

1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

(Fifth and Final Installment)

For the detailed introduction to this series see "Valley Leaves," Volume 18, No. 3 (March, 1984). This census was authorized by the Alabama State Legislature for pension purposes and includes all veterans who were residents of the state at the time.

Frankfort, Alabama

William Amos Womble Mr. Womble was born November 18, 1842 in Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a Third Sergeant in September, 1861 at Courtland, Alabama in Company E of the 16th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until April, 1865 when he was paroled at Iuka, Mississippi.

97. Gardiner Willis Russellville, Ala. Mr. Willis was born August 10, 1830 in Jackson County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in May, 1861 at Florence, Alabama

in Company B of the 9th Tennessee Regiment of Cavalry and continued until May, 1865 when he was paroled at Gainesville, Alabama.

98. John L. Young Russellville, Ala.

Mr. Young was born September 5, 1844 in Jackson County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in November, 1862 and Old Bellfonte, Alabama in Company J[I?] of the 55th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until May 2, 1865 when he was paroled at Greensboro. North Carolina.

Mr. James was born February 5, 1836 in Franklin County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in September, 1861 at Knoxville, Tennessee in Company H of the 11th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until March, 1865 when

he was paroled at Pond Springs, Alabama. 101. James Lodric Thompson

Mr. Thompson was born December 18[?], 1834 in Carroll County, Georgia. He entered service as a private in November, 1863 at Howels Camp Ground, Alabama in Company B of the 28th Alabama Regiment of Infantry and continued until captured at Missionary Ridge in December, 1863. He was paroled at Rock Island, Illinois.

CERTIFICATION: The certification stated that this record was a "carefully compared copy of the original list on file in the office of the Probate Judge of" Franklin Co., Ala. It was signed by C. C. Sparks, J.P., on Aug. 10, 1908. Mr. Sparks attested the the signature of R.J.Wood, Judge of Probate.

PASSPORT OF GEORGE P. DYKES

Prior to the cession of the Cherokee lands, in what in now east Alabama, to the United States Government, it was necessary for anyone wishing to enter the Cherokee Nation or cross over their lands to secure a Passport from the Governor of the state of Georgia. One had to make application for a Passport and secure recommendations from neighbors, friends, or others who would vouch for the good character of the applicant. This was necessary to not only minimize the possibility of "riff-raff" going into the Indian Nation and stirring up trouble but to also keep track of those entering Indian territory to secure their own safety. The earliest passports were issued to allow men to enter the Indian Nation to recover stolen property or to collect debts. By 1808 when George P. Dykes made application and was granted his Passport, many were asking for passports to go as settlers or to view the country with the idea of settling. At the time Mr. Dykes' Passport was issued the Capitol of Georgia was Milledgeville in what is now Baldwin County, Georgia.

For an excellent explanation of Passports I refer the reader to the publication of the National Genealogical Society, "Passports Issued by Governors of Georgia, 1810 to 1820" by Mary G. Bryan. This small book, in two volumes, lists the names of many hundreds of persons applying for and securing passports to cross the Cherokee Nation.

JOSEPH WASHINGTON KEY, CONFEDERATE SERVICE RECORD


The following service record was contributed by Howard K. Dixson of 9826 Bartley Ave., Santa Fe Springs, California 90670. The record was obtained from the Fort Worth, Texas library. This name has also been written Kee.

JOSEPH WASHINGTON KEY

J. W. Key, age 53, born Carrolton, Pickens County, Alabama, enlisted at Burleson, Franklin County, Alabama on 6 August 1861 in Company "E" of the 16th Alabama Regiment, Lawry's Brigade, Cleburn's Division, Hardee's Corps, of the Tennessee Army. [Note: This statement made in 1890's.]

W. W. Weatherford elected Capt., J. P. Guy was 1st Lieut., R. M. Brandon was 1st Sergeant; the Regt. organized at Courtland, Ala. Aug. 11th 1861, Judge Wm. B. Wood of Florence, Ala was elected Colonel. Started immediately to join ghe Army in Virginia but was held at Knoxville, Tenn. on account of the strong Union Sentiment in that Section; marched north to Mills Springs, Ky. on the Cumberland River near which place we engaged a superior force and lost Gen. Zolicoffer on the 19th Jan. 1862.

Retreated and endured many privations. I was put aboard a boat more dead than alive at Jacksboro [Campbell County], Tennessee together with many sick and went to Nashville, Tenn. and placed in a hospital two miles west of the city which was presided over by "Aunt Mary," a wealthy old English lady. Drs. Nat Rowland and Black were the attending surgeons, also English. After being there about ten days we heard that Fort Donalson had surrendered About ten of us disobeyed the orders and slipped out one at a time and met together and had to walk all night and next day to Franklin, Tenn. where we climbed on a train and succeeded in getting to Tuscumbia, Ala. where we were cared for and soon rejoined our command at Corrinth, Miss. There we were armed with Endfield rifles.

the 4th Ala. Cavalry commanded by Col. W. A. Johnson, Under Gen. Bedford Forrest; Engaged in capturing Athens, Ala. and many minor places. When was near Selma, Ala. and hearing of Gen. Lee's Surrender disbanded and all went home.

