

#### GENERAL HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, ALABAMA

### James Arthur Thomason

(As published in the 1945 and 1946 issues of The Guntersville Advertiser and Democrat. This series began in Valley Leaves Vol. 4, No. 1, Sept. 1969)

Chapter XIV - A Wilderness When Hiram Brashier Came (May 30, 1945)

I will tell of some of the first settlers. The late Hiram Brashier and family from South Carolina came to Marshall County in 1855 and settled where R. R. Cobb lives.

He pitched his camp and cut logs and notched them down at the corners and built him a house. Weren't any saw mills. He rived boards and lathing for his roof. Those days they placed the boards on the roof and weighted them down with poles.

He was an Abraham of his day. He had a great faith, going out from an old settled country, to a new country, it in a wilderness. There were panthers, they could hear them hollering at night. There weren't any railroads, mail facilities, etc.

In the 60's the M. E. church (northern) organized a church at the Hiram Brashier home, and they built a log house for a church. It stood till the 70's when the woods got a fire and burned down the buildings. It stood where the Brashier's Chapel cemetery is. The church was named Brashier's Chapel.

About 1872 Rev. J. C. Hunkapillar, who was on the Marshall Circuit, organized another church, M. E. church South. They built another log church half a mile west of the cemetery, called it by the same name.

Rev. Peter Alexander Jackson Renfro, a local preacher would walk from Warrenton 8 miles and preach at Brashier's Chapel.

Rev. James "Uncle Jimmie" Jones lived at Summit. He preached at the chapel.

David Brashier was Sunday School superintendent and class leader for years. Stephen Tuttle Thompson superintended the school, while it was an M. E. Church.

Later years they moved the membership of the M. E. church to Arab. In 1883 they built a log building where the cemetery is and in 1897 built a church 12 miles Southwest of Arab, Union Hill.

At the old log building of the M. E. church Southwest of the cemetery, the late G. W. Thomason, who came from South Carolina in 1881 was Sunday school Supt. and steward till 1889.

The late Rev. Joe I. Williams, pastor of Summit Circuit transferred the membership of Brashier's Chapel in 1889. In 1897 the late Rev. J. C. Hunka-

pillar was on the Warrenton circuit. He re-organized the church at Hill's school house. Still called it Brashier's Chapel.

The present church building is a frame structure built in 1899. The late M. L. Leak gave 2 acres of land. After the membership was moved to Arab, Rev. E. T. Pesnell a local preacher preached at Yancy Coker's home and had Sunday School in an old dwelling house. The late J. F. Prentice was Sunday school Supt. and steward.

Chapter XV - Women Didn't Wear Pants In Those Days (June 6, 1945)

Back in those days women rode horse back. The saddle had an iron horn, they called it. They rode sideways, wore riding skirts.

Nowdays, the women ride astride and wear pants. Back when I was a boy we never saw women wear pants.

It took 10 yards of cloth to make a woman a dress. They could buy cotton checks or it was "bell factory." It cost four cents a yard. A dress would cost forty cents. Now-a-days they make a dress out of 3 to 4 yards.

Way back in other days women wore hoop skirts, wanted their dresses to spread out. Now they want them tight.

In those days they mostly used midwives instead of doctors. It didn't come so high, often not more than \$2.50. Once Evidence Cranford, who lived on Brindlee mountain, went to the A. G. Henry store in Guntersville. He was barefoot and had his pants legs rolled up above his knees. He had been walking and you could see the mud on his feet.

Mr. Monore, a brother-in-law of Mr. Henry who clerked in the store, thought he would pull a joke on Mr. Cranford and he wouldn't have an answer. Mr. Monroe said, "Mr. Cranford, what did your shoes cost you?" Mr. Cranford said, "They cost my father \$2.50 45 years ago."

Mr. Henry said, "Mr. Monroe, pick out a pair of shoes for Mr. Cranford and charge them to your account."

Chapter XVI - Only Two Sons Of Brashier Family Idving (June 13, 1945)

In 1876 J. R. N. Thompson ginned 56 bales of cotton at the Brashier Spring near where J. W. Cobb now lives.

Cobb Bodine and B. V. Alexander operated a horse gin in 1887 near where Houston Coker lives.

Isaac Thompson operated a grist mill just below where mink creek pours over the Thompson falls. It washed away in 1873 when the July freshet came. Old folks have told me it rained 40 days and nights. Not much crops were made that year.

Hiram Brashier's son-in-law, Yancy Coker came from Greenville County, S. C., in 1867, and settled at the Thompson falls.

The late Hiram Brashier's wife, Irena Cox Brashier, belonged to that historic family of Coxes from Greenville, County, S. C. She was a shouting kind of Methodist. She shouted at the spinning wheel, in the cornfield and at church. She was the salt of the earth.

Hiram Brashier had a daughter named Mary, who married J. W. Sinquefield. They moved to Mississippi.

