# SESSION RECORDS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HUNTSVILLE, ALA. ORGANIZED JUNE 1818 VOL. 2

The original copy of this book is located in the church office of The First Presbyterian Church, 307 Gates Avenue, S. E., Huntsville, Madison County, Alabama. The records of The First Presbyterian Church were obtained by Mr. Donald Shenk and transcribed and abstracted by Mrs. Roy J. Cochran.

The greater portion of the book contains Session Records, after which are found a roll of church members, a list of non-resident members, and a list of baptisms. This latter portion of the volume has been transcribed in total. Some additional items contained in the Session Records elaborate on the members' names, previous residence, later residence, relationships, These abstracted bits of information will be added following the entry etc. on the membership roll and will be indicated by SRp\_, Session Record page on which the information is found. No effort has been made to transcribe information regarding pastors of the church, clerks of the sessions, elders, deacons, or information other than that which will help locate members of this congregation during the period from 22 December 1849 (the date of the first congregational meeting recorded in the Session Records) and 1 January 1888 (the date of the last session recorded). Following the complete transcription of the latter portion of this volume, we have abstracted some additional information from the Session Records which could not be annexed to an entry in the latter portion. This information is also preceded by the page number on which it is located in the Session Records.

Many names are found in more than one entry. All of the names, dates, and 'how received' at the beginning of the membership roll until 1850 appear to have been entered at one time. We may surmise that these names were copied from an earlier book which has been missing since before 1900. A new list was begun on October 1, 1880, when the names of members still on the church rolls were recopied. Members who were 'Dismissed' were removed from the church rolls presumably to be entered on the rolls of another church. The pages of the latter portion of the volume are unnumbered, the numbering is ours. The Session Records fill 254 numbered pages.



# MADDERRA TOMBSTONE, MADISON COUNTY, ALABAMA

Located NW4 Section 30, Township 3 South, Range 1 West, near the intersection of Old Monrovia Road and Johns Road, by a fence on Bill Brockway's farm. This large tombstone was struck at a depth of about 18 inches by a sub-soiler point during a test demonstration in a cotton field next to the Brockway house. [Soil is usually plowed only to a depth of 6 to 8 inches.] The demonstration was halted for fear of damaging another point and the "object" was dug up. The surmise is the tombstone was used to fill a ditch and the area leveled for a field many years ago. Mr. Brockway, owner of the field for about 25 years, has no additional data on this cemetery, nor does the previous owner. Perhaps there are other tombstones buried there? # GENERAL HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, ALABAMA by James Arthur Thomason

(As published in the 1945 & 1946 issues of The Guntersville Advertiser and Democrat. This series began in Valley Leaves Vol. 4, No. 1, Sept. 1969.)

Chapter XXVII - History of Georgia Mountain (September 19, 1945)

The Ayers, Fosters and Alfords owned farms on the Tennessee river and grew a lot of corn. The people would go from the mountain and buy corn off those farms. Most of the people on Georgia mountain would rent land on the river to make their corn.

The late Pat Yarbrough, lived on this mountain. He sharpened gins. He came from Cleburne County. I was told he ran the first locomotive engine through Georgia.

Mrs. Tempie Shores Fielding said: "My sister and I, when we came to Alabama carried water about 2 miles on a pony from a spring on the Alford place."

The first persons buried at Mt. Carmel cemetery were two children named Baker and Kirbo.

The Fielding family came from Habershane county, Georgia, to Alabama in 1859.

The Shore family first camped where the Mount Carmel cemetery is.

The late J.A. Dispennett came from Indiana to Alabama. He came from Decatur to Manchester. He operated a saw mill. He moved to this mountain in 1892. He was born May 10, 1886; died July8, 1917. The list of dead buried at Mt. Carmel cemetery also includes M.A. Rainwater, Mrs. D. D. Morrow, James Turner, J.W. (Bud) Fielding.

Pat Duett said: "I went to school at Mason's Chapel log church. William (Bill) Garrett was the teacher."

Other teachers were Bill Hogan, Asberry Hedgecock, Billy Parrot, Susie Austin, Helen Arnold, Mrs Page, Mrs Tempie Shults, Miss Sallie Foster, Miss Vick Foster, Thomas Bell, Mack Coplin, Bill Garrett, H R Whitman and others.

