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Jackson County Old Store Records

Compiled by the late Addie Stovall Shaver Edited by Dorothy Scott Johnson

Addie Stovall Shaver, before her death, spent untold hours gathering and compiling information from old Jackson County records and newspapers. We are fortunate to be able to publish a portion of her extensive work in *Valley Leaves*. Her notes are written in first person, and she did not include the amount owed, nor the item that was purchased in the following store accounts. Mrs. Shaver passed away before she could put finishing touches on her work, but for researchers of family history, the list of names may serve to indicate that their ancestors were in Jackson County.

Addie Stovall Shaver's Notes:

The two stores I am going to concentrate on here are for the purpose of showing who lived in the area at the time. In many cases, it gives an account of the approximate death date of some of the customers.

Both stores were operating before the Civil War. One is in the Hollytree-Old Nashville [became Princeton] area and the other is on Larkin Fork. The Princeton-Hollytree store is a record of accounts and collections by administrators of estates.

The other store was located on Larkin's Fork and has accounts and lists of items bought by customers that are fascinating. Most people of today will not recognize the names of lots of items that were bought. It is not an estate settlement - just these accounts made before the Civil War.

The Princeton-Hollytree estate settlement will include most everyone in lower end of the Valley and some in the upper part.

The estate settlement is that of one A. L. Hyder. I will also include family information in the family histories.

The records were taken from courthouse will books and an old ledger. There is an inventory of the accounts and a supplementary inventory at a later date before the final estate settlement. R. C. Austin was administrator.

Adam L. Hyder

Adam L. Hyder was born in North Carolina but was in Paint Rock Valley by 1850. He is living in District 21, in the Swaim community, according to the 1850 Jackson County Census. He is listed as family No. 367 and is shown as follows:

Adam is listed here as a teacher. He was mentioned as teaching in an early subscription school in the area. It is one of the earliest schools on which we have found a record. The family is also shown on the 1860 census and by 1870, he is deceased. His wife, Catherine, and family was enumerated in Beat 17, household No. 39, as follows:

In the 1880 census there is a girl that may have been the youngest daughter of A. L.

Hyder. She is shown in family No. 193 as follows:

No. 27 Hattie Hiden [Probably Heder] age 17.

In the Hollytree-Mt. Nebo Cemetery there is a tombstone for Margaret Hyder:

In Memory of Margaret R. Hyder and an infant child of G. T. Hyder Born July 29th Died Oct. 3rd Aged 19 years, 2 Mo. and 4 days

There is also, in this cemetery, an old box tomb with a concrete top with the following inscription:

Sacred to the Memory of Martha E. Duckett Departed this life August 15, 1856 Aged 26 years, 6 Months and 21 days. A sinner saved by God

There is a Jackson County marriage as follows: Thomas Duckett to Martha A. Hyder, 26 February 1867 by R. H. Taliferro, M. G. This middle initial is picked up wrong somewhere, either in the census or the marriage record. I believe this Martha to be the daughter of R. L. Hyder.

What happened to the rest of the family is unknown. George could have gone west and taken his mother with him as many did.

Adam L. Hyder and Catherine Colyar married in Franklin County, Tennessee 6 June 1848 by L. D. Harwell. Catherine may have moved back to Franklin County, Tennessee.

1 Jan 1858: John N. Lust and others; note set off by note of \$200.72 made by intestate, A. L. Hyder, to ... & Larkin. [Ed: About two lines that are too dim to read.]

Bal of H. H. Harton & Co.: Two day books at \$2.25 each.

"The foregoing inventory was certified by R. C. Austin, Admr., before M. Brown, Judge of Probate on 31 July 1867."

You will note that this supplementary inventory was filed in July 1867 - just after the Civil War. It probably is not the *final* settlement which is undoubtedly in the Jackson County Courthouse. It is important to see who was in the Valley at the time. One of the most important aspects of this inventory is the names of those who died. Mrs. Hyder still owned the store in 1870.

Alex Clay was working in the store and boarding with Mrs. Hyder in 1870, according to the census. He then became postmaster at Princeton which was at the old Nashville settlement.

Dollar amounts were not always indicated on account records, for whatever reason, but for our purposes, it is the names which are important. (Editor's Note: there are many names that are repeated,

some with varying spellings. Those will be included since there is no way to know for sure which spelling is accurate.)

Madison County Lewellen Jones Estate

Contributed by Jacquelyn Procter Reeves

Revolutionary War veteran, Lewellen/Llewllyn Jones, came to the Territory of Alabama from Virginia, via Oglethorpe County, Georgia to buy large tracts of land. As a Captain in the Regiment of Dragoons, he was awarded 4,000 acres in what was known as the Dinwiddie tract. He sold his bounty warrant and came to the Mississippi/Alabama Territory. In Madison County, he bought property known as Avalon, now part of Research Park and the University of Alabama Huntsville and committed suicide by hanging himself in his home in January 1820. There were many twists and turns that followed the estate over the next 50 years. Some of the more interesting aspects of this case are found here.