He had a son, James Brashier who moved to Mississippi, and one son, Lewis Brashier, who went back to Greenville County, S. C. The late J. Q. Brashier another son, lived in the Brashier's Chapel community and moved to Brown's Valley, and died in 1940 at his daughter's home, Mrs. Pearl Johnson.

Just two male members of the Brashier family are living, sons of J. Q. and Mrs. Rebecca Nabors Brashier. They are J. W. Brashier, Guntersville 1, and T. R. Brashier, Guntersville. There are four daughters living Mrs. Irena Rice, Guntersville 1; Mrs. Isla McGee, Guntersville 1; Mrs. Susie Aldrege, Arab 1; and Mrs. Pearl Johnson, Guntersville.

Chapter XVII - Took Half A Day To Count The Money (June 20, 1945)

- W. D. Folsom operated a jug factory near Sweet Gun. Those that turned the ware were M? H. Eckerlush, Mr. Nunn and Mr. Vancuron.
- A. C. Roan peddled the jug ware. He worked an ox to a one horse wagon. He went to New Hope, Owen's Cross Roads, etc. peddling.

He said on one trip back from New Hope he had to cross the Tennessee River at Deposit and the wind was high and the whitecaps bursting. The wind blew them down the river below the landing and he had a time getting out of the steep banks of the river.

At Sweet Gum, the late H. H. Smith operated a store and grist mill. He sold his place to B. G. Collins and bought a place on Sand mountain.

He paid the man \$3000 in silver. He had it hidden in the block of his gasoline engine. He carried the money to the Bank of Arab and it took the banker over half a day to count it.

James Osburn and G. B. Johnson operated a grist mill at Sweet Gum. J.R.N. Thompson, Henry Berry and G. B. Johnson operated a sawmill. Willis Brown operated a blacksmith shop near the top of Brindlee mountain at Feemster gap, nearly at the corner of Marshall, Blount and Cullman counties.

There were people who lived in Blount or Cullman county who would get their marriage license in Marshall and come to the Brown place to get married.

J. N. Feemster owns the place. He has run a syrup mill and blacksmith shop.

The first Burmuda grass I ever saw, Willis Brown gave the rent free to the late John Collins, to set out five acres of land. He set out the grass near a log house. Some years ago a family named Edmondson lived there. There are two graves near the house. I was told it was a lady named Bailey and her child.

The late Frank Miller ran a store at Sweet Gum in the Smith store house. He also operated a syrup mill. J. W. Fielding and Jay Woodruff operated a saw mill near Sweet Gum.

J. R. Michael and Walter Michael ran a saw mill at South Fry.

Chapter XVIII - Drunk Man Kissed His Wife At The Altar (June 27, 1945)

B. V. Alexander said: "Father and I would walk from the side of Brindlee mountain five or six miles to the old log church, Brasher's Chapel, through the week to be at prayer meeting. We Also attended church at Beech Creek at an old log church.

"Once while Rev. J. C. Hunkapiller was preaching a report of a pistol was heard on the outside of the house. George Gross, a young man, hollered, 'It went off accidentally.'

"The Ku Klux were pretty numerous and the shot excited the congregation. They began to jump up. I was about 5 years old and I was afraid to get up. Those days children weren't allowed to go out of church.

"George Gross hollered again, 'Just an accident,' and the crowd quieted down."

"It was the close of the Civil War and a lot of the soldiers were at church, just come home."

The writer of this sketch in the 90's was attending protracted meeting at Diamond. Rev. J. C. Hunkapillar was doing the preaching. He made an altar call one night and a lady came to the altar. Her man was drunk and he went up in the altar and kissed his wife.

They swore out a warrant for him before J. F. Prentice, a Justice of the Peace. He deputized J. H. Thrift and John deputized me and others. We went down near his home at Beech Creek.

I had a double barrel breech loading shotgun. I was afraid of it. It was the first time I had ever been out to hunt a man with a gun. We made a search but he left the country. I wouldn't make an officer, I am too big a coward.

Chapter XIX - Don't Realize What Pioneers Did For Us (July 4, 1945)

The first settlers on Brindlee mountain in clearing up the land, would cut the small timber and sprouts. They would leave the large trees and

deaden them by cutting a ring around the tree during the full moon in May and peeling the bark off 4 or 5 feet.

The wind would blow down the timber and they would invite their neighbors in and have a log rolling.

About six or eight men would carry a log and pile them up and later on would burn them. They wasted a lot of good timber.

There was always some one who wanted to show off. They would try out their manhood, see who could pull the other down with the hand stick. The one who had the log rolling would give a big dinner or supper, sometimes would have a dance at night.

In first settling up this country they built houses out of hewn logs. They had house raisings. Some would hew the logs, some notch the corners, etc.

The people who first settled this country broke themselves down clearing land, building houses for the rising generation. The younger generation doesn't appreciate it.

