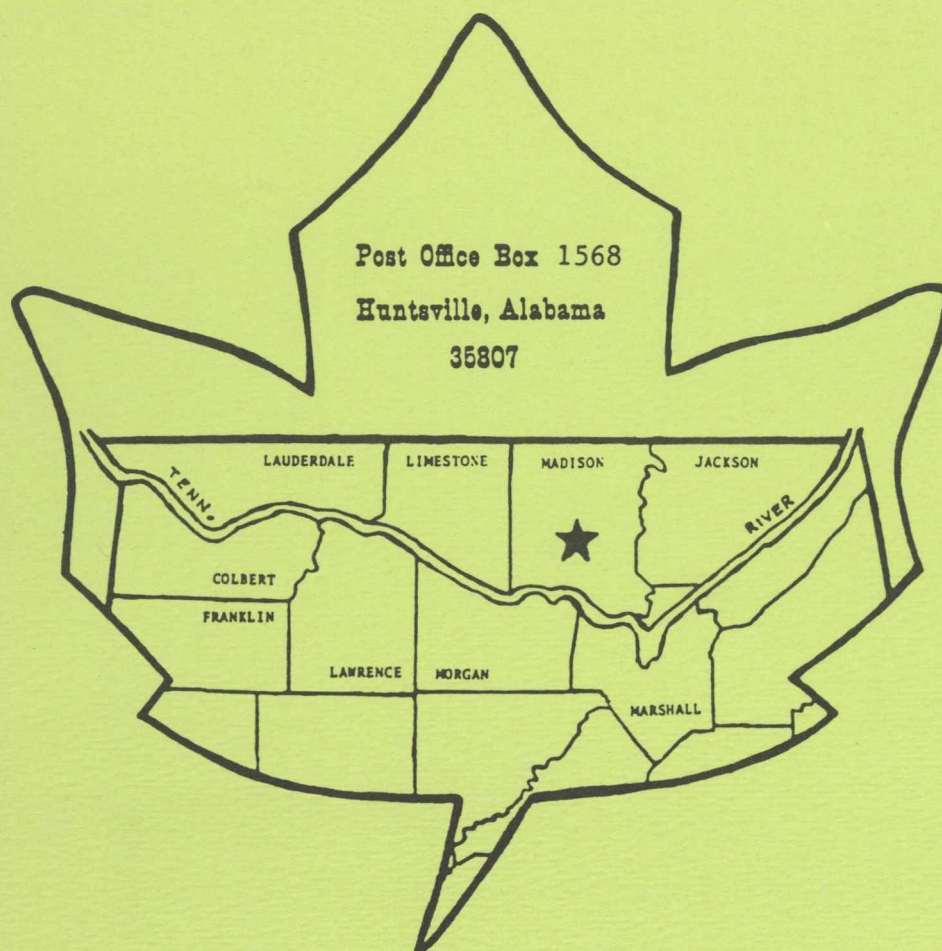

LIMESTONE COUNTY MARRIAGE BOOK 1832-1862. Edited by Philip Reyer and published by the Limestone County Historical Society and the Limestone County Archives, P. O. Box 82, Athens, Alabama 35611. Spiral bound, soft cover, 8½" x 11", full name index for both brides and grooms, \$12.00.

"The Marriage Book of Limestone County 1832-1862" is the earliest existing record of marriages other than those performed by Rev. Robert Donnell between 1813-1830. The entries are listed chronologically and give the marriage license number, name of groom and bride, date of issue of license, date marriage was solemnized, name of person performing the ceremony and, in some instances, where the marriage was performed.

This is an excellent resource for Limestone County researchers.

ABSTRACTS OF THE SMITH COUNTY PROBATE RECORDS, SMITH COUNTY, TEXAS, 1846-1880. Abstracted by Andrew L. Leath and published by the Jack T. Greer Memorial Trust Fund of the Smith County Historical Society/Historical Commission, Tyler, Texas. 8½" x 11", soft bound, 177 pages including a full name index. Order from Smith County Historical Society, 125 South College, Tyler, Texas 75702. \$16.00.

This volume attempts to abstract every probate case in Smith County, Texas between the county's organization in 1846 until 1880. The cases are presented in approximate chronological order. Four types of cases are abstracted in this book (1) wills; (2) administrations; (3) community property and (4) guardianships. The deceased, widows or widowers, minors and heirs are named as well as administrators, appraisers and witnesses.

These early records are obviously very useful for family researchers.

LIPHAM'S OLD-YOUNG AND IN-BETWEEN, compiled and edited by Clarice S. Cox, Carrollton, Georgia, 1987. 8½" x 11", spiral bound, 143 pages including a full name index. This book is now out-of-print; however, if you are interested in a copy please contact Sue Bright Richter, 125 Scenic Drive, Madison, Alabama 35758.