Probate Record 2 Page 106

Will of Lewellen Jones - In the name of God amen. I Lewellen Jones of Madison County. Madison County, Alabama Territory being of sound mind, do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following, viz: to my beloved daughter Frances A. M. Perkins, I give and bequeath that tract of land lying on Spring Creek in Lawrence County, Alabama Territory, containing seven hundred and thirty four acres and twenty hundredths acres on which I have made one payment. That is, I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Frances A. M. Perkins all my right and title to the said tract of land not interacting to make any other payment on it. To her and the heirs of her body forever, furthermore, to my beloved daughter Frances A. M. Perkins I give and bequeath the sum of three thousand seven hundred and seventy seven dollars fifty cents to her and her heirs forever, and no more, having given her other valuable property in Negroes previous to this in the state of Virginia. After all my just debts are paid, I give and bequeath unto my two well beloved sons, John N. S. Jones and Alexander P. Jones to them and their heirs forever, all the remainder of my estate both real and personal, my land, monies, bonds, Negroes, plantation interests, horses, hogs, cattle, household and kitchen furniture to be equally divided between them, deducting two thousand dollars from the portion of my

eldest son John N. S. Jones, which I give and bequeath to my son, Alexander P. Jones, to him and his heirs forever. Lastly I do appoint my eldest son John N. S. Jones and ? Scruggs ? both of Madison County, Alabama Territory, executors of this my last will and testament. In writing whereof I have hereunto affixed my hand and seal this 20th day of October 1818. Signed and acknowledged in the presence of Benjamin W. Burford, William A. Powell, Henry Moore.

Alexander P. Jones, Planter, vs. John N. S. Jones, Benjamin Perkins and Frances Anna Maria Perkins, his wife, and Thomas Moore, and John Moore. Soujoner Noble and Richard Perkins, defendants.

On the 20th of October 1818, Orator's father, Llewellen Jones, now dec'd, being possessed of a large personal and real estate and three children vs. your Orator and John J. S. Jones, his sons and Frances Anna Maria married to Benjamin Perkins. He had previously given his daughter a full share of his estate, and whose husband had been

engaged in trade and failed for many thousands of dollars more than he was able to pay, and said Llewellen being unwilling any considerable part should come into the hands of said Benjamin, on that day made his will. At the time of making the will one Irby Jones was indebted to said Llewellen in the sum of \$8,000, being part of the money bequeathed by said Llewellen to his two sons. The debt, being in danger of being lost, Llewellen in order to make it secure, purchased from said Irby Jones the SE 1/4 of Sec. 32 and the SE and SW 1/4's of Sec. 33 T3 R1W. He wrote to John N. S. Jones two letters concerning this land, which were written from his then residence on the tract of land in Limestone County which he had purchased before the date of the will. Soon after the death of the said Llewellen in 1820, John N. S. Jones as one of the executors, paid the legacy of the wife of said Benjamin Perkins into the hands of said Perkins, and in the division the lands purchased from said Irby Jones were taken by Orator, but the creditors of said Perkins have levied on said lands.

Editor's Note: There is no record of when/where Lewellen's wife, Mary Anderson, whom he married October 22, 1792, died. After the death of Lewellen Jones, his two sons petitioned to have some of Lewellen's slaves freed. It has been assumed, though there is no evidence in writing, that perhaps some of the slaves were his children:

Section 1 Approved December 11, 1820 Emancipation of Slaves Belonging to Lewellen Jones

An Act to authorize John N. S. Jones and Alexander P. Jones to emancipate certain slaves therein named: Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Alabama in General Assembly convened, that John N. S. Jones and Volume 44, Issue 3 March 2010

Alexander P. Jones of the county of Madison, be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to manumit and set free a mulatto woman, named Elizabeth, aged forty years; a mulatto girl, named Evelina, aged thirteen years; a mulatto girl named Ann, aged six years; and a mulatto child, named Shandy, aged three years, so soon as the said John N. S. Jones, and Alexander P. Jones shall have executed to the Chief Justice of the county court of Madison county and his successors in office, a bond with sufficient security to be approved of by the County Court; conditioned, that the said slaves, Elizabeth, Evelina, Ann, and Shandy, or either of them shall never become chargeable to the state of Alabama or any Court or Town therein.

Editor's Note: John N. S. Jones inherited property in Limestone County and the plantation was developed and named Druid's Gove. Alexander Pinckney Jones inherited Madison County property that is now part of Research Park and University of Alabama Huntsville, along with two lots on what was then Fountain Row and other property in present-day Blossomwood area of Huntsville. Evidently, he had borrowed money from his brother John N. S. Jones, who died in 1853, and never paid either him or his estate what he owed.

A letter found in the Jones Family Files in the Heritage Room of the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library was written by someone who knew Alexander P. Jones. The letter described him as "a peculiar old botchler" who bought old horses and kept them until they died and would not sell slaves even if there was no work for them. He died intestate on November 22, 1865, having never married, and there were many legal issues regarding the settlement of his estate and sale of the plantation known as Avalon. The following records reveal those issues between his various nieces and nephews. Two of his nephews, cousins to each other, both argued to be the administrator of his estate.

