

### MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS FROM 1827 ISSUES OF THE TUSCUMBIA PATRIOT

Microfilm copies of some 1827 issues of this newspaper, published by Henry S. Foote at Tuscumbia, Franklin (now Colbert) County, Alabama, are available at the University of Alabama Library in Tuscaloosa for use there. The following items from those four issues - May 26, June 9, August 11, and August 18, 1827 were abstracted from the microfilm roll by Helen Bowling McKnight on 28 September 1977. Included on that roll are three or four pages of the National Banner and Nashville Whig, a Nashville, Tennessee newspaper dated Tuesday, November 12, 1833 and Wednesday, November 13, 1833. There were numerous Nashville and Tennessee items which Mrs. McKnight did not abstract.

#### SESSION BOOK (MINUTES)

Big Cove, Mt. Pleasant Society

This old Session Book is in the rare book section of the Zeitler Room of the Huntsville Public Library. A Xerox copy was provided TVGS by Rane Pruitt and was transcribed by Margaret Cowart and proofed by Ann Cochran. The book is very old and fragile with many torn pages and loose pages. The writing is sometimes faded and difficult to read; also, some child has practiced penmanship in blank spaces in the book adding to the difficulty of transcribing it. Blank spaces and illegible words are shown by \_\_\_\_\_.

The Camp Ground Cemetery was the burial place of some of the older members of this congregation. This cemetery is now adjacent to an <u>United Presbyterian Church</u>. A <u>Cumberland Presbyterian Church</u> is in the immediate area which would indicate the church membership may have divided at some time in the past.

In the minutes of July 19, 1854 E. J. Stocton offered the following resolution: "Where the records of Mt. Pleasant Congregation have been mislaid or lost except a small portion of them and the few that are left are iregular, Resolved that we record the small portion that we find still in existence for the satisfaction of the congregation of the future."

Comments on the right side of the membership list are inseveral handwritings. Although this first list carried the date of 1835 please bear in mind that the list was <u>started</u> in 1835 but added to as new members joined. Probably the first 63 names were members before September, 1836. The list continues until 1860 when a new list was started. Another list was made in 1869.

Valley Leaves will carry the entire book, which includes membership rolls and church minutes. The minutes begin in 1836. Sometimes there are one to four year lapses between sessions. All minutes until August 14, 1858 appear to be in the same handwriting.

Throughout the book a number of pages appear to have been cut or torn out; some pages on lined paper (written in purple ink) have been added. Everything readable in the book has been copied here. The first several pages are membership rolls and the rest of the pages are minutes. There are many names found in the minutes that do not appear on the membership rolls.

#### CHURCH BOOK

This Society was organized by the Rev. Robert Donnell\* in the year of our Lord Eighteen hundred and sixteen and consisted of the following members viz: Jane Middleton\* and Margaret Pickens.\* From the above date up to July 1835 no regular record was kept of this Church except a list of the names of its members which are as follows viz:

VAUGHN CEMETERY

This cemetery was copied and contributed by Sandra Cox of Huntsville, Alabama. The graves are located in approximately Section 14-9S-2E in Marshall County and is on property owned by Robert Nelson. It is located about ten miles south of Guntersville on Highway 79. The graves are located about 50 feet from the road in the woods. Other than these two marked graves there is believed to be several unmarked graves here and some marked with only unlettered fieldstones. There are dirt mounds here three to four feet high which are believed to be the burial ground of Indians.

Manoah Vaughn Died July 10, 1870 Aged 82 years

Manoah Vaughn married Betsey Vaughn in Madison County Feb. 13, 1813 (Marriage Book I). He then married Sarah Mayhall July 20, 1851 in Morgan County (V-L, Vol. 8, No. 3, p. 112). He is listed on the Madison County tax lists of 1813 and 1815 and was a Private in Perkins Battalion, 7th Regt. of Mississippi Militia in the War of 1812. He is not listed on the Madison County 1809 Squatter Census or the Register of Applications and Permissions for land in the Miss. Territory (V-L, Vol. 6, p. 180). On Nov. 10, 1812 the Superior Court of Madison County nole prosequi an assault and battery case against Manoah Vaughn which had been brought by John Murray. Vaughn was fined costs in the case.

## Book Reviews

LIMESTONE COUNTY CEMETERIES, Vol. I, (Northwest Section), published by the Limestone County Historical Society and may be ordered from the Limestone County Historical Society's Book Fund, 301 9th St., Athens, Ala. 35611. 8-1/2 x 11, soft cover, offset printing, fully indexed, 202 pages. \$8.00. This is the first volume of cemetery records to ever be published on Limestone County Cemeteries. A subsequent volume will cover the remainder of the rural county and a separate volume will include the cemeteries in Athens. Volume I includes only those cemeteries located in the northwest portion of Limestone County encompassing the communities of Salem, Lentzville, Cairo, Union Hill, Pettey, Holbert Springs, Good Springs, and Lebanon. It borders Giles County, Tenn. on the north and Lauderdale County, Alabama on the west. A Table of Contents and full name index makes any cemetery or name easy to find. The cemeteries were carefully copied by several of Limestone County's foremost genealogical and historical researchers and took eight years to compile. A fine book at a reasonable price.

