

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PHOTOCOPY RATES UP STATEWIDE. The cost of photocopying has gone up to \$1.00 per page in all probate offices throughout the state of Alabama. The cost to certify a document has gone up to \$2.00. The rate change for photocopies is due to a ruling from the office of Mr. Don Siegelman, Alabama Secretary of State, State Capitol Building, Montgomery, Alabama 36130.

In the past your editor would spend a day in each county and photocopy enough material to carry *Valley Leaves* for several issues. Usually it was not necessary to make more than one or two trips to each county yearly. Of course, this was when photocopy rates ranged from 10 Cents to 50 Cents per page, depending upon the county.

To give you an idea of the problem we have, the cost of photocopying *just* what is in this issue at \$1.00 per page would have been \$215.00. Photocopy cost of the two pages of birth records from Jackson County would have been \$25.00; the four pages of Colbert County Will Book "A" would have cost \$19.00; the *one* page of marriages from Lauderdale County would have cost \$14.00, and so on.

In this issue we are fortunate in that we have more member-contributed material than usual. Many issues go out with no member-contributed material and in those issues you can figure the cost to run as high as \$300.00 to \$400.00 for photocopied material that would have cost \$25.00 to \$75.00 a few weeks ago. Multiply this by four issues and you can see the magnitude of the problem.

You can help us to *continue* publishing by contributing Bible records, military records, Southern Claims Commission records, or any other pre-1900 document of genealogical value. In the case of voluminous, expensive material we will be glad to abstract it immediately and return the document to you.

Those of you who live in Alabama may wish to write to Don Siegelman (see above for his address) and let him know your views on this horrendous rate increase. It may mean the difference between sinking and swimming for *Valley Leaves*.

NEW ASSOCIATE EDITOR. We wish to welcome **Janet Baker Burks** of Tyler, Texas as an Associate Editor (Lawrence County) of *Valley Leaves*. Janet's work has been appearing in *Valley Leaves* for several issues and we are most grateful for her contributions.

MORGAN COUNTY MARRIAGES. Mr. Elbert Minter of Decatur, Alabama has spent many years copying the marriage records of Morgan County, Alabama. He has given TVGS permission to publish this work and we are now in the process of preparing his records for publication. We are aiming for a publication date sometime in late summer and all proceeds will go to the Heritage Room of the Huntsville Public Library.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS? It is important that you let us know when your address changes. If your copy of the quarterly is not delivered because you have moved, the Postal authorities will not forward the book to you at your new address. It is returned to TVGS undelivered. We have to pay \$.88 postage due when it is returned to us. When we get your new address we mail your quarterly to you at an additional cost to us of \$.69. The cost to TVGS is \$1.57 for each copy not delivered because of a change of address. The money could be better spent on obtaining material for the publication. The \$1.57 is in addition to the cost of the original postage. It is for this reason that we must charge you \$2.00 for all issues returned to us.

Book Reviews



BOOK REVIEW EDITOR: Annewhite (Thomas) Fuller

COMPUTER GENEALOGY: A GUIDE TO RESEARCH THROUGH HIGH TECHNOLOGY by Paul A. Andereck and Richard A. Pence. 5x7, soft cover, 280 pages, indexed. Order from: Ancestry, P. O. Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84115. \$12.95.

Messrs. Andereck and Pence have compiled an excellent guide to the use of computers in genealogical research. Written for family researchers who think that a computer might be useful in genealogical research and for computer owners who are seeking different uses for their computers, Computer Genealogy provides guidelines for selecting and using computer hardware and software in the compiling of family histories.

Among the information provided are a directory of genealogy programs, illustrations of the charts and group-sheets that are parts of these programs, the future of genealogy databases, and a bibliography of books and articles that can provide further information for the researcher. A glossary of terms and an index enhance the usefulness of this book.

Computer Genealogy is an excellent introduction to the use of computers and to their applications in genealogy.

ANCESTRY'S GUIDE TO RESEARCH: CASE STUDIES IN AMERICAN GENEALOGY by Johni Cerny and Arlene Eakle. 5x7, 368 pages, soft cover, indexed, illustrated. Order from: Ancestry, P. O. Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84115. \$10.95.

Ancestry's Guide to Research presents how to do genealogical research in a new format. The reader is taken, step-by-step, through the process of researching a family history. Each generation provides a look at different types of records and at the repositories where the records are found. Illustrations are provided for some of the types of records and ancestor charts and family group-sheets guide the reader through the data that has been located.

Emphasis is places on the importance of a systematic search technique. A plan for the research of each generation is given before the data is presented and an analysis of the data summarizes the work completed and that yet to be done.

The authors stress the importance of the documentation in printed genealogies and encourage the researcher to keep complete records for the location of each fact gathered during research. Ancestry's Guide to Research provides both the beginning and experienced family history researcher with a topnotch, illustrated, guide to genealogy search techniques.

DEED ABSTRACTS OF WARREN COUNTY, KENTUCKY, 1797-1812 by Joyce Martin Murray. 5x7, hardbound, 105 pages, full-name index. Order from the author, 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75201. \$20.00.

Joyce Murray has abstracted deeds, bills of sale, deeds of gift, mortgages, and other records from the earliest deed books of Warren County, Kentucky. Much of the land involved in these transactions is in the present-day counties of Logan, Simpson, Barren, and Allén.

The records are presented in an easy-to-use format with a full-name index. Ms. Murray indicates in the Foreword that she plans to do at least one more volume of Warren County records - let's hope she does.

WHEELER COUSINS. Compiled by Wheeler Cousins, Inc., 2011 East Rosebrier, Springfield, Mo., 65804. 8½x11, 500-plus pages, soft cover, indexed. May be ordered from above address. \$20.00.

Wheeler Cousins is a compilation of the research of many Wheeler descendants. An attempt

was made to include in the book some reference to every person of the Wheeler name who was discovered in the records of Bedford, Buckingham, Cumberland, Hanover, and Henrico Counties, Virginia. Descendants of some of these people are also included in the book.