From the National Archives in Washington, D. C. Mr. Dixson obtained two Confederate Company Muster Roll vouchers. The first one stated Joseph W. Kee was a Pvt. in Co. "E" of 16th Reg't Alabama Infantry and that his name appears on Company Muster Roll for Aug. 10 to Aug. 31, 1861, dated Oct. 22, 1861. He enlisted Aug. 6, 1861 at Burleson, Ala. by Capt. Weatherford for a period of three years. On Oct. 22, 1861 he was present but sick in camp.

The other Company Muster Roll was dated April 30, 1862 and showed that he was last paid on Feb. 28, 1862 by Maj. F. M. Gailor. He was present in camp. Both vouchers were signed by J. H. Howard.

DUBOISE FAMILY BIBLE

The following Bible record was contributed to TVGS by Mrs. Evelyn B. Evans of Russellville, Alabama. The Bible is in the possession of Mrs. Elbert Trapp of Route #1, Phil Campbell, Alabama and is her father's family Bible.

There was no copyright or publication date in evidence, however, on the inside of the Bible was the following inscription: "This Book Was a Present From Rev. Pater Duboise to his Son, B. F. Duboise, March the 20, 1907."

Page 1

This is to Certify that B. F. Duboise and Cora D. Jones were united by me in Holy Matrimony at W. H. Jones's on the Fifth day of Dec. in the year of our Lord 1906 in Presence of Many Witnesses. Signed Jno. W. Doss, J.P." "Therefore shall a man leave his Father and his Mother and shall cleave unto his wife and they shall be one flesh."

CERTIFICATE OF DISABILITY FOR DISCHARGE.

RICHARD WINCHESTER

Private Richard Winchester of Captain Fennel's Company J of the 4th Alabama Regiment of Confederate States, Ala. Volunteers, was enlisted by Capt. Dunnigan the 4th Ala. Regiment of Cavalry at Guntersville, Ala. on the 30th day of Aug., 1862 to serve 3 years. He was born in Hind[Hart? Heard?] Co. in the State of Georgia, is 22 years of age, 5 feet 5 inches high, dark complection, dark eyes, dark hair, and by occupation when enlisted, a Farmer. During the last two months said soldier has been unfit for duty 60 days.

Station: Chattanooga, Tenn. Date: April 12, 1863

The undersigned, in accordance with General Order No. 72, certify that they have carefully examined the said Richard Winchester of Captain Fennell's Company, and find him incapable of performing the duties of a soldier because of Disease of the Heart, Hypertrophia; Said Soldier is unfit for duty in any department. We therefore recommend that he be discharged from service.

The following information was abstracted from the 81-page Southern Claims Commission's file, No. 1775, on Dr. Frederick Hampton Anderson and was obtained from the National Archives in Washington, D. C. Dr. Anderson was one of only 37 Union sympathizers in Franklin County to apply to the United States government for reimbursement for loss sustained through theft or destruction by Northern troops. The following depositions were taken 16 July 1872. The entire file is in the Huntsville Public Library.

FREDERICK HAMPTON ANDERSON

Frederick Hampton Anderson states he lived at Franklin Springs near Russellville, Alabama. He was a physician but during the Rebellion he quit his practice to a great degree because of the disturbed state of the country and because of his unwillingness to take Confederate money. Many times Rebel soldiers fed men and horses at his house but he was never reimbursed for anything they took. They once took 40 bushels of corn, threatened to "burn him out" and to hang him, and generally harassed him. He had three sons in the Confederate Army but they entered that service against his will. Their service is believed to have saved his life.

Dr. Frederick H. Anderson, Deposition

On August 24, 1862 the 3rd Michigan Cavalry, Major G. Moyer commanding, encamped at Dr. Frederick H. Anderson's plantation and occupied his residence, lots, stables, and outhouses until Sept. 7, 1862 when they left for Tuscumbia, Alabama. No battle or skirmish had taken place in the vicinity. During the time they were there the soldiers took possession of a 20-acre field of corn located on good bottom land on which was a crop of ungathered corn that had been well-cultivated and promised an abundant yield. The soldiers turned their horses upon it and entirely consumed it. They also cut down and hauled wood for their use from Dr. Anderson's land and used his rails and paling (around his lots, garden, and other enclosures) for firewood. When they left, the place was almost entirely destitute of fences.

At this time Dr. Anderson's garden was in a high state of cultivation and stocked with vegetables of all kinds commonly used by families and embracing about 1-1/2 acres. The soldiers appropriated the garden to their own use.

When the soldiers were about ready to leave, the commanding officer told Dr. Anderson that he was satisfied as to his loyalty and did not wish to go off without giving him the means of being reimbursed for his losses. The officer then gave Dr. Anderson a receipt for the goods consumed and destroyed but Dr. Anderson told him it was not enough. The officer agreed with him and told him to come to Tuscumbia and the amount would be raised to \$1000. Anderson did go to Tuscumbia the following day but the Major and his regiment had gone to Iuka, Mississippi to participate in the battle there and Anderson did not see the Major again and had no way of getting another receipt. Dr. Anderson stated the 20 acres of corn

would have yielded an average of 25 bushels to the acre for a total of 500 bushels.

Dr. Anderson stated that none of his property was taken in the night or secretly except a sorrel horse which disappeared when Major Moyer's regiment left his house in the night of September 7, 1862. His mule had been taken about 9:00 o'clock in the morning and the leather, corn, and saddle were taken at about 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

Anderson did not ask for, nor did he receive, a voucher or receipt for property taken except for one mule, the fuel and damage to his place, and 400 bushels of corn. He saw the mule taken by the 5th Indiana Volunteers in April, 1863 and when he told the soldiers of his loyalty to the United States he was given a receipt for \$150.00.