The Mt. Carmel church was built in 1884 by Capt. Ira Foster who came from Atlanta.

Among the pastors of the Baptist church were: Revs. James Phillips, J D Fletcher, James Stover, L F Campbell, Collins and others.

Some among the Methodist pastors were: Revs J C Hunkapillar, W M Yarbrough, E L Roy, B D Cook, W A Hamric, T N Martin, E Upton, T W Smallwood, W D Peoples, J H Hallman, G E Pharr and others. (General History of Marshal Co., Ala., continued)

# Chapter XXVIII - History of Georgia Mountain (Sept. 26, 1945) (Continued from last week)

In1901 or 1902 Rev. E L Roy was pastor of the Methodist church. They had a dance at someone's house and Preacher Roy went to the dance to see what the folks did. Some of the people commended and some criticized him.

There was crowd of boys from across the Tennessee river and they were clever, but they wouldn't take any kidding. The preacher put a dishpan on the floor and told the folks there was a rooster under it. When they looked under the pan he said, "Oh yes, I caught one sucker." Some of the boys were armed and they were about to put out his light.

It seemed to me he was out of his place, but the preacher said, "If it wasn't fit for a preacher to go to, it wasn't fit for the girls to go to."

The late A C Menn lived on Georgia Mountain. He made the race for county treasurer but was defeated. He married the second time to Miss Mariah Brashier, a daughter of the late Hiram and Irene Cox Brashier. Her mother was 50 years old when she was born.

It has been said, the way they killed dog fennell on Georgia Mountain, they would pour peach brandy on it and the Georgians, would suck it and that would kill it.

Inf,; Sarah E Arnold, born 1878, died 1914; John M Walker, born 1865, died 1925; Tempie Walker Huckaby, born 1884, died 1925; Estell Atchley, born 1894, died 1918; Josiah Nabors, born 1820, died 1903; Mrs Josiah Nabors, born 1818, died 1901; J A Nelms, born 1861, died 1911; J M Dobbs, born 1845, died 1919; Maggie Dobbs, born 1848, died 1923; Allora King, born 1878, died 1912; Mary E Hulsey, born 1848, died 1922; William Hulsey died 1916, about 85 years old; J R Hulsey, born 1872, died 1922; W H Beard, born 1861, died 1917; Martha Malone, born 1899; V L Parrott, died 1888, age 76; T J Wood, born 1892, died 1919; Riley Nabors, born 1849, died 1929; Mary Walker, born 1859, died 1921; Louisa Starnes, born 1888, died 1919; Junior Brown, born 1891, died 1924; William A Mason, Co. G, 8th Ala. Cor.; L D Eubanks, born 1841, died 1910.

Chapter XXIX - History of Ruth (October 3, 1945)

The Ruth postoffice was established in the 90's. The first postmaster was Polk Brisco, next was J G Cleckler and H L Wright. It continued till 1905. The rural route, Arab Rt. 3, supplied the mail.

All the postmasters ran stores in connection with the post office.

Other merchants were Samuel Hyatt, Arthur Hyatt, Walter Light and A M Saylor.

Ruth Baptist church was built in the 80's or 90's.

The Mt. Oak Methodist church was organized in 1897. It is built on a mound with a large grove of oaks around it. There is where it got its name. They taught school in Ruth church until they buillt a school house.

C N Peek, before his death told me:

"I joined the M E church South at Shiloh in 1868. Rev E A Green was the pastor. I joined the Masons in 1871 at Covington, Ga. I was outside doorkeeper. I was married to Miss Fannie E Hayes in 1879. I have belonged to the Oddfellows, Grange, Farmers Union, Farmers Alliance and Good Templars."

They built a two story school near Mt. Oak church, called it Ruth. It was consumed by fire. They built again.

Some of the teachers included Mr Kyle, Miss Neely Wolf, Ulus Huckaby, Elva Bain, Miss Tullis, Prof. Overton, W T Solley, M N Hunt, Mrs Volley Cranford, George Bishop, Emmett Smile, Robert Beggers, Jennie Beggers, Minnie Winn, H P Barnard, Dr Frank Barnard, Mr Wendsor, O C Carter, Otis Weaver, Grady Wheeler, Edgar Weaver, Loyd Berry, Rosie Bell Canford, Doris Hawk and others.

