



I think we all feel it was a successful day. Our Public Library Director, Elbert Watson, spoke at the noon luncheon break on the genealogical holdings in the Library's Heritage Room. One interesting comment that he made was that there is better return (time-spent-on-the-bookwise) on the "tax dollar" from the purchase of a genealogical book than any other, as these books are used over and over for years and years.

Speaking of the Library, remember that books make the nicest memorials, and, also, the gift is tax deductable. The Library is also engaged in an active microfilming program of its own. Old newspapers stored in the basement and here-to-fore unavailable to the general public, have now been microfilmed. Records of any church in this county will be filmed anytime they are made available to the Library. To date the church records that have been filmed and the person responsible for bringing them to the Library are: First Presbyterian Church, Huntsville, Ala. - Donald H. Shenk (the earliest of these have been published in Valley Leaves); Church of the Nativity, Episcopal, Huntsville, Ala. - Dr. Frances Roberts; First United Methodist Church, Huntsville, Ala. - Mrs. Earl Ford; Locust Grove Baptist Church, New Market, Ala. - Mrs. Jesse G. Henry; Mt.Pleasant Society (1816-1888 records) - Rev. Washio Ishii, the pastor of Big Cove United Presbyterian Church in Madison County, Ala. All of these records are on film in the Heritage Room of the Huntsville Public Library.

Our local TVGS members continue to spread "the good word" about our organization and the fascinating hobby it represents. Yvonne Perkins gave another program on genealogy, this time to Alpha Epsilon, an educational sorority, and she said the ladies followed her into the hall after the meeting asking even more questions. That's the kind of interest we like! Our local membership has increased so as of late that the telephone committee needed additional help. Tweak Harvey and Ann Hartman volunteered to help with the phoning.

Another member has published another book. Great! Mrs. Esther W. Powell, 36 N. Highland Ave., Akron, Ohio 44303 has for sale Early Ohio Tax Records (459 pages, \$19.50 each). Write her for list of other books she has published. Tax records are vital for genealogical researching. Hopefully more of them will be put into print.

## JACKSON COUNTY, ALABAMA NEWSPAPER ADVERTISEMENTS 1862 - 1863

During the Civil War no newspaper was published in Jackson County, Alabama, therefore all Estates, Letters of Administration, etc. had to be advertised in papers published in adjoining counties. These Jackson County advertisements appeared in The Huntsville Confederate, a newspaper published weekly in Huntsville (Madison Co.), Alabama from 8 October 1862 through about 25 June 1863. Of the 35? or so issues of this paper which were published, only 16 are known to have been preserved. Abstracted from microfilm in the Huntsville Public Library by Mrs. Eugene G. Cowart, Huntsville, Alabama, whose notes are in parenthesis.

# RECORDS OF MARRIAGE LICENSES AND CERTIFICATES OF MARRIAGES FROM INVENTORY A-1 LAUDERDALE COUNTY, ALABAMA (1818 - 1820)

These earliest marriage records of Lauderdale County are now laminated and bound together with no cover or back into a small section which is inserted in Marriage Books 1, 2 and 3, 1820-1838 (bound together in one volume which is referred to as Book 1 in the Index to Marriages) but is not bound therein. The first page is entitled "Record of Marriage Licenses & certificates of marriages." Penciled near the title is "Inventory A-1." notation leads us to believe that these few pages and others now missing were once part of a larger volume. In Alabama Records, Volume 104, compiled by Kathleen Paul Jones and Pauline Jones Gandrud, December 1948, a transcription of these records appears although not in exactly the same order in which they are now found. The compilers indicated that, following this record, pages were out and upon "reversing" the book, Orphans' Court Record Book A appeared (the first entry dated July 1818.) "Book A, Orphan Court Records" in now bound with the outside title as "Inventory Record A-1, 1818-22, Lauderdale County." The first entry is dated July 1818. Undoubtedly these marriages were removed from that volume in an effort to place them with other marriage records. Green at the city in Mecklenburg County, Virginia on the — day of July 1812 and was honorably discharged at Norfolk, Virginia on the 8th day of January 1813, that he does not recollect the brigade and division if he was in any and that he was stationed at Norfolk for six months; that at no time did he adhere to the cause of the enemies of the government during the late rebellion. The State of Alabama) Franklin County SS )

At a Circuit Court.....County of Franklin in said State before Daniel Coleman, Judge of said court.....in the town of Russellville....

On this 16 day of April 1841 personally appeared in open court John Riley a resident of this County....aged 81 years. Who being first duly sworn.... doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision by an act of Congress passed June 7th 1832 - That he enlisted in the army of the United States in 1780 in Camden District South Carolina where he then resided. With Captain Jacob Barnett in the Second Regiment South Carolina line, under the following named officers - Colonel Henry Hampton Colonel of said Regiment. Taylor Major, Jacob Barnett Captain, William Barnett Ensign in the company in which he enlisted. That he enlisted and served the term of ten months; That during that term of enlistment he was in constant service in the State of South Carolina....mostly under command of General Sumpter....fought at the capture of the enemies Fort at Colonel Thompson's plantation on Congaree River and also at the capture of the enemies Fort at Orangeburg on the Edisto River.