Dr. Anderson stated that early in the month of February, 1865 a regiment of U. S. Cavalry commanded by Col. Stitson came to his residence at Franklin Springs which was about three miles from Russellville, Alabama. They were on their way from Russellville to Chickasaw in Franklin County and stopped at his residence to feed at which time they took 100 bushels of corn, a saddle, and leather. This was taken to their headquarters at Chickasaw. All the soldiers were engaged in taking the corn and three or four of the soldiers carried the leather out of his house then took the saddle, and all this took place in the presence of Col. Stitson. The soldier who took the saddle said he was ordered by an officer to take it and drew his pistol on Anderson.

The officers in command of the regiment were sitting in the piazza of claimant's home when Dr. Anderson called their attention to the fact that the goods were being taken but the officers informed him they needed the articles and approved the taking of them. The goods were taken at a time when Anderson was almost exhausted in means and when he and a dependent family needed them for their own comfort and support, they being in a condition of almost absolute want.

The members of his family were somewhere about his residence but he does not know that they saw the articles being taken. His family were all females and were avoiding the presence of the soldiers. The corn was taken and fed to the horses belonging to the command and the leather and saddle were carried away when the soldiers left claimant's residence. The officer in charge told the claimant that their encampment was at Chickasaw; that they were on their march there and wished to arrive in time to celebrate the 22nd day of February.

In March, 1865, when the sheep, fodder, and 400 bushels of corn were taken and his fences used for fuel, the 3rd Regiment of Michigan Cavalry was encamped at his residence and the Illinois 7th Regiment was encamped about a mile from his house.

All the livestock taken were in a sound and healthy condition when taken and none were over 10 years old. All corn, except that in the field, was in the crib but was unshucked. This was taken from his home at Franklin Springs. The other 100 bushels were taken from his plantation located about two miles from Franklin Springs. The livestock was taken from the plantation which was one mile from Russellville; the mule was taken from Franklin Springs.

The officers did not attempt to prevent the soldiers using or taking anything. Dr. Anderson made no complaint because he was more a prisoner in fact than anything else during their stay even though they expressed full confidence in his loyalty. He felt no confidence in being able to arrest the injury done.

Dr. Anderson had voted for Bell for President in 1860. He voted for Robert L. Watkins and John A. Steel, the Union candidates for the state convention of 1860-61. There was no election held on the Ordinance of Secession. He has supported the Constitution and Acts of Congress and voted for Grant for President in 1868.

Catharine S. Anderson, Deposition

Catharine S. Anderson, wife of Dr. Frederick H. Anderson, states her age as 53 years and says she is a resident of near Russellville. Her occupation is that of wife and mother in her husband's household.

In February, 1865, Gen. Stitson's cavalry, of nearly 1000 in number, came to her husband's residence and broke open the smoke house, took bacon from it, hung it from their saddles, and carried it away as they rode off. They took at least 800 pounds which was a whole year's support for the family, then told her they were obliged to have it for their use in the service. The officers present were told of the theft but did nothing about it. She could not see that the soldiers were carrying any supplies unless such was contained in their haversacks. The soldiers only remained at the Anderson farm long enough to get their dinner. She saw some of them cooking the bacon for their dinner, using utensils taken from her kitchen.

Miss Judith H. Anderson, Deposition

Miss Judith H. Anderson, sister of Frederick H. Anderson, is 65 years of age and lives with her brother. Frederick H. She states she saw the soldiers break into the smokehouse and take 32 pieces of

bacon. She had counted 60 pieces before the soldiers came and there were only 28 when they left.

Suzzie P. Allen, Deposition

The deposition of Suzzie P. Allen, daughter of Frederick H. Anderson, states that at about 10:00 o'clock one morning in either March or April, 1865, when Gen. Wilson's command was on the march south, one regiment of his command camped about a quarter of a mile from Dr. Anderson's plantation house, one mile from Russellville, Ala. A portion of Dr. Anderson's family lived there at the time and included Suzzie P. (Anderson) Allen, his daughter; also present were Miss Delilah Craize and Frances Jones (Colored). Miss Craize removed from the neighborhood several years ago.

Many of the soldiers gathered around the house and two of them came near the house and within a few yards of witnesses took away a bay horse colt. The soldiers put a bridle on the colt and led him off in the direction of their encampment. The soldiers were on their way to Selma, Ala. at the time.

The regiment left the next morning when it marched south. The colt was about three years old, was large for his age, and was in good condition. Suzzie thinks he was worth \$125. at the time.

Suzzie said her age was 21 years, and that her residence was about 4-1/2 miles south of Russellville in Franklin County and five or six miles from Dr. Anderson's residence. Her occupation is keeping house where she resides.

She stated that her father was a Union man before, during, and after the rebellion, and was loyal to the United States at all times. She lived with his family from infancy until two years past and never heard him express a sentiment disloyal to the Union.

