

The exact location of the Decatur/Jackson County line remains elusive but it was in trying to locate it that negative photostats of the township plats of the Decatur County area were ordered. The public surveys of this land were conducted in 1822 and 1823 but annotations as late as 1888 are included. Located and secured by Catherine Gilliam, this information was transcribed by Dorothy S. 1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

(Third Installment)

Please refer to the December, 1982 issue of Valley Leaves for the Introduction to this Census. The 1907 Confederate Census was taken for pension purposes and was authorized by an Act of the Alabama Legislature. The drawings were taken from rare books, long out of print, covering the Civil War. The clerks compiling these records were careless in the spellings of various geographical locations and corrections have been made where possible. Copied and contributed by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

62. Thomas Jefferson Mitchell Spring Valley, Ala.

Thomas Jefferson Mitchell was born September 29, 1839 at Kinlock, Lawrence County, Alabama. He entered service in Company A of the 27th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until September, 1863. He re-enlisted as a 3rd Lieutenant on September 20, 1863 at Jackson, Mississippi in the 27th Alabama Regiment for three years and continued until May 1, 1866 when he was paroled at Decatur.

63. John Weston Messer Cherokee, Alabama

Mr. Messer was born June 23, 1835 at McDonald, Henry County, Georgia. [Note: McDonald was located in Thomas County according to an 1888 atlas.] He entered service as a private August 6, 1861 at Burleson, Alabama in Company E of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until October, 1864. He re-enlisted as a private in October, 1864 in Moreland's Battalion but does not remember the place. He continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Iuka, Mississippi.

64. James Lalton[Latton?] Mr. Morgan was born July 24, 1845 near Mount Hope, Lawrence County, Alabama. He entered service as a private August 23, 1863 at Newburg, Alabama in Company C of the 4th Alabama Cavalry and continued until May 17, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

65. Samuel Nichols Leighton, Alabama Samuel Nichols was born October 4, 1831 at Newbury[?], Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a First Sergeant on

67. Goodloe Pride Cherokee, Alabama Mr. Pride was born October 20, 1820 at Pride Station, Franklin Co., Alabama. He entered service as a 3rd Lieutenant in April, 1861 at Cherokee, Alabama in Company A of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Macon, Georgia.

Sheffield, Alabama

68. William Barnes Pippen Mr. Pippen was born June 4, 1845 at Mayfield, Jackson County, Tennessee. He first entered service as a private August 11, 1861 at Jackson [Tennessee] in Company E of the 28th Tennessee Cavalry Regiment and continued until November 7, 1862. He re-enlisted on June 10, 1862 at Mayfield, Tennessee in the 8th Tennessee Regiment, Company C, and continued until December 8, 1864. He re-enlisted as a private on January 10, 1864 at Mayfield, Tennessee in Company E of the 28th Tennessee Cavalry Regiment and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Kingston, Georgia.

69. John Berry Porterfield Florence, Alabama

Mr. Porterfield was born in October, 1836 at Greenville, Butler County, Alabama. He enlisted as a private February 28, 1861 at Fort Deposit in Company C of the 1st Alabama Regiment and continued until June, 1865 when he was captured and paroled at Port Hetson[Hudson?].

Sheffield, Alabama

70. Ward Post Lay Parker Mr. Parker was born December 30, 1847 at Gainesville, Sumpter County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in December, 1864 at Gainesville, Alabama in Company E of the 63rd Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May 17, 1865 when he was paroled at Meridian, Mississippi.

71. John William Pickard Frankfort, Alabama

Mr. Pickard was born in 1843 at Frankfort, Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in 1862 at Frankfort in Company E of the 4th Alabama Cavalry regiment and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama, now called Wheeler Station.