People would come in from other states and pick out a place and build them a shack of a house. They called them squatters. Some would enter the land, and some would sell their claim.

The first settlers hunted a lot. They would burn off the woods in the spring for a range for the cattle. They destroyed a lot of good timber.

Some had a net. They would ride a horse and drive quail into a net. Before the land was cleared there were lots of snakes.

Back before the stock law cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, etc. ran at large and ticks nearly ate the stock up. Each man who owned cattle would mark them, a swallow fork in the right ear or a hole in the left ear. Sometimes people would get up a dispute about their stock.

#### SHERROD CEMETERY, COLBERT COUNTY, ALABAMA

Located about five miles southwest of Tuscumbia, Alabama - see letter Copied by Mrs. V. W. Hamner, Huntsville, Alabama 24 September 1960

March 31, 1970

Dear Editor:

I cannot give you the location of this small cemetery. When I was taken there in 1960, I was not in possession of a topographical map - or any kind of a map - of Colbert County.

You go west-southwest out of Tuscumbia on U.S. 72 West: go over the bridge, turn left on to a county road. Follow this road for about limiles, then make a sharp right turn on to another county road. You go on past the old Sherrod house. When you come to the tabernacle, turn right. This road will take you to the pasture gate with the cattle guard; if the bull is in the pasture, park your car along the fence and walk the rest of the way. If the bull is not in the pasture, it is all right to drive your car through the pasture. Be sure to close the gate behind you. Cross this pasture, angling to the southwest (to your left), crawl under, or through, the barbed wire fence to the second pasture. Cross the second pasture (still to your left) and you can see the cemetery in a small grove of trees. Two more barbed wire fences, and you are there.

Note: This 1819-1832 Register, located in the Alabama Archives, contains the Civil Appointments for all of the counties in Alabama created before 1832. The appointments to be printed in Valley Leaves will be those from Blount (this issue), Decatur, Franklin, Jackson, Lauderdale, Lawrence, Timestone, Madison and Morgan Counties in that order. All enteries before late March 1823 are in the same handwriting which indicates they were copied from an earlier list; however most remarks appear to have been entered "later." Some pages have no or only a few names, others are full, and for some unknown reason appointments were written on unnumbered pages in the back of the register when there were still blank pages in the front part. The Alabama Historical Quarterly, Summer 1944, published the "Register of Gubernatorial Appointments, Civil and Military, Feb. 8, 1818-Oct. 4, 1822" for the entire state. Although there are some duplicate 1819-1822 enteries in these two Alabama registers, there are also some original appointments and remarks shown in both.

On this 14October 1850 personally appeared Daniel M Bradford aged 57 years, a resident of Huntsville, Madison Co. in the State of Ala. (repeats same service as already stated) He volunteered at Nashville. Tenn. on or about 1 Nov. 1814 and was appointed and commissioned 1st Lieutenant of said Volunteer company on the 13th Novr. 1814 and afterwards commissioned as Captain, at the Battle Ground below New Orleans on the 10th Jan. 1815, that he volunteered for the term of six months, and continuing in actual service in said war for the term, and was honorably discharged at Nashville, Tenn. on the 13th May 1815 as will appear by my discharge herewith presented, and by the muster Rolls of my Company, now on file in the War Office. He makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which he may be entitled under act of Sept. 28, 1850. Thos. H. Eanes, J.P.

The obituary of Daniel Morgan Bradford states that he died on 13th Oct. 1869 aged 76. He was Capt. of Carroll's Life Guard at the battle of New Orleans and was appointed by President Jackson Receiver of Land Office at Huntsville, a position which he held until removed by Grant. (Livingston, Ala, Journal Oct. 22, 1869.)

#### BOOK REVIEW

Mississippi Valley Pioneers. Compiled and edited by Neil J. Toups. Neilson Publishing Company, P. O. Bex 52611, Lafayette, Louisana 70501. \$7.95 prepaid (1970)

Passenger Lists of 37 ships that left France bound for the French Province of Louisians between October 25, 1717, and July 21, 1721, will prove to be a valuable aid to the genealogist. Mr. Toups reports in his preface that the original passenger lists have been remarkably preserved in the Paris Archives for over two hundred and fifty years, catalogued under the Archives of the Colonies. To his knowledge, only one partial attempt has heretofore been made to publish these lists.

The compiler has more or less confined his brief glossary to the more commonly listed occupations of the passengers, but this reviewer's school-girl French did not allow perusal of the book without a French-to-English dictionary close at hand.

Not to be overlooked are the lists of German emigrants, "who, in essence as well as in fact, were the backbone of the Colonial venture."

One of the most important contributions Mr. Toups has made is in the recording of former European residences or birthplaces of the passengers, an ever-difficult task to the American genealogist.

The extensive bibliography is excellent.

Despite the lamentable absence of an index, Mr. Toups has published a valuable aid to the researcher in the colonial settlement along the Gulf of Mexico.