INDEX TO WILLS OF MADISON COUNTY, ALABAMA - 1808-1900 by Andrew Ezell Terry, Ph.D. 37 pages, 8-1/2 x 11, offset printed, soft cover. May be ordered from author at P. O. Box 206, Huntsville, Ala. 35804. \$4.50

This painstakingly researched book is a MUST for anyone doing research in Madison County, Alabama. Dr. Terry has read every Will indexed here rather than merely pull names from the indexes of the books in the Courthouse. He gives the name, date of probate, designates which document the Will is in, and gives the page number. This information allows anyone to easily order the original document from the Probate Judge of Madison County. There is no index because the entire book is in alphabetical order. Where there is a similarity of names Dr. Terry has included the name of the decedent's spouse and/or children to enable the reader to more easily identify his ancestor. For instance, James Walker (Will probated March 10, 1824) leaves a wife, Peggy; James R. Walker (Will probated March 10, 1824) leaves wife, Jane. Other identifying factors are also given. A note by the name of John C. Weaver (Will probated Aug. 19, 1876) states, "of Shelby County, Tenn. — Filed 14 Sep 1876 Madison Co., Ala." Each page has several detailed clarifications as to relationships.

This book must not be confused with one published in 1953 by a local organization. Dr. Terry's book has much greater content in that it lists all (1046) wills and goes to the year 1900. (There were many omissions and errors in the 1953 book and it only goes to 1870). Even owners of the preceeding publication should add this one to their library.

MY CROSS AND HAND FAMILIES (and my Beeman, Hamrick, Johnson, Page, Poole, Vance, Wells, Williamson, and Woodward Families) by Jeanne Hand Henry, Certified Genealogist. 290 pages, 8-1/2 x 11, soft cover, full name index, offset printed. \$20.[Ala. residents add 4% sales tax]. May be ordered from Southern Genealogical Services, Route 2, Box 855, New Market, Ala. 35761.

Mrs. Henry has presented her genealogical information so that anyone can understand the lines of descent. The book reflects her thoroughness and aptitude for detail in this extremely well documented presentation. Over three thousand names are mentioned and it is an excellent source for those searching for families with the same surname and migration pattern. These Mississippi families came from Ireland, Mass., Pennsylvania, N.C., S.C., and Georgia migrating through Tennessee and Alabama. The book begins with the earliest known progenitor and continues through the compiler's main lines of descent. In many instances collateral lines have been included. Thirty seven pages, for instance, are devoted to the elusive Johnson line from Ireland with the earliest date being ca. 1722. Each chapter ends with numerous footnotes. Other family names appearing frequently are Aiken, Barnett, Brand, Brooks, Calvert, Carpenter, Cashion, Clay, Clearman, Davis, Estes, Fortson, Freeman, Giles, Harrison, Houston, James, Jones, King, Ledlow, Mathews, May, McCann, McMullan, Moore, Munn, Nobles, Price, Pruitt, Reynolds, Rhodes, Smith, Snowden, Stephens, Strange, Tucker, Walker and Oyler. A thoughtful and handy touch has been added by Mrs. Henry when she included four pages of blank charts in the back of the book to enable you to connect your branch with the researched material she has already presented.

Mrs. Hand has gleaned information for this book from Archives, military records, courthouse records, Bible records, census records, personal statements, vital statistics, and recognized publications.

YEISER, LEDBETTER, and ALLIED FAMILIES by Mary Louise Yeiser Wiley. 8-1/2 x 11, 140 pages, Full name index, soft cover, \$13.50. May be ordered from author at Rt., Estill Springs, Tenn. 37330. Included are photographs of the Yeiser, Davis, Ledbetter, and Godwin coats of arms plus some family portraits. Mrs. Wiley traces the Yeiser family from 1680 in Switzerland, the Doudel family from ca. 1724 in Ireland, the Bernard family from King John of England (1167-1216), the Jameson family from 1736 in Virginia, the Fauntleroy family from the 12th century England (but does not connect them to the American line that is traced back to England in 1639), the Davis family from Indiana ca. 1800, and the Ledbetters from New York City and Brunswick County, Va. in 1742. Mrs. Wiley relates family traditions which add spice to any genealogical publication even though proof is lacking. She includes Wills, Bible records, estate settlements, and other references. A nice addition to this book is a chapter entitled, "Patriotic Organization Applications." In this the author details the lines of eligibility to the Huguenot Society, Colonial Dames, Daughters of 1812, and the DAR.

