

## North Alabama



#### COLDWATER

The area known as Coldwater was settled as early as 1780 as a trading post with the French from the Wabash country, according to Harris, <u>Dead Towns of Alabama</u>. Michael Dickson, the first known white resident of the area, was from Reynoldsburg, Tennessee, where he escaped the Johnson Indian massacre. Sometime in 1815, Dickson, his wife and four sons settled on the bluff above the spring which was purchased for five dollars and two pole axes from Tuscumbia, the Indian Chief. When the United States Government acquired the land by Indian Treaties in 1816, Dickson received several choice lots in lieu of his tomahawk claim.

In 1817 John Coffee was appointed to survey and lay out a town situated on the site of the Indian village Ococoposa, correctly spelled Oka Kopassa, meaning Cold Water in the Choctaw-Chickasaw dialect, Leftwick, Two Hundred Years at Muscle Shoals. The area provided an abundant supply of water from a large spring as well as a creek nearby to turn wheels for mills. Lots for the town of Coldwater were offered for sale on 6 March 1820 and the people petitioned the legislature for incorporation under the name of Coldwater on 20 December 1820. Six months later, 14 June 1821, the legislature changed the name to Big Spring, but that name did not last long for on 31 December 1822 the legislature again changed the name to Tuscumbia. The following purchasers of land were abstracted by Margaret Matthews Cowart, Huntsville, Alabama, from a microfilm copy of a book in the Alabama State Archive, Montgomery, Alabama, called The Sale of Public Lands, 1818–1825 (Archives number 129).




#### MAPS OF COLDWATER

The cemetery sets off the road to the left approximately a quarter of a mile and is surrounded by a fence bordered by tall ceder trees. The older part of the cemetery is grown up in tall grass and has several un-marked graves. The newer part is well cared for but has several graves marked with only stones and blocks. Given under my hand this 21st day of December, 1829.



### PROBATE RECORDS

#### (Tenth Installment)

This series began in Volume 11, Number 1 (June, 1977) and is the earliest probate record in Jackson County. It is a large red volume entitled "Will Record K", and begins in 1855. The title is somewhat misleading in that it is primarily probate proceedings and covers intestate proceedings as well as wills. The information was abstracted by David Whitehorn.

### CHANCERY COURT RECORD BOOK "O" 1846-47 Madison County, Alabama

The following information was compiled by Dorothy Scott Johnson from a law suit recorded in Chancery Court Reocrd Book "O" 1846-47, pages 284-328, Madison County, Alabama. The case was filed in Jackson County and was tried in the 32nd Chancery District, Northern Chancery Division, with the court sitting in Huntsville, Madison County, Alabama.

Edward H. Vann, Thomas Vann, and Sarah (Sally) Vann were siblings and were originally from North Carolina. Sarah married John Lanier and had children by him. At his death in 1819 John Lanier lived near Calwell's Bridge in Franklin County, Tennessee. He left a will and his wife, Sarah, received a child's portion of his estate valued at approximately \$2500. Sarah's brother, Thomas Vann, was named executor of Lanier's will and her brother, Edward H. Vann, became the administrator.

Sarah moved to Madison County, Alabama in the latter part of the year 1819. She married Burkett Green February 22, 1827 in Madison County. Sarah and Burkett then moved to that part of Jackson County that became a part of Marshall County in 1836.

Burkett Green was a widower with eight children by his first wife (not named) plus two grandchildren by a daughter who died several years before him. The eight children were Reuben, Samuel, Fanny, John and William Green; Matilda who married James Glover in Madison County May 7, 1822 (Marriage Book 3, page 166); Lucinda who married Ezekiel Craft March 20, 1823 in Madison County (Marriage Book 3, page 224); Sally who married John McGill November 12, 1824 in Madison County (Marriage Book 3, page 326). The grand children were Jarusha and Ritha Glover.

Burkett Green and Sarah evidently were not compatible as the marriage lasted only a month or so and ended in a separation in the spring of 1827. There was no issue from this marriage. Green "run her off" and she went, in the night, to the home of her nephew by marriage, Duncastle Buford in Madison County. (Duncastle S. Buford married Lucretia Vann Feb. 2, 1826 in Madison County, Ala. Marriage Book 3, page 432.) Afterwards, Sarah made her residence in Madison County at the home of her brother, Edward H. Vann.

At the time of Sarah's marriage to Green she had an estate valued at approximately \$2500 consisting of six slaves, kitchen & household furniture, and some cattle. When Burkett and Sarah separated they agreed that she would retain all the property she had at the time of their marriage, that he would do the same, and that neither of them would ever make any demands upon the property of the other. There was no divorce mentioned.

