

If there is something in particular you would like explained please write to the editor and clearly outline your problem or stumbling block, or just tell us what you would like to know more about as long as it pertains to research in the nine northern-most counties of Alabama. If there is sufficient response we might even have a question and answer section.

Dene Walls and Sue Marine have carefully copied all the cemeteries in the eastern half of Morgan County for publication and their book is presently being bound. For more information write to Dene Walls, Route 4, Box 408, Hartselle, Alabama 35640. Their second volume will cover the west half of Morgan County. We feel that many of our members will be glad to hear of this tremendous undertaking and will wish to purchase a copy of this excellent research tool.

Another bit of good news comes out of Tennessee. Helen and Tim Marsh have published the 1850 Tennessee Mortality Schedule and it, too, is at the bindery. Margaret Cowart has begun research on the fourth volume in her Old Land Records series. This one will cover Limestone County and we are sure it will have the same excellent quality of research as her Jackson County, Madison County, and Morgan County books have had.

We wish to make one small correction in Issues No. 3 and 4 of Volume 16. The Langston Cemetery location in Jackson County was given as being in the SE/4 of the SE/4 of Section 2-7-5E thanks to an erroneously marked state map. The cemetery is actually in the SE/4 of the SW/4 of Sec. 2-6-5E.



DECATUR COUNTY

The exact location of the Pecatur/Jackson County line remains elusive but it was in trying to locate it that negative photostats of the township plats of the Pecatur County area were ordered. The public surveys of this land were conducted in 1822 and 1823 but annotations as late as 1888 are included. Located and secured by Catherine Gilliam, this information was transcribed by Porothy S. Johnson and Margaret M. Cowart. This series began in <u>Valley Leaves</u> Volume 16, Number 1, September 1981.

1921 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

Most of us are familiar with the Alabama 1907 Confederate Census but few are aware of the one taken in 1921. The Alabama Legislature passed an Act requiring that a permanent roll of Civil War pensioners be prepared and kept by the Pension Commission in 1921. Questionnaires were prepared and sent to all pensioners, both veterans and widows of veterans. These original, completed questionnaires are now housed in the Military Branch of the Alabama State Department of Archives and History in Montgomery, Alabama. They not only give a brief military history of the veteran but they also give personal information such as when and where married and the age of the wife if she is still living. Unfortunately, they did not ask the name of the wife but did ask for a list of living children, their addresses, and occupations. Copied, abstracted, and contributed by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

LEVIC. FOWLER 600 Austin Ave. Sheffield, Ala.

Levi C. Fowler entered service in April, 1861 at Florence, Ala., as a private in Company "H" in the 4th Alabama Regiment of Infantry under Capt. McFarland and Col. Jones. He served four years and was in the battles of Seven Pines, Gaines Farm, Second Battle of Manassas, Sharpsburg, and Gettysburg but was never wounded or captured. He left service when paroled at Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865.

Mr. Fowler was born August 30, 1841 in Lauderdale County, Ala., and is a registered voter in the Sheffield Precinct. He was married January 17, 1867 in Lauderdale County and his wife is 77 years old. She was born in Lauderdale County. Mr. Fowler is a farmer by occupation and is now residing with some of his children. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

Mr. Fowler stated he had received his pension regularly since being placed on the roll in Colbert County. The questionnaire was signed by L. C. Fowler on June 17, 1921 at Verona, Mississippi.

BENTON W. McVAY Margerum, Alabama Benton W. McVay enlisted in the service in 1862 as a private at Cherokee, Ala. He served nearly three years in the 4th Alabama Regiment under Capt. Robert Johnson and Col. P. D. Radia. He was in the battles of "Harrisburg, Miss., Pelaskay [Pulaski], Tenn., [and] Sulphur Spring, Athens, Ala." He was captured on April 2, 1865 at Selma, Alabama and was paroled on April 13, 1865 at Montgomery after eleven days imprisonment.

He was born April 6, 1835 in Mounton, Lawrence Co., Alabama. He is a registered voter in the Dixon, Alabama precinct in Colbert County. His wife is dead and he has no children. He is unable to walk and makes his home with Kay[Ray?] McVay, his nephew.