James Cole, Deposition

James Cole was a slave on Dr. Anderson's plantation prior to the emancipation. He states that in March or April, 1865 he was Superintendent of Anderson's farming business and was in the field where the hands were plowing when some four or five U. S. soldiers came galloping into the field toward where they were. The men were plowing with the grey horse and the grey mare but the soldiers took the horses from the plow and took them south joining the column of the army then marching down the lane about 150 yards away. Mr. Cole followed them to a point near the lane trying to get the animals back but was told by soldiers that it was useless to try to recover them. He then went to the plantation house where one of the plow hands had taken the ball faced mare. After he got to the house some 20 or 30 soldiers from the same command came to the house and ordered him to catch the mare for them and when he refused they caught her themselves and took her off with them. (This took place on Dr. Frederick H. Anderson's plantation about one mile from Russellville.) This command of Union soldiers also took 500 binds of fodder and 20 bushels of corn (in sacks) away on horses. The fodder was tied on the horses by the soldiers. Hannak Kirk and Enoch Cole witnessed the horses being taken from the field. The next day James Cole again followed after the soldiers in an attempt to retrieve the horses but could not overtake them.

On September 6, 1862, about sunrise, a sorrel horse was taken by a soldier belonging to the 7th Illinois Regiment of Cavalry encamped within a mile of Franklin Springs and commanded by Major Moyer. The horse was taken from James Cole.

James Cole states that at the time the property was taken he was a slave of Dr. Anderson and had been for 35 years previous thereto and that he is now 78 years old. He has known the family intimately and has known Dr. Anderson's political opinions well. Dr. Anderson was always a Union man.

Mr. Cole states that in the last of August or first of September, 1862, soldiers under Major Moyer were camped where Dr. Anderson resided. A soldier took a sorrel ball-faced horse belonging to Dr. Anderson from him and told him that his own horse was broken down and that he must have the sorrel. The soldier left the mare he was riding but it was also the property of Dr. Anderson. The soldier told Mr. Cole he had swapped for the mare.

Enoch Cole, Deposition

Enoch Cole, formerly a slave belonging to Dr. Anderson, states he is 36 years of age and is a farmer living near Russellville, Alabama. In March, 1865, he was plowing when three soldiers from General Wilson's Cavalry came into the field and took one horse and two mares from the plows and led them to where the column was marching by. He never saw the animals again.

William Anderson, Deposition

William Anderson, age 35, a former slave of Dr. Anderson, is a farmer and lives near Russellville. William states that in the latter part of August or first of September, Major Moyer's Cavalry force was camped at Dr. Anderson's for about two weeks. Major Moyer was sick and Dr. Anderson carried him

to Tuscumbia in a buggy. They were gone about half a day. During their absence William saw a soldier riding Dr. Anderson's sorrel ball-face horse. The horse was bearing military equipment.

Frances Jones, Deposition

Frances Jones is 26 years old, resides on the plantation of Dr. Anderson, and before the emancipation she was a slave on his plantation and had been since infancey.

NOTE: Her deposition merely reiterated information given in the other depositions.

Richard S. Watkins and William Skinner, Depositions

Watkins is 56 years old and Skinner is about 60. Both reside near Russellville, Alabama. Watkins is a lawyer and Skinner is Chancellor of the Northern Chancery Division of Alabama having previously practiced law. Both have known Dr. Anderson over 25 years and their relationship was of an intimate and confidential nature both before and during the Rebellion. They were all Whigs and Union men. Before the War they lived about one mile from Anderson and about three files from him during the Rebellion. Anderson spoke of the war as treasonable and as having been brought about by "traitorous combinations and wicked conspiracies, concocted and carried forward by unscrupulous men to promote their own ambitious Schemes for Self Aggrandisement and not for the good of the people whether North or South."

They state that two of Dr. Anderson's sons went into the Confederate Army, that both were wounded, and that one lost an arm. They entered the Confederate Army against their father's will and in defiance of his authority. He regarded their entry into the Confederate service no less treason to his authority than to the United States. [Note: In Dr. Anderson's deposition he states three sons entered the Confederate service.]

Skinner stated that in the latter part of 1861 or early 1862 he was present when Dr. Anderson was handed a notice by John Brown to appear before the Vigilence Committee in Tuscumbia to answer charges of disloyalty to the Confederate Government. Skinner further stated that Dr. Anderson's farm consisted of 360 acres of which about 160 acres were in cultivation. It was worth about \$2000 then and is worth about the same now.

Russellville, Ala. June 1st 1874

Re: No. 1755, Claim of Dr. Frederick H. Anderson for \$2119.00

In the above case, I have made a thorough investigation as to claimant's loyalty and find no evidence against him. His general reputation as a loyal man is good and I find that he was regarded during the War as being one of the few loyal men in the county who was outspoken in favor of the federal government.

Claimant was an old practicing Physician and a man of means occupying a high social position. That, together with his Sons in the Rebel army, seems to have saved him from arrest by the rebels.

I have retaken the deposition of James Cole (Col'd.) but elicit nothing new except a discrepancy in the number of horses taken.

He now is the same unflinching friend to our party that he always has been. He is poor and in great need of assistance.

Will you be so kind as to use your influence with the court of claims in his behalf. You, of course, know how to manage much better than I can suggest.

CARRUTHERS/CARITHERS FAMILY RECORD

The following material was sent to "Valley Leaves" by Mrs. Edna Bond Ripley, Star Route 69, Box 1205, Ironton, Mo. 63650. Mrs. Ripley writes a column on genealogy for the Ironton newspaper.