Those that ran saw mills included Clinton Morrow, Miles Holmes, William Whitlock, M C Blanton, Preston Briscoe and Matt Morrow. All ran grist mills in connection. Matt Morrow operated a thresher, crusher, planer and shingle mill.

Dr Thomas Ryan ran the first grist mill by water power on Gilliam and Perkins Creeks.

The late H S Hartsfield said "there were three creeks that sunk and went under the mountain into Cotaco Valley."

Chapter XXX - History of Fry (October 10, 1945)

There is a road leading off Brindlee Mountain to Brown's Valley that they call Fry gap. That gave rise to the name of the post office. It was established in 1901.

J M Thomason was the postmaster and J A Thomason assistant. The post office was supplied from Red Hill. J A Johnson was the mail carrier.

(General History of Marshall Co., Ala., continued)

There was a store at Fry. S A Thomason was the merchant. Among those that ran stores at Fry were W L Clark, Mrs Florence Wilson and J T Breedwell.

J T Breedwell operated a grist mill. In 1901 W J Copeland and J E Linn operated a saw mill and grist mill.

M H Eckerbush ran a store at East Fry and J A Johnson ran a little store and blacksmith shop.

At South Fry, G B Johnson and J A Johnson ran a saw mill and grist mill. W O Johnson runs a grist mill, a saw mill, a hatchery and store at South Fry.

There lived a family named Fry at the foot of the mountain near where G B Johnson ran a saw mill.

W A Brazelton, a great-grandson of Solomon Fry, has the old Fry family Bible. Solomon Fry and Miss Cleo Hinds were married in 1814. They were married at the Fry cemetery on the ridge, near G B Johnson's saw mill.

The Shirley heirs own the land where the Fry Spring is. The spring was a large one but Joe Farris hauled rocks and filled in and put a hollow gum in it.

Byram Brazelton was the father of W A Brazelton. His mother was a daughter of W L Boyles and Sarah Fry Boyles. Bryrum Brazelton was the miller at the Champion Farris grist mill. It saw the same mill owned by Robert Hall in Brown's valley.

W J Copeland was the last one to own the grist mill. He put in a turbine water wheel, ran the grist mill, a shingle mill and a blacksmith shop.

W J Copeland and W A Hartsfield ran a saloon at the mill.

A T Reynolds ran a store and grist mill at East Fry. J E Coker, K B Hunt, J E Bryant and Mrs A J Maze ran a store at West Fry. J E Coker, J T Breedwell, J E Bryant and A J Maze ran a grist mill at West Fry.

In 1905 the mail went from Red Hill to Diamond by Fry on to Roswell and back to Red Hill. The office was discontinued. N B Berry was the carrier. Arab Rt. 1 and Guntersville Rt. 2 supplied the territory. A H Riddle was rural carrier on Arab Rt. 1 and then D C Swords. It is Arab Rt. 2. A O Thompson is carrier.

A H Copeland was on Guntersville Rt. 2 then they consolidated the routes out of Guntersville and made it Guntersville Rt. 1. S E Copeland carrier and now W D Newman. Carless Berry was substitute with A H and S E Copeland.

She states she married him in Spartanburg Co. S C on 25 day of Aug. 1820 by one William Smith, J P; that her name before said marriage was Sarah Warford; that neither had been previously married. That William Hazlewood died in St. Clair Co., Ala. on 25 Jan. 1863. The following have been places of residence since his discharge: Union District, S C until 1845 then to Cobb Co. Ga. remaining until Nov. 1851 and thence to St. Clair Co. Ala. 

A deed executed in 1819, a few weeks before Alabama became a State, has just been filed for record in the Project court. It was executed by Drvis Vance, of Tuskaloosa county, Territory of Mississippi, conveying to John James, of Madison county, fifty acres of land lying north of the Battle place and being a part of the Octavia Sanders plantation. The consideration was \$500. The deed is dated January 2, 1819.

