

DESHLER FEMALE INSTITUTE, AN EXAMPLE OF FEMALE EDUCATION IN ALABAMA 1874-1918, by Richard C. Sheridan, 6 x 9, hardbound, 111 pages including full name index and photographs. May be purchased from the author at 105 Terrace Street, Sheffield, Alabama 35660, \$12.50 postpaid.

This work details the life of a non-sectarian college for the education of white females from opening day, "The Second Monday in September, 1874" to the final years, 1909 to 1918. Deshler was founded in 1874 as the result of a bequest of Major David Deshler and was so named in his memory. Complete school rolls are given for the years 1904 through 1908. Deshler was located in Tuscumbia, Alabama.

WILLIAM SIMMONS OF WAYNE COUNTY, TENNESSEE AND DESCENDANTS, by Jack Simmons Jenkins, Colonel, US Air Force, Ret., 421 Fenwick Drive, San Antonio, Texas 78239, 8½ x 11½, hardbound, 96 pages, price not given.

This family history tells the story of William Simmons, son of John and Jane Simmons, Franklin County, Tennessee, who married Sarah Hagood in 1814 in Franklin County, Tennessee. William and Sarah had eleven children and each child and his/her descendants are listed in order.

GREENBERRY JENKINS OF CHEROKEE COUNTY, TEXAS, HIS ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS, Revised Edition, by Jack S. Jenkins, Colonel, US Air Force, Ret., 421 Fenwick Drive, San Antonio, Texas, 78239, 8½ x 11½, vii + 243 pages, hardbound, price not given.

The first section of this genealogy of the Jenkins family begins with Richard Jenkins of Pendleton District, South Carolina, and then Richard's son, Lewis Jenkins, who migrated to Morgan County, Alabama, and Lewis's son, Greenberry Jenkins.

Greenberry Jenkins and his parents came from Tennessee into Morgan County, Alabama in the early part of the nineteenth century. Greenberry then moved to Walker County, Alabama, then to Cherokee County, Texas in January, 1841. The second part of this book deals with Greenberry's early years in Texas and his descendants. Related families are Bailey, Evans, Harris, Hornbuckle and Medford. Especially interesting are the eight (8) old letters, dated from June 24, 1848 to April, 1859, from the Alabama kin to Greenberry. There are also photographs and a full name index. Colonel Jenkins is to be congratulated on a well-written, well-documented family history.

The earliest Will Book in Colbert County is Book "A" which is from July 22, 1867 to May 11, 1903. This series began in Volume 19 and is continued from Volume 22, Number 1. Abstracted from photocopies by Dorothy Scott Johnson.

p. 295-297 ANN ELIZA STEENSON

Dated 8 Nov. 1888 Probated 28 Jan. 1896

...being of sound mind and memory...pay all debts...

To my son, Alphonso L. Steenson, 60 acres off the north part of the NW/4 and SW/4 of Sec. 17-3-10W and lying on the south bank of the Tennessee River on which is situated a water grist mill and cotton gin and known as the lower mill; also two acres out of the SW/4 of Sec. 17-3-10W embracing the dwelling house he built at his own expense.

To my son, Turner J. Steenson, two unimproved acres to be carved out of the SW/4 of Sec. 17-3-10W in the location of his choice.

To my sons Alphonso L. Steenson and Turner J. Steenson to have, jointly, the balance of the SW/4 of Sec. 17-3-10W on which is situated a grist mill. Both sons to have free access to the spring and neither shall bar the other from it.

If either of my sons die without issue his share to go to the survivor. If both sons die without issue then their share to go to my daughter, Della C. Little and her children except the 60 acres devised to Alphonso L. Steenson above.

The balance of my real estate and personal property to be sold and divided equally between my three children.

I appoint Alphonso L. Steenson executor.

p. 297-300 MARY A. F. CROSS

Dated 15 Dec. 1894, Cherokee, Colbert Co. Ala. Probated 1 Sept. 1896

MARY A. F. CROSS (continued)

...of sound and disposing mind and memory...pay just debts and funeral expense...

To my son, B. J. Cross, my dwelling house with 25 acres in the northern part of Section 36-3-14W.

To my children, Mrs. A. R. Lile, B. J. Cross, and W. C. Cross, the right to use any timber or wood "for fuel or other purposes upon their farms" from any timber land I own and hereafter leave in trust as an educational fund for my grandchildren.

