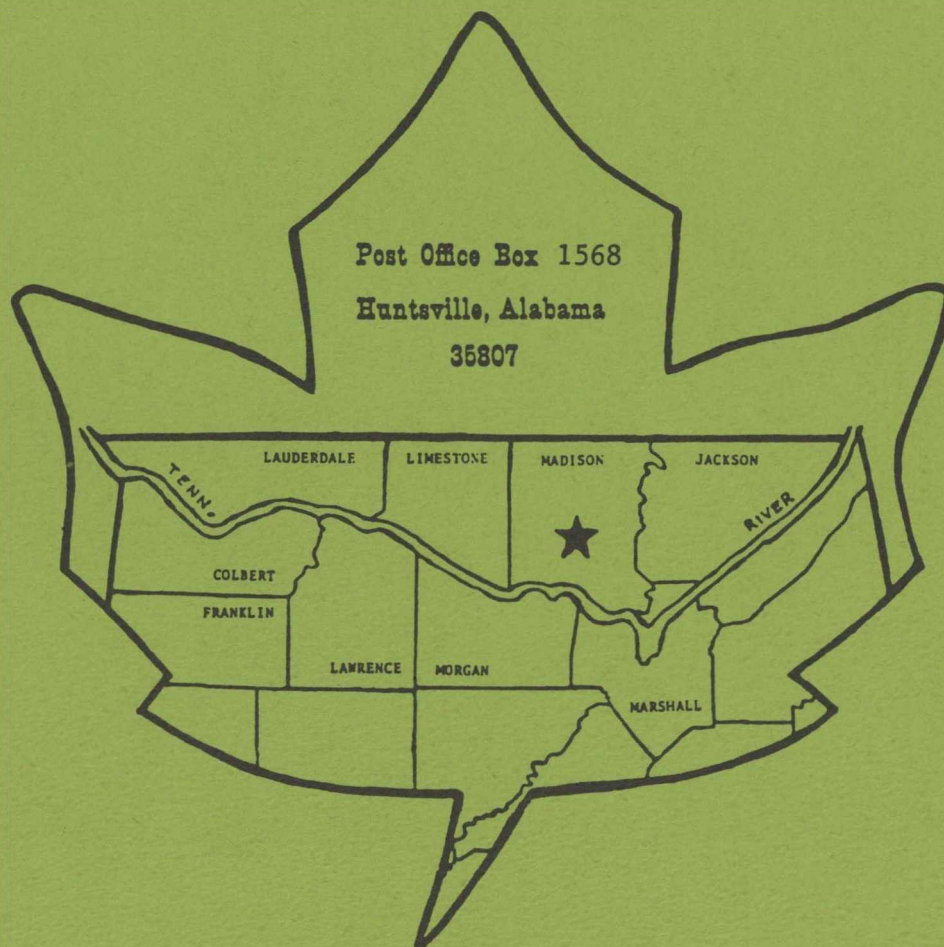

THE CULLENS OF SHEBOYGAN, COUNTY, 1850-1900, by Katherine Cullen King. Gateway Press, Baltimore, Md., 1986. Hard Cover, 6 x 9, 149 p., indexed. Available from the author at 8403 Wagon Wheel Road, Alexandria, VA 22309, \$25.00.

The Cullens of Sheboygan, County, by Katherine Cullen King traces the descendants of John Cullen (1811-1872) who left Ireland to come to the United States some time during the late 1820's or early 1830's. Family members in this book are those who lived in Sheboygan County, Wisconsin from about 1850 to around 1900. Mrs. King has interspersed her genealogical data with some very interesting first person reminiscences.

Those of you with North Alabama Cullen connections will be interested as one branch of the family lived in Limestone and Jefferson Counties, Alabama.

DECATUR COUNTY

The exact location of the Decatur/Jackson County line remains elusive but it was in trying to locate it that negative photostats of the township plats of the Decatur County area were ordered. The public surveys of this land were conducted in 1822 and 1823 but annotations as late as 1888 are included. Located and secured by Catherine Gilliam, this information was transcribed by Dorothy S. Johnson and Margaret M. Cowart. This series began in Valley Leaves Volume 16, Number 1, September 1981.