Documentation for the earlier records is given, but later generations' information is listed without the citation of sources. A full-name index is included for the Wheelers and a surname index for allied lines. The cost of the book includes a year's subscription to the Wheeler Cousins quarterly newsletter.

THE HELLUMS FAMILY, 1765-1984 by Earle C. Hellums. 5½x9½, hardbound, 365 pages. For price write author at 2425 Fountain View, Suite 300, Houston, Texas 77057.

This book is a fully documented record of John Hellums Sr. of Laurens County, South Carolina and his descendants. The lines are traced through Knox County, Tennessee, Madison County, Mississippi Territory, Tuscaloosa and Fayette Counties in Alabama, Tippah County, Mississippi, the state of Arkansas, and finally, Texas.

The Hellums Family is basically in three distinct, although related, sections. The first section is a narrative of the family beginning in South Carolina in 1765. The first proof shown is of a royal land grant to John Hellums for 500 acres from King George III dated 25 Sept. 1776 and, as is done throughout the book, a photocopy of the grant is included. From that time on the author has traced each descendant and liberally included photocopies of original courthouse documents, family letters, maps, plats, charts, family group-sheets, and old family photographs to illustrate almost every statement made. What is not reproduced photographically is type-set such as family Bibles and other documents that do not lend themselves to reproduction.

The second section consists of 32 pages of chronological listings of the various family groups, each numbered and each number corresponding to that particular family in the narrative. This is a good "at-a-glance" record of each couple and their children. Too, Mr. Hellums has made a study of history and correlated his ancestors' activities with the events of the times which adds a lot of flavor.

The third section is 138 pages of photographically reproduced documents referred to throughout the text and includes deeds, wills, etc. This is the most outstanding compilation of family documentation I have ever seen in a family history. It leaves no doubt as to the source of the information. To check the interpretation of a name or fact all one has to do is turn to the back of the book and look at a copy of the original. Some of the documents reproduced, such as William Hellums' Will (in his own handwriting) dated 17 January 1808, are literally in shreds and will soon disintegrate and be no more; because they are reproduced in this book they will be in the family record for all time.

The only flaw I can find in this beautifully compiled, printed, and bound book is that it has no index. If it is ever reproduced I hope a full-name index will be included.

DECATUR COUNTY

COLBERT COUNTY WILL BOOK "A" 1869 - 1903 4th Installment

The earliest Will Book in Colbert County is Book "A" which is from July 22, 1867 to May 11, 1903. Colbert County was carved from Franklin County in 1867 and many of the earlier wills were dated in Franklin County. Abstracted from photocopies by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

- I, Samuel Bennett, being now sound both in body and mind and life being uncertain ... I give unto the children of Mary D. C. Alexander, and herself, who was formerly Mary D. C. Bennett, and more recently Mary D. C. Cain [also written Cane], all my landed property together with my half of all the negroes held in common with her former husband, James H. Cain, Decd., all now in La. The children to take possession when the voungest comes of age.
- To my sister, Sarah Colley's children, all my lots and houses in Alabama together with all my landed property in Alabama, Tennessee, and Mississippi; "also all my negro property except Nat is already given previous in this instrument."

It is unfortunate that the obituary lists the name of the departed as Matilda McLendon. She was Malinda Derrick McClendon, daughter of Henry Derrick and wife Catherine Branner. She was a sister to Doctor Derrick of Woodville.

The obituary of Malinda Derrick McClendon was carried in The Jackson County Herald. It was written by Fannie V. King, and is reproduced below.

AN ANCIENT DAME DEPARTS FROM EARTH

"To write in full the life of Mrs. Matilda McLendon, widow of J. S. McLendon, would be to give an epitome of a history of Jackson County. For eighty years she has lived continuously on Jackson county soil, coming from her birthplace in Jefferson county, Tennessee, with her father and mother in 1815, four years before the State of Alabama and Jackson County were organized. The father, Henry Derrick, a Virginian by birth but of German extraction, helped to hold the first court ever held in the county. He was a man of means, a slave-owner, settling upon a rich tract of virgin soil at the place now called Woodville which was then a vast canebrake.

"A woman of the native intellect, gifted with a remarkable memory, Mrs. McLendon could tell many interesting stories of people, places and things—especially was it enjoyable to hear her narrations about pioneers and Indians. Once, when a child, I heard Mrs. McLendon tell how she captured a beautiful pet, in her early girlhood, that illustrated a primitive wilderness of her pioneer home. She went to call the cows home with a slave-girl late one evening and returned bearing a tiny fawn in her arms. Her pride in her trophy was somewhat abated, when she suffered a severe reprimand from her mother for running so great a risk from an

attack from the doe, whose gentle nature, fired with the natural instinct to protect her young sometimes became dangerous. She remembered when the mountain now crowned with Green Academy, was the haunt of wolves and bears, and other lesser game. Think what a magazine of facts, a storehouse of rich memories, a bright mind can become in eighty five years. Her earliest hours were full of the echoes of the War of 1812, when she was a babe of two, and in which her kinsmen fought, of Indian warfares she knew much, and she was a pensioner of the Florida or Black Hawk war, her young husband having left her side in '37 to fight for his country, when her oldest son was an infant of one. A youth from her roof left her household to fight in the Mexican War under Gen. Benj. Snodgrass, and her two sons, J. H. and J. P. McLendon, fought in the war of the Rebellion in the command of the late Col. John Snodgrass if I mistake not.

"This ancient dame told me anecdotes of my own kin who came early from Virginia and were owners of the land where Scottsboro now lies and the adjacent hills and dales of Joseph Snodgrass and David Long, Joseph Clark and John Eads, all kin by blood or marriage, who were first proprietors, long before Scottsboro was known as Scott's Mill.