To the trustees of the Cherokee School house the one acre lot on which the school stands and more if my son, B. J. Cross, thinks advisable. I direct B. J. Cross to stand liable for a balance due on a note held by Mrs. A. R. Lile against the school trustees.

Considering the great importance of education, the rest of my estate both real and personal is to go to my son, B. J. Cross, in trust, using the proceeds to educate my grandchildren:

Willis Cross Clement Cross Anne Cross Burne Cross, the children of my son W. L. Cross

Minnie Lile, child of my daughter Amanda R. Lile

James S. Cross
Ben Harris Cross
Mary Ann Cross
Adam Sherrod Cross, the children of my son, B. J. Cross

This is not to be construed to prevent the older children or those further advanced from receiving their share first or out of the first income provided there is left enough to educate the rest. After all are educated the balance to be equally divided among my grandchildren.

I appoint my son, B. J. Cross, executor.

Dated 27 Aug. 1896 Probated 26 Jan 1897

ARTHER H. KELLER (continued)

...of sound mind and disposing memory but now confined to my bed by sickness...

At my death all my property of every kind and nature to be taken by my beloved wife, Katie A. Keller, managed by her for five years. She is to pay my just debts. I owe the estate of John P. Spaulding of Boston, Mass. about \$7000 due in June 1897 and secured by certain of my lands.

I have two life insurance policies for \$2000 each, one payable to my wife and the other to my two sons, James Keller and Simpson Keller. When collected, these amounts to be immediately applied to indebtedness to Spaulding.

For five years my property to be used for support and maintenance of my wife and children as well as for payment of debt. After payment of my debts, at the death of my wife or if my sons, James or Simpson should ask for a division then my estate to be divided into six equal parts (except the Hyde store). My wife to have one part and one part to go to each of my children. My wife to hold the shares of my three youngest children until they come of age.

To my wife, Katie A. Keller, the lot and store in Tuscumbia known as the Hyde Store in discharge and payment of \$3500 of her money used by me in payment of my debts.

To my dear sister, Evaline H. Keller, "who has been a mother to me and my children," during her lifetime, her present home or she may make her home with my family "as may best suit her comfort and have and receive the same kind treatment and attention during her life which was shown her in my life."

I appoint my wife executrix without bond.

Dated 14 Feb. 1868 Probated 10 May 1897

...I, Hannah W. Rutland, wife of John W. Rutland...being possessed of an estate and being in good health and of sound and disposing mind and memory...

To my two nieces, Ellen A. Scruggs, wife of Nathan H. Scruggs, and Margaret F. Pride, wife of Goodloe Pride, land in Section

HANNAH M. RUTLAND (continued)

13-4-13W free of control, debts or liabilities of their husbands.

If my husband, John W. Rutland, survives me then he is to remain in undisturbed occupancy of the home place during his natural life being the land conveyed to me by John W. Rutland by deed to Arthur C. Barton, trustee, for my sole use and benefit, dated 14 Feb. 1868.

To my two nieces, Ann M. Rutland and Lucy Alice Rutland, daughters of John W. Rutland, after the death of my husband, the home place being the land conveyed to Arthur C. Barton, in trust. Also, they are to have the balance of my estate out of which all debts against my estate are to be paid.

I appoint Arthur B. Rutland and Nathan H. Scruggs, executors without bond.

"I have no wife living and have but two children living, to wit: Susie E. Shaller, wife of Dr. J. M. Shaller who is my oldest daughter, and Annie Lee Moore, my youngest daughter living. I have three nephews living in the state of Mississippi, they are the children of my sister Adaline Deavonns who died at Iuka in the state of Mississippi some years ago; the names of my said nephews are William Deavonns, Jerome Deavonns and Stone Deavonns."

To my two daughters, Susie E. Shaller and Annie L. Moore, equally, all my property consisting of lots in Sheffield and Tuscumbia, bonds, notes, mortgages, stocks, law books, literary books, money, household furniture and all other property.

I have heretofore advanced to my daughter, Susie E. Shaller, \$5000 which is to be charged against her in the settlement.

Said daughters to have the property with right of survivorship

unless there are children and in that case the children of the deceased daughter is to receive her share.

If both my daughters die without issue then all my property is to go to my three nephews, equally, children of my sister, Adaline.