Burkett Green died in June, 1833. A short time before his death Sarah told John C. Grayson that she had heard "the old man" (Burkett Green) was very low in health and could not live long. After Green died she told Grayson she was very sorry to hear of "the old man's" death. She had intended to go see him for the purpose of getting his written statement verifying the verbal agreement they made when they separated regarding their properties. She did not feel, however, that Burkett's heirs would make demands upon any of her property and besides that it had all been disposed of.

When Green's will was submitted for probate in Jackson County, however, Sarah contested its validity saying she was his wife, had been left out of the will, and was due a portion of the estate as widow's dower. The case went before a jury in the Jackson County Orphans Court on Sept. 27, 1833. Jurors were:

Verdict: The will of Burkett Green is valid and should be admitted to record. The jury further decreed that Sarah pay the costs of the suit.

On October 9, 1833 John Green and William Green applied for and received Letters Testamentary on the will of Burkett Green after giving \$6000 bond with Archibald R. Barclay and John Baker their securities. The perishable and personal property of the estate appraised at \$2616.62-1/2. Simeon Nichols, B. B. Goodrich, and John C. Johnson were the appraisers and the appraisal was sworn to before John Johnson, J.P. (-continued-)

A sale of the estate's property was held November 20, 1833 and purchasers at the sale were:

There were also outstanding notes due the estate from Thomas P. Hawkins, John Thorton, Thomas Jones, W. H. E. Wheeler Jr., John Hill, and Thomas Ricketts, all insolvent. Notes were also due from Joseph Tipton, Josh Johnson, John Smith, William Devenport, John Wittorn, Christ Cobb, A. Bain, H. Rose, H. H. Bryant, Jonathan Scoond[?], Jesse Chick, William Pickens, William Manley, B. A. Manley, and Robert Shute. Said outstanding accounts totaled \$281.47-3/4.

Sarah (Vann) Lanier Green filed suit in the Circuit Court of Jackson County, under the name of Sarah Green, against John Green and William Green as executors of Burkett Green's estate prior to September, 1836. In her suit she claimed that as the legal wife of Burkett Green she was entitled to 1/3 of his estate as widow's dower even though the Orphans Court had already decreed the will valid. She claimed the executors had refused her claim and thereby defrauded her of her just share of the estate which she said was substantial.

By September, 1836, the suit was in the Chancery Court, Madison County, Alabama. The case was postponed again and again until October, 1838 when she was given permission to file an amended petition to include "Burgess McGaha as guardian of John Green, and John Baker." At some time after he was made an executor in 1833 John Green was declared a lunatic and in October, 1838 Burgess McGaha was appointed his guardian by the Madison County Court. Apparently John Baker was made a defendant in her suit since he was a security on the executors' bond as he is mentioned nowhere else in the entire suit. The amended Petition was actually filed December 14, 1839.

William Green answered Sarah's allegations on May 18, 1840 stating she had no rights to his father's estate since they had agreed to keep their own property after the separation and make no claim upon each other's estate.

Depositions were taken in this case from the following witness in behalf of the defendants:

The final decree was handed down the first Monday after the 4th Monday in May, 1846. The judge ruled that Sarah Green had no right to any of Burkett Green's estate and ordered her to pay the court costs of the suit.

#### WILL OF BURKETT GREEN

Dated: April 1, 1833 Died: June, 1833

Probated: Nov. 18, 1833

In the name of God, Aman. I Burkett Green of the County [of Jackson] & State of Alabama being of sound mind & memory but low in health, do by these presents make & ordain this my last will and testament, revoking each & all other will or wills heretofore made by me.

<u>Item 1st.</u> It is my will & desire that all my debts be paid as soon as the law of the State makes it necessary that debts of deceased persons should be paid, thereby avoiding all costs.

Item 2nd. It is my will & desire, & I hereby give to my son Richard [marked out] Reuben 35 acres of the tract of land on which he now lives running East and West of my said fraction and adjoining John Baker's land on which he lives.

Item 3rd. It is my will & desire & I hereby give & bequeath unto my son Samuel 50 acres of my [tract of land?] for a cabin, so as to join Guners' reservation, said 50 to be taken on the South-East side of said fraction.

Item 4th. I give & bequeath unto my daughter Fanny Green \$50 in cash to be paid her by my executors whenever she becomes of age or marries.