Joseph N. Olduer, also being duly sworn, states that the statement made by Hundley is substantially correct. He recollects that Mowry also requested that his wife should dispose of his property amongst his children as she might think proper. Mowry also stated to his son William, that he wished him to sell his lower place, meaning the Jones place, and to pay out the Land that he had an occupancy to, from the proceeds of the same, and that his son William was to pay all his just debts. Mowry than observed to Mr. Harding "if this was not right". Mowry also stated that his son Jesse Mowry had been a disobedient child and that he had not much confidence in him. He wished his son William to stay with his Mother and to assist her in the management of the estate and in the raising of the children.

16 Dec 1829

Daniel Harding being duly sworn, stated that he was present at the dwelling house of John Mowry at the time of his death and that some time previous to his death, the said John Mowry called for his wife and son William. Harding verified the statements of the other two witnesses. Harding further states that John Mowry has been dead more than 14 days and less than six months and that he died at his usual place of residence. And, Harding states that from the manner of said Mowry, it is Harding's opinion that it was the intention of Mowry that these instructions should be noticed as his Will, although he did not expressly say so.

The Court then ordered that the noncupative will of John Mowry, decd. be recorded.

WILLIAM R. CHANDLER
Southern Claims Commission Report

The following claim was obtained from the Southern Claims Commission files and submitted by TVGS member, Jack Campbell, 15219 Herring Ave., San Jose, CA 95124. Abstracted for Valley Leaves by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

William R. Chandler of the Berkley Community, Madison County, Ala. made the following claim for reimbursement of property taken from him by and for the use of the Army of the United States during the Civil War.

Mr. Chandler states that during November, 1864 officers and soldiers of the United States Army belonging to the command of General Austerhouse of the 4th Army Corps were stationed at Woodville (Jackson County), Ala. and took from him for their use, 75 bushels of corn valued at 60 cents per bushel (totaling \$45.00); 2600 pounds of fodder valued at 1½ cents per pound (totaling \$39.00); ten bushels of wheat valued at \$1.00 per bushel (totaling \$10.00).

General Robert S. Granger of said army was in command of said Military District at the time the provisions were taken.

On or about 30 January 1865 soldiers and officers of the U. S. Army belonging to the command of General D. L. Stanley stationed at Huntsville, Ala., at the time and who were on a raiding or scouting expedition, took from him 342 pounds of bacon valued at 16-2/3 cents per pound (totaling \$57.00). Mr. Chandler is unable to state if said bacon was carried to Huntsville, Ala. or consumed by said troops on the road.

Chandler received a receipt for the corn, fodder, and wheat mentioned above but said receipt has been lost and he is unable to find it. The receipt was for the quantity of corn, fodder, and wheat described above and stated the provisions were for the use of the United States Army at said post of Woodville. Mr. Chandler does not now remember the name of the officer signing the receipt.

Chandler received no receipt or voucher or other written instrument than the one mentioned above. The property, when taken, was in good merchantable condition and he feels that the prices charged for the property taken to be reasonable and just. Chandler prays that he may be allowed the sum of \$151.00. Mr. Chandler signed the document with an "X".

