide variation in the spelling of names. There was no 1814 tax return.