Bresler, Samuel Bresler, Calia Bresler, Sophia Bresler, Mamie Bresler, the house and lot on 6th St. in Tuscumbia where I now reside, known as the home place; the house and lot in Tuscumbia on corner of 6th and Dickson Streets and known as the old store house; lot with buildings in Tuscumbia on corner of 6th and Dickson (opposite the store house) known as the horse lot; the land about $5\frac{1}{2}$ miles south of Tuscumbia on Russellville Road known as the mountain home; Tuscumbia; and any and all property I am now or may become entitled to from the estate of my mother or father in Detroit, Michigan.

To my son, Jacques Bresler, \$5.00.

I appoint my beloved husband, Abraham Bresler, executor, w/o bond.

My executors to "liberally and in plenty" support my wife, Nancy Gargis, during her lifetime and at her death she is to be properly buried "in the burial ground to be hereinafter designated."

The following, in order, are my heirs born in lawful wedlock by my wife, Nancy Gargis:

- 1. John Gargis, now decd., who if living would be about 45 years old
- 2. William Gargis, aged about 43
- 3. Merideth Gargis, aged about 41
- 4. Henry Gargis, Jr., aged about 39
- 5. Miranda Gargis (late wife of William Jones) now deceased, if living would be about 36 years
- 6. King Gargis, aged about 30
- 7. Nancy Gargis, now the wife of Charles M. Whittock, aged about 25

My executors to bury me in a proper manner in the burial ground that I hereinafter designate so as to be recognized at all times.

My executors to pay all debts and funeral expenses.

To my daughter, Nancy Whittock, \$500.00

Executors to have special care of the six orphan children (4 sons & 2 daughters) of my son, John Gargis, lately deceased, and supply their wants in emergencies until they each come of age. When they come of age each is to receive \$5.00 from my estate.

To my son's widow, who has remarried to James Hawkins and left the country, her present address unknown to me, I cut her off with \$1.00 upon her renouncing all claim to my estate.

My executors to have special care of the orphan children of my daughter, Miranda, decd., late wife of William Jones, said orphans consisting of one son and 3 daughters. They are to be shown same consideration as the orphans of my son John and at their full age are to each receive \$5.00.

After paying debts and legacies, my executors to have \$100.00 for their services. They are then to "Make a final settlement with each other and myoother sons and when said settlement is made that they deed the land and divide the assets equally and with strict corticy (courtesy) with each other..."

Schedule 1 includes the white population with heads of household listed by name and other members by sex and age categories. Soldiers in the war ending in 1865 were enumerated by number if they were killed in battle, died of sickness or were disabled by wounds. The number of insane, epileptic or idiotic in each household were also enumerated. We numbered each line of Schedule 1 of the census in order to identify each entry; they were not numbered in this manner on the original. There were approximately 49 lines on each page of the original census. Thos. C. Irion was the census taker for the first 890 entries, consuming 19 pages. Beginning with number 891 on page 20, W. 1907 CONFEDERATE CENSUS

The Alabama Legislature passed an act requiring that a Census of all Confederate Soldiers be taken in 1907. This was to include all veterans of the Civil War who had fought for the Confederacy and who were presently living in the State of Alabama regardless of where they had served or from what state they had served. It was the duty of the Probate Judge in each county to secure the information and to send a copy of it to the State.

Each veteran was to fill out the affidavit stating his residence, date and place of birth, and to give a brief statement as to his military service. This information was transferred from the original affidavit to ledgers in alphabetical, or semi-alphabetical, order by the soldier's last name. Some of the affidavits were returned after the ledger was made up and those will be found at the end of the ledger out of alphabetical order. The original ledgers are housed in the Probate Judge's Office of each County and the copies are now in the Alabama Dept. of Archives and History, Military Division. The material used in Valley Leaves was taken from microfilm copies of the ledgers in the Archives and was abstracted by Janet Baker Burks of Tyler, Texas. The number preceeding each name is the number of that person as it appears in the ledger. Continued from Volume 22, No. 1.