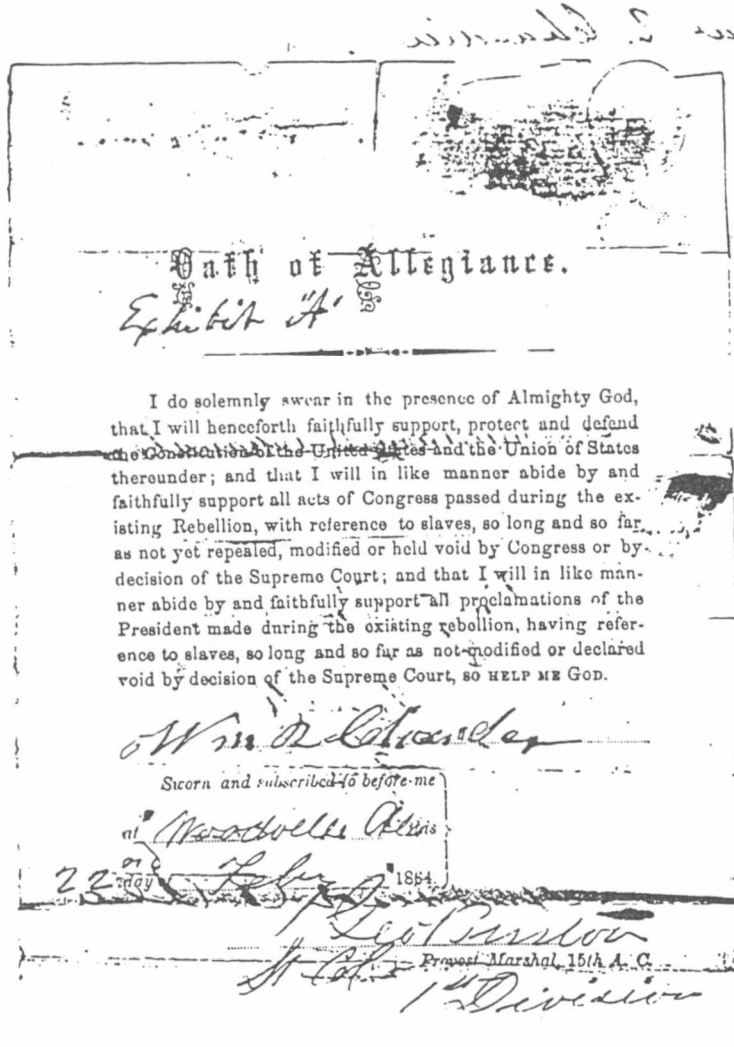

On an attached sheet of paper was the physical description of William R. Chandler: Aged 66, 6 feet tall, dark complexion, blue eyes, gray hair, and a farmer by profession. There was no notation in this file whether the claim was paid or not.

On Nov. 6, 1865, William R. Chandler signed "The Oath of Registration" which states, "I, Wm. R. Chandler, do solemnly swear, that I will henceforth faithfully support, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States, and the Union of States thereunder; and that I will, in like manner abide by and support all Laws and Proclamations which have been made during the existing rebellion with reference to the Emancipation of Slaves. So help me God. He had, on February 22, 1864 signed the "Oath of Allegiance" at Woodville, Jackson County, Alabama.

CHANCERY RECORD "A", PAGE 325

On August 31, 1822, William B. Jones of Decatur County, brought suit against Benjamin Jones and William Jones of Lawrence County. Judge Clement C. Clay presided. The Clerk was Samuel Mead. The suit alleged that in the Fall of 1819, the plaintiff, William B. Jones, gave the defendant, William Jones, a note in the amount of \$222.00 due one day after date. In 1820 Benjamin Jones as assignee of William Jones brought suit on the note in Circuit Court of Madison County. The plaintiff, William B. Jones, was then a resident of Jackson County residing about 30 miles from Huntsville. The plaintiff, William B. Jones, upon receipt of the suit papers, contacted James H. Weakley and had Weakley obtain the services of John McKinley, Esq., an attorney, to defend the suit. At that time William B. Jones had five notes made by William Jones which he wanted to set-off against the debt that he owed William Jones. The notes held by William B. Jones were payable to James H. Weakley, Lewis Evans, James Mackey, _____ Estelle and _____ Waggoner.

The attorney failed and neglected to defend the suit and did not assert the five notes as a proper set-off. When the attorney did not defend the suit a judgment in favor of William Jones and against William B. Jones had been entered. William B. Jones asserted that he had now been arrested by the Sheriff of Madison County and was in custody upon a capias founded on the judgment.

Judge Clay entered an injunction delaying further proceedings in collection of the judgment. The defendant, William Jones, made his answer before _____ Poston, a Justice of the Peace in Limestone County.

In 1824, Judge Clay heard the case, found in favor of the defendants, William Jones and Benjamin Jones (who were brothers), and dissolved the injunction.