"Through her maternal lines, Mrs. McLendon

Malinda Derrick McClendon (-continued-)

was a Brunner of Virginia. Though living a secluded life she never forgot her proud and ancient lineage or mixed with the ruder social element. She pointed with pardonable pleasure to the successful careers of her uncles Brunner, the first bankers of Knoxville, Tenn., and learning of my contemplated trip to California in 1892, John McLendon, Esq., gave me a letter of introduction to an eminent cousin who has an considerable fame in circles of reserch and culture, Prof. John Caspar Brunner, occupying the chair of Chemistry at Leland Standford University. In his laboratory at Palo Alto, I found him a courtly, elegant man, and afterwards. at San Jose, I heard him deliver an interesting scientific lecture.

"Of her immediate family, two sons, J. H. and J. F. McLendon, and two daughters, Mrs. James Beeson and Mrs. John Hall of Ozark, Ark., survive her. Among the mourners also were Mrs. Jane Stephens of Woodville, and Mrs. Stephen Kennemore of Paint Rock (widow of the old war sheriff of that name), and the well-known citizen of Woodville, her brother, Doctor Derrick.

Among her grand-children was the late Dr. Dicus and the favorably known young practictioner, Dr. Lafayette McLendon of Hollywood [Ala.].

'Mrs. McLendon was the oldest Cumberland Presbyterian in the county, having joined that church in June, 1848, and was baptised by the beloved Bro. Willoughby, one of the pioneer preachers of her faith. She retained her faculties up to the last day, and fell asleep in Jesus last Saturday, waking to the eternal dawn at one o'clock in the morning. After life's long and fitful fever she has gone to gather the fruits of the garnered hopes of 85 years, and harvest of the sowing of good deeds and better intentions through her useful life. Last Sunday she was laid to rest beside her daughter, the first wife of George T. Dicus, formerly the widow of Wm. Shelton, in the Center Point church-yard. Her husband had preceded her to the unknown country nearly forty years ago, having been interred in the old "Liberty" cemetery."

The daughter beside whom she was buried was Alabama McClendon. The grave is about six feet from that of Mrs. McClendon and is marked, "Allie Dicus, wife of G. T. Dicus, born Sept. 18, 1842 - Died July 27, 1891." She married first, William D. Skelton and second, George T. Dicus.

The husband, Joel S. McClendon, is said to be buried at "Old Liberty Cemetery" in Jackson County. He was born November 7, 1811 and died October 6, 1858.

The cousin, John Casper Branner, was born July 4, 1850 at New Market, Tennessee. He was author of "Casper Branner of Virginia and His Descendants," published in 1913 at Stanford University. He graduated Cornell University in 1882 and was made professor of geology at the University of Indiana in 1885. In 1887 he was appointed state geologist of Arkansas. He began teaching at Stanford University, then called Leland Stanford University, at Palo Alto, California, in 1892. He became Vice President of Stanford University 1899 and served until 1913 when he became President. He served as President until 1915. He died in 1922. The family name of Branner was also spelled Brynner and Brunner.

The young practicioner of Hollywood [Jackson County, Ala.] was William Lafayette McClendon, born September 15, 1872, son of James Knox Polk McClendon and his wife, Mary King. He married first, January 1896 Annie Hunt; she died in 1898 and he then married Lizzie Campbell.

JOHN BAZOAR LAND PATENTS

The following Certificates on patented land were obtained and contributed by TVGS member Ann Gahan of Sierra Madre, California (308 Grove St. 91024). They are Certificates which were issued John Bazoar by the United States Government after the land was paid for. Mrs. Gahan obtained these Certificates from the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, 350 Pickett St., Alexandria, Va. 22304. John Bazoar/Basoar/Bazore had first settled in Madison County by 1809 then moved to Jackson County.

THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

To all whom these presents shall come, Greeting:

WHEREAS, John Bazoar of Jackson County, Alabama has deposited in the General Land Office of the United States, a certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Huntsville whereby it appears that full payment has been made by the said John Bazoar according to the provisions of the Act of Congress of the 24th of April, 1820, entitled "An act making further provision for the sale of the Public Lands," for the East half of the Southeast quarter of Section Nine, in Township Four, of Range Three East in the District of lands subject to sale at Huntsville, Alabama; containing eighty acres and ten hundredths of an acre; according to the official plat of the survey of the said Lands, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General, which said tract has been purchased by the said John Bazoar.

NOW KNOW YE, That the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in consideration of the premises, and in conformity with the several acts of Congress, in such case made and provided, have Given and Granted, and, by these presents, do give and grant, unto the siad John Bazoar and to his heirs the said tract above described: To Have and to Hold the same, together with all the rights, privileges, immunitis and appurtenances, of whatsoever nature thereto belonging, unto the said John Bazoar and to his heirs and assigns forever.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I, Andrew Jackson, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.

Given under my hand, at the city of Washington, the twenty first day of December in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and thirty and of the Independence of the United States the fifty fifth. Certificate No. 2528.

1839 LETTERS LEFT AT POST OFFICE Bellefonte, Alabama

Letters to the following named addressees were yet to be picked up from the Post Office at Bellefonte, Alabama on the first day of April, 1839. The list was obtained and contributed by Judge William D. Page who found it in the Thursday April 11, 1839 edition of the 'Bellefonte Courier.' An admonishment at the beginning of the newspaper article stated that the letters "if not taken out by the first of July next will be sent to the General Post Office as dead letters."

DEED RECORD A-1

Lauderdale County was established in 1818 but the earliest deed book found in that county appears to be from 1822-1828 and has "Deed Record A-1" on the cover. The first recorded instrument was signed on 30 March 1818 and the next was recorded in 1822.

Another book marked "Deed Record A-2" appears to be a WPA copy of A-1. The next book was "Deed Record A-3" which began 18 April 1825 and ended 14 May 1827 on Page 355. Abstracted from the original book and contributed by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

McKnight agrees to purchase the NW/4 of Sec. 17-11-2W. Wilkes and McKnight agree to divide the land between them. McKnight to get the land north of the dividing line and Wilks to have the land south of the dividing line.