Included in the books is information on the families of Yeiser of Va., Ky., and Lauderdale County, Ala; Doudel, Spangler and Jameson of Va. and Ky; Straiton and Clark of Ky; Bernard, Gaines, and Fauntleroy of Va; Davis and Lay of Wayne County, Tenn; Ledbetter of Va. and Lincoln, Marshall and Perry Counties, Tenn; Vaughn of S.C. and Perry Co., Tenn; Whitaker of Maury and Perry Counties in Tenn; Godwin of Maury and Perry Counties, Tenn; Craig of Williamson and Perry Counties, Tenn; and Crafton of Virginia and Williamson Co., Tenn.

- JONES JOURNEYS, a quarterly of family information published Aug., Nov., Feb. and May each year by Frances R. Nelson, 4041 Pedley Road, #18, Riverside, Cal. 92509. \$6. yearly. Mimeographed. The issue recived and reviewed here is Vol. 5, No. 2 (Nov. 1977) and consists of 34 pages, 8-1/2 x 11, nicely typed and easy to read. The Jones name is an extremely difficult one to trace because of the great number of them. Once found they are even more difficult to differentiate because of common first names such as William, James, and John. A family quarterly devoted to "Jones" should be a great asset. The reviewed issue includes the family of John Paul Jones, Jones marriages in Pennsy. prior to 1790, Jones names appearing in West Virginia newspapers in late 1700's through mid-1800, North Carolina Jones wills from 1600-1760, Queries, and many items on miscellaneous Jones families—mostly above the Mason-Dixon line.
- FAMILY FINDINGS, a quarterly published by Mid-West Tenn. Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 3343, Jackson, Tenn. 38301 in Jan., Apr., July, and Oct. \$7.50 yearly. 8-1/2 x 11, offset printing. The review copy (Vol. ix, No. 4) had 51 pages of which 20 made up the index to the 1977 issues, 5 pages of queries, and 2 pages of new members. Twenty pages were devoted to Bible records, cemetery records and miscellaneous genealogical information. Included were the Denmark Presbyterian Cemetery and the Harris Cemetery in Madison County, Tenn. Also included were the Perry Farrow Bible and the William Houston Harris Bible.
- JOURNAL OF THE GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OF OKALOOSA COUNTY, FLORIDA, P. O Box 1175, Ft. Walton Beach, Fla. 32548. This is a quarterly published in March, June, Sept. and December. \$6.00 for quarterly or \$8. for Society membership which includes the publication, per year. The copy reviewed (Vol. 1, No. 3, Sept., 1977) was 8-1/2 x 11, 16 pages, mimeographed. It covers the counties of Santa Rosa, Okaloosa, and Walton, Florida. Included in this issue are the marriage licenses of Santa Rosa County, 1870-1871, and of Walton County, 1885-87, plus the marriages of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Ft. Walton Beach. Also included are cemetery records of the Jesse Rogers Memorial Cemetery in Mary Esther, Fla. plus other miscellaneous material. The records in this quarterly appear thorough and carefully copied. Subscriptions should be sent to Mrs. Ruth C. Usrey, 56 Yacht Club Dr., Ft. Walton Beach, Fla. 32548.
- ECHOLS NOTES, VOL. I (Marriages, Wills, and Census Records), by Rebecca Echols Terry. 192 pages, 8-1/2 x 11, fully indexed, offset printed, soft cover. \$10 PRE PUBLICATION price before June 1st, and \$12. after June 1, 1978. May be ordered from author at 1414 Monterrey Dr., SE, Huntsville, Ala. 35801. This primarily Southern compilation of Echols Marriages, Wills, and Census records was collected over a ten year period from microfilm, courthouses, and state archives. Mrs. Echols travelled thousands of miles researching the Echols name (and its 63 spelling variations) in Va., N.C., S.C., Tenn., Ga., Ala. and Miss. resulting in a most unusual family Source Book. Research in Illinois, Texas, Mo., Md., New Mexico, Ky., Indiana, La., Calif, Ark., and West Virginia is also included. The information in this book is laid out very methodically with wills, marriages, and census records in separate sections or chapters. Each chapter is then broken down into state, then counties within that state. For instance in the Virginia wills the counties with the earlies Echols wills are listed first: Lunenberg County, Will Book 1, page 489, will of Abraham Echols dated 1749; in Amelia County, Will Book I, Page 12, Will of George Marchbanks dated in 1740 (a family connection) is given. Each will is abstracted but all pertinent information is given. This book is not a history or genealogy of Mrs. Terry's own line but is a unique and most useful source book of excellence for anyone researching the Echols family.