72. Parker Nathaniel Green Rand [Note: This name is written "Parker Nathaniel Green Rand," but it is listed with the "P's" so the name may be "Nathaniel Green Rand Parker." He was born October 18, 1829 at LaGrange, Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a Captian in 1863 at Leighton in Company H of the 11th Alabama Regiment of cavalry and continued until May, 1865 when

he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

73. Ruben C. Reed Florence, Alabama Mr. Reed was born May 26, 1845 at Jasper, Walker County, Alabama. He entered service February 22, 1862 at Jasper, Alabama in Company E of the 28th Alabama Regiment and continued until October, 1863. He re-enlisted as a Captain on October 15, 1863 at Blue Mountain in the Musgrave Battalion and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

74. John William Rather Spring Valley, Ala.

Mr. Rather was born December 14, 1828 at Elkton, Giles County, Tennessee. He entered service in January, 1863 at LaGrange, Alabama in Company B of the 35th Alabama Infantry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

75. Jacob Samuel Rhodes Sheffield, Alabama Mr. Rhodes was born March 16, 1845 at Gravley Springs in Lauderdale County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in the spring of 1862 at Florence, Alabama in Company F of the 4th Alabama Cavalry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Big Springs, Ky.

76. Hugh Watson Rutland Cherokee, Alabama Mr. Rutland was born September 28, 1839 at Buzzard Roose in Colbert [then Franklin] County, Alabama. He entered service as a private on

March 31, 1861 at Tuscumbia. Alabama in Company E of the 2nd Alabama Regiment and continued until March 31. 1862 when he was mustered out of service at Fort Pillow, Tn. He reentered service as a private

at Tupelo, Mississippi on April 20, 1862 in Company A of the 16th Alabama Infantry Regiment and continued until April 1, 1865 when he "Resigned Lieutenant in Company A" 16th Alabama Regiment. He reenlisted as a private on April 1, 1865 at Edgefield, South Carolina in the Independent Scouts under Inge and continued until April 25, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

77. Alexander Sharpton Sheffield, Alabama

Note: This name listed as "Shorpston" on the 1921 Confederate Census. Mr. Sharpton was born October 9, 1839 at Edgefield in Edgefield County, South Carolina. He entered service as a private in 1861 at Silver Run, Alabama in Company G of the 17th Alabama Infantry Regiment and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Danville, Virginia.

78. James Henry Spangler Leighton, Alabama Mr. Spangler was born July 12, 1844 at Marietta, Lawrence County, Alabama. He entered service as a private July 12, 1863 at Leighton, Alabama in Company A of the 4th Alabama Cavalry and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs in Lawrence Co., Ala.

79. John William Spangler Mr. Spangler was born September 18, 1842 at Marietta, Lawrence County.

He entered service as a private on September 29, 1862 at Russellville in Company E of the 4th Alabama Cavalry Regiment and continued until paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama on May 16, 1865.

81. Henry Lawrence Sherrod Tuscumbia, Ala. Henry Lawrence Sherrod was born May 8, 1841 at Florence, Lauderdale County, Alabama. He entered service as a private on March 25, 1861 at Fort Morgan in Company C of the 2nd Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until March 25, 1862. He re-enlisted as a private on March 25, 1862 at Barton, Alabama in the 11th Alabama Cavalry in Company F and continued until May 18, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

82. James David Stringer Tuscumbia, Ala.

Mr. Stringer was born April 12, 1840 at Florence in Lauderdale County, Alabama. He entered service as a private on May 25, 1863 at Cherokee. Alabama in Baxter's Battalion and served until 1864 when he went home sick and never returned.

83. William Henderson Shaw Leighton, Alabama

Mr. Shaw was born August 1, 1830 at Leighton in Lawrence County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in January, 1862 near Leighton. Alabama in Company B of the 27th Alabama Infantry Regiment and continued until August, 1862. He re-enlisted as a private in the summer of 1862 at Leighton and served as a secret service man until the summer of 1865 when he was paroled.

84. John Thomas Terry Riverton, Alabama

Mr. Terry was born March 24, 1840 at Sulligent in Marion County, Alabama. He entered service as a private on June 2, 1861 at Moscow, Alabama in Company K of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May, 1865. He was never paroled.

