Book Reviews



DEATH NOTICES FROM LIMESTONE COUNTY, ALABAMA NEWSPAPERS, 1828-1891, abstracted by Eulalia Yancy Wellden, P. O. Box 781, Athens, AL 35611. 8-1/2 x 11, 276 pages, soft cover, indexed. May be ordered from above address. \$17.50.

Once again, we are pleased to have available a new publication from one of our own members. Mrs. Wellden has provided a most helpful source for death records from early Limestone County. An interesting Introduction gives us an outline of Athens and Limestone County newspapers. These newspapers abstracted include Alabama Courier, Alabama Farmer, Alabama Statesman, Alliance Banner, Athenian, Democrat, Herald, Limestone Advertiser, Limestone News and Post.

In addition, Mrs. Wellden has prepared an appendix of out-of-town newspaper abstracts because of the loss of so many of the Limestone Co. newspapers prior to 1867. These include Huntsville newspapers: The Advocate, The Democrat, The Republican and The Southern Advocate.

We are indeed grateful for the many hours she has put into this work and hope that it will serve as encouragement to other members of TVGS.

RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS, DEED ABSTRACTS, VOL. I, by Joyce Martin Murray, 1986. 6 x 9, hardbound, indexed, 188 pages, \$25.00. May be purchased from the author at 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75205. (Texas residents add \$1.25 tax.)

Mrs. Murray has prepared this volume of Deed Record Books A-B, A-B-C, D and a part of F of the records in one of the first counties in Texas. The earliest instrument is dated 1831 but there are numerous references to earlier transactions. The latest entries are dated in February 1846 after the annexation of the Republic of Texas into the United States. Included are deeds, bonds, cattle brands, bills of sale, deeds of trust, agreements, wills, land certificates and bounty land grants.

There are three indexes: a full name index containing approximately 5000 names, an index of place names, and an index of slave names (first names only).

COLLIER COLLATOR, edited by Alice Collier Clark. $8-1/2 \times 11$, quarterly, indexed 1985-86, \$12.00 per year. Available from Collier Clark Publications, P. O. Box 864017, Plano, TX 75086.

The Collier Collator is a new publication, proposing to be a clearinghouse for all Collier, Colyer, etc., families and allied lines. This set of four issues bound together contains Bible records, cemeteries, family group sheets and other records, ancestor charts and wills. Original articles will be considered for publication. Queries are free to the subscribers.

Collier records in these issues were from Alabama, Mississippi, Virginia, Texas, Tennessee, North Carolina and Ohio. Other states may have slipped by this reviewer. Each quarterly is indexed separately.

DECENDANTS OF JOHN STEPHENSON, 1785-1857, FAYETTE COUNTY, ALABAMA, by Lois R. Stephenson, 1544 Avolencia Dr, Fullerton, CA 92635-3718. 8-1/2 x 11, 70 pages.

This privately published book contains information compiled by Mrs. Stephenson on John Stephenson of North Carolina and Alabama and his sons, John Elliott Stephenson and Samuel M. Stephenson. John Elliott was from Tuscaloosa and Walker Counties and Samuel M. of Fayette & Walker Counties, Alabama. The major portion of the book consists of family groups decended from these two sons and brought up-to-date into the late 20th century.

Unfortunately for those researchers with allied lines there is no index. There is, also, no information regarding price or availability.

Construction is under way on a new building for the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library. Completion is expected in the Spring of 1987. The 107,000 square foot building will have space for 670,000 volumes and seating for 900 patrons. It will be approximately three times the size of the present building which is visited by more than 1200 people every day.

The Huntsville Heritage Room will be located on the third floor of the new facility. It will measure approximately 10,000 square feet and have seating for 90 patrons; this room presently contains only 2000 square feet. There will be a special temperature and humidity controlled environment for housing archives and microforms. There will also be a public lounge convenient to the Heritage Room which I know will be welcome news to those researchers who like to spend the day at the Library.

The cost of the new building is \$9.9 million. Eight million dollars is being provided by the City and the Library must raise \$1.9 million which will be used to furnish and equip the building. The Heritage Room will cost approximately \$100,000.

For twenty years TVGS has supported the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library and it is partially because of this support that the Heritage Room has become renowned for its extensive genealogical research material. We will continue to support this institution and are asking you as TVGS members to pledge your personal financial support. All donations are tax deductible.