REMARKS

The Claimant testifies that he voted for Union candidates to the secession convention, was opposed to secession and then was lay out in the woods to avoid conscription and was abused and threatened. On one occasion a squad of Rebel soldiers came to his house with a rope to hang him, but finally robbed him of his mule and other property and left him. In order to escape and get his son away from the conscript officers, he started North with him in the Fall of 186_ and before he got out of his own county he came across Gen. Wilder's Command and they took the horse for which he claims compensation. His son enlisted in the Union Army and subsequently died at Nashville as appears from the Surgeon's Certificate. One son was in the Confederate Army and claimant persumes he is dead as he never heard from him. Three or four witnesses testify the claimant's loyal conversation and reputation.

We find him loyal and allow \$120.

CLAIM

On 3 August 1877, William Perkins, Claimant, with witnesses, Charles H. Reynolds, Riley Cagle, James P. Morrow, Wm. B. Perkins and Joseph Perkins, appeared before Jno. D. Taylor, Special Commissioner, at Guntersville, Marshall County, Alabama, for the purpose of a hearing in the above cause.

The Claim of William Perkins (-continued-)

Deposition of William Perkins

William Perkins states that he is about sixty years old, but does not know his exact age. He has lived in Marshall County, Alabama, nearly all of his life except for the years he went North in time of war from 1861 to 1865. He is a farmer.

He thinks he was born in the State of Tennessee. He lived in Marshall County before the war and went North for his own safety and the protection of his family because he was a Union man. He provided aid to parties trying to cross into Union lines by sending them on his horses. On particular party that he aided was named Collins.

He had one son in the Union Army, 3rd Kentucky Cav., Co. L., mustered into service in Louisville, Ky. He died at Nashville, Tenn. The Surgeon's certificate dated March 6, 1864 is attached.

Addressed to Wm. Perkins, Cladeston, Perry Co., Ind. and signed by Wm. C. Otterson, Surgeon, U.S.V., the Certificate states that Jefferson Perkins, Priv. Co. F, 3 Ky Cav. died 6 March 1864 of unknown cause.

Perkins states that he was threatened with personal injury in 1863 in Marshall County, Ala. by one Willhite who was making up a Co. of Confederates, the threat was that "I would be hung." He was never arrested by anyone professing to represent the Confederate government but a man by the name of Hamilton came to his house with a squad of six or seven men and brought with them a rope to hang him with. They did not do it but took off his mule and some corn.

He states that he was never in any service for the Confederacy and never took any oath for its support.

To the question "Had you any near relatives in the Confederate military?" Perkins answered, "I had one son, his name was Jesse Perkins, he was about 21 years old. He is supposed to be dead, I persuaded him not to enter the service, but he was over the conscript age and I could do nothing with him. I never contributed anything for his outfit when he went into the Rebel service.

Perkins states that he took an amnesty oath after the close of the war but does not recollect exactly when. He took it in Marshall Co., Ala. "because the Government of the United States required it, and I wish to see the Union restored.

He voted for Union Candidates as delegates to the Ala. State Convention in December, 1860. He never had an opportunity of voting on the secession ordinance but would have voted against its ratification.

The Claim of William Perkins (-continued-)

The property taken for which this claim is filed, the horse, was taken in the daytime, by an officer of General Wilder's Command. Perkins does not know the name of the Officer but he knew him to be an officer by his uniform. The officer told him the horse was for the use of the Union Army. Perkins asked for a voucher, but the officer had no pen or ink and Perkins didn't have time to wait for it. He was moving North and the troops came to the place in Marshall County where he had stayed all night and took the horse. The troops were stationed at Woodville in Jackson County, Ala. about five or six miles away.

A Colonel at Paint Rock Station gave Perkins a pass to go North and told him that General Wilder was gathering up horses for the use of the Army and that he would get pay for his horse but up to this time he has never been paid.

Deposition of Charles H. Reynolds

Charles H. Reynolds is called to testify as to the loyalty of William Perkins. He is about 37 years old and lives in Marshall County, Ala. He came to Marshall Co. in 1860, lived here until 1868, left the state and returned in 1875. He is a farmer.

He is not related to William Perkins and has no interest in the claim. He has known Perkins since 1860 and lived within two or three miles from him up to the time he left the state and went North.