Another deed nearly eighty years o'd was filed for record at the same time. It was executed by the State of Alabama and conveyed to Martha Jumes certificate for an area of school lands. It was written on parchment, bears date of 1835 and is signed by Sohn Gayle, governor of Alabama, at Tuscaloosa, which was then the State capital.

The two deeds belong to the same estate and they were rescued from oblivion and filed for record for the purpose of perfecting title to the property described in them.

The following History of Jackson Co. Ala., including the History of Stevenson, Ala. was copied from the Jackson County High School edition of the <u>Progressive Age</u> dated August 5, 1915. My brother Charles Richard McCulley was a member of the Senior Class of that year at Jackson County High School, located in Scottsboro, Ala. After his death in 1961 this old newspaper was found among his personal belongings. I heard him talk of how hard the Senior Class worked on this history.

On the front page of the paper are pictures of the faculty which include R. P. Wills, Miss Sarah Melton, Miss Evelyn Payton and Mr. Ira Taylor. Also on the front page is an article entitled Jackson County High School by Prof. R. P. Wills and a picture of Jackson County High School. #### HISTORY OF JACKSON COUNTY

Scottsboro, Alabama, Thursday August 5, 1915

Compiled by Senior Class, 1914-15

#### ORIGIN OF JACKSON COUNTY

Jackson County was organized by an Act of the State Legislature on December 13, 1819, and was named in honor of General Andrew Jackson, who was visiting in Huntsville - then temporary State Capitol - during the session of this first legislature.

The boundaries of this county have been changed six times since its organization. The original boundaries as given in the statutes are as follows: "All that track of county lately obtained from the Cherokee nation of Indians, lying on the north side of the Tennessee river, south of the Tennessee State line, and east of the present Madison County line, and of the Flint river, after it has left Madison County, it constitues one county, by the name of Jackson."

The cession of the Cherokee nation referred to above was made to the admitted states government on February 27, 1819, about ten months before the formation of this County.

Two years later the formation of Decatur County gave rise to an occasion necessitating a change in the original boundaries of Jackson County. Decatur County was organized by an Act of the State Legislature December 17, 1821, and was abolished three years later. It included the part of the great bend in the Tennessee river east of the Flint river and south and west of an irregular line running in a southwest direction from the ridge that divides the waters of the Flint and Paint Rock at the Tennessee boundary line south of the mouth of Sauta Creek. Its seat of justice was located at Woodville, and be it further enacted that all that track of county, lately obtained of the Cherokee nation of Indians, lying on the north mide of the Tennessee River, south of the present Madison

# (History of Jackson Co., Ala., cont.)

County line, and of the Flint River, after it has left Madison County, be constituted one county, by the name of Jackson.

And be it further enacted, "That the boundaries of Jackson County shall hereafter be as follows: To the west beginning at the mouth of Sauta Creek, thence up said creek to where the Winchester road crosses the same, thence on a straight line to the south end of a ridge, east of said creek, which divides the waters of Sauta Creek from the waters of Roseberry Creek, thence with the extreme height of said ridge to Winchester road, on the top of the mountain above William Hoskins, thence with said road to the Pole Ridge branch, thence on a straight line to Paint Rock River, one mile below the mouth of said river, thence on a line due west to the extreme height of the mountain that divides the waters of Paint Rock River from Flint River, thence with extreme height of said mountain northwest to the Tennessee State line, thence east with said line to where it strikes the Tennessee river, thence down the same to the beginning."

And be it further enacted, "That track of county lying west of Jackson County, south of the Tennessee State line, east of Madison County, and north of the Tennessee river shall constitute a separate and distinct county, to be called by the name of Decatur."

December 31, 1822, (better defined), that the line between Jackson and Decatur counties be as follows: To the west, beginning at the mouth of Sauta Creek, thence up said creek to where Winchester Road crosses said creek thence to Jesse Thompson's, thence to Caswell Bibey's, including said Jesse Thompson, William Cunduff Jackson, Thomas Jones, John Smart, and Caswell Bibey's in Decatur County, thence from said creek to top of mountain above William E. Hoskins, where the Winchester road descends the Cumberland mountain, thence to the most leading point of Lick Fork and mouth of Larkin's Fork of Paint Rock river, thence to the top of said mountain, thence a northwest course to the Tennessee State line.