CHARACTER SKETCHES

(17th Installment)

These character sketches were written by Prof. Charles Gibson Lynch and carried in The Moulton Advertiser in 1911. The sketches were provided to T. V. G. S. by Spencer A. Waters, Moulton, Ala., now deceased, who collected, typed, and edited them for their genealogical value. Past editors of "Valley Leaves" have attempted to locate the 1911 editions of The Moulton Advertiser which were supposedly in the Alabama State Archives in Montgomery. The Archives has been unable to locate the issues in question. The series began in "Valley Leaves" in Volume 12, No. 4, June 1978, and appeared last in Volume 22, No. 1, September 1987.

October 11, 1911 ROBERT BYARS

Robert Byars was born Jan. 29, 1819 in McMinn Co., Tenn. When about seventeen years of age, his father moved to Lawrence Co., Ala. and settled near Red Hill, about 6 miles east of Moulton.

His father's name was Nathan and his mother was Miss Elizabeth Womack.

Robert Byars had but the most meagre of school advantages and when we see the work he did and the land he owned, we ask, "What could a boy of the same pluck and energy, with the advantages of today, do if he only tried?" Robert Byars was inured to all kinds of hard work, which boys of that day had to do. His days at school numbered 17. Compare those to that of his son, and to those given to his grandsons.

Robert Byars married Lucinda DeVault, Sept. 18, 1839, near Decatur, Ala. After this marriage, he located about one mile east of Morris Chapel, where he lived ten years. Here their son, James Napoleon, was born March 21, 1845. Here his wife died June 27, 1847. In 1849 he moved to the Eyster place, 5 miles east of Moulton.

His second wife was Mrs. Elizabeth S. Leeper, the widow of Frank Leeper. Here was born George Ann, who married W. T. Brown, moved to Texas, and died in California in 1896.

From the Eyster place he moved to a place on the Oakville and Courtland Road, about 7 miles NE of Moulton. In 1858 he moved to the place where his son, J. N. Byars now lives and where he died, March 23, 1882.

Robert Byars was a plain, industrious man, but like all others of his kind, who did something - he economized - sent his children to school to the greatest teacher of them all, Prof. Z. F. Freeman, and the Byarses are making good in the battle of life in old Lawrence County.

James Napoleon Byars married Mrs. Ann E. Brooks, nee Moody, Nov. 13, 1866. He has lived continuously at his present home all his life. He was educated in the private schools in his neighborhood and at Moulton under the instruction of Prof. Daniel Green Johnson and Prof. Z. F. Freeman. He has been a most successful farmer, attended strictly to his own business, and the landed estate given him by his father has been added to till 1840 acres of Lawrence County land are his.

Nine children have been born to Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Byars. Of these, four, John, Edward Bolivar, Christopher Columbus, and Virgil are dead.

Farris, who married Addie Burch, lives near his father's place. He has taught school for a great deal of the time, but is now giving his attention to farming, and I am glad to learn that he is successful.

Robert Byars married Lillie Vaughan and lives in Moulton, where he is engaged in the mercantile business. He was Circuit Clerk of Lawrence county for six years and made an efficient officer. He taught school very successfully for several years.

Farris and Robert were our students, and we watched their course in life with great interest, as we do all others who studied under us.

Emmett Byars married Nettie Aldridge and lives on the Cole Place. He is a promising young Christian minister, and a life of usefulness looms up before him. May he continue to grow in wisdom.

W. Lorenzo is living with his dear parents and following the noblest of all callings -- farming.

Albert S. is in the drug business at Moulton, and his deportment is worthy of emulation by all the world.

James N. Byars and his devoted wife are still living, happy and contented in their rural home, surrounded by plenty. Their home is Mecca to which their children and grandchildren go, flooding their hearts with pleasure.

What a beautiful picture: a man and woman marry, buy for themselves a home and build a house, toil for years, raise a large family, train their children to work and give them a good education, see them married happily and settled around them.

Jim, we were school boys together, sat at the feet of the same great teacher, who (was) the inspiration to be and do something. May your tribe continue to increase. May the rest of your life be filled with happiness-your heart with love, kindness and gentleness; may your children do all they can to make the remaining days of you and your wife, all that you could ask for.

October 18, 1911 THE WEAR FAMILY

On the 20th of June, 1814, near the little village of Morganton, Blount Co. Tennessee, Gilbert Wear was born.

Two years before in 1812, Miss Angelna Strain was born. In the fall of 1832, these persons boarded a boat on the Little Tennessee, and as they drifted down the stream they were married.