On 17 March 1818 Wilkes and McKnight purchased the NW/4 of Sec. 17-11-2W and Wilkes became the purchaser in order to secure title to McKnight as McKnight has paid half of the first installment. If Whiteside does not pay said sum by the due date Fulton is authorized to sell the negroes at the Florence Inn.

GEORGE W. WATKINS Southern Claims Commission Report

On 7 September 1871, George W. Watkins of Athens, Limestone County, Alabama gave Messrs. Lewis & Fullerton, attorneys of Washington, D. C., his Power of Attorney to recover \$181 due him for the following articles taken from him by Federal troops during the Civil War:

350 lb. bacon @ 25¢ per pound \$87.50 10 barrels of corn @ \$5. per barrel 50.00 300 bundles of oats @ 2¢ per bundle 6.00

and in the spring of 1863 they took from near Gardner's Mills in Giles County, Tennessee:

One good horse \$150.00 \$293.50

The soldiers who took the provisions belonged to the command of General Mitchell and those who took the horse belonged to General Wilder.

Claims Commission Summary

George W. Watkins lived in Limestone County, Alabama near the Tennessee line and was an outspoken Union man. He was persecuted, hunted, and threatened; for 12 months he never slept at his own home. Because of his Union sympathies he came near being killed. The charges he makes for the items taken are too high; the date the horse was taken is uncertain. Recommend payment of \$161.00.

> George W. Watkins Deposition (July 24, 1875)

George W. Watkins states he is aged somewhere betwixt 45 and 50 years and lives near the east corner of Limestone County in Sand Spring Beat and has for near 20 years. His occupation is farmer, blacksmith, and wagonmaker. He was born in Giles County, Tenn. and presently lives within two miles of where he was born.

Watkins' sympathies have always been with the Federals and when Union citizens dodged out of Tennessee to escape the Southern conscript officer he fed and cared for them. He gave information to Union citizens to aid them in avoiding the Rebels. Some of the Union sympathizers he fed were relatives and some were strangers. Among them were "Robert Watkins, Jasper Turner (no connection), Eli Hill and two other Turners, Martin and Samuel."

Watkins has no relatives in the Union army or navy that he knows of. He stayed out of the Union army because his relatives were in the Rebel army and he had no one to leave his family with. He opposed secession from the beginning and did so in every debate and on every occasion. He rejoiced when he heard of the capture of Vicksburg. When he heard of the final surrender he "felt just like a cat let out of a wallet;" he felt released from prison, revived, and like a new man. During the war Watkins lived near the road and Federal officers furnished him a guard for protection. The best known Union men in the community were John M. Clark, John J. Vickers, Isaac Gatlin and Giles Hedfeth[?].

In 1861 and 1862 there were 12 months he never slept in his own shelter [home] but hid until Gen. Mitchell's army appeared in Huntsville in April, 1862. He went to see Mitchell and offered his service and was told to return home and do the best he could as the Rebels would bother him very little more. Watkins life was threatened both before and after Mitchell's arrival. After Mitchell left the Rebels were in control and he had to hide out again.

Thomas Taylor and a squad of men came to his house one morning before daybreak in 1862. Watkins heard them coming and hid near by. He heard them tell his wife that if they saw him it would be the last of him as they were hunting him to kill him because of his sentiments. Taylor then burned his house. Taylor belonged to Capt. Sam Moore's command and was a Lieutenant. Watkins did not personally hear many threats but heard of them through friends.

Watkins stated he had scars on his body (and showed them) where he was cut all to pieces by Julius George, a rebel, on account of his sentiment. They had an argument that led to blows in the last part of 1861 or first part of 1862 at a little country grocery store kept by James Falkner in Watkins' precinct.

The only items stolen by the Rebels were a Bone[?] Knife and pistol. None of his property was confiscated by the Rebels but he did nothing to support the Confederacy either. Watkins has no relatives in the

Confederacy closer than a nephew whom Watkins told he had best stay at home and whom he did not support. In the presidential election of 1860 Watkins voted for Bell but did not vote after Alabama seceded. During the war whole Confederate companies lay around his house trying to capture him but they never succeeded.

The property taken for which Watkins is making claim belonged to him. He states, 'I asked for it and paid for it. I am a very poor man and never had anything but what I worked for by day work." He stated he owned only 40 acres of which about half was in cultivation.

John M. Clark Deposition

John M. Clark states he is 61 years old, a farmer, and lives 10 miles northeast of Athens, Ala. on the Fayetteville Road and has lived there about 6 years but has lived in Limestone County 29 years. During the war he lived on the Huntsville Road 14 miles northeast of Athens. He is not related to George W. Watkins. Clark has been acquainted with Watkins for 28 or 29 years and has lived within three miles of him for the last 23 years and saw him often during the war.

During a public meeting in the fall of 1861 when some "big fellows" were in the neighborhood inspiring recruits for the Rebel army, Watkins publicly stated, 'If they want anybody to fight let them go and fight for their own negroes. Damn them!" As time went on he learned to hold his tongue while among Rebels to save himself but his principles never changed. Watkins' reputation was that of a Union man and it can be verified by Squire Ned Hatchet, Simeon Rhodes, old Billy Motes, and Delamar Ramsey. 'He was an independent sort of fellow and a fighting kind of a man.''

The known, prominent Union men in the neighborhood were Galloway Ramsey, Isaac Gatlin, old Davy Watkins, Westley Shannon, Nimrod Gatlin, Ep Gatlin and Newton Hart. Mr. Clark states that he, too, has always been a Northern sympathizer and that if "there is a drop of Rebel blood in me I would have it out ... when I first saw the Blue coats in 1862 I just felt like I was meeting up with my friends."

Clark states he knows of Watkins fighting a time or two in defense of his Northern sympathies and was nearly killed once. The Rebels threatened him for not going into the Rebel army and said they were going to hang him or shoot him. Clark said, "we had to bush it many and many a times lying around our plantation day and night. It was the Rebels who lived up in that country who would have the Cavalry sent in on him to drive him out." Regarding the fight with Julius George, Clark said "George Watkins hurt Julius George right smartly." Had the Rebels won the war they would not have allowed Watkins to continue living in the community as they had said they intended to send all the Union party off without a cent of property in the world.