The following is copied from a notebook yellowed with age which belonged to Franklin Bedford Fowler (1834-1907) of Western Grove, Ark. The notebook apparently was originally the property of his wife's (nee Martha Ann Curbow) half-brother, John M. Carithers (born in Ala. ca 1829, a Union soldier, died at Western Grove, Ark. ca 1865). These records are customarily found in a family Bible and may be of great value to someone in the Carithers/Carruthers family or one with similar spelling.





FLETCHER CEMETERY

The following information regarding the Fletcher tombstone and the Derrick-Fletcher family history was compiled and contributed by Judge William Page.

The Fletcher graveyard is in Woodville, Jackson County, Alabama, about 150 yards east of the Woodville High School in the SW/4 of the NW/4 of Section 12-5S-3E. The graveyard, consisting of a single stone-covered grave with a broken hand-chiseled headstone stands in an open field north of Jack Jones Lane:

> Sacred to Memory Mrs. Ann Fletcher Died 1839 Age 27



Anna (Derrick) Fletcher was born 8 September 1812 in Jefferson County, Tennessee. She was the daughter of Henry Derrick and his wife Catherine Branner. Anna married John P. Fletcher who was born near Jonesborough, Tennessee on 19 December 1804 and who died 20 July 1865. Anna died 28 May 1839.

John P. Fletcher was in the Seminole War in Florida and arrived in Woodville at an early date. He married first, Ann Derrick, daughter of Henry Derrick and sister of Dr. L. Derrick. The young couple lived east of the present Woodville High School at the south of the lane on the east side of the road. John P. Fletcher was a brother of Capt. James Fletcher and a half-brother of Bud Fletcher.

Anna and John P. Fletcher had seven (7) children but three died in infancy and were buried just west of Old Woodville. When Ann died in 1839, honoring her request, she was buried in her lettuce bed in her garden.

Jane (Jennie) Maples Thomas who was born 6 March 1818 and who died 7 September 1908. Jennie was the daughter of Josiah Maples and his wife Mary Butler. Jennie's first husband was Harvey Thomas who was born 9 June 1814 and who died 23 August 1838.

Both John P. Fletcher and Jennie are buried at the Union Cemetery in Woodville, Jackson County, Alabama.





JACKSON COUNTY NEWSPAPERS

The following business cards were published in the "Era" and "Star" which were newspapers printed in Jackson County in the 1870's. These were semi-weeklies published in Scottsboro and Stevenson, Alabama. James Beeson was the editor. The following excerpts were copied and contributed by William D. WILL RECORD "A" 1835 - 1858

(Eighteenth Installment)

Will Record "A" is a large, red 316-page volume and it is in the Lauderdale County Courthouse in Florence, Alabama. All decedents were residents of Lauderdale County unless otherwise stated. B. W. Wood was the County Court judge and Wiley T. Hawkins was the Probate judge at the time these minutes were made.

Abstracts of the wills of Lauderdale County were first published in Valley Leaves in Volume 7 (Dec., 1972) and began with Will Record 3 (1821). Additional wills were published until that series concluded with the first fifty pages of Will Record "A" in Volume 8 (June, 1974). The current series began in Volume 14 (June, 1980). Abstracted from photocopies by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

Orleana die without children or grandchildren then their portion is to be divided equally between my wife and other children.

The negroes and money due my daughters Josephine Simmons, Martha Ann Herbert, and Mary Swanson, are to go to Jesse Koger, in trust, for their sole and separate use free from any debts, liabilities, or contracts of their present or any future husbands. It is to go to their children upon their deaths and if they die without children or grandchildren their parts are to be equally divided between my wife and the remaining children or children or my dead children.

The negroes and money due my daughters Elizabeth F. Koger and Sarah Alice Koger are to go to Jesse Koger, in trust, for their sole and separate use free from debts, liabilities, or contracts of any future husbands. It is to go to their children upon their deaths but if they die without children or grandchildren their shares are to be equally divided between my wife and the remaining children or children of my dead children.

Appoints son, Jesse Koger, and Thomas Swanson executors.

To my beloved wife, Nancy, nine slaves (named), all my household and kitchen furniture, two of my best horses, 1/3 of my cattle, and 1/3 of my hogs, during her lifetime. At her death said property is to be equally divided among my children.

> After all debts are paid then my estate to be equally divided between my children, except my daughter, Mrs. Phebe Harraway, is to receive \$500 less it being the value of a negro I already gave her. Until the land is sold and the debt against it is discharged, it is to be worked under the control of my

executors and everything raised or made thereon (above the family's expenses) to be paid against by debts, especially the debt for the land.

My wife may sell any of her slaves if they become unruly or unmanagable.

If my executors sell the land they are to purchase a suitable home for my wife and such of my family as shall continue to reside with her.

Jackson Windham, Administrator, has filed his application in the Lawrence County Probate Court for the sale of land belonging to the estate of said decedent, for the purpose of division and alleging that said lands can not be equitably divided among the heirs of said decedent without a sale thereof, and the 11th day of Jan., 1897, has been appointed for the hearing of said application.