Item 5th. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Matilda Glover \$1 in cash & also to my grand children Jarusha & Retha Glover each \$1 in cash to be paid to them when called for by my executors, whenever the will is legally proven.

Item 5th I give & bequeath unto my daughter Lucinda Craft \$50 in cash to be paid by my executor in 18 months after my decease.

Item 6th. I give & bequeath unto my daughter Sally McGill \$1 in cash to be paid by my executors at any time after my will is proven.

Item 7th. I give & bequeath unto my son John a negro boy named Ellick about 5 or 6 years old and also I give & bequeath to my son Samuel a feather bed & furniture & my bay colt about 2 years old.

Item 8th. I give & bequeath unto my children John Green, William Green, Reubin Green, Samuel Green, and Fanny Green all my negroes not otherwise disposed of, say nine in number, viz: Susan, Betsy & her child, Daniel, Jenny, Lucy, Mint, Sarah, and Wash to be equally divided among my said mentioned children.

It is also my desire that all my household & kitchen furniture, stock of horses, cattle, and hogs be equally divided among my said above mentioned children, said division to be made as soon as the legacies of Samuel Green, Martha Glover, Jarusha Glover, Retha Glover, Lucinda Craft and Sally McGill are paid off and \$50 reserved to burn [marked out] to Fanny Green.

Item 9th. It is my will and desire that all my land not above divided should be equally divided among my children John Green, William Green, Reuben Green, Samuel Green and Fanny Green.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 1st day of April, 1833.

#### CHARACTER SKETCHES (Seventh Installment)

The following character sketches, written by Prof. Charles Gibson Lynch and carried in The Moulton Advertiser in 1911, were begun in Vol. 12, No. 4 (June, 1978). The sketches were collected, typed and edited for their genealogical value by Spencer A. Waters, Moulton, Alabama.

June 21, 1911 THE PREUITS

About five miles just East or Southeast of Moulton lives John W. Preuit. If I were asked who, among all the men that I have ever known, has lived the happiest, the most contented life, I would say John Preuit. He has never envied the great, the wealth of anybody else. He has lived a life of ought against John W. Preuit. A negro once said to me: "If the poorest white man or the most illiterate nego works for Mr. Preuit, he gets every cent that is due him, he never has to give us an order at the store, he always has the money to pay him." I heard a man who lives in Moulton say: "If I were to die and every cent of property I have in the world was in money, and was in John W. Preuit's hands and no one knew it but him and me, I would die content, because I would know my children would get every cent of it" I have heard my father say: "Son, of all the men I ever knew J. W. Preuit is one of the best of all." Some might say: "That would sound better if John Preuit were dead." To you my friend, let me say: Let us scatter more flowers along each others pathway while we live, instead of putting all on their graves after death.

Travis, Clebe, Brintz, and Minnie Preuit were my pupils. I want the boys who read this to know that I think that one of the greatest reasons for the success of John Preuit was the placing of the greatest confidence in the judgement of his mother who was one of the most business and practical women I ever knew. He did not think his mother was ever wrong and took her advise after his father's death, over and above that of anybody else. I believe the Scriptures say "Honor thy father and mother that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord

thy God giveth thee." So John Preuit is

living to a good old age.

I herewith send a sketch of the ancestors of John W. Preuit To all the Preuits, whom I have known who have been my friends and they all have been, I send a hearty "God bless you."

#### FAMILY TREE

At an early date, long before the honor, of usefulness, of industry, of great Revoluionary War, two Preuit peace, of happiness. In all my life, of brothers came from Scotland and settled sixty years, I have never heard men say in South Carolina. From one of them our family came, which was my father's (J. W. Preuit) great great-grand father. His name was William M. Preuit. I don't know who he married, but his children

1. Martin Preuit, who lived in Virginia.

2. William M. Preuit, who was killed in

Kentucky by Indians.
3. Fallops Preuit who went to Alabama. 4. & 5. Abraham and Issac Preuit, twin brothers, who married the same woman. Abraham was also killed by the Indians, and before he died, he suggested that his twin brother marry his widow, which he did.

6. Jacob Preuit, who married Nancy Richey, an Irish lady. This Jacob was the grandfather of John W. Preuit now living in Lawrence county, Alabama.