1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

First Installment

The Alabama Legislature passed an Act requiring a census of all Confederate Soldiers be taken in 1907 for pension payment purposes. This was to include all veterans of the Civil War who had fought for the Confederacy and who were presently living in the state of Alabama regardless of where they had served or from what state they had served.

Each veteran was to fill out an affidavit stating his residence, date and place of birth, and a brief statement as to his military service. This information was transferred from the original affidavit to ledgers in alphabetical, or semi-alphabetical, order by the soldier's last name. Some of the affidavits were returned after the ledger was made up and those will be found at the end of the ledger out of alphabetical sequence.

The Probate Judge in each county had the duty of securing the information and sending a copy of it to the State. For this reason, the original ledgers are housed in the Probate Judge's office of each county and the copies are now in the Military Division of the Alabama Department of Archives and History in Montgomery, Alabama. The material used in Valley Leaves was taken from microfilm copies of the ledgers in the Archives.

The clerks compiling these records were careless in the spellings of various geographical locations and corrections have been made where possible. The drawings were taken from rare books, long out of print, covering the Civil War. The number preceding each name is the number of that person as it appears in the ledger.



He re-enlisted as a private in 1863 at Chattanooga, Tennessee in Company K of the 10th Mississippi Regiment of Infantry and continued until February, 1865 when he was paroled at Danville, Alabama.

- 6. David Baker Boyd Mr. Boyd was born April 7, 1842 in Tuscaloosa County, Alabama. He

John Pinkney Borden Russellville, Alabama Mr. Borden was born February 27, 1844 in Lawrence County.

William Drura Bowen Russellville, Alabama Mr. Bowen was born December 6, 1834 at Russellville, Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private July 15, 1861 at Russellville, Alabama in Company H of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and served until May 17, 1865 when he was paroled at Greensboro, North Carolina.

10. John H. Blackledge Pleasant Site, Ala. Mr. Blackledge was born August 3, 1844 in Llincoln County, Tenn. He entered service as a private in December, 1862 at Cherokee, Alabama in Company L of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

11. RFD #1 Newburgh, Alabama

Addison Lafayette Bishop Mr. Bishop was born August 17, 1837 in Etawah County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in September, 1862 at Shelbyville, Tennessee in Company H of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Larkinsville, Alabama.

Benjamin Franklin Baldwin Vina, Alabama

Benjamin Franklin Baldwin was born March 3, 1842 in Gwinnett County, Georgia. He entered service as a private in July, 1861 at Murfreesboro, Tennessee in Company B of the 49th Alabama Regt. of Infantry and continued until transferred to Cavalry in 1862. He re-enlisted as a private in April, 1862 at Bridgeport in Company K of the 5th Regiment of Alabama Cavalry and continued until the end of the war. He was at home sick at the time of the surrender.

13. Phil Campbell, Ala.

Andrew Jackson Barnett Mr. Barnett was born September 5, 1829 in Lincoln County, Tennessee. He entered service as a private in 1861 at Newburgh, Alabama in Company A of the 27th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until the capture of Fort Henry in February, 1862. After that he was detailed to make boots and shoes for the army and continued doing that until the surrender.

14. David Sevier Box

Mr. Box was born March 29, 1840 in Franklin County, Alabama. He

(David Sevier Box) Spruce Pine, Ala. (-continued-) entered service as a private in May, 1861 at Corinth, Mississippi in Company A of the 17th Mississippi Regiment of Infantry and continued until March, 1865 when he was captured. He was paroled at Louisville, Kentucky on May 20, 1865.

15. George Almonte Britton Belgreen, Alabama

Mr. Britton was born September 22, 1839 at Russellville, Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in September, 1862 at Barton, Alabama in Company L of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

16. Colston (Coley) Crowel Rockwood, Alabama Mr. Crowel was born February 19, 1822 in Montgomery County, North Carolina. He entered service as a private in March, 1863 at Cherokee, Alabama in Company L of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until captured in December, 1864. He was paroled June 14, [1865] at Camp Chase, Ohio.