> It is, therefore, ordered that Mary Austin and her husband, James Austin, who reside at Okalona, Miss.; Miss G. W. Moore who resides at Stubbs, Kaufman Co., Texas; B. F. Moore; Eilen (Ellen) Daniel and her husband, S. P. Daniel, all of whom reside at Duncansville, Dallas Co., Texas, be notified of said application, by publication in the Moulton Advertiser, a newspaper published in this county, for at least three successive weeks previous to Jan. 11, 1897. J. C. Kumpe, Judge of Probate

- Jan. 21, 1897 Mr. M. A. Speights and Mrs. Mattie Hill were united in marriage at the home of the bride's father, near Itaska, Hill Co., Texas, on Sunday, Dec. 13, 1896, Rev. F. C. Sowell officiating. The bride is an accomplished daughter of our neighbor Mr. Wm. H. Aldridge. (From: Itaska Mail)
- Feb. 11, 1897 A resolution has passed the Senate allowing Hon. Willis Brewer, the Senator from Lowndes, the privilege of smoking through the evening sessions of that body. Col. Brewer is an inveterate lover of the weed. (From: Greenville Adv.)

Mr. P. W. Shoemaker, who has been quite unwell with the grip for the past two months is now able to sit up and walk out in the yard on pleasant days.

Dr. J. P. Elliott, after a painful illness, has given up the ghost and passed over the river to rest under the shade of the trees. Dr. Elliott has been a prominent of this county for many years - took a deep interest in everything that had for its object the elevation of our people, and the advancement of our county. He lived near Trinity.

- March 4, 1897 Died at his home in Winston Co. on the 11th of Jan. last, Col. John A. McVay, in the 78th year of his age. He was 60 years a citizen of this county and was highly respected by our people. He was a son of Hon. Zeddoc McVay who aided in the survey of the county and also represented Lawrence [County] in the early history in the legislature. He was a nephew of Hon. Hugh McVay, one of the early Governors of Alabama. He was married five times and leaves a long line of children, grand children, and great grand children. A sweet rest to his noble spirit.

Editor's Note: If any of our readers can supply the missing information we would appreciate you sending it to us so we can publish it. This old Madison County family is very difficult to separate since there were several Walker families; they all lived near each other, their children had the same names and were born about the same time.

WRIGHT CEMETERY (Collier-Spivey-Ledbetter)

LOCATION: This cemetery is located in the center of the SW quarter of the NE quarter of Section 33. Township 4 South, and Range 2 East in Madison County, Alabama. It is approximately 3/4 of a mile due north of the Chestnut Grove Church on Cherry Tree Lane and is located off the end of Joe Cross Road in a dense clump of trees and undergrowth. The entire wooded area in which these graves are located is covered with unmarked graves and many graves marked with unlettered fieldstones. This is alledgedly the graveyard in which Robert Wright, Revolutionary Soldier, is buried. According to some sources, the Chestnut Grove Church once owned the land this cemetery is on.

TURNER CEMETERY

LOCATION: This cemetery is located in the approximate E/2 of the E/2 of the SW/4 of Sec. 24-6-1Ein Clouds Cove. It is located at the foot of Meeks Mountain just north of the C. C. Ivey Road on the old Adron Cloud farm and is very near an old, abandoned house. The land around the cemetery is being cultivated by a Mr. Spears. Part of the cemetery, including one large tombstone, has recently been bulldozed and the stone is now missing. One tombstone remains:

> William H. B. Turner Born Aug. 27, 1842 Died Nov. 14, 1872

The large obelisk tombstone of John Blount Turner who died 28 November 1856 (the father of William H[enry] B[ynum] Turner) was also in this cemetery a year ago but is now gone. It appears another monument to our heritage has fallen by way of the bulldozer! The information on William H. B. Turner's tombstone was contributed by Mr. and Mrs. Norman Shapiro of Huntsville.

RICHARD HOLDING CEMETERY

LOCATION: Section 32-4S-2W. SW SW SE. Originally on Triana Road on what became Airport Authority property. The remains in this cemetery and the tombstones were moved on February 15, 1984 to the old section of Madison Cemetery in the city of Madison. The Port Authority has plans to build on the site of the cemetery and it had to be moved. Arrangements had been made to remove the cemetery to Morgan County but Mr. P. B. Keel interceded. Through the cooperation of the Madison City Council, Airport Authority and others, plus a lot of diplomacy and leg-work, Mr. Keel was able to retain the cemetery in Madison County. Our hat is off to Mr. Keel.

First Installment

1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

The Alabama Legislature passed an act requiring that a census of all Confederate Soldiers be taken in 1907. This was to include all veterans of the Civil War who had fought for the Confederacy and who were presently living in the state of Alabama regardless of where they had served or from what state they had served. It was the duty of the Probate Judge in each county to secure the information and to send a copy of it to the state.

Each veteran was to fill out an Affidavit stating his residence, date and place of birth, and to give a brief statement as to his military service. This information was transferred from the original affidavit to ledgers in alphabetical, or semi-alphabetical, order by the soldier's last name. Some of the affidavits were returned after the ledger was made up and those will be found at the end of the ledger out of alphabetical order. The original ledgers are housed in the Probate Judge's office of each county and the copies are now in the Alabama Department of Archives and History, Military Division. The material used in "Valley Leaves" was taken from microfilm copies of the ledgers in the Archives and was abstracted by Dorothy Scott Johnson. The number preceeding each name is the number of that person as it appears in the ledger.



Mr. Bramlett was born June 12, 1845 at Claud in Greenville County, South Carolina. He entered service as a private in the fall of 1862 in Greenville, S.C. in Company "A" of the 16th South Carolina Infantry and continued until paroled at Greensboro, North Carolina on April 15, 1865.