DeKalb and Marshall counties were surveyed in 1836, and the present boundary was surveyed in 1870.

#### INDIAN BATTLES AND REMOVAL OF INDIANS

The Cherokee Indians were the chief inhabitants, but on several occasions the Creeks entered, but were forced out. The Cherokee territory extended from the Great Lakes to Alabama. They were the strongest tribe of Indians east of the Mississippi. As was common of all Indian tribes the women did most of the work while the men engaged in fighting, and carrying on war with the neighboring tribes. The Indians through this section were not particular as to clothing and were very dirty. They were of large stature and a light coffee color. The Cherokee Indians were not warlike in nature, but were good fighters when oppressed.

Several fights wave fought by Indians in this country. The most important one was fought on Mountain Creek near Canton, GA., about 1755. This battle was the hardest ever fought between Indians. The total number was estimated at about 1,500 Indians. There were twice as many Creeks as Cherokees. At first the Cherokee were overwhelmed, but they rallied and completely routed the Creeks.

After this battle the Creeks abandoned the whole of North Alabama and a treaty was signed between them in 1759. They remained friendly until 1813.

The removal of the Cherokee Indians from their native home in 1837 and 1838 furnishes one of the most touching stories in American history. They were moved by United States troops under the command of General Scott in 1824. There were about fifty thousand Creeks, Cherokees and Indians of other tribes who occupied about eleven million acres of land in Georgia. In 1825 a few Creeks signed a treaty ceding this land to Georgia. The remaining Indians objected and waged war on the whites and Creeks. President Adams interfered and Georgia threatoned to fight. The Cherokees in 1827 framed a new constitution and intended to remain in Georgia. The latter surveyed the Indian's lands and shut them out of their counts. The Supreme Court decided in 1832 that Georgia had no authority over the Cherokee territory, but President Jackson refused to recognize the decision. Congress sided with the president, and in 1834 passed a law providing for the removal of the Cherokees in Alabama, Tennessee and Georgia to Indian Territory.

# (History of Jackson Co., Ala., cont.)

These Indians were driven from their homes because they resisted the civilization of the white man who had settled on and robbed them of their territory. These two peoples differed in race, language and customs; thus they had no common bond to hold them together and it was impossible for them to live under the same government. In their struggle for existence the fittest was to survive, while the weaker was deprived of his territory because he was anti-social and not able to adapt himself to the higher civilization of the Caucasian race.

The troops entered the territory of the Cherokees and divided into small parties for the purpose of searching every home. The soldiers, with rifles in hand, pursued the Indians as though they were wild beasts. They would surround their homes, force them out, place them in line and march them to the nearest palisade. The Indians were forced to leave everything behind and follow the troops. Most of them submitted to their fate, but a few rebelled and force was necessary. The soldiers were followed by the rabble who robbed the Indian's homes, drove off his cattle, burned his houses and hunted his graves to rob them of their silver.

These palisades were fences formed of stakes driven in the ground and pointed at the top, enclosing a small plot of ground. In all about 17,000 Cherokees were gathered for removal. In June, 1837, they came down to Calhoun, Tennessee, stopping next to Rosse's Landing (now Chattanooga), then going to Gunter's Landing, where they were put on board boats, floated down the Tennessee, Ohio and Missippippi river to Indian territory. This first removal took place in the heart of the summer and over 1,600 died on the way. The remainder agreed to move themselves not later than October 20. They took the six months for their journey, but about 1,660 died on the second trip. Many died in the palisade and it is estimated that 4,000 Cherokees died as a result of removal.

The Indians were given 160 acres each in Indian Territory on which to build a house and raise their crops and immediately they started to build new homes. End.

#### HISTORY OF STEVENSON

Copied from the Progressive Age from Scottsboro, Ala. dated Thursday, Aug 5, 1915

Henderson Price was the first owner of the land where the town of Stevenson is now situated.

About 1825, the first settlers came here, mostly from Tennessee and Virginia. Only a few small houses and cabins were constructed at this time. And from the fact that there were no railroads through the town, the growth was very slow.