17. Peter Clay Russellville, Alabama Mr. Clay was born June 7, 1838 near Frankfort on Main River in Germany. He entered service as a private in August, 1861 at Courtland, Alabama in Company B of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May 27, 1865 when he was paroled at Greensboro, North Carolina.

18. Jessey Thomas Counts Mehama, Alabama Mr. Counts was born April 29, 1842 in Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in November, 1863 in Newburgh, Alabama in Company D of the 11th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Courtland, Ala.

19. John King Clarke Russellville, Ala. Mr. Clarke was born January 15, 1832 in Augusta County, Virginia. He entered service as a captain in May, 1862 at Russellville, Alabama in Company H of the 11th Regular Alabama Cavalry and continued until December, 1862 after which he remained at home as a practicing physician until the surrender.

20. John William Carter Russellville, Alabama Mr. Carter was born April 8, 1847 in Lawrence Co., Ala., and entered service as a private in July, 1861 at Courtland, Ala. in Co. F of the 16th Alabama Regt. of



Infantry and continued until July, 1864 when he was discharged at Atlanta, Georgia.

21. Joseph Lindsey Dotson Russellville, Ala.

Mr. Dotson was born December 1, 1846 at Russellville, Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in November, 1862 at Tuscumbia, Alabama in Company A of the 27th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

23. Partain Dill Belgreen, Alabama Mr. Dill was born January 24, 1841 in Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in December, 1861 at Florence, Alabama in Company L of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

24. Robert Flurnoy Ezzell Belgreen, Alabama Mr. Ezzell was born October 23, 1845 in Cleburne County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in November, 1864 at Kingston, Tennessee in Company J[I?] of the 1st Georgia Regiment of Cavalry and continued until March, 1865 when he was paroled at Talladega, Alabama.

25. Berry Ellis Finch Pleasant Site, Alabama Mr. Finch was born April 11, 1841 in Campbell County, Georgia. He entered service as a private on March 12, 1862 at LaGrange, Alabama in Company B of the 35th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May 16, 1865 when he was paroled at Meridian, Mississippi.

26. Charley Franklin

Mr. Fleming was born July 24, 1837 in Monroe County, Georgia. He entered service as a private March 15, 1862 at LaGrange, Alabama in Company B of the 35th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until captured in March, 1865. He was paroled in May, 1865 at Camp Chase, Ohio.

27. John Simpson Gray Littleville, Alabama Mr. Gray was born January 18, 1842 in Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in December, 1861 at Newburgh, Alabama in Company A of the 27th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until April, 1865. He was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

28. William C. Greenhill Daily, Alabama

Mr. Greenhill was born January 29, 1847 at Leighton, Lawrence County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in September, 1864 in Company E of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Cavalry and continued until May 17, 1865 when he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama.

MARRIAGE RECORDS 1851 - 1856

(Eighth Installment)

The Jackson County Marriage Book, 1851-1856, was first carried in Valley Leaves in Volume 11, Issue No. 3 (March, 1977), and is continued from Volume 13, Issue No. 1 (September, 1978). Most of the records of this county were burned during the Civil War by the Northern Army and this is the earliest marriage record to survive. The marriages are not recorded in strict chronological order which leads me to believe they were copied from another source, possibly the original marriage bonds. If this is the case, it is doubtful these are all of the marriages performed during the period 1851-1856 but would be only those for which a marriage bond survived. The handwriting in the book is very difficult to decipher but, fortunately, there is an index. The index is incomplete, however. Apparently the person making the index also had trouble reading the clerk's script and he solved the problem by simply omitting many questionable names from his index. I have referred to the index where there was a question of interpretation and so noted it in this work; let us hope the person who made up the index was more familiar with Jackson County names than the clerk.