Mr. Burt was born August 10, 1846 at Tullahoma, Coffee County, Tennessee. He entered service as a private in March, 1863 at Normando, Tennessee in Company "K" of the 4th Tennessee Regiment. [No further information given.]

John E. Bagwell was born April 10, 1844 at Greenville, in Greenville County, South Carolina. He entered service as a private in March, 1861 at Greenville, S. C. and continued until transferred in 1863 [Company and regiment not given.] He reenlisted as a private in Company "C" of the 37th V.A. and continued until paroled at Kingston, Ga. in 1865.

15. Richard W. Bolton Guntersville, Ala.



Billington A. Baker was born April 25, 1834 at Marietta, Georgia. He entered service as a private in February, 1864 at Talladega, Alabama in Company "G" under J. M. B. Nix and continued until he was wounded at Atlanta, Georgia in 1865.

Mr. Bruce was born August 23. 1839 at Millville, Lincoln County. Tennessee. He entered service as a private on April 7, 1861 at Elkton, Giles County, Tennessee in the 3rd Tennessee Volunteer Infantry and continued until captured at Fort Donelson. He escaped from

prison at Camp Douglas on May 10, 1862 and re-enlisted as a private in July, 1862 at Spring Hill, Tennessee in the 1st Tennessee Cavalry and continued until March, 1865 when he was captured near Pulaski, Tennessee while on scouting duty. He remained until paroled until the close of war. He walked from Chicago, Illinois after escaping Fort Douglas, got a horse, and joined the 1st Tennessee Cavalry. He was an ordnance officer for a short period under Gen. Frank C. Armstrong.

18. William Blessing Boaz, Ala.

He was born October, 1835 at Guntersville, Marshall County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in October, 1861 at Ashville, Alabama in Company "B" of the 1st Alabama Cavalry and continued until captured at Kingston, East Tennessee. He was sent to Rock Island prison and was paroled in April, 1865 at Natchez, Mississippi.

19. Timothy T. Barnard Upton, Ala.

Mr. Barnard was born July 5, 1842 at Cottonville, Marshall County, Ala. He entered service as a private in December, 1861 at Nashville,

Tennessee, Tennessee in Company "D" of the 49th Alabama and continued until paroled at Port Hudson.

20. Joseph Ely Barclay Grant, Ala. Mr. Barclay was born in December, 1844 in Jackson County, Alabama. He entered service as a private in May, 1864 at Marietta, Georgia in Company "C" of the 4th Alabama and continued until captured at Atlanta, Georgia in August, 1864. He was imprisoned at Rock Island, Illinois and paroled in April, 1865.

21. Solomon Benson Scottsboro, Ala.



Mr. Benson was born February 25, 1835 at Seiverville, Sevier County, Tennessee. He entered service as a private in the fall of 1862 at Preston, Alabama in Company "G" of the 4th Alabama Regiment and continued until discharged in the fall of 1863.

He continued until surrender at Greensboro, North Carolina on May 2, 1865.

23. James L. Burke Guntersville, Ala. Mr. Burke was born May 24, 1850 at Rome, Floyd County, Georgia. He entered service as a private on June 8, 1863 at Shelbyville, Tennessee in Company "D" of the 19th Alabama Infantry. [No other info.]

Mr. Bradford was born July 7. 1844 at Lantsville [Lawrenceville?] Gwinnett Co.. Georgia. He entered service as a private in 1861 at Atlanta, Georgia in Company "F" of the 24th Georgia Regiment and continued until discharged at Richmond. Virginia in

August, 1862. He reenlisted as

a private in November, 1862 at Covington, Georgia in the 2nd Georgia State Troops and continued until transferred in August, 1864 to Graham Ball and remained until close of the war.

He re-enlisted as a private in February, 1865 at Cartersville, Georgia in Walford's Command and continued until the close of the war.

26. William Monroe Bell Guntersville, Ala. Mr. Bell was born September 18, 1843 at Franklin, Lincoln County, Georgia. He entered service as a private in June 1862 at Lebanon, Tennessee in Company "K" of the 4th Alabama Cavalry and continued until paroled at Guntersville on May 15, 1865.

Mr. J. W. Lipscomb and family returned home one day last week.

Judge Clark's speech in the Mayor's Court in defense of Henry Wilkie last Monday, is spoken of in eulogistic terms.

Mr. J. Council Baker is ahead of any one we know of in getting his cotton to market.

Mr. J. Leonard Kron returned from New Orleans this week. The Crescent City is the home of his childhood, but an absence of five years from there has wrought many changes.

Our former townsmen, Dr. Ward and Eugene Collins, left Huntsville one day last week with the avowed intention of riding on horseback all the way to Michigan, having sent their families by rail.

Major D. M. Huson, who has been running the Atkins House in Knoxville, Tenn., for the last eighteen months, with his family returned to Morgan [County] last week.

Major C. H. Button who has been enjoying the luxuries (?) of bachelordom for the past two months, is no longer left to dream of the absent loved ones. Mrs. Button has returned from Kentucky.

Mr. Frank Jennings is preparing to open a livery stable on Church Street between Bank and Canal [Streets]. He will be in full blast in a few days.

ELIZABETH WELCH OBITUARY

The following obituary of Elizabeth Welch was copied from "The Decatur News" of Nov., 1878 and contributed by Margaret Henson of the Heritage Room of the Huntsville Public Library. We have chosen to reprint the obituary in its entirety because of its tenderness of spirit and because of the genealogy it contains.