That for a short period of the latter part of his term he served under General Henderson and was discharged at Orangeburg and received a written discharge signed by said Major Taylor - which he has long since lost. That a few days after said discharge he went as a substitute in the militia service in said Camden District in the place of Peter Aiken and served as such substitute two months and ten days in the Company commanded by Captain Thomas Gillum, in which Rodgers was Lieutenant and . . . belonged to a Regiment of which he understood Batton was Colonel, but who never appeared to command said Regiment. That he was engaged during said period of service on the South Fork of Edisto and on Congaree River during which period the British occupied Charleston. That he received no discharge from said militia service.

That he was born in Amherst County in the State of Virginia in 1760 and that he has no record of his age. That he removed to and resided in Camden District South Carolina when he was into service, that about three years after the termination of the war he removed to Wilkes County, Georgia where he lived about two years, when he moved to Elbert County, Georgia, and about three years afterward to Franklin Co., Ga., about eight years afterwards to Sevier County in the state of Tennessee, about ten years afterwards to St. Clair County in the State of Alabama, about nine years afterwards to Shelby County in the same state and about six years afterwards to Franklin County, Alabama where he now resides. That he is known to Andrew McCain who resides in the neighborhood where he now lives and who can testify....his (Riley's) name is not on this pension Roll or any agency in any State. Sworn to and inscribed the day and year aforesaid Text: E. D. Townes John Riley



(Other Notes by Editor: St. Clair, Shelby and Franklin Counties, Alabama were all three created in 1818. If John Riley lived in what later became Alabama before this time, he probably lived on Indian Land. There is a John Rieles in the St. Clair Co., Ala. 1820 census and a Jno. Riley in the Franklin Co., Ala. 1830 census.)

## 1877-1878 DIARY OF SUSAN (BRADLEY) WHITE, HUNTSVILLE, ALABAMA

(Contributed by Mrs. William G. Henson, Huntsville, Alabama, a great great granddaughter of Mrs. White who kept this diary. Susan Bradley was the daughter of James Bradley and his wife, Adeline (Bibb) Bradley (daughter of Thomas Bibb, 2nd Governor of Alabama). Susan Bradley married Thomas White and their children were Tom, Alexander "Sandy", Frank, Jimmie, Addison, William, Ada, Jane, Susie, Ellen, Sallie and Bessie White. Notes about these children and their families, which are mentioned repeatedly in this diary, have not been copied in this abstract. Mrs. White made her first entry March 6, 1877 and her last July 11, 1878, but did not write in the diary everyday.)

March 28, 1877 .....visited Ma and Aunt Sally...Mrs. Add White and family going to Europe...rec'd present from Cousin Cornelia McGhee.

April 6, 1877 Went over to Ma's to tell her of the death of Uncle William Bibb. Mrs. Alice Young died during the Storm, and today it is so wet and stormy that she cannot be buried. Cousin Sarah Patteson was to see me yesterday. We talked of old times our old neighbors that have all passed away except old Mr. Donegan-so pale and feeble-walking about sometimes in his red flannel drawers. Then there is Mr. Robinson with one foot in the grave and our neighbors, Dr. Ross and Mr. Graves both of them are now and have long been "Soldiers of the Cross."

April 26, 1877 Young George Elgin died this morning.

May 4, 1877 Mr. Simler was buried this evening...wife survives...

May 19, 1877 I spent a pleasant day yesterday at Ma's. It was sad too. Sister looks bad. Sallie Hopkins is an invalid but cheerful and hopeful. Aunt Eliza is certainly a wonderful woman.

July 6, 1877 Poor Mr. Dill's body was found out on the mountain. Killed himself. Poor children.

July 20, 1877 The largest procession I ever saw attended Mrs. Grimball's funeral. We will always remember her as Kate Moore.

July 21, 1877 This is my birthday-54 years old. I feel a thousand.

July 30, 1877 Was truly rejoiced to see Aunt Lizzie Mastin this morning.

August 11, 1877 It seems so strange how life changes as years roll on-eightteen years ago Ma was boarding in the same house with Mrs. Fleming and Mrs. Wilson-all are dead except Ma who is old and feeble.

August 15, 1877 My husband's birthday-60 years old....

Dec. 15, 1877 Sallie Hopkins died suddenly this morning.

Dec. 16, 1877 Anniversary of our wedding - 37 years I have been his wife....

Jan. 19, 1878 Margie McGhee came to see the Girls from Nashville. She was Bridesmaid for Maysie Bates.