Jacob Preuit's children were: 1. William M. Preuit who married first, Sallie Cavitt, and after her death he married the widow Hodges, whose name was Martha Patsie Luney (Looney). This William M. Preuit was the father of John W. Preuit now living near Moulton; 2. James Preuit, who married a Miss Carter; 3. John Preuit who married Martah Hart first, and after her death he married a widow Walker, who was a sister of his first wife; 4. Peggie Preuit who married a Hellems; 5. Elizabeth Preuit who married a Lee; 6. Mary Ann Preuit, who married R. H. Holl-mark; 7. Nancy Preuit married John Preuit, her cousin; 8. Lavina Preuit, who married a Underwood; 9. Rebecca Preuit, who married a Roden; 10. Tabitha Preuit who married Levi Warren.

1. Ruth Preuit, who married John Moore and lived near Moulton.

2. Richard Preuit married Moriah Hodges first. His second wife was a widow Preuit from Tuscaloosa. He lived near Leighton.

4. Nancy A. Preuit married John Hodges first; after his death she married Daniel Hodges.

5. Polly A. Preuit married John A. Wear.

6. Betsey Ann Preuit married T. Jeff. MsDaniel.

- 7. Jacob M. Preuit married Nancy J. Johnson, went to Texas and was Properous. written by Jacob M. Preuit, and older He has a son, Drew Preuit, who is a very talented lawyer now living in Los Angeles, California.
- 8. Robert Preuit married Mary Gibson.
- 9. John W. Preuit married Elizabeth E. McDaniel.
- 10. Bluet Preuit married Anna Rose. 11. Sallie J. Preuit married W. D. Mc-Daniel.

This closes the list of the ancestors of my father, John W. Preuit. They have all passed over the river, also his brothers and sisters are all dead; he is the only one living.

He, John W. Preuit, son of William M. Preuit and Martha Patsie Luney, was born August 8, 1834, and is living in the same house, five miles East of Moulton, in which he was reared.

McDaniel and Ann Leeper was born Aug. 13, byterians. 1839, died September 20, 1907. She was born and reared in Lawrence County.

Martha Patsie Preuit (nee Luney) and mother of John W. Preuit, died June 1, 1869, aged 72 years. She was born in Virginia, her people moved to Tennessee and later to Alabama. She was of Irish descent, her people having coming from Ireland. She also was a descent of the poet, Sir Thomas Moore.
William M. Preuit, the father of

John M. Preuit, died in 1840.

Both the McDaniels and Leepers were promient in the Revolutionary War. Ann Leeper was a descendent of General Smallwood of Revolutionary War fame

and Governor of Maryland.

The children of John W. Preuit and Elizabeth E. McDaniel follows:

> In this home on March 1, 1835 Albert Alexander McGregor was born, who was destined to play an important part in the things that was to make the Tennessee Valley a better place to live. A. A. McGregor was raised on his father's farm, was taught to work with his hands, as well as given a literary education.

> Happy for him, LaGrange College was in the zenith of its glory, and he entered the great institution of learning and applied himself diligently to his work. It became his Alma Mater, and he loved and revered it to his death.

He entered it as a student in 1849, and graduated with distinction in 1854.

He made such a fine record, he was elected Professor of Mathematics in 1855 in this great educational institution, (-continued-)

and taught there until 1862, when he donned the uniform of the uniform of a Confederate soldier and won his title, Captain. He followed Roddy and Forest till he was transfered to the 11th Albama Cavalry.

His reputation as a teacher spread beyond the limits of his own county, and he was called to several places to take charge of different schools. In 1875 he took charge of the Tuscumbia Male Academy but his health not being good he returned to his home, four or five miles east of Town Creek.



### ABRAHAM RANDOLPH Revolutionary War Patriot

The following papers from the pension file of Abraham Randolph were contributed by Lorene B. Randolph, Mountain Brook, Alabama. Abraham was drafted into the army in 1780 at the Caswell County Courthouse in North Carolina. After the Revolution he moved to the Greenville District of South Carolina, where he married Lydia Dill in 1792. Mrs. Randolph futhur stated that the family later moved to near Courtland in Lawrence County, where Abraham died 29 April 1837.

#### Claim for Military Service

I cerify, in comformity with the laws of the United States of the 7 July 1838 Lydia Randolph, deceased, widow of Abraham Randolph, who was a private in the Revolution, was entitled to a pension, and having died on the 4th October 1847 her only surviving children John D. Randolph, James Randolph, Abraham Randolph, Robert Randolph and Christiana Givens are entitled to the amount at the rate of twenty dollars per annum, from 29 April 1837 when he died, to 4 March 1841.

Also acts 3d March 1843 & 17 June 1844, at the same rate, from 4 March 1843 to 4 October 1847 when she died payable to John D. Randolph, Administrator.