Route 1 Leighton, Alabama Jefferson T. Donaldson enlisted at Mt. Hope in Lawrence Co., Ala. on Sept. 17, 1861 as a private in Company "K" of the 4th Regiment of Alabama Cavalry under Capt. David Hubbard (and later Capt. A. E. Kelley), and Col. W. A. Johnson. He participated in the battles of Fort Henry, Day's Gap, Athens, Alabama and Brice's Cross Roads. He was wounded in a cavalry skirmish near Bane Bridge in Colbert County but was never taken prisoner. He was paroled at the end of the war on May 11, 1865 at Wheeler Station, Alabama.

Mr. Donaldson was born June 5, 1843 at Dalton, Murray Co., Georgia. He was married January 2, 1867 at Mount Hope, Ala. and his wife, aged 76 and born in Selma, Ala., is now dead. He is a farmer by occupation, is a registered voter in Precinct 11 in Colbert County and is presently living with his youngest daughter, Mrs. H. H. Croft. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

He served three years and was in the battles of Cross Roads, Germantown, Red Sulphur Tressel, and Athens but was never wounded or captured. He was paroled in 1865 at the close of the war at Ponds Springs.

Mr. Askew was born in Lawrenceburg, Lawrence County, Tenn. on February 7, 1835. He has lived in Alabama 60 years having moved here in 1860. He was married in 1878 in Newport, Ala. but his wife, who was born in Alabama, is now dead. He is a farmer by occupation and is presently residing with a daughter. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

Alexander Shorpston enlisted at Crawford, Russell County, Alabama in 1861 as a Private in Company "G," of the 17th Alabama Regiment of Infantry under Captain Tom Ragland and Col. Tom Watts.

Mr. Shorpston was in service four years and was in the battles of Shiloh, Franklin, and Nashville in Tennessee and in the battles of Dalton, Rome, Atlanta, and Peachtree Creek in Georgia. He was wounded in either 1861 or 1862 ("doesn't remember which") in the battle of Rome, Georgia but was not captured or imprisoned. He was paroled at the close of the war in 1865 at Danville, Virginia.

He was born October 9, 1839 at Red Hill, Edgefield District, South Carolina but moved to Alabama "about 1843" during the "1st, 2 or 3 year of life." He is a registered voter in the Sheffield precinct in Colbert County, Alabama.

Alexander Shorpston was married in 1867 in Lauderdale County, Alabama but his wife, who was born in Lauderdale County, is now dead. He is a farmer by occupation and is presently living with his daughter, Mrs. Mollie Pippen in Sheffield, Alabama. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

Aaron Thomas Patton enlisted in May, 1861 at Russellville, Alabama as a Private in Company "H," of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry under the command of Captain J. W. C. Smith and Col. W. B. Wood.

He was in service approximately four years and participated in the battles of Fishing Creek, Shiloh, Chickamauga, Murfreesboro, Missionary Ridge, Kingston, Kennesaw Mountain, Ringgold [Tn.], and Wild City [Ky.] He was wounded in July, 1864 in the battle of Kennesaw Mountain, now Marietta, Georgia, but was not captured or imprisoned. He was discharged in May, 1865 at Pond Spring, Ala., by order of Capt. Smith who obtained the discharge for him as he was in the hospital.

Mr. Patton was born near Russellville in Franklin County, Alabama on March 12, 1842. He lived in Mississippi from 1894 to about 1908 [he is not sure of the year] when he moved back to Alabama. He was married in 1865 near Russellville, Ala. and his wife, who was born in Lawrence Co., Ala., is now dead. He is a registered voter in the Town Creek precinct in Lawrence County.

Mr. Patton was once a farmer but is unable to work and is residing with his children. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

CORDY SKINNER BADGETT Mr. Badgett enlisted at Russellville, Alabama in 1862 as a private in the 16th Alabama Regiment. He was in service three years and participated in campaigns from Dalton to Atlanta, Georgia and was wounded there in 1864. He was captured in 1864 at Good Springs, Alabama and imprisoned in Camp Chase, Ohio until the end of the War at which time and place he was paroled.