Reynolds did discuss Perkins' opposition to the war and that it would be the ruin of the Country. Once Reynolds went with some Confederate Cavalry to his house at which time he said he was opposed to the war. A. T. Hamilton was present one time when they conversed about the war.

Reynolds testified that Perkins fed men who were laying out to keep out of the Confederate Army. Perkins refused to go into the army or to allow his boys to go as long as he could prevent it.

Reynolds states that the public reputation of Perkins' loyalty to the Union is well known. He has heard O. L. Sims, M. Putman and others, Riley Cagle and Peter Reynolds speak of his loyalty to the Union. Joseph Light could also testify to his loyalty. Reynolds states that he, Reynolds, was not an adherent to the Union cause. He was with a Cavalry unit who threatened to hang Perkins for feeding layouts and talking for the Union.

Deposition of Riley Cagle

Riley Cagle is called to testify as to the loyalty of William Perkins. He is going on 46 years old, has lived in Marshall County about 30 years and is a farmer. He has no relation to William Perkins and is not interested in the claim in any way.

He lived within three or three and a half miles of him up to the time he left the state. He often heard Perkins talk "a heap" about it and how he was very much opposed to the war. He does not remember if anyone else was present because at that time Union men had to be very cautious as to whom they talked to.

Perkins' loyalty to the Union was evidenced by the fact that he kept his sons out of the Confederate Army as long as he could. He had one son to quit the Confederate service and go north with him to keep out of the War.

Cagle testified that Perkins' public reputation for loyalty was good. He has heard Joseph Light, Sr., Joseph Light, Jr. and Martin Putman speak of his loyalty to the Union.

Cagle testified that he left his home and went north to keep out of the Confederate service and always advocated the cause of the Union.

Deposition of James P. Morrow

James P. Morrow is called to testify as to the loyalty of William Perkins. He will be 31 years old in Sept. next, has lived in Marshall County all of his life except nearly four years during the war. He is a farmer.

He is a cousin to William Perkins but is not interested in the claim in any manner. He has known Perkins all of his life but has been more intimately acquainted with him since than before the war.

Morrow testified that Perkins' public reputation for loyalty to the Union was good and related the story of his having helped a family across the line. Other people loyal to the Union who might testify were Gray Williams and a family of Collins. Morrow, himself, was loyal to the Union and was seen in the North by Perkins. They also rode the same train to Nashville.

William B. Perkins is called to testify as to the taking of property. He will be 27 years old in November next, has lived in Marshall County, Alabama all of his life except for three or four years. He is a farmer.

William B. Perkins is the son of the claimant, William Perkins, and is not interested in the claim. He was present when the horse was taken. It was taken in the day time. It was a bay, medium size and worth one hundred and fifty dollars in good money.

A complaint was made about the property being taken, but he cannot give the name, rank or regiment to which the officer belonged. He does not know if a voucher or receipt were asked for. The troops who took the horse were encamped a few miles from where the horse was taken near Cobbs Mill, Marshall County and said they were out collecting horses to mount some of Genl. Wilder's men.

Joseph Perkins is called to testify as to the taking of property. He is 28 years old, has lived in Marshall County, Alabama all of his life except about 4 years. He is a farmer.

Joseph Perkins is the son of the claimant, William Perkins, and is not interested in the claim. He was present when the horse was taken. It was taken in the day time and was taken publicly. It was a bay horse in tolerable good condition, about 8 years old, worth about one hundred and fifty dollars in U. S. currency.

His father complained about the horse being taken, but the officer stated that he had orders to take it for the use of the Army and refused to give up the horse. Receipts were asked for but they had no pen, ink or paper to write with.

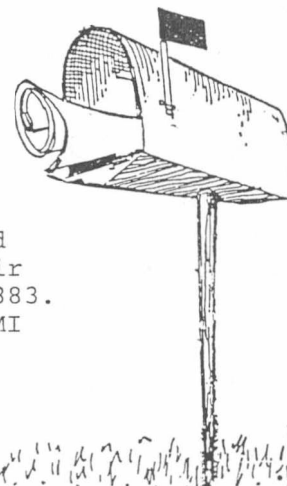