Given at the Department of the Interior this 24 day of April 1854

### NATURALIZATION RECORDS Circuit Court and County Court Minutes

Madison County, Alabama Prior To 1850

Aliens applying for naturalization in early Madison County, Alabama, were governed by a Congressional law passed 14 April 1802 which required residence in a state one year and in the United States for five years. The Declaration of Intention was to have been filed three years previous to citizenship. There was also a need to have good moral character, take an oath of allegiance, and renounce forever "all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, State or Sovereignty whatever" and particularly the head of the country from whence the applicant came. This law also provided automatic citizenship of children of naturalized parents and made special provisions for wives of naturalized males. Despite minor modifications the law remained basically the same until the Civil War.

The immigrant was required to present himself in a "court of record." Naturalization applications and final papers for persons residing in Madison County during the 19th Century are found in the Minute Books of the Circuit and County Courts (and one additional record from Probate Court is included here). Although there are some indexes, a page by page search of the records is often necessary. The Minute Books of the Circuit and County Courts of Madison County are found in the Old Records Department in the Elbert J. Parsons Law Library on East Side Square in Huntsville. The Circuit Court records collection is quite extensive, however Circuit Court Minutes which are missing for sessions prior to 1850 are those before 1820, May 1823, November 1826, May 1827, Spring 1839, Fall 1841, Fall 1847, all of 1848 and Spring 1849. Although the volume containing records for Fall 1849, 1850, and 1851 is rotting away, with parts completely gone or illegible, it was completely searched. Books which include Circuit Court Minutes are not always correctly labeled.

The County Court record collection is not as extensive as the Circuit Court, but a good representation is made. The minutes begin in the Spring of 1823 and continue unbroken until a large break occurs from 1848 to 1876 and then continue again until the turn of the century. Labels of County Court Minutes are more recognizable with exception of Volume 5. Containing County Court Minutes for August 1825, February, August 1826, and February 1827, Volume 5 is bound with pages completely out of order in a new red binding which is titled "Minutes 1820-Madison County Circuit Court."

Another source for naturalization records in Madison County is a book entitled "Certificates of Naturalization 1871-1872" which contains some records after 1850 and all naturalization records after 1878.

The information contained in the Declaration of Intention (to become a citizen of the United States) and the admission (to naturalized citizenship) some years later varies with the individual. The following records were located by George A. O'Reilly, Jr., Huntsville, Alabama, and abstracted by Ann Esslinger Cochran, Huntsville, Alabama, 1979. The information given is pertinent to the individual's identification and whereabouts, past or present. The last number given in parenthesis after the abstract is the number painted on the volume's spine and circled. In no two books are the numbers repetitive.

ALLISON, JOHN, born in County of Londonderry, Ireland about 1769. Emigrated in 1797, arriving New Castle, Delaware the same year. Came to Madison County, Mississippi Territory and married there in 1810, resided there since. Proven by oaths of William Brandon, Jesse Searcy, Henry Brazelton. 

## Book Reviews



ROBERT A. B. McCARTER IN NAVARRO COUNTY, TEXAS AND ALLIED FAMILIES by Herbert H. McCarter. 6 X 9, green hard bound, 224 pages including index. Order from: Chaparrel Gen. Soc. Library, P. O. Box 606, Tomball, TX 77375. Price not given.

Robert A. B. McCarter, son of James, was born 1812 in Abbeville District, SC, and died 1875 in Navarro County, TX, after having lived in Sumter and Greene Counties, AL. There is a chapter of the book devoted to each of the nine children of Robert and their descendants. Pictures are generously scattered through out the book and add much to the interest and value.

A genealogical outline is provided for Elbert Corbin, Jessie Weaver, William Walter McCarter, Hugh Meador, and William Henry Anderson as well as some land transactions, wills and a church history.

Mr. McCarter searched many records, especially in Navarro County, but a lot of the information he uses came to him orally or in written form. He admits his short-comings as a journalist but has complied a warm and interesting family history.

OLD LAND RECORDS OF MADISON COUNTY, ALABAMA by Margaret Matthews Cowart, 7801 Tea Garden Rd., Huntsville, AL 35802. 8½ X 11, yellow soft cover, 287 pages including index. Price: \$18.00.

Mrs. Cowart has done an excellant job of researching and presenting in an index form the old land records of Madison County, AL. Her foreword is especially valuable in understanding the book and the depth of her research. It gives a short history of the selling of lands in Madison County, and should be read thoroughly to understand the data in the book.