Jan. 24, 1878 All my children and grandchildren sat at my table yesterday.

March \_\_\_\_, 1878 This is the beginning of a new life. My Mother is dead.... Uncle Joe Bradley visited....he told me of his grandfather my great grandfather lived to be 104 years old ...

(Newspaper clipping sewn in diary) "Passed away from earth on the night of the 1st inst., Mrs. Adaline Bradley, the venerable widow of Col. James Bradley of this city. She was a pious and consistent christian woman, ripe and full of life for the final harvest-home of Heaven."

When a two-acre plot at the corner of Wells Ave. and California St. was selected in 1818 as the permanent Huntsville cemetery location, all bodies were removed from the old graveyard to the new site which was named Maple Hill Cemetery. Today this beautiful city maintained cemetery covers 74 acres, has thousands of tombstones (no complete listing exists), hundreds of unmarked graves, and averages about 350 new burials each year. —Editor.

## GENERAL HISTORY OF MARSHALL COUNTY, ALABAMA by James Arthur Thomason

(As published in the 1945 & 1946 issues of The Guntersville Advertiser and Democrat. This series began in Valley Leaves Vol. 4, No. 1, Sept. 1969.)

Chapter XXXXV - History of Gilliam Springs

(Jan. 23, 1946)

The church was organized Nov. 3, 1882, in a log church house on the lot where the present building stands.

The presbytery was composed of Elders J M Simpson, P J Corley and B Chambers, and J W Rigsby, church clerk. The deacons were P M Williamston and J F Kelly.

Other members that joined at the organization were S J Williamston, E E Williamston, Mary Williamston, S J Williamston, S E Rigsby, R C Kelly and Rev. Childers.

I didn't find the name of the first pastor, but I was told it was Rev P J Corley. From 1882 to 1898 we found no record of pastors.

The first house was built in 1871 at Gilliam Springs, fronting the place of Mrs J C Camp. They taught school at this place. There wasn't any church.

There was a man name Gilliam lived in this community. They named the spring and creek for him. Then they called the church Gilliam Springs.

The second log building was built about 1882. They built a fram building and it was destroyed by fire. They have a large brick structure now and have a membership over 300.

The late J W Cranford said: "I went to school at the first log building at Gilliam Springs. The teachers were: Cain Waldrop, Isaac Brown, Bill Draper and Lisha Bush."

List of pastors from 1898 to 1934: T J Weaver, 1898-99-1901-02 and part of 1911. (Clerks serving during his pastorate were J C Camp and J G Kelly); Rev J E Canon, 1903 to 1908 and then 1910 (Clerks, C P Carter, J C Camp and E D Cranford); Rev M K Taylor 1909 and 1911 (Clerks, T J Williamston and J C Camp); Rev. W T Cambron, 1913 to 1914, (Clerks, E D Cranford).

The record shows Rev R G Parker was pastor 1908 and the record show that Rev J E Canon was pastor, 1908. I guess each served part of the year. J W Cranford was clerk.

Rev J O Johnston pastor, 1929, (clerk, J K Howard); Rev R L Isdell, 1918 to 1920, 1923, 1925, 1927-28, 1932 to 1934 clerks, W T Solley, E D Perkins, H M Price, Otes Carter, R H Cantrell).

We didn't get any record of pastors or clerks in 1910, 1921-22, 1924, 1926, 1930-31. I failed to get hold of the right books and regret I can't give a record of all the years. (continued next page)

Chapter XXXXVI - History of Albert G. Henry

(Jan. 30, 1946)

Albert G Henry was one of the outstanding merchants of Northeast Alabama. He was a native of Tennessee, born in 1816. He came with his father Hugh Henry to Alabama at the age of 12.

His father opened a mercantile house in Jackson county. At the age of 18 the son entered the store as clerk. At the age of 20 he was given an interest in the concern and five years later he went into business for himself at Guntersville.

Before the Civil war he had control of almost the entire patronage at that point, and was the first man in Alabama to introduce the continued credit system, by which he carried his patrons, rich and poor, upon his books from year to year.

Upon the close of the war his patrons were nearly all financially broken up. Mr Henry, with the protection furnished by the crop morgage law in vogue in the south was able to advance nearly \$50,000 of goods to his patrons without serious loss to himself.

For years he was recognized as one of the most substantial business men of the south. He acquired large wealth by his astute business equalities, thrift and energy. Hr Henry was communicant of the M E Church South.

He was married first in 1838 to Mary Anne Henry of Tennessee, who became the mother of eight children. She died in 1884. He was later married to Mrs Julia Waitt.

His children were: Wallace H.; Hugh; Margaret, wife of Dr. Clifton, of Waco, Texas; Mary, wife of J D Bell of Texas; Albert G., Jr.; Samuel.