During the war George Watkins' elderly mother lived with he and his wife along with a couple of nephews who were small boys. George was a very poor man "as well as myself," and is a hard working, industrious man.

Isaac Gatlin Deposition

Isaac Gatlin states he is 65 years old and has lived 8 miles northeast of Athens for 45 or 50 years. He is a farmer. He is not related to George Watkins but has known him since Watkins was a child having lived within 3 or 4 miles of him and within two miles of him during the war. During the war Watkins was "running and secreting about to keep out of the war" and Gatlin saw him frequently and discussed the war with him. Watkins told Gatlin that he would never go into the Rebel army unless they caught him up and put him in, then he would run away since he was in favor of the old government and old stars and stripes.

The Rebel cavalry tried to kill Watkins several times but, Gatlin said, 'I reckon the good Lord was with him and he escaped.'' Watkins had several fights about the Union and he was regarded in the community as a Union man. There was a "nest" of Rebels in the area. John J. Vickers, John M. Clark, T. W. Shannon, Watkins and Gatlin are neighbors and all regarded Watkins as a Union man. Gatlin was also a Union man and says he would have sacrificed his life before his principles.

Gatlin states he knew that Stev[?] Curry of the Rebel army was out getting conscripts when he shot at Watkins when Watkins was escaping. The "news was out that he [Watkins] was killed but it wasn't more than an hour till I see him."

George W. Watkins Deposition

The corn, oats and meat were taken one night by soldiers camped around Watkins' place. It was a wagon train on the road from Pulaski, Tennessee to Huntsville, Alabama. Watkins had brought the bacon in a short time before, having paid \$76 for it, and was about ready to hang it when it was taken. Watkins had bought two

live hogs from Eph Bryant, driven them home, and killed them. None of the meat had been used except the ribs, jowls, and feet. The meat has been in salt for some time when taken by the soldiers and would have weighed 400 pounds. It would have sold for 25¢ per pound.

The corn was taken from the cribs where Watkins now lives and was approximately 50 bushel, worth about \$1. per bushel. The oats was by the stable and was in shocks. Over 300 bundles were taken. It was selling at \$2. a hundred bundles. General Mitchell's command took it in 1862. The soldiers burned the oats as fuel in their camps as the weather was very cold.

The night the command took his horse they were camped at Loving[?] Springs 2-1/2 miles from Watkins' residence. They then went on to Athens and stayed there a few days. The horse was taken from his nephew, James Watkins, when he went to mill for him. The horse was worth \$150.

Martha Jane Watkins Deposition

Martha Jane Watkins is 36 years old and resides 15 miles northeast of Athens, Ala. and is the wife of George W. Watkins. She was present when the corn, oats and bacon were taken and saw the soldiers get it in the daytime about dusk. At about the beginning of winter the soldiers were camped "right close to our house" having just stopped for the night. They broke open the smoke house door and packed the mean off on their shoulders to their camp about 200 yards from the Watkins' house. They left one little piece of bacon which Martha Jane took into the house. She did not say anything to the soldiers as she was "sorta scared." That same night the soldiers took some of the corn and oats in their arms and in sacks on their horses. Some of the corn was taken by other commands as they were passing by.

James Benningham Deposition

Note: This is the same person that George W. Watkins referred to as James Watkins in his deposition.

James Benningham says he is about 29 years old and resides 15 miles northeast of Athens and has since 1860. He is a nephew of George W. Watkins. Benningham was present when the Yankees took the property. The soldiers that took the corn, oats, and meat had been marching and camped in an old field close by Watkins' house for the night then went on the next day. Most of them were infantry and were about 500 in number.

James states he was riding the horse in the big road some 2-1/2 to 3 miles from Watkins' home. He was living with Watkins and was returning home from the mill when over a thousand Northern soldiers overtook him and accused him of being a bushwacker. The soldiers said "they had to have my horse and was going to have him and talked like they were going to take me. They ordered me down off him. They took the horse, bridle and blanket." An officer ordered the soldiers to "take me down off the horse; they were just forming a line to stack their guns to camp when they led the horse off. I had been riding with them a mile or two." James stated the horse was a very good saddle and plow horse.

CARROLL BRADLEY BIBLE

The following Bible record of Carroll Bradley was contributed by TVGS member Juanita Parker, 31945 Warren, Garden City, Michigan 48135. This Bible is in Mrs. Parker's possession and Carroll Bradley was her grandfather.

Carroll Bradley was raised by some family named Newton and it was not until Carroll was a young man that Mr. Newton told him he was not their son and that his name was Bradley, not Newton. Mr. Newton also told Carroll that he was born in Limestone County on March 22, 1824 but if he told him anything about his blood parents Carroll did not relate the information to his children.

Mrs. Parker has searched for the identity of Carroll Bradley's parents for many years in all North Alabama counties. The clue to his birth may be in a family letter long forgotton or a diary kept by a neighbor or perhaps even lore in some Limestone County community that has been handed down from generation to generation. Whatever the source, and whatever the clue, Mrs. Parker would like to hear about it.





DAVIS FAMILY CORRESPONDENCE

The following letter, written by Aug^S W. Davis at Huntsville, Alabama on 11 November 1819 was contributed by Charles H. McMillan of Columbus, Georgia. Mr. McMillan states, "The exact identity of the writer is not known except for what is revealed in the letter. His grandfather was Jonathan Davis whose will is on file in the Wake County Courthouse, Raleigh, N. C., May term 1819. Several of Jonathan's children named in the will are mentioned in the letter."