The public surveys of this land were conducted in 1822 and 1823 but annotations as late as 1888 are included. Located and secured by Catherine Gilliam, this information was transcribed by Dorothy S. He did witness the will of Mr. Cockburn along with the other witnesses and signed same in each others presence. He believes Cockburn's mind was entirely clear and he seemed to "understand himself" perfectly.

CHARLES L. WILSON DEPOSITION:

Charles L. Wilson states he is 56 years of age and a resident of Indianapolis, Marion Co., Ind. (Note: The balance of his deposition is essentially the same as that of L. C. McLane and is not repeated here.)

FLORINDA FAIRFIELD DEPOSTION:

She states she is 41 years old and resides at 381 North Delaware St. in Indianapolis. She states she knew Mr. Cockburn about six weeks before he died. She said Mr. Cockburn "could neither read nor write but seemed to be a very shrewd man (and) he was perfectly capable." The will was made in his room (No. 34) at the Surgical Institute.

HANNAH C. OVERMAN DEPOSITION:

She stated her age as 48 and a resident at the Surgical Institute. She said Mr. Cockburn wanted his wife to take all his property but she stated she did not want it. (Note: The rest of the deposition is essentially the same as the others and is not repeated here.)

COLBERT COUNTY CEMETERIES

During the Great Depression days of the 1930's, one of the Colbert Co. WPA projects was to copy the cemeteries of the county. Since that time a copy of the work has been on deposit in the Office of the Colbert Co. Commissioners and available only to those who knew it was in existence and who went to that office to see it. TVGS has photocopied the complete work, indexed it, and will carry some of the cemeteries in "Valley Leaves" from time to time.

In the 1930's genealogical research was not as exacting as it is today and a few words of caution must be said regarding these cemeteries. First, it is apparent the copyists did not use chalk on the faces of the stones to bring out the lettering to a more legible condition. For instance, a person's initials might be 'M. R." on one inscription and 'W. R." on another. To add to the problem of inaccuracy, the copyist was different from the typist who had to interpret the copyist's field notes the best she could.

There is nothing on the work to indicate when these cemeteries were copied, however, it was probably between 1931 and 1935. Of course, no tombstones erected after that period are included. Too, there is no way we can guarantee their accuracy which depended entirely upon the copyist and the typist. The location of the individual cemeteries is given only roughly and even then in only a few cases. Our previous editor, Dorothy Scott Johnson, has tried to correlate these cemeteries with the current Colbert County road map without success. She is sure that there are some that were copied that are no longer on the map and some on the map that were not copied.

The great thing about these cemeteries is that they were recorded. "Civilization," being what it is, has probably already destroyed a number of them and at the very least some of the individual markers have undoubtedly been obliterated by time and the elements.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to the Colbert Co. Commission for allowing us to copy these important genealogical documents and for sharing them with a hungry public.

1921 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

In 1921 the Alabama Legislature passed an Act requiring that a permanent roll of Civil War pensioners be prepared and kept by the Pension Commission. Questionnaires were prepared and sent to all known pensioners, both veterans and widows of veterans. These original, completed questionnaires are now housed in the Military Branch of the Alabama State Department of Archives and History in Montgomery, Ala. They not only give a brief military history of the veteran but they also give personal information such as when and where married and the age of the wife if she is still living. Unfortunately, they did not ask the name of the wife but did ask for a list of living children, their addresses, and occupations. Abstracted by Lois Robertson.

Benjamin W. Atchley Princeton, Ala.

Benjamin W. Atchley was born at New Hope, Madison Co., Ala., Dec. 12, 1842. His wife is 74 years old and was born in Madison Co., Ala. They married in 1867 in Madison Co. He is a farmer and lives with his wife. He is a voter in the Princeton Precinct, Jackson Co.

He enlisted in 1861 at Bellefont, Ala., Private, 2nd Confederate Regiment under Capt. John Snodgrass and Col. John B. Martin. Was also known as the Jackson Hornets; after Shiloh formed 4th Ala. LAUDERDALE COUNTY, ALABAMA, 1866 STATE CENSUS, SCHEDULE 1

Act No. 99 of the Acts of Alabama for 1865-66 was passed 21 February 1866 "To provide for taking the census of the State of Alabama for the year 1866, as ordered by ordinance of the Convention of 1865." Census takers were to be appointed by the courts of county commissioners previous to the first day of April 1866 and allowed compensation dependent on the number of persons counted, mileage and for making returns. The enumeration was "to embrace all the citizens of the State, whether within the State at the time of the enumeration or abroad, but such persons only as shall be residents of the respective counties in which they are enumerated on the 1st day of April next; Provided, That persons removing into any county after the said 1st day of April next, and making oath or affirmation that they have not been enumerated in any other county, may be included." Three copies were to be made, one of which was to be deposited in the office of the clerk of the circuit court, and two forwarded to the Secretary of State by "second Monday in November next." (This date was amended by Act 165 of 1866-7 on 7 December 1866 to read "the 5th of January, 1867.") Printed forms were provided by the Secretary of State. There were four schedules:

Schedule 2 was of the black population (to include all persons of color)

using the same criteria as Schedule 1 (see later).