The format of this book highlights the differences between the Madison County copy of the Government Tract Book and the Secretary of State's copy, which should have been identical but, in fact, had more that 2,000 differences. She transcribed exactly what she found in each copy. Following the land tract records is information from the Receiver's Ledgers A. B. C. (1809-1918), Sale of Public Lands, Credit Systems, Huntsville (Nashville) Land Office which gives the place of residence of the men buying the land.

The book also includes a description of the tract, the area, to whom U. S. Title was sold or granted, date, number of certificate or warrent, and date of military act for each person receiving land. The many maps and index make this an excellant book for the researcher.

KEITH KINFOLKS by Larry King, 100 Longview Dr., Hendersonville, TN 37075. 7 X 10, green hard bound, 363 pages including index. Price: \$25.00.

This book is about the descendants of James Keith, Sr. (1720-1979), who was born in North England and brought to Virginia as an infant. His brothers were thought to be Jessie, Gabriel and Reuben with sons Samuel, William, John Reuben, James, and Joshua.

Extensive research went into the preparation of this book with 16,500 name entries in the index. The book records all essential facts on descendants and the spouse of those married to form 2,715 descendant family biographies arranged by generation and, in as far as possible, birthdates in the generation. Also included are 182 pictures selected for their value and interest.

Mr. King gives the sources and methods used to gather information, format, abbreviations and symbols, hints for the use of the book, and a general history of the Keiths at the beginning of the book for a helpful and interesting book. He plans other Keith Family histories and is anxious to hear from interested Keiths and Keith descendants.

LAWRENCE COUNTY, TENNESSEE MARRIAGE RECORDS 1818-1923 by Mrs. Claude A. Carter, 221 Admiral Circle, Lawrenceburg, TN 38464. 8½ X 11, yellow soft cover, 285 pages including index. Price: \$15.00.

This very complete book is valuable to anyone doing research in Lawrence County, TN. The marriage records, 1818-1838, are copied from the original Bonds and Licenses found in file cabinets in the County Clerk's office. The marriages, 1838-1923, are recorded from the marriage books found in the office of the County Court Clerk. Information included gives the names of the bride and groom, the date of marriage (or date of marriage bond, if there was no return), and the name of the officiant. Additional information is given when it was listed in the records, such as name of parents or where the persons were born. The marriages are listed alphabetically by the grooms surname with a bride surname index at the back of the book.

THE FAMILY OF JAMES ALLEN KENNAMER AND MATILDA (MAPLES) KENNAMER by Alice Ruth Page, Woodville, AL 35776. 8½ X 11, soft bound, 256 pages including index. Price: \$10.00

The purpose of this book is to complement and update a portion of an earlier Kennamer family record published in 1954. Mrs. Page briefly reviews the Kennamer family history from Staffa and Jacob Kenama (Kennemer) and their descendants from 1732 in Pennsylvania and later thru North Carolina, South Carolina, Alabama, Tennessee, and Texas. Her detailed accounts with James Allen Kennamer, 1829 TN-1904 TX, and wife Matilda Maples, 1842 AL-1907 TX. They lived for many years near Woodville, AL, where their twelve children were born.

There is an introduction for the Maples Family and the Kennamer Family with a chapter for each of the twelve children of James Allen and Matilda (Maples) Kennamer and their descendants. Numerous old letters, personal interviews, family records, and pictures make the book interesting reading. Mrs. Page has compiled a book which is easy to follow as well as valuable.

Please limit queries to 175 words or less. No surname queries, please. At least one full name, date, and location should be included in each query. We reserve the right to edit all queries. Send queries NOW. Work begins months before the date on the cover.

CONTRIBUTIONS - TVGS does not pay for contributions but welcomes genealogical material pertaining to our Valley counties (see front cover). Occasional articles concerning neighboring counties will be used. Families living in our counties prior to 1900 are of the most interest, genealogically speaking, so please do not send recent items.

To be considered for publication an item submitted must have a reliable reference - not be based entirely on "tradition." We do not want items copied from books now in print, however, such references may be used as footnotes to clarify items.

<u>Valley Leaves</u> is most interested in securing for publication the following types of items (send photocopy of original if possible):

Family Bible records (include title page with date Bible was published if page still exists), diaries, church records, military records, minister's records, cemetery readings (give location of cemetery and whether or not the listing is complete), courthouse records, old newspaper items, etc.

Contributions of Bible records, wills, etc., which include a photocopy of the original record plus a typed or handwritten transcription are usually published before records sent without a photocopy. We always reserve the right to edit.