Some of the earliest settlers of the town were James Hogen, F. M. Pankey, R. Hatfield, Jno. Blake, Luke Willis, Lee Metts, F. M. McMahan, Bill Russell, Geo. Rodgers, Tom Osborn, G. W. Rice, Dr. James Russell and a few others.

N. B. Burch was one of the first merchants. A little while later James Hogue and Jno. R. Coffey built small stores.

The manufactories first attempted were grist and saw mills. Water power was used in running most all the mills.

One of the first mills near the present town of Stevenson was a grist mill near the bank of Crow Creek. It was run by horse power, which was carried on similar to some of the present methods of baling hay.

However, this history occurred before the town received its name. B. K. Stevenson and Jno. F. Anderson bought the land from Henderson Price and about the time the first railroad came through here, they divided the town into lots and sold them. The town then became known as Stevenson.

The first railroad to come through Stevenson was the Nashville and Chattanooga Railroad. This was constructed through here about 1830.

About 1853 the Southern Railway was extended through Stevenson and in 1857 it began to be operated between Stevenson and Decatur. The town now began to grow as a railroad center and it is largely to the railroad that is early growth is due. The engines operated on these lines at first were upright engines and indeed would look peculiar in comparison with the modern type. Wood

# (History of Stevenson, Ala., cont.)

was used instead of coal to fire the engines even up until 1880. No suspension bridges were built on either road for a good many years.

All the bottom lands then surrounding Stevenson were covered with heavy timber such as gum, etc. Also the mountains were covered with large amounts of excellent cedar. Therefore, the town until about the time of war was practically surrounded by a forest.

The town of Stevenson sent a good many of its best citizens into the ranks of the Confederate army. The first Alabama company left Stevenson in 1861 for Fort Morgan. Captain Ragsdale was the commander of the company. About a year later, the Thirty-first Alabama regiment went out from the town with Captain W. A. Coffey as the leader of the company.

It secended from the Union, though, not all the citizens of the town were in favor of it. And in the county the secession movement only won by one vote.

The Federals never located any troops here until about 1863. A small regiment encamped here. They remained here until near the end of the war and it was with this company that the only engagement during the war was fought here. It was only a small skirmish at Fort Harker and it resulted in the retreat of the Federals. Some retreated toward Nashville, while others joined the Federal army by erecting pontoons and crossing the river at Caperton's ferry.

During the war the growth of the town was retarded. One building is standing today, however, that was built about this time, namely; the Masonic Hall. The Masonic lodge was moved from Bolivar to Stevenson and a two-story building was erected which was used as a Masonic hall and church.

F. E. McMahan, W. H. McMahan, W. H. Washington, G. W. Thornton, H. M. Bunn and J. P. and J. S. Timberlake were citizens of the town who built business houses at this period.

W. W. Rosser, J. F. Martin, W. M. Cowan, Squire William McMahan, Captain C. D. Stoner, Dr. T. T. Cotnam and Dr. P. H. Helton were also highly respected citizens at this period of the town's history and they aided much in its development.

(History of Setvenson, Ala., cont.)

Among the additions to the town at this time was the William and Emma Austin College erected in 1875. It is situated in the eastern part of the town limits and it is at this building that some of Jackson County's best citizens began their education. The building is beautifully situated on a big campus at the foothills of the Cumberland Mountains. It is indeed an instituation that has rendered the town of Stevenson great benefits. It is an instituation of which the town of Stevenson should always be proud.

During this period of the town's history, the residence section increased rapidly as well as the business section. Being a railroad center and also a good agricultural center, many new families came to the town during the period from 1880 to 1890. Hotels and other business houses were also added at this time.

In the year 1890 a butter-dish factory was built in Stevenson by W. M. Wayne. This was one of the largest, if not the largest, manufactory of the town up to this time. It offered employment to over one hundred hands and this, of course, brought more people to Stevenson. This manufactory existed until about 1898 or 1900 and was then removed and a cotton mill was erected near the site of the old butter-dish factory.

At this time the people began to feel the need of a new church. As a result the Union church was erected and all denominations met here. This was the only church in town for a good many years. The Methodist and Christian churches were built later on and the old church was used by the Baptists and Presbyterians. The street on which the church was located has been named Church street on account of this church. This street has become one of the best residence sections of the town.