It is assumed that the four Lipham men from South Carolina, Frederick, Moses, Abraham and Daniel, who fought in the Revolutionary War were brothers. Of these four Revolutionary War soldiers only Daniel remained in South Carolina. The other three Liphams received Headright and Bounty Land Grants in Georgia and were in Georgia before 1790. Daniel Lipham's will in Union County, South Carolina in 1829 names nieces and nephews in Georgia as heirs.

Copies of audited accounts of the four Liphams during Revolutionary service are included as well as numerous family photographs.

This book was given to our library by Sue Bright Richter.

PITTS AND WRIGHT FAMILY HISTORY, compiled by Sidney A. Pitts, 4720 Mulberry, Woodward, Oklahoma 73801, 8½" x 11", looseleaf notebook.

This genealogy begins with Pittman Pitts who was born in Virginia in 1784, married Mary C. Andrews in Lunenburg County, Virginia in 1807 and died 14 January, 1855 in Tishomingo County, Mississippi. Pittman and Mary C. (Andrews) Pitts had five children; Elizabeth Pitts born 5 August, 1809 in Virginia; Younger Pitts born 6 March, 1812 in Virginia; Benjamin Franklin Pitts born 17 January, 1816 in Virginia, William C. Pitts born 6 March, 1826 in Alabama; and John P. Pitts born 8 April, 1830 in Alabama.

This book, compiled by Sidney A. Pitts, a great-great grandson of Pittman Pitts, traces the Pitts family from Virginia to Alabama to Mississippi to Texas and Oklahoma. Sidney A. Pitts is the son of N. T. Pitts and Elizabeth Wright who were married 24 November, 1895 in Jack County, Texas. Many relatives of Sidney A. Pitts have contributed interesting narrative histories of their families and many photographs of family members.

CAPTAIN YOUNG'S GUARD COMPANY

NITRE & MINING DISTRICT #9

At the beginning of the War between the States, the Confederacy lacked many of the most basic requirements for carrying on an armed struggle. In fact, the South had barely enough gunpowder in early 1861 to allow for even a few weeks of limited fighting. To overcome this crippling handicap, the Confederate government established a Nitre and Mining Bureau to oversee the operation of saltpeter works throughout the South. Northern Alabama came under Nitre and Mining District 9, supervised by Captain William Gabbett. On December 26, 1862, after the Union army had withdrawn from North Alabama following six months of destructive occupation, Gabbett enlisted a company of guards to protect his saltpeter works from raiding Union cavalry. Named commander of the company was a veteran of the war in Virginia, Captain James H. Young.

James Young had been one of the first men to volunteer in Jackson County. A native of Kentucky, Young was 36 years old when he was elected first lieutenant of the "Larkinsville Guards" on April 27, 1861. The Guards were soon mustered into the Confederate army, and became Company K of the 4th Alabama Infantry Regiment. On July 21, 1861, the 4th Alabama was the only unit from the state to fight in the war's first major engagement, the Battle of Manassas. Among those slain was Company K's commander, 41-year-old Captain Lewis E. Lindsay. Lieutenant Young was promoted to take his place.

James H. Young left the army at the end of his one year enlistment and returned home to Jackson County. Seven months later, on December 26, 1862, he re-entered the service as captain of the company raised at Larkinsville "for the defense of Nitre and Mining District No. 9."

Captain Young's guard company operated primarily in the area around Larkinsville. "The Company has been variously engaged since its organization," reads the unit's history for the period through September 15, 1863, "arresting deserters, gathering conscripts and guarding the different nitre works embraced in the district; besides rendering a considerable amount of service as detailed laborers at the aforesaid works." Headquarters was located at Larkinsville until April 13, 1863, when it was moved to the Sauta Cave nitre works in Jackson County. The company "remained on duty until the time of the evacuation of North

Alabama by the Confederate forces under the command of Gen. Braxton Bragg, at which time it rendered valuable assistance in guarding and removing Government stores and laborers to the south of the Tennessee river."

During the latter part of 1863, Young's company "was divided into squads to guard the various nitre works in North Alabama. They have also captured many deserters, and rendered considerable service to the Conscript Bureau. The stores of subsistence and ordnance in their charge has been guarded with diligence." The headquarters by then had been transferred across the river to Guntersville, "where they assist in picketing the Tennessee river, guarding prisoners, etc., in conjunction with the details of the Conscript Bureau."