IN MEMORIAM

Died, on the 22nd of this inst., Mrs. Elizabeth Welch, in Boonsboro, Ark., from an attack of diarrhea, aged 85 years, less thirty-three days.

In a letter from her son, Rev. H. M. Welch, M.D., I learned the sad news of her death. She was the wife of C. A. Welch, Esq., and the mother of Dr's. H. M. and W. B. Welch of Boonsboro, Ark., and also T. C. Welch and three daughters, one of whom has passed in triumph before her sainted mother, into the rest that remaineth to the people of God--all late of Morgan county.

I have been intimate with the family since the year 1843. Sister Welch was at all times one of the brightest christians I ever knew; I have often heard her pray in public. She always prayed with great power, and it was only to hear her to be made to feel that she was filled with the spirit of God. And it was the same when she shouted the praise of God. I always felt that she enjoyed a fullness of the love of her savior. I have often heard her speak in class-meeting and love-feast. Her faith in her redeemer was unshaken. She spoke of heaven as her home. I have never heard any one who knew her say they did not have faith in her as a christian. I have often taken sweet council with her and her husband. Bro. C. A. Welch, and their son Dr. H. M. Welch, for more than thirty years. She was always ready to give a reason for the hope she had in her savior. She had a presentiment of her departure, and while nearing the cold river she gave her parting blessing and dying charge to her aged husband and every member of her family present, and took from them a promise to meet her in heaven.

She said that her soul was "on the wing" and tried to sing the old chorus, "I am going home to die no more."

She was growing very weak, but said she wanted to talk more but could not. Her son, Dr. H. M. Welch, said to her, "Ma, that is not necessary, for we all know where you are going and that you are ready."
"Yes," she said, "my wings are plumed," and thus this aged christian, with her soul full of joy, and last desire expressed being to depart and be with christ, fell asleep in Jesus.

She was born in Louden county, Virginia on the 25th of October, 1794. She professed religion when 14 years of age; moved to Allen county, Kentucky, in the year 1810, where she was married to her surviving husband in

November, 1820. They moved to

Somerville, Ala., in March, 1830, and thence to Boonsboro, Ark., in November, 1871, and from thence to her heavenly inheritance. She had been a member of the M. E. Church nearly 71 years, and had lived with her now grief-stricken husband, nearly 59 years, a long time for two to walk the path of life together. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints."

Thus passed away from earth to live forever with the redeemed of God, one of the purest and brightest christians I ever knew. She always shed a bright light through her religious influence, and well may it be said of her, "Though being dead, yet she speaketh."

Book Reviews

KEEL-WHITAKER: Keel and Related Families, Part I by Hilda Aldridge Barnette, Ola Aldridge Johnson, and Percy Brooks Keel, Jr. and Whitaker Wanderings, Part II by Harold Glenn Whitaker. 562 pages.

Writing a review about a history of one's family can be as difficult a task as reviewing a book written by one's friends. Dealing with both situations in one book could be a dangerous situation. Fortunately the "Keel-Whitaker" book has saved this reviewer from having too many bad moments.

Composed of two parts, "Keel and Related Families" and "Whitaker Wanderings," the Keel-Whitaker book provides the histories of many Madison and Jackson County, Alabama families.

"Keel and Related Families" was compiled by TVGS members Ola Johnson and P. B. Keel, Jr. and their cousin, Hilda Barnette. The 390 pages are packed with names, dates, places, pictures, and family stories. Jesse and Priscilla (Whitaker) Keel came to North Alabama from North Carolina in the early 1800's. They were the parents of eleven children. Especially interesting are the excerpts from the writings of Temperance McCulley Hosmer.

"Whitaker Wanderings" by Harold Glenn Whitaker provides a listing of Whitakers and their kin in the North Alabama area (including Tennessee, Mississippi, and North Carolina.) Information is provided for the early family members, but little is given, other than names, for later generations. Enough space has been provided on most pages for dates and places to be written.

The index contains full-name listings for Keel and Whitaker entries and surname entries for the related families.

KITH AND KIN: A PORTRAIT OF A SOUTHERN FAMILY, 1630-1934 by Carolyn (Lawton) Harrell. 1984. Mercer University Press.

Carolyn Lawton Harrell's "Kith and Kin: A Portrait of a Southern Family, 1630-1934" was selected for publication by Mercer University Press as a part of their southern history collection. Mrs. Harrell's work is listed as "social history, the story of a Southern family from the time one of its members arrived in America with Winthrop's fleet in 1630, until another member took up residence in Macon, Georgia in the 1930's.

"Kith and Kin" provides a history of South Carolina and the United States through the lives of the ancestors of Mrs. Harrell. Details from business papers, letters, diaries, court and other records are used to bring the family members to life for the reader. The bibliography lists the many primary and secondary sources used by Mrs. Harrell during the nine years she spent researching this book.

Ancestor charts and family listings are included in the appendixes. A full-name and subject index rounds out this excellent work. The families traced are Furman, Grimball, Barnwell, Robert, Guttenberger, Nottingham, Willingham, and Lawton.

TVGS is fortunate to be able to claim Mrs. Harrell as a member. Publication of works such as "Kith and Kin" will do much to bring recognition to the fact that proper genealogical research is much more than "just a hobby."