From time to time many new stores or business houses were built and by 1895 there were twelve or fifteen large business houses and two hotels.

But the year 1900 brought to Stevenson its largest manufacturing establishment, namely: The Broadus' cotton mill. This is a large stone structure, with additional warehouses, and good machinery, and is indeed a credit to any town. (History of Stevenson, Ala., cont.)

It furnished work for many hands; the officials of the mill also provide houses for its laboreres. For many years to come this establishment will be of importance to the town of Stevenson.

In 1903 or 1904 a hub factory was built in the town of T. C. Campbell and it was a good addition to the manufactories of the town.

In May, 1910, occured one of the largest destructions in the town, namely: the big fire. One of the stores caught fire during the night and as a result all the business houses were burned with the exception of five or six. Much property was consumed by the flames. But since then the houses have been replaced by all brick structures.

At present the town is growing rapidly. An efficient water-works system has been installed. Power is received from a large reservoir on the mountain above town and Stevenson is now well supplied with water.

The town is now furnished with electric lights and all evidence considered, with its picturesque situation at the foothills of the Cumberland Mountains, with its healthful climate, its railroad advantages and its manufactories it promises to be one of the leading towns of North Alabama for many years to come. End.

### BOOK REVIEWS

Hathcock Family History by Douglas W. Hathcock. Blue cardstock cover with plastic front oversheet, coat of arms cover design, spiral binding, indexed, 50 pages  $(8\frac{1}{2} \times 11)$ , \$10.00. Available from the author at 11002 Vivian Drive, N. W., Huntsville, Alabama 35810.

Presented is a history summary of 350 years of the Hathcock family, a family of English origin that, the author states, is almost extinct in England and can be found only in small numbers in America. (Several variants of the name are Heathcock, Haithcock, Hethcock, Hathcox, Haithcoat, Hathcoat, Hethcote, Hitchcock, Hatchcock, Hathcock, Hathcocke, Hethcox, Hathcote, Haithcox, Heithcox, Harthcock, Hathcocke, Hethcox, Hathcote, Haithcox, Heithcox, Haythcock, and Hethcott.) Even though some readers may be a little disappointed in not finding their complete genealogy or even their names mentioned, the author states in the Preface that separate manuscripts are available which contain details of many specific Hathcock lines and that interested readers should contact him.

This work is historically valuable, as well as interesting, since no other such history of the Hathcock family is known to exist. The compiler concentrates on the Hathcock families in America during the 18th and 19th centuries but refers to English instances as early as the 13th century. A worthwhile attempt is made to follow the migration of the earliest families and to show the genealogical connection as they spread from Virginia to several southern states. Of particular interest to this native southerner was a list of Douglas W. Hathcock's other publications which placed the Hathcocks in Bibb, Tuscaloosa, and St. Clair Counties, Alabama, and in Monroe and Tippah Counties, Mississippi. The reviewer wishes that Mr. Hathcock had given the price list so that one letter could replace the two which all Hathcock descendants will be writing when they purchase Hathcock Family History, as will other searchers who have interests in those geographical areas.

The author has presented tables to place early Hathcock families in Meherrin Parish of Virginia, Salisbury District of North Carolina, Camden District of South Carolina, and St. Clair County, Alabama, and has provided a table showing early Hathcock population distribution in the United States. He is to be complimented for this geographical arrangement in which he has utilized footnotes for vital statistics. (Book Reviews, cont.)

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The Tennessee Valley Genealogical Society was pleased to receive recently two index publications for review. To find an index in a new publication is expected; but to find that earlier published unindexed books have now been indexed is a real joy to all searchers who do not have time to read a book in order to determine whether or not the name for which they search is contained therein.

The Name Index to History of DeKalb County, Tennessee (Author: Will T. Hale), compiled by Mike Marler, 1970. Cardstock cover, stapled and tape bound, 8½ x 11, 43 pages, mimeographed, \$3.50 postpaid. Available from co-publisher John D. Pearson, 2698 Fessey Court, Nashville, Tennessee 37204.

This is a name index to the 254 (i-xviii) page <u>History</u> of <u>DeKalb</u> <u>County</u>, <u>Tennessee</u>, which was first published in 1915 and was reprinted in 1969. That history covers events and people that were prominent in DeKalb County during the period prior to and following the Civil War.