The cooperation of Captain Young's company with the Conscript Bureau is somewhat ironic, since many of Young's men appear to have enlisted only to avoid being drafted themselves. The saltpeter mines became a haven for those who wished to avoid more hazardous war service far from home. Once the Union army had returned to North Alabama in the fall of 1863, the guard company slowly began to disintegrate. With the Union army occupying the northern bank of the Tennessee, those who chose to desert could do so with little fear of being punished. Many were lured by the excitement offered by service in the partisan ranger battalion led by Colonel Lemuel G. Mead. Others simply went home and took no further part in the war.

Not surprisingly, Captain Young became dissatisfied with the situation. On February 1, 1864, he wrote to Superintendent Gabbett. "The time having arrived," he said, "when every man in the Confederacy should do his whole duty to drive back the invaders of our land, and believing that I could render more efficient service to the cause in the field than in the position that I now occupy, I would most respectfully offer my resignation as captain of the company raised under Official Order No. 235, A & I Genl. Office, bearing date of Dec. 5, 1862." Presumably, 1st Lieutenant "Pete" Whitecotton assumed command of what remained of the Company and acted as captain until he was killed in action near Guntersville one year later.

ACTS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF ALABAMA
1862

1862 - p. 190 - No. 199

AN ACT

For the relief of A. A. Grider, and others, Tax Collectors in their respective counties.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Alabama in General Assembly convened, That A. A. Grider, tax collector of Jackson county, shall have until the first day of March, 1863, to make final settlement of his accounts as such tax collector, with the comptroller of public accounts: Provided, that he shall first obtain the written consent of the securities on his official bond, for such extension, and file the same in the office of the comptroller of public accounts, before this act shall take effect.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That the provisions of this act are hereby extended to William R. Day, tax collector of Madison county; Thomas Hines, tax collector of Limestone county; Thomas M. Phillips, tax collector of Lauderdale county; F. M. Calloway, tax collector of Morgan county; John Clack, tax collector of Marshall county; William Hulsy, tax collector of Walker county; N. Allman, tax collector of Lawrence county: Provided, that the said several tax collectors above named, in their respective counties, shall obtain the written consent of their securities on their official bonds, for such extension, and file the same in the office of the comptroller of public accounts before this act shall take effect.

1st Resolved, that in our intercourse and acquaintance with Capt. Robinson, while at the bar, we recognised in him the able lawyer, the upright citizen and the courteous gentleman.

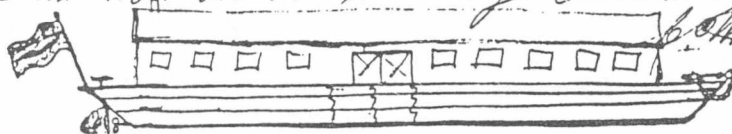

A warrant was issued for Garmon's arrest on 4 June 1840. On 7 July 1840 Deputy Sheriff William T. Todd arrested Garmon. Garmon posted bond in the amount of \$250 with John Cole his security on 7 July 1840.

At a court held in Marshall County on the 4th Monday in September 1840, Wright Gamon pleaded Not Guilty whereupon a trial by jury was held. The jury, consisting of John L. Downs and eleven others (not named) found Gamon guilty and assessed his fine to \$5.00. He was assessed the \$5. plus court costs.

Circuit Court Grand Jury Records (-continued-)

A warrant was issued for the arrest of Ashley and Collins on 4 June 1840. Ashley was arrested 6 July 1840 and Collins was arrested 1 August 1840 by William T. Todd, the deputy to Joel Higgins, Sheriff.

On 6 July 1840 Ashley posted a \$250 bond with William T. Todd and James M. Adams as his bondsmen.

Frederick Collins was arrested 1 August 1840 and posted bond on the same day in the amount of \$250 with John W. Brown and John Still his securities. The bond was signed by John Still and by Collins and Brown by their marks.

At a court held on the 4th Monday in September 1840 both men pleaded guilty. A jury including John D. Barclay and eleven others (not named) assessed the fine of One Cent each. The judge further assessed costs of this case. William M. Griffin acknowledged himself security for the fine and costs of Frederick Collins. John Ashley acknowledged himself security for the fine and costs of William Ashley.

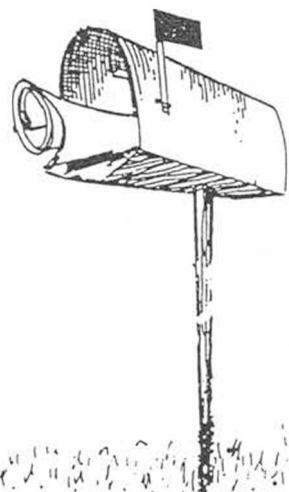

I am trying to trace the ancestry of my paternal grandmother, Catherine Alice Murphy Owen, who was b in Leake City, MS on 29 Apr 1856.