Huntsville, Nov^r 11th 1819

Dear Grandmother

The favourable opportunity which now presents itself to me to write you (by our relation Green D. Howze) is too great to be passed over in silence—you are no doubt anxious to know how all your children are in this country. I have been in this place about six months scince which time I have not seen any of the family except my brother Alfred, who lives here; I however get intelligence from some one of the family every week and they were all well with the exception of my father who's health is bad, and I am apprehensive [he] never will be [healthy] again. William Dukes² & Nancy Cooke and husband were all well from the last account I had from Tennessee. I have not heard anything from Uncle Willie & family since I left Nashvillethey were then all well & enjoying good [health] & were doing much better than formally. I have heard nothing from H. Yarborough lately. I visited our old friend William D. Howze and family is in very good health & are much pleased with the country with the exception of Aunt Burchet & cousin Betsey Hays, the Girls are much pleased with their change—they are toasted.³ I have a great many friends & acquaintances here from N. Carolina; Isham R. Howze, Hill & Jno. C. Parry⁴ from Louisburg are here and a great many others which I can [not] pretend to designate with the compass of a letter.

I presume that you know Madison [County] is the greatest cotton country in the Western World. The people in this county have cotton fields as large as the old fields in Franklin where my father formerly lived. The people in this country are great characters—they talk here of Thousands like Carolinians do of hundreds (and think no more of the latter and of their speech than they do of the latter end of their lives) moreover think no more of a Bale of cotton than the Franklin people would of a meal bag full. The Carolinians will make

On Page 39 of a small book in Madison County marked "Chancery Record H" is a suit of interest filed 2 April 1835: Jenkins A. Herbert -vs- David Davis, Thomas Brandon, William Brandon, and Alfred Davis. William Herbert, John Herbert, and James H. Jenkins, former partners, state that in 1819 David Davis became indebted to Jenkins A. Herbert for a drove of horses and gave his note on 8 March 1819. Property transferred to Alfred Davis, David Davis' nephew. Bond signed by James H. Jenkins of White County, Tn. [Note: David Davis is shown on 1820 White Co. Tn. Fed. Census.] David Davis answered that he owed money to Thomas Gray, Patrick Vance and wife, and to "Moses Norman, his son in law" and others. Jenkins A. Herbert states that David Davis sold slaves to Thomas and William Brandon and transferred their notes to Alfred Davis. The Brandons answered that Davis, as next friend of Esther Norman, filed suit against Moses Norman, Davis' son-in-law, and that he became liable for expense. Believe no fraud intended.

more of a Silver quarter than the Alabamians do of a five Dollar piece of gold. Call a man worth Ten Thousand Dollars nothing, one worth fifty Thousand tolerable. Carriages & Giggs are as plentiful here as Ginger bread & Paddler waggons are at Louisburg in time of court. Why! they would think no more of picking your Pocket, Stabbing, shooting, commiting rape or adultry than you would of killing a chicking. In short, they would shout of any thing that their heads can invent or their hands execute. Every Ladie (unmarried) that has any pretentions to beauty, fashion, or high life, is Idolised—and if you wish to get shot or your [neck] broke you have only to go & pay your respects to her.


The weather is so extremely dry that it is almost impossible to walk the Streets without being suffocated. The streets are so dusty and Lomkey[?] that it is impossible to distinguish a man fifty steps distance & across the public square you cant tell whether a man is white or black at Twelve oclock in the day.

As I am about free, I shall call upon you to shoose me a wife a gainst I come to see you next fall. I am determined to get me a wife on the Eastern side of the Blue Ridge. The women on this side have all degenerated or assuming those who were not this way before they came here have become so since. My Dear Grandmother do not think I am [?].

My paper has nearly given out and this must suffice for the present & you will preceive that I have cut several of my sentences short for want of room in this paper. Present my best love & respects to all my friends & relatives. I have written them all but can hear from none. I am dir___[?] my Dear Grandmother accept for yourself the sincerity of

This Indenture made this the Twentieth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty two Between Thomas Willson and Jane his Wife, of the State of Mississippi, Monroe County, of the one part and James McCartney of the State of Alabama and Decatur County of the other part.

Witnesseth that the sd. Thomas Wilson and Jane, his Wife, for and in Consideration of the sum of two thousand dollars to them in hand paid by the Sd. James McCartney and before the sealing and delivery hereof, the receipt whereof they do hereby acknowledge and thereof acquit and forever discharge the Sd. James McCartney, his heirs, Executors, and Administrators by these presents have granted, sold, aliened, enfeoffed[?], released, and Confirmed and by these presents do grant, Bargain, sell, Alein, enfooff[?], release, and Confirm unto the said James McCartney and to his heirs and assigns a Certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the Sd. County of Decatur, Beginning at a white oak stump and stake on the former Boundary Cherokee line thence north 160 Poles to a sweet gum tree thence east 358 Poles to a dogwood and beech [tree] crossing the creek at 280 Poles, thence south 160 Poles to a stake, Thence west 358 Poles to the Beginning.

To have and to hold the above described Tract or parcel of land with the tenements and appertenances Thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining—unto the Said James McCartney, his Heirs and Assigns forever, And the said Thomas Wilson and Jane his wife, does Warrant and will forever defend the title to Sd. tract or parcel of land unto the Sd. James McCartney, his Heirs and assigns from and against the unlawful seizing and all and every person or persons Claiming or S....[?] under them the said Thomas Wilson and Jane his wife and also against the lawful title, claim or demand of all and every person or persons whosoever claiming or held by form or under the government of the United States.

JACOB BROYLES PATENT

The following Patent was sent to TVGS by Ann Gahan of Sierra Madre, California. It is a Patent showing that Jacob Broyles, assignee of Jehu Beeson, had paid for land in Section 4-2-2E of Madison County, Alabama and was now the owner. Jehu Beeson was apparently the person who first purchased this land but assigned his interest in it to Broyles. The reasons for assigning, or selling, land in 1816 were as varied as they are today. Perhaps Beeson found he could not make the payments on the land or perhaps he found land elsewhere he preferred and chose to sell it for the equity he had in it. This was a common practice. The Government Land Tract Books found in each courthouse in Alabama give the name of the person who actually obtained the patent on the land, i. e., the person who finished paying for it. They also reflect whether the final purchaser was an assignee such as was Jacob Broyles, however, they do not tell who assigned the land to the purchaser, in this case Jehu Beeson.