They landed at Decatur, Alabama and went out into the country and

began life's hard battle. In the early part of 1833, they moved to near Mt. Hope, Ala. and Mr. Wear hired himself to Mr. Samuel Gill who lived on the Blalock Place.

It meant something in those days to fell the mighty forest and to prepare the land for cultivation, and Gilbert M. Wear took off his coat, rolled up his sleeves, and did his part, poor as he was, to help lay the foundation of civilization of the great county of Lawrence.

In the fall of 1833 he purchased from a Mr. Simpson, a quarter section of land on the Mt. Hope and Moulton road, on Town Creek, where he spent his entire life, except from 1854 to 1857, when he lived at LaGrange, where he went to place his children in that great institution of learning, LaGrange College. In those days good institutions of learning were scarce and among the best was this school and thither many went to have their children prepared for life. This college was destroyed by that beast of destruction, the Civil War, and Capt. A. A. McGregor worked faithfully to have the United States Government pay for this act of vandalism.

On August 27, 1854, Mrs. Wear died, and the father resolved that his mother-less children should be prepared for life's battles. No wonder many, if not all of his children learned something while under the teaching of such men as Prof. John C. Stephenson. This grand old man who left his imprint, so powerfully for good, moved to Mt. Hope, and he and the citizens there built the John C. Stephenson schoolhouse of hewn logs, where boys and girls were gathered and tutored, many of whom have been prominent in various walks of life.

The first family of Gilbert M. Wear and wife consisted of nine children.

The oldest was James H. Wear, who won distinction during the Civil War as Capt. of Co. A, 4th Alabama Cavalry. Capt. Wear married Miss P. M. Nicholson. They raised a family of nine children, five boys and four girls. Four of the boys and two of the girls still living. Two of the boys are ministers of the Baptist Church.

All persons mentioned in these minutes were residents of Limestone County unless so stated. Daniel Coleman was the Judge from the beginning of the minutes through May 2, 1829 and on May 26, 1829 William J. Mason became the presiding Judge.

This is not the earliest Orphans Court Minute Book in Limestone County. At least one book prior to this one is in the Limestone County Archives.

To fully understand these minutes there are some facts you should know. When an estate was ready to be appraised the Judge usually appointed five men as appraisers, or commissioners. It was only necessary that a majority, or three of these commissioners, do the actual appraisal.

When an estate or guardianship was ready for final settlement the administrator or guardian submitted his final accounts and vouchers to the Judge and asked that the case be settled. The law required that a notice of this intent be published for a certain length of time in a local newspaper or a newspaper "in the State of Alabama." The Judge set the date of the hearing on the settlement and at that time anyone interested in the case in any manner could appear and let his wishes or complaints be heard. Too, if any of the heirs lived outside the State of Alabama the Judge usually asked that publication be made if a petition was filed to sell the real estate, slaves or other property.

ORPHANS COURT REGISTER 1 1818-1873 (Part 10)

The Morgan County Orphans Court Register 2 from 1818 to 1827 was carried in "Valley Leaves" in Volume 7 (Sept. 1972 through June 1973). While Register 2 dealt with estate matters, Register 1 deals with the laying out of the road system in Morgan (originally Cotaco) County, apprenticeships, tax levies, Revolutionary War Pension Claims, and other matters that could easily fall in a "miscellaneous" category. In the later years this book was used primarily to record cattle brand registrations. This book contains a fascinating accumulation of facts and it is probable that names will appear in this volume that may not appear in other Morgan County records. This series began in Volume 19, Number 3, March 1985 and is continued from Volume 22, Number 1, September 1987.

Page 118 William Priddy obtained a Writ of Adquoa Dammus (making inquiry to what damage a specified act, if done, will cause) from the Clerk's Office on 3rd day of December 1821 (returnable to the January term 1822) setting forth that he owns the SE/4 Sect 21 T6 R4W upon which he wishes to build a mill and other useful water works. The Writ has been executed and returned according to law. It is considered by the Court that summons issue to all interested proprietors and tenants to appear in Court on the 2nd Monday in July to show cause, if any, why Priddy should not have leave to build his mill and dam.

Stephen Heard comes into Court as a subscribing witness to a Bill of Sale from Thomas Johnson to Presley Rector for a certain Negro girl named Charity. Stephen Heard testifies that he saw Johnson sign and acknowledge the sale.

Court adjourned until tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

Page 119 Tuesday morning, January 15, 1822.