> He was born in Colbert County, Alabama on March 22, 1831 and never lived in any other state. On February 10, 1892 he was married in Franklin County and his wife, who was born in Franklin Co., is now aged 63 years. Badgett is a registered voter in Tuscumbia, Alabama.

HESTER BIBLE

The Hester Bible was contributed by M. E. Ahlstrom of Florence, Alabama. This Bible was originally owned by William (Buck) Hester who came to Franklin County in the spring of 1818 with his eldest son, Roling, then a boy of about eleven years of age. They selected a place for settlement near Gaine's Trace towards the present Tharp Springs Community and raised their first crop of corn that summer. In the fall of 1818 they returned by ox cart to North Carolina for Mrs. Hester (nee Amy Malone) and the other members of the family. When they returned to Franklin County, Alabama they continued to live near Tharp Springs until they moved to a section of wilderness near the line between the Franklin County line of that period and the Chickasaw Reservation. This area was later known as Frankfort and was the first Franklin county seat. The Bible passed to the eldest son, Wiley Robertson Hester, who died in 1929.

1921 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

In the year 1921 the Alabama Legislature passed an Act requiring that a permanent roll of Civil War pensioners be prepared and kept by the Pension Commission. Questionnaires were prepared and sent to all pensioners, both veterans and widows of veterans. These original, completed questionnaires are now housed in the Military Branch of the Alabama State Department of Archives and History in Montgomery, Alabama.

These questionnaires not only give a brief military history of the veteran but they also give personal information such as when and where married and the age of the wife if she is still living. It is most unfortunate that these forms did not include the name of the wife, however, they did ask for a list of living children, their addresses, and occupations.

The genealogical information contained in these questionnaires is specially significant in Franklin County since it is a "burned county" and there is virtually nothing left there of genealogical import from the mid-Nineteenth Century.

The census questionnaire of Wiley Roberson Hester is carried in this issue in conjunction with the Hester Bible record. In the next issue of Valley Leaves we will print several more of these census records.

WILEY ROBERSON HESTER RFD 1 Belgreen, Alabama

Wiley Roberson Hester enlisted as a private at Frankfort, Alabama in the spring of 1862 in Company "E" of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry commanded by Capt. W. W. Weatherford and Col. Woods. He transferred to Company "L" of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry in the Fall of 1863 (he is uncertain as to the exact time) under Capt. Newsom and Col. Bill Johnson.

He was in the battles of Fishing Creek, Kentucky and of Corinth, Mississippi. He shot himself accidentally through the hand but was not otherwise wounded or captured during his three years in service. He was paroled at Old Newport in 1865 at the close of the War.

Wiley Roberson Hester was born July 25, 1844 at Frankfort in Franklin County, Alabama, and was married in 1867 in Franklin County. His wife was born in South Alabama and was aged 75 at the time of her death last year [1920.]

He is a registered voter in the Belgreen Precinct in Franklin County. His occupation was farming as long as he was able but he is now residing with a son, W. A. Hester. His living children and their addresses and occupations are:

They further State that Said Carroll about 3 O'clock on the morning aforesaid called them together with one Joshua Mason to bear witness to what he should say. He then called Mary Ann McBride, wife of said Giles McBride, to his bed side and remarked that he was dying but that he was as well in his senses as any of them, that he did not think he would live to see the sun rise, and handed Mrs. McBride his gold watch and told her it was hers, that he gave it to her for her kindness to him since he had been at her house sick.

He then remarked, addressing himself to said affiants and said Mason, and calling on them to take notice of what he saith that he wanted all his just debts paid and after they were paid he wanted his friend Giles McBride to have all his property. He said he did not owe any thing of Account that he knew of. He further said that if Mr. McBride had been at home he would have had his will written out but he said that what had been said to affiants and said Mason would do as well as if he had written it on ninety nine sheets of paper.

He also said that he wished said McBride to wind up his business for him. Said affiants further states that said McBride was from home and that there was no person present that could write a Will and that said Carroll was in great agony and scarcely able to turn himself in his bed and totally unable to write. That said Carroll continued to grow weaker but retained his right mind till Monday the 11th June when he became senseless and remained so till he died at said McBride's house on Thursday the 14th day of June, 1849.