Mrs. Gahan also sent photocopies of the Payments Ledger showing that John Beason [not Jehu] had purchased this land on March 11, 1812 for \$461.02 plus \$17.28-1/2 interest. His down payment on March 11th was \$115.25-1/2. On August 3, 1814 he made a \$132.54 payment and on Feb. 1, 1815 he paid \$115.25-1/2 leaving a \$115.25-1/2 balance which Jacob Broyles paid on February 9, 1816.

1819 HAPPENINGS

In The <u>Limestone</u> News of Wednesday, March 23, 1859, there is a column entitled "Forty Years Ago." In this case "forty years ago" was in 1819 and the following news was from that year.

In convention to frame the constitution, John W. Walker was elected President by unanimous vote. C. C. Clay, Chairman of the Committee, reported a draft of the constitution.

The vote for Governor in 1819 was between Wm. W. Bibb and Marmaduke Williams—twenty-two counties voting. The vote stood:

About 40 years ago the City of Memphis was laid off by John Overton and others on Chickasaw Bluff, at the mouth of Wolf River. On this bluff once stood the Spanish, and afterward American, Fort Pickering.

A tin factory was established in Huntsville on

October 3rd, 1819 by Isaac Williams, late of Philadelphia.

In 1819 a man by the name of Jas. Cochran, alias Cushing, died suddenly in Huntsville. He was a partner of Mr. Meindeer of Marsailles, France—had Mr. Meindeer's property to a large amount, to whom he never made remittance, and was hiding himself, but Mr. Meindeer being at the time in New York in search of him accidentally read the account of his death, proceeded to Huntsville, and secured the property left by Cochran. I give this to show the value of newspapers forty years ago.

It is said that a bird flew over the capital at the moment of Mr. Monroe's inauguration in 1817.

The Territorial Legislature of Alabama assembled in Huntsville April 26th 1817—present, James Titus. It appears that he composed that august body.

A nail factory was in full blast in Huntsville so early as May, 1817, by Carroll & Bradford.

About forty years ago the small pox broke out in Huntsville, creating great alarm. Eleven physicians offered their services gratis, viz:

Samuel Brown
David Moore
Rich. Edmons
Joseph Wheelright
Alex. A. Campbell, and
Wyche & Allen

A soap and tallow manufactory existed forty years ago in Huntsville—Phelon & Dillon, proprietors.

A cigar manufactory existed about the same time—Henry Pope, proprietor.

A coincident. At the very moment the election for United States Senators, the first that ever took place in Alabama, was going on an exhibition of a live Elephant, the greatest wonder then in America, was also being made in Huntsville on October 28th 1819.

Huntsville was at one time called Wickenham. [Ed. note: It was actually called Twickenham.]

A large vote was at one time cast in favor of putting Athens at the poor house.

OLD ATCHLEY CEMETERY (Also known as the Keel Mountain Cemetery)

This cemetery was copied and contributed by TVGS member P. B. Keel about five years ago. It was again copied in March, 1984 by TVGS members Addie Shaver and Evelyn Rochelle and contributed by them. There are at least fifteen unmarked graves in this old family cemetery.

GUNTERSVILLE FEMALE SEMINARY

The following item was located and contributed by Judge William D. Page. It was found in "The Marshall Eagle" January 5, 1852, Volume 2, Number 32.

"The Female Seminary at Guntersville under the care of Miss A. A. Rogers will re-commence on the 15th of September, 1852."

"The Marshall Eagle" was published weekly at Guntersville. The masthead was "The Union, Now and Forever, One and Inseparable." It contained national news and legal ads in addition to commercial advertisement but rarely had any local news items. Judge Page obtained a copy of the available issues from 1852-1855 on microfilm and placed them in the Huntsville Public Library's Heritage Room.

LYSANDER JOHNSON'S "ANSWER"

While sorting through stacks of loose papers in the Franklin County courthouse at Winchester, Tennessee, Jeanne R. Bigger of Tullahoma, Tennessee found the following copy of an Answer by Lysander Johnson to a Bill of Complaint [law suit] filed by John W. Syler, J. F. Syler "and others." The file was incomplete and it was impossible to tell if James Lamar was one of the "others" or not, however, from the wording of the Answer one is led to believe he is a plaintiff in the action. The suit was filed in Chancery Court in Franklin County, Tennessee. Located and contributed by Jeanne R. Bigger and abstracted by Judge William D. Page and Dorothy Scott Johnson. [Suit filed 19 May 1869]

Lysander Johnson is a resident of Jackson Co., Ala. and states that on 28 Jan. 1865 he bought 86 bales of cotton, weighing 480 lbs. per bale (totaling 41,281 lb.) from James Lamar. Lamar lived in Marshall County, Alabama on the south side of the Tennessee River at that time. This transaction was signed by Lamar and witnessed by Col. William Griffin of Marshall County. Lamar agreed to take 45¢ per pound for the cotton payable in Southern States of Georgia and South Carolina bank notes or \$1.00 per pound in Confederate Treasury notes. Johnson paid Lamar \$1400 in Confederate Treasury notes which Lamar accepted. He also paid him \$2700 in Southern States bank notes which Lamar accepted, folded up and put cautiously into his pocketbook. On 7 Feb. 1865 Johnson further paid Lamar \$4000 in Southern States bank notes which Lamar accepted.

After the purchase, sale, and delivery, the cotton was left at the cotton shed of Washington T. May in Marshall County, Ala., it being where Lamar delivered it to Johnson. A disagreement arose as to the weight of the cotton and they started to re-weigh it but Lamar pledged on his honor that when the cotton was first packed it weighed 500 lbs. per bale and they then reached an agreement without re-weighing it.