If my sons should die without heirs I desire their shares of my estate to go to the children of my brothers and sisters. If my brother, Milton C. Lansford, should become disables so he can not support himself then I desire that he be supported from the proceeds of my estate.

Appoints Genl. Phillip J. Iron and Judge Sidney C. Posey, executors.

Statement of James H. Witherspoon, Witness:

At the time of executing and signing his will Thomas A.

Lansford was in a low state of health. So far as his mental condition was concerned I can only give a brief history of the circumstances. On Saturday preceeding the date of the will I was sent for to write his will. When I arrived I found him very low and feeble in every way; he said there were too many persons about to have his will written that day but to come early the next week as he thought he would not die for 3 or 4 days. He exhibited great feebleness of mind and body. On the date of the will I returned to his house; he appeared to have improved and had more strength and was more talkative. The "room was closed" and

I proceeded to write down what he suggested in the most condensed manner I could. In each bequest he used a great many words and I condensed it as much as possible. I thought him somewhat under the influence of Spirits and thought him much enfeebled and impaired both by dread and excessive drinking. I remember to have come to the conclusion at the time that

his mind was barely sufficiently such to make a will yet I thought it would not do to wait after this date. From the causes before named, prior to making his will, his mind and physical powers had commenced giving way and so continued until his death.

WILLIAM H. CRITTENDEN

Dated: 4 Sept 1853 Prob: 6 May 1854

... being weak of body but of sound and disposing mind and memory ... pay all just debts ... My executor or executrix to purchase a plantation with a suitable residence on it for my family. All my negroes to be put on said plantation and worked for the support of my wife and children.

Should my wife, Octavia, marry any property given her by this will is to be hers forever, solely and independently of control of anyone.

If my executors feel it wise, they may sell all my negroes (rather than purchase a plantation) and invest the money. Out of the interest, my wife and children to be supported and my children educated. My wife may retain some negroes as house servants.

All my property to be divided equally among my wife and children. If there should be a posthumous child then it shall take a share as follows:

> My wife, Octavia, one share My son, Benjamin Felix Crittenden, one share My son, William Henry Crittenden, one share My son, Doctor Moses Hargraves Crittenden, one share the posthumous child, one share.

If my wife remarries her portion to be given her when my son, Benjamin F., comes of age. Each child to have their portion when they come of age. My house and lot in Florence to be sold.

Appoints wife Octavia, executrix; and my affectionate brother, Benjamin F. Crittenden, and my brother-in-law, Moses Ingram, executors.

COUNTY TREASURER'S REPORT

The following is a verbatim transcript from the original copy of a report to the Lawrence County Commission of monies paid out of the treasury. Not only does it show the date and amount paid but it also shows to whom paid and the reason for the payment. Since there are a number of entries dating back to 1844, and up to and including 1849, it is important as names will appear here that are not found in the 1850 Federal Census.

Most of the expenditures are to witnesses or jury members. Witnesses and jurors were not paid a fee for their services but were reimbursed their actual expenses in travelling to and from their home.

PROBATE FILES

There is nothing more revealing and helpful in your genealogical research than the original files on your ancestor's estate. If the file is complete it will contain receipts, petitions, lists of heirs, and many other helpful items. It is, in essence, a detailed picture of your ancestor's last days on earth. Often, however, these files are incomplete and may contain only one item. Many counties do not have the old, original files; apparently they were recorded in the ledgers, kept a respectable length of time, then discarded.

Madison County researchers are fortunate because many of the original files are extant and contain a fountain of genealogical and historical information. We will, from time to time, abstract complete files and run them in "Valley Leaves." We have chosen to begin this series with two separate George Smiths.

GEORGE SMITH OF GOOCHLAND CO., VA.

Probate File No. 1-A. [Note: This George Smith's will was found mis-filed in with the other George Smith's probate file.] The will was transferred from Goochland County to Madison County because his son and heir, George S. Smith, was a resident of Madison County.