Schedule 3 was the "enumeration of white inhabitants by townships." Name of head of household was given and males and females in the household were listed by number in each category under 10, 10-20, and over 20. Total males and females were given as well as totals in each township.

Schedule 4 was the recapitulation by townships showing population of each township, "the number of colleges, academies and common schools in each county respectively, and also the number of scholars at each college, academy and

common school, as nearly as practicable."

SCHEDULE I will be presented in installments in <u>Valley Leaves</u>. In it the white population was presented by households with the name of the head of household given. Males in the household were divided into ten categories by age from zero to one hundred in ten year increments. Total number of males followed. Then females were presented in the same manner. Following the total number of people in that household, "how many were lost in the service during the late war, died of sickness or were killed in battle, or were disabled by wounds" were detailed as SOLDIERS KILLED [K], DIED OF SICKNESS [S], or DISABLED BY WOUNDS [W]. The next category included all INSANE [I], EPILEPTICS [E], and IDIOTS [D]. Thos. C. Irion was the census taker recording the first 19 pages. W. Glenn, the Lauderdale County enumerator for the second half, listed the soldiers BY NAME.

1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

The Alabama Legislature passed an act requiring that a census of all Confederate Soldiers be taken in 1907. This was to include all veterans of the Civil War who had fought for the Confederacy and who were presently living in the state of Alabama regardless of where they had served or from what state they had served. It was the duty of the Probate Judge in each county to secure the information and to send a copy of it to the state.

Each veteran was to fill out an Affidavit stating his residence, date and place of birth, and to give a brief statement as to his military service. This information was transferred from the original affidavit to ledgers in alphabetical, or semi-alphabetical, order by the soldier's last name. Some of the affidavits were returned after the ledger was made up and those will be found at the end of the ledger out of alphabetical order. The original ledgers are housed in the Probate Judge's office of each county and the copies are now in the Alabama Dept. of Archives and History, Military Division. The material used in Valley Leaves was taken from microfilm copies of the ledgers in the Archives and was abstracted by Janet Baker Burks of Tyler, Texas. The number preceeding each name is the number of that person as it appears in the ledger.



ORPHANS COURT MINUTES, 1824-30 Part 14

1829

All persons mentioned in these minutes were residents of Limestone County unless so stated. Daniel Coleman was the Judge from the beginning of the minutes through May 2, 1829 and on May 26, 1829 William J. Mason became the presiding Judge.

This is not the earliest Orphans Court Minute book in Limestone County. At least one book prior to this one is in the Limestone County Archives.

To fully understand these minutes there are some facts you should know. When an estate was ready to be appraised the Judge usually appointed five men as appraisers, or commissioners. It was only necessary that a majority, or three, of these commissioners do the actual appraisal.

When an estate or guardianship was ready for final settlement the administrator or guardian submitted his final accounts and vouchers to the Judge and asked that the case be settled. The law required that a notice of this intent be published for a certain length of time in a local newspaper or a newspaper published "in the State of Alabama." The Judge set the date of the hearing on the settlement and at that time anyone interested in the case in any manner could appear and let his wishes or complaints be heard. Too, if any of the heirs lived outside the State of Alabama the Judge usually asked that publication be made if a petition was filed to sell the real estate, slaves, or other property.

The Morgan County Orphans Court Register 2 from 1818 to 1827 was carried in "Valley Leaves" in Volume 7 (Sept., 1972 through June, 1973). While Register 2 dealt with estate matters, Register 1 deals with laying out the road system in Morgan (originally Cotaco) County, apprenticeships, tax levies, Revolutionary War Pension Claims, and other matters that could easily fall in a "miscellaneous" category. In the later years this book was used primarily to record cattle brand registrations. This book contains a fascinating accumulation of facts and it is probable that names will appear in this volume that may not appear in other Morgan County records. This series began in Volume 19, Issue No. 3, March 1985. Continued from the March, 1986 issue of "Valley Leaves."