No specified time for payment of the remainder of the price was fixed but was to be done as soon as Johnson could return to his home on the north side of the Tennessee River in Jackson County and gather up the money. On 9 June 1865 Johnson paid William Griffin \$1000 in Confederate money which Griffin gave to Lamar and Lamar accepted.

Johnson left his cotton under the shed of Washington T. May which James Lamar had but recently sold to May. Lamar assured Johnson that he had reserved the right to store cotton at that place during the existing hostilities [Civil War] and Lamar gave Johnson permission to store it there.

Due to the state of war then raging over the country and the vigilance of scouting parties of Confederate soldiers who occupied the southern banks of the Tennessee River and in consequence of predatory bands of guerrillas that infested the southern banks of the river under authority and control of the Confederate authorities, Johnson was prevented from returning to pay off Lamar until the times specified.

Immediately upon the surrender of the Confederate Army and dispersion of said bands of guerrillas, in May, 1865, Johnson returned to Marshall County and sought Lamar for the purpose of discharging his indebtedness. Johnson took with him enough Southern States bank notes to finish paying for the cotton but could not find Lamar.

On this trip he first had notice of the charges against him in the Bill of Complaint. The notice was given him by one Champ Farris, a citizen of Marshall County. Farris had affected the exchange of cotton originally. Champ Farris and Johnson, together, sent a messenger to Marengo County [where Lamar then lived] to notify Lamar that Johnson had come for the cotton and had the amount due him. Johnson gave Farris \$25. to speed the messenger and even procured the horse upon which the messenger was mounted. Johnson then waited ten days before removing the cotton awaiting the return of Lamar who never came.

Before the cotton purchase Lamar fled as a refugee before the Army of the United States to southern Alabama and at the time of the cotton purchase he had disposed of all his property of every character in Marshall County for Confederate money and he had no agent left there to whom Johnson could pay over the money. Johnson states that Lamar has "become reckless, hishonored and bankrupt in fortune."

On 9 June 1865 Johnson paid off, in United States currency, his contract. This was done before suit was brought. Johnson paid the following sums:

A. M. Beard, an account of \$628.88 due 3 March 1861 and also to Beard an assignment of John J. Stibbs due from Lamar in 1858, 1859, 1860 and 1861 in amount of \$330.70.

An order of James Lamar drawn on J. D. Lusk payable to James Jeater due 18 Feb. 1865 for \$800.00. An account of A. M. Beardon with assignment of John J. Sibley yet to be proven.

On 9 June 1865 \$1759.88 in U. S. currency was worth six times Southern States bank notes and by reason of the U. S. currency's excessive value Johnson feels his debt to Lamar is completely paid.

Pages 174-181 James Cowen Estate

"The nuncupative will of James Cowen, Decd., who departed this Life on Sunday the 27th day of Jany. 1839 being of sound mind [and] disposing memory but in expectation of a speedy dissolution made his nuncupative will as follows, to wit:"

Appointed his wife, Frances Cowen, and his son, David Cowen, his executors. All property, real and personal, to go into the hands of his wife and at her death it is to be "equally divided among his heirs, share and share alike."

A portion of his estate was to be given to his younger children to make their portion equal to that already given to his older children when they came of age or married which Cowen believes amounted to about \$150 each. If the property given the older children does not value \$150 then their portion to be made up to them out of the estate. The minor children to receive their portion when they marry. [Note: None of the children were named.]

Witnesses: C. D. Abernathy and Frances Cowen in January, 1839.

Admitted to probate 11 Feb. 1839

Administrator's Bond dated 11 Feb. 1839

Frances Cowen and David Cowen were awarded administratorship after giving \$6000 bond with Garrett Cowen and Peter Foust their securities. This bond was signed by David Cowen. Frances Cowen signed with an "X" and bondsmen signed as Peter R. Foust and Jackson Cowen. [Please note that in the body of the bond Garrett Cowen was named as bondsman but it was signed by Jackson Cowen.]

Page 29 (-continued-) Page 30 D. Crabb and others [not named] granted an order for a road leading from Stringfield's Ferry to Sommerville and that Thos. Skidmore, William Skidmore, Joseph Kolb, Joseph Clift, Stewart Braun, James Thompson, and William Thorn be appointed to view said road.

Nicholas Lewis and others [not named] granted petition to view a road leading from Lewises Ferry to intersect the Sommerville [Road] at the Center Spring and that John McMahan, William King, Richard Holly, Nicholas Lewis, Isaac Yearry, Marvin Kyle and Wm. Read be appointed a jury to view and mark the same.

On petition of John Maxwell and others [not named] the court ordered that the overseer alter that part of the road leading from Sommerville to Ditto's Landing (between Center Spring and Cotaco Creek) so as to take the nearest and best way to said Creek and going immediately by John Maxwell's house so as to shun that very bad hill in said road.

Martin Ross appointed overseer on that part of the road leading from Sommerville to Ditto's Landing (between Sommerville and Ross' Spring) and that he have an equal divide of the hands which John Loy now has as overseer of said road.

The review of that part of the road from the Fort[Fork?] dam ford to the county line in a direction to Meltons Bluff is cancelled.

William Finton[?] appointed overseer of the road reviewed and laid off from Stringfield's Ferry to Centerville and Arch. Kirkland is appointed on that part of said road from Centerville to Flint [River] as viewed and laid off; also William Milligan is appointed on that part of the road from Flint to Samuel Givens: also that Smith Deskins be appointed on that part of the road from Givens to the county line; and that Joseph Blevins, David Day, Thos. T. Bibb and William Johnson be appointed to apportion the hands to work on the same so as no one man shall be compelled to work two roads.

Wm. Doss, James Clark, John Buchanan, Edward Fulton, Philip Archey, Jeremiah Archey and William Chadwick each be allowed \$1.00 for their services in guarding the jail while Wesley H. Mills was prisoner to be paid out of the county treasury from moneys not otherwise appropriated.