The above was signed by Sanders M. Norwood. Mary E. Blanton signed it with an "X." It was sworn to before Judge William B. Wood on July 23, 1850. [Note: The above nuncupative will was copied here in its entirety.]

ORPHANS COURT MINUTES, 1824 - 1830

(Part One of several parts)

1824 - 25

This is not the earliest Orphans Court Minute book in Limestone County. The one(s) prior to 1824 are in the process of being abstracted by Mr. David Whitehorn of Limestone County who plans to publish them.

Daniel Coleman was the Judge from the beginning of these minutes through May 2, 1829. On May 26, 1829 William J. Mason became the presiding judge. All persons are residents of Limestone County unless so stated.

To fully understand these minutes there are some facts the reader should know. When an estate was ready to be appraised the judge usually appointed five men as appraisers or commissioners. It was only necessary that a majority of these commissioners do the actual appraisal.

When an estate or guardianship was ready for final settlement the administrator or guardian submitted his final accounts and vouchers to the judge and asked that the case be settled. The law required that a notice of this intent be published for a certain length of time in a local newspaper. The judge set the date of hearing on the settlement and at that time anyone interested in the case in any manner could appear and let his wishes or complaints be heard. In these abstracts we have not stated that the judge ordered publication in the newspaper, however, it should be understood that such was the case.

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT

of

WILLIAM DICKSON

The following Last Will and Testament of William Dickson was found and contributed by Mrs. Carl. E. Goodwin of Murfreesboro, Tennessee. This Will is recorded in Will Book No. 9, Pages 407-408, Rutherford County, Tennessee, and is housed in the County Court Clerk's office.

In the name of God, Amen

I, William Dickson, now of Rutherford County and State of Tennessee being weak in body but of sound and disposing mind [and] memory do make & ordain the following as my last will and Testament—

First, I give and bequeath to my brother James Dickson living in Madison County, Alabama and my Brother Enoch Dickson of Rutherford County, Tennessee all the negroes of which I may die possed, consisting of sixteen working hands including seven women also four children with all the increase, if any, to be divided in value equally between them and if making such division my said two brothers shall not be able to agree then such division shall be made by three competent disinterested persons to be chosen by them; the negroes so divided is for their benefit during their life time and on the death of my brother James Dickson it is my in tention that the negroes to which he becomes intitled under the will shall decend at once to his five youngest daughters and in case of the death of either to be shared equally by those that may be living at the time.

And on the death of my brother Enoch Dickson it is my intention that the negroes now intended to be conveyed to him by this will shall descend at once to his two Sons, John and Enoch, and his two daughters Lucends and Mary share and share alike; and in the event Lucinda dies without an heir then her portion shall revert to the remaining three children just named.

Second, I have some money and debts due me which I wish put out to interest as soon as practicable to be made safe and secure, the sum I am unable to state exactly but suppose it to be about Six Thousand Dollars appropriated to the use and special benefit of two neices which I have in Virginia named Lucinda & Margaret Martin & the same to be paid to them annually.

Third, I have a quarter section of land in Lauderdale County, Alabama within four miles of Rogersville near big Elk Which I give to my brother Thomas Dickson.

Fourth, I have in Grayson County, Virginia twenty two hundred and fourteen acres of land nearly in a Square, also one other tract of about fifty acres adjoining or nearly adjoining my brother John Dickson who lives in Virginia; these two tracts of land I give and bequeath to my said brother John Dickson.

Fourth [Fifth] To my brother Enock Dickson I give the mare which I ride and all the personal property which I have not otherwise disposed of in this will.

And lastly I do hereby appoint my Said two Brothers James Dickson and Enoch Dickson my Executors to this my last will and testament revoking all others & not wishing them to give any Security for their faithful Administration on the premises.

RICHARD MITCHELL HEIRS

Richard Mitchell died in Madison County, Alabama between July 21 and July 25, 1839. He left a widow, Mary, and eight children. In his Probate File [No. 316] is a list of his children which is most unusual in that it gives the birth dates of several. The following is a verbatim transcript of the document. [Contributed by Dorothy Scott Johnson.]