Name Index to Old Days in Nashville (by Miss Jane Thomas) and Early History of Nashville (by Lizzie P. Elliott), compiled by Mike Marler, 1970. Cardstock cover, stapled and tape bound,  $8\frac{1}{2}$  x 11, 20 pages, mimeographed, \$3.00 postpaid. Available from co-publisher John D. Pearson, 2698 Fessey Court, Nashville, Tennessee 37204.

<u>Old Days in Nashville</u> was printed in book form in 1897 (190 pages) and is a cultural history of that area. Early <u>History of Nashville</u> (286 pages, i-xi) was originally published, with a subject matter index, in 1911 as a school textbook and was reprinted in 1963. These books cover the history of Nashville from the period when it was founded in 1710 to about the middle of 1800. Mr. Marler has separated this index into three parts: Part I deals with personal names in <u>Old Days in Nash-</u> ville; Part II covers places recorded in that same publication; Part III is an index of people's names in <u>Early History of Nash-</u> ville.

Susannah Fitts, b. 1801 Va., d. 2-5-1885, Madison Co., Ala. He probably came to Madison Co., Ala. abt. 1820. Have been unable to place this James Ragsdale in my Ragsdale chart which goes back to 1644 "Massacre Day" Henrico Co., Va. when Godfrey Ragsdale was scalped by Indians. Will exchange data I have. Have found David in the 1860 census of Blount Co., and references to these Mayes in <u>Valley Leaves</u>. I wonder if John was in Ala., rather than Ill. HUNT (the man and the verb): Huntsville (Madison Co.), Alabama re-*#*96. ceived its name from one JOHN HUNT who settled at the 'Big Spring' in 1805 with his family of grown and nearly grown children. About this JOHN HUNT, I know he: lived 1771, 1772, 1773 near Wolf Hills, Botetourt Co., then Fincastle Co. (later Washington Co.), Va.; lived early 1780's in Carter's Valley, Sullivan Co., N. C. (later Tenn.); lived Hawkins Co., N. C. (later Tenn.) 1786 when this county was created from Sullivan Co. - he was first Sheriff of Hawkins Co.; lived in Claiborne Co., Tenn. 1801 when this county was created from Grainger and Hawkins Counties - he was also first Sheriff of Claiborne Co. serving until 1804; lived at the 'Big Spring' in northern Mississippi Territory in 1805 on land that a few years later became known as Huntsville, Mississippi Territory (later Alabama) - he remained there until at least 1814, after which his trail is lost. JOHN HUNT'S known children were: #### (1) John Hunt, Jr., b. 1770/1780; m. ?Rhoda \_\_\_\_; followed in Father's footsteps and was Sheriff of Claiborne Co., Tenn. 1820-1836; then moved to Bolivar (Polk Co.), Mo. "where some of my children are now living." d. before 1850. ##### (2) David Hunt, b. 1778; m. Elizabeth Larkin; had 13 children; letters preserved by their descendants have been a great help: d. 1841 Franklin Co., Tenn. ##### (3) Elizabeth Hunt, b. 1784; m. Samuel Black Acklin; had 9 children; the Acklins of 'Belmont' in Nashville, Tenn. among their descendants; d. 1859 Huntsville, Alabama. ##### (4) George W. Hunt, b. 1788/1794; d. ca1838 Talledega, Ala.; had also lived in Madison Co., Ala. and Lincoln Co., Tenn.; his widow (nee Liddy Campbell) and children moved to Bastrop Co., Texas ca1840. #### (5) William R. Hunt, b. ?1790; had issue and has descendants; d. 1855 Huntsville, Ala.; newspaper obituary says "this place took its name from his Father." ##### (6) (dau.) Hunt, m. Stephen Neal, first Sheriff of Madison Co., Miss. Terr. (later Ala.); she died before 1818 when he remarried; ?two children, or were they by his second marriage? About the pioneer JOHN HUNT, I do not know when or where he was born; when, where or who he married; and when or where he died. Can anyone help with the hunt for data on Huntsville's JOHN HUNT???? I AM NOT A HUNT DESCENDANT.