Will dated May 13, 1814 in Goochland Co., Va. Probated April 15, 1816 in Goochland Co., Va.

"I, George Smith, of the County of Goochland being aged and infirm but through divine mercy of sound mind and disposing memory and calling to mind the uncertainty of all transitory things do make and ordain this to be my last Will and Testament: ... commend soul to God ... my body I commit to the earth from whence it came to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors ... pay just debts ..."

To beloved wife Caroline Smith during her lifetime my entire estate not herein otherwise disposed of.

To my daughter Magdalene Fowler one negro man (who has been in her husband's possession for many years), and One Dollar cash.

To my daughter Mary Baughan one negro man (who has been in her husband's possession for many years), and One Dollar cash.

To my daughter Martha Worsham one negro man (who has been in her husband's possession for many years), and One Dollar cash.

To my son Thomas Smith three slaves (now in his possession) and One Dollar cash.

To my son Anthony T. Smith one negro man (now and for several years back in his possession) and One Dollar cash.

To my daughter Anne Worsham and to the heirs of her body at the death of my wife, one negro girl.

To my son George S. Smith, after my wife's death, one negro woman and child. George S. is to pay my son John Smith \$200 when said negroes are delivered which sum is to be used to buy a negro girl and conveyed to my daughter Sarah Dowdye.

To my son John Smith, after my wife's death, two negro girls.

To my sons Thomas, Anthony, and George S. Smith all the remainder of my estate after the death of my wife.

Thomas, Anthony and George S. Smith are to pay to my two grandchildren, Caroline Maddox and George Maddox, children of my deceased daughter Elizabeth Maddox,

One Hundred Fifty Dollars, "that is to say \$50 each or whatever they may think it most proper for their benefit, to be equally divided between them."

Appoints sons George S. and John Smith, executors.

"I have long since complied with the contents of the within Will and hold Receipts for the same. July 28, 1826."

Note: In the Frederick W. James estate file No. 2, George S. Smith is listed as the guardian of Frederick W. James' minor children, Alfred T.[W?] James, Mary L. James, and Jane Catherine James.

GEORGE SMITH OF MADISON CO., ALA.

George Smith died without a will (intestate) and the following information was abstracted from his estate file, No. 2B, housed in the Madison County Courthouse.

Letter to the Probate Judge dated Nov. 14, 1823 and signed by Sally H. Smith: "I, Sally H. Smith, widow of George Smith, decd., do hereby certify I relinquish my right to admr. on estate of said deceased and am willing that John Kirkland be appointed."

Letters of Administration: John Kirkland was appointed Administrator Nov. 14, 1823 with Harper Malone, John Smith, and William Kirkland, his securities. The administrator's bond was for \$5,000.

Receipt from Dr. D[abney] M. Wharton: "visit, consultation with Dr. Heacock on Sept. 19, 1823 - \$14.00" [Note: This was probably the physician's final visit to George Smith before his death.]

Receipt from Samuel Smither for "making coffin - \$10.00" - paid March 13, 1824.

The Petition for Division of Real Estate, dated Dec. 1, 1832, shows that George Smith died owning land and slaves, livestock, household furniture, etc. John Kirkland, admr., sold the perishable property of the estate, paid all debts, and made settlement with the court. George Smith had seven minor children at the time of his death, three of whom have since died in their minority. Sally H. Smith, widow, became their guardian and took possession of the slaves and land for purpose of supporting and educating the children. One of the heirs, Richard S. Smith, has now reached age of 21 years and asks the Court for a Division of Slaves and Lands among heirs.

Note: It was found impractical to divide slaves among heirs, therefore, the five slaves owned by the estate were sold March 2, 1833. Sarah H. Smith bought four of them and Richard Smith bought the other.

On May 10, 1833 William Routt [neighbor] signed an affidavit saying he thought the land should be sold because there had been an offer of a big price for it.