"The Heirs of Richd Mitchell decd [are] Eli Mitchell, decd., his heir [is] Anna Maria, an Infant Sarah Doss, decd., her heir [is] Martha Ann 4 y[ear]s old Note: This document is Isaac Mitchell, of age Drucilla Mitchell born June 21st 1823 not dated, however, Eveline Mitchell born Febr. 29, 1828 it was probably Anna Mitchell born Sept^r 18, 1830 made soon after Andrew J. Mitchell born March 5, 1836 Richard's death. James M. Mitchell born July 5, 1838" 1

Even though Isaac Mitchell's birth date was not recorded here he was buried in the Rice Cemetery and his tombstone says he was born October 8, 1820 and died September 11, 1871.



THE BEGINNER IN GENEALOGY

All too often the problems of the rank beginner in genealogy are overlooked. We "old-timers" tend to assume a beginner knows more than he does and as a consequence that beginner, not wanting to appear stupid, allows many important questions to go unanswered. Experienced genealogists often forget that they too were rank beginners once.

In order to help the novice over some rough spots the Tennessee Valley Genealogical Society plans to publish a series of articles in Valley Leaves written especially for the beginner in genealogy. These articles will deal with such basic skills as how and where to start your research, how to fill out a Family Group Sheet, and how to find certain things such as birth dates, death dates, and other necessary genealogical information. Other articles will include understanding and abstracting deeds, wills, and other legal documents. All articles will be geared to research in the nine North Alabama counties covered by Valley Leaves. We hope you find them entertaining, stimulating, and educational.

DO and DON'T

Do not collar people and expound on your ancestors unless you want your present friends to suddenly become your past friends. Nothing is more boring to others than your ancestors. especially when they are dying to bore you with theirs.

Do not expect to find royal blood, generals, land barons, and First Families among your ancestors even though Great Aunt Sarah swears you descend from each and every one of the above. You might find, however, illiterates, illegitimacies, felons, insolvents, and other persons that raise a family genealogy from dull to interesting.

Do be brief and straight to the point in seeking information from another - then THANK that person for their help.

Do not expect to trace your ancestry back to Adam and Eve or Charlemagne in twenty days or less. Do expect to spend many months, or even years, trying to find your immigrant ancestors.

Do not expect to find you descend from Pocahontas [although you might as she has many descendents] or an "Indian Princess." Instead, expect to have difficulty in proving Indian heritage with road-blocks at every turn.

Do not always believe the printed word. Humans write books and they do make mistakes.

Do not brag of your ancestor's accomplishments; after all, the accomplishments were theirs, not yours.

Do try to live up to the standards of your ancestors - or in some cases, rise above them.

Do not be surprised to find your ancestors were illiterate. Do understand that educational facilities were limited in pioneer America - and that education had nothing to do with intelligence or integrity.

Do not believe you have the perfect memory and will recall where you found a certain piece of information. Cite your sources of information. Now. Before you forget it.

At one time or another most of us have had to hurridly abstract deeds and estate proceedings that dealt with land descriptions. We have carefully written out each quarter, each section number, each township number, and each range number. Each time we laboriously repeated the lengthy description we wished for a shorter, easier method. There is one. It is the universally accepted form used by the oil industry in its dealings. The rules are few and very simple. They are:

- 1. The letters N, S, E, and W stand for north, south, east, and west.
- 2. The number "4" stands for "quarter" [1/4] and the number "2" stands for "half" [1/2].

Example: W/2 SE/4 means the west half of the southeast quarter.

3. You ALWAYS write the section number first, then the township number, then the range number:

Example: Sec. 32-6-1W means Section 32, Township 6, Range 1 West.

4. Townships are always north and south, or up and down on a map if you prefer to think of it that way. Ranges are always east and west, or if you prefer, right and left on a map.

The plat below is a township plat. There are 36 sections in each township. A section is one square mile and contains 640 acres. A half section contains 320 acres and a quarter section contains 160 acres. Land records seem to be the most baffling thing in genealogy to the beginner and we hope the plat will aid in putting sections, townships, and ranges in their proper perspective.