Petition for Sale of Lands dated February 25, 1833 by Sally H. Smith, widow. [Sally was

still guardian at this time of George B. and Freeborn Smith.] Sally states in her petition that George Smith died in Madison County on September 19, 1823 leaving said widow and the following heirs:

The widow purchased, among other items, a crib (small bedstead), clock, looking glass, bookcase, Bible, book entitled "History of Methodist," kitchen furniture, 2 beds, candlestand, kettle, churn, coffee mill, hogs, a horse, fodder, 6 chairs, 3 head cattle, corn, and various plantation tools.

Statement dated March 1, 1828 - \$30.00 due Joseph D. Heacock which was for 'erecting a shop on the land of said G[eorge] Smith.' The certification stated:

"This is to certify that I Jeremiah L. Calvert was witness to a verbal agreement between George Smith, since deceased, and Joseph D. Heacock in the year 1821 by which said Heacock agreed to erect a building near said Smith's dwelling house to be occupied by said Heacock as a doctor's shop so long as he might think proper, and said G[eorge] Smith, on his part, agreed to pay to said Heacock the amount of the necessary expense of erecting the same at any time when said Heacock should see cause to remove from the same. I do further certify that the above account of thirty dollars is the amount paid to me by said Heacock for erecting the same, I having been employed to do the work."

NOTE: It is interesting to note that one Samuel Vest was a purchaser at this estate sale and also that one Samuel Vest was a witness in Goochland County, Virginia to the will of the other George Smith.

Pages 134-141 Newton Bohanan Estate [Also written Buchannan]

Newton Bohanan died without a will. His estate was offered for probate 18 December, 1838. His widow (not named) relinquished, in writing, her right to administer on the estate. Richard Bohanan applied for and received letters of administration after giving \$1710 bond with John B. Finley and Elisha Moreland his securities. Richard Bohanan was ordered to make a true inventory of the estate and return same within three weeks.

The Inventory of this estate included: plantation waggon, mare and 4 colts, corn, 33 head cattle, 26 hogs, 2 yoke of oxen, 33-1/2 dry cow hides, rifle, wooden clock, man's saddle, pair of gears, log chain, and one cotton receipt on C. Kennedy for 1,913 pounds of seed cotton. This estate was appraised at \$689.61 by Charles Kennedy, E. Moreland, and Solomon Fry and the return made on Jan. 16, 1839.

INTRODUCTION TO GENEALOGY

SURNAME SPELLING VARIATIONS by
Dorothy Scott Johnson

"That can not be my family! We've never spelled our name that way!" This statement, heard so often, is the mark of an inexperienced or beginner family researcher. When we personally know our name has been spelled the same way for several generations it is very difficult to accept the possibility that it was NOT always spelled the same way.

If your family has been in America since the late 1700's or early 1800's and your name is spelled the same as that of your immigrant ancestor, then you are probably among the minority; and even then who is to say that a different branch of your family spells their name the way you do.

In order to get a clear picture of what can happen to a name let us imagine that your family had been denied the advantages of a formal education for five generations. During that period one branch moved to Boston, Mass., one to Natchez, Miss., one to Chicago, Ill., and one to St. Louis, Mo. These geographical areas represent strongly different accents in speech. If, suddenly, all branches were educated and asked to write their surname you might be surprised at the results. Each would spell their name the way it sounded and the different accents represented would probably produce startling variations in the name. Families do not have to be separated for several generations in order to spell their names differently. I have seen fathers and sons buried next to each other with different spellings on their tombstones.

A name may be spelled various ways depending upon who wrote it. Few of our early pioneers were literate and they often depended upon lawyers, judges, court clerks, justices of the peace, or even neighbors to do their writing for them. Each of these persons might interpret the man's name differently. Anthony Chambless died in Madison County, Alabama in 1812; in his nuncupative will his name was written "Cambess," and in other early records it was variously written Chamless, Chambles, and Chambless. When William Helms' 1808 will was recorded the clerk variously wrote his name Helms, Hellums, and Hellems in that one single document. In an 1815 Madison County deed from one David and Cassa to their son, Robert, their surname was variously written Cannon, Camin, Coman, and Comin; probably further research would disclose it also written Komin and Kannon at some period. In early records it is not uncommon to find a single surname written four or five ways in one paragraph.

Our English-speaking ports-of-entry personnel were not usually bilingual and any language other than English presented a problem to them. To compound this problem, often the immigrant could not read or write in his own language so the port personnel had no other choice than to spell the name as he heard it. Then, too, you will hear horror stories about some port personnel's disrespect for accuracy; those who threw up their hands at names like Schweisshaupt (German), Repslagare (Swedish), McAulla (Scotch), Riemensperger (Swiss), Schwerdafeger (Prussian), or De Jernette (French). The real horror was when the port personnel merely wrote "Smith" or "Jones" rather than attept a difficult name—and we wonder why we can not find our immigrant ancestor today!

Many non-English settlers in America chose to "Americanize" their name after establishing roots in this country and their reasons were varied. Some had bad memories of their homeland and wanted to shed everything that reminded them of it, including their name. Some were debtors or felons who had escaped to America to start a new life and part of the new life included a new name or at least a variation of the old one. Others Americanized their names in an attempt to throw off ethnic prejudices that may have existed in the community in which they lived. Still others changed their names for simplicity sake; they were tired of trying to teach Americans to pronounce and spell their strange-sounding European name. One branch of the Pettipoole family reduced the name to P. Poole and finally to just plain Pool or Poole. Many Irish immigrants dropped the "O" from the beginning of their names, Germans dropped the "von" and Scotch dropped the "Mac." Some immigrants went a step further than Americanizing their names and changed them entirely, again, for various reasons. For instance, in ca 1905 Jacob Lippshits arrived in New York from Russia where he was about to be conscripted into the army; when he set foot in America he felt free and from that day forward he became Jacob Freeman.

The national origin of a name is not always what it appears to be. Some names go through a sort of metamorphosis. An example of this is the Euhler family that immigrated to Philadelphia ca 1730. By

the year 1759 we find a branch of this family in Rowan Co., N C. and the name was spelled "Eller." In 1783 we find a branch in Culpeper Co., Ga. and it was written "Aylor." One branch of this family began the westward trek and by 1805 in Kentucky it was being written Eller, Iler, and Oyler. By 1830 the family had reached St. Louis, Missouri and the name was being written Oyler and Oylear. Even though the name was pronounced the same as it was in 1730 it had gone through several metamorphoses in spelling. This family was German, however, to those unfamiliar with German names it appeared Irish and many years of fruitless searching was done in Irish publications.

A common reason for a difference in the spelling of a surname is a family quarrel. One family lived in the same county with close relatives for several generations but never mingled. A dispute between two brothers in the early 1800's had led to one brother moving to a distant part of the county and changing the spelling of his name. That generation refused to acknowledge relationship to the rest of the family and it was not long before the two branches lost all knowledge of kinship to the other. It was about 100 years later when both branches, as happenstance would have it, began tracing their linage and made the discovery. By then, of course, all hard feelings had been forgotten and the families reunited. This was a very common occurrence during the Civil War, a war that instead of strengthening family ties had a tendency to sever them.

You must not assume the name you are tracing was <u>always</u> spelled the way you spell it now. Listen to how it is pronounced then try to put a German accent to it, then a French accent, then Irish, and so on. Keep an open mind.

At the time of his death at age 41 Mr. Lackey was President of the Board for Certification of Genealogists, vice-President of the American Society of Genealogist (of which he had been elected a Fellow in 1976), a Councilor of the National Genealogical Society and a Contributing Editor of the 'Genealogical Journal.' He had held responsible positions in the Mississippi Historical Society and the Mississippi Genealogical Society. His accomplishments were many and his most recent work was 'Cite Your Sources: A Manual for Documenting Family Histories and Genealogical Records.'