State of Alabama To the honorable R. D. Wilson Probate Judge of Madison County State of Alabama December 6, 1865

The undersigned heirs and next of kin and allied to the late Alexander P. Jones deceased of said County of Madison, State of Alabama and heirs in part of said A. P. Jones and holding as heirs and legatees of the late J. N. S. Jones, deceased, certain wills dated respectively 1824 and 1828 constituting the said J. N. S. Jones deceased and his children the ? and sole beneficiaries and recipients of all the goods and chattels and Estate of the said Alexander P. Jones, signed sealed and respectively delivered to the said J. N. S. Jones by the said A. P. Jones and came into the possession of the Administrators of the said J. N. S. Jones, deceased, J. Haywood Jones and J. W. S. Donnell, which said papers have in consequence of the disturbed condition of the County been conveyed out of the County for safe keeping and not yet returned, now your petitioners in consideration of the above said promises respectfully petition your honor to appoint a special administrator for the estate of said A. P. Jones, deceased who departed this life on the 22nd November 1865 and whose estate requires the immediate concerted attention. Respectfully Submitted, December 6th, 1865.

court records. Irby Jones, a resident of Huntsville, owed money to Lewellen Jones and was unable to pay it. At the suggestion of his son, John Nelson Spotswood Jones, an attorney whose office became Alabama's first library, Lewellen Jones bought the Irby Jones place in order to resolve the debt, which was less than the price of the property.

This indenture made this 5th day of January 1820, between Irby Jones and Mary his wife of the one part and Lewellen Jones of the other part, all of the State of Alabama. Witnesseth: That the said Irby Jones and Mary his wife for and in consideration of the sum of \$18,742.00. Whereof they do hereby acknowledge have this day granted, ? and confirmed and by these presents do bargain sell. ? and confirm unto the said Lewellen Jones, his heirs and assigns forever the following tracts of parcels of land, Viz: One quarter section of land which was purchased by the said Irby Jones of I. Allison known in the plan of Madison County as the Northeast quarter section of section thirty two in township no. 3, range no. 1 of the basis meridian and two other quarter sections of lands purchased by the said Irby Jones of George Dilworth known in the plan of Madison County as the South East quarter section of section thirty three of township no. 3 and range no. one West of the basis meridian and Southwest guarter section of section no. 33 in township no. three and range no. one West of the basis meridian, together with all their appertenancies, improvements, tenements and heridatements thereunto belonging or in anywise appertaining. To have and to hold the said tracts or parcels of land to him the said Lewellen Jones his heirs and assigns forever. And the said Irby Jones and Mary his wife have relinquished and by these presents to do relinquish all their right title interest claim and demand in and to the said

tracts or parcels of lands both for themselves their heirs and assigns forever and they do bind themselves their heirs executors and administrators to warrant and defend every person or persons whatsoever claiming by, through, or under them. In witness whereof they have hereunto affixed their names and seals the date above mentioned. Signed in the presence of

Also personally appeared Mary Jones, wife of said Irby Jones, who on private examination separate and apart from her said husband Irby Jones acknowledge that she signed sealed and delivered the same on the day and year therein named freely voluntarily without fear, threats, or compulsion of her said husband. Given under my hand and seal this 5th day of January, 1820.

On January 8, 1818, Lewellen Jones wrote to his son, J. N. S. Jones:

"My son, I received your note by Sigh and observed its contents. As for trading with any person for I. Jones paper, I've no notion of the great bargain I purchased in this land. I give it to you. It is yours. Do whatever you please with it. I will make you a deed whenever you think proper. I've declined moving to it. It was your advice to purchase it, as it was a great bargain. I did so, therefore take it and may you prosper and be happy.

Sincerely yours, Lewellen Jones"

The previous letter may have been copied with the wrong year in the Jones family files. It makes more sense to have been written after the following letter, dated two years later, from Lewellen to his son J.N.S. Jones:

"Spottswood:

I wrote you by Sigh making you the offer of I. Jones place. I wish to know if you had rather take it than this. If so you must purchase all things necessary to keep up the plantation. If you take this you can have the corn fodder and only a sufficiency for myself while my hands are here, and stock. The hogs I will leave here and next fall give you one-third for having taken care of. It's time you and Major Hickman have settled your hands. If you take this place, send or tell Hickman to send his down soon as possible. You will have to get a wagon for the plantation. Capt. Blair will perhaps let Hickman have his. I will let you have two horses, the Major to furnish two will be sufficient. It's high time you had made some conclusions. Let me know whether Irby Jones has advertised his sale, and if so, when it will take place as I wish to be there. If you do not conclude to take this place, to purchase corn, let me know by the bearer what you will do and if you take this place when you will be ready with the Majors hands to do so. Sigh said you talked of giving an answer. Let me know if you have done so.

As ever yours,

Lewellen Jones"

John Nelson Spotswood Jones responded by writing on the same letter, which was returned by the slave named Sigh, the following answer:

"I will take Jones land on the terms you mentioned.

J.N.S. Jones January 1820"

Lewellen Jones wrote the letters from his home in Greenbrier named "Druid's Grove." Although there is a headstone for him in the Jones-Perkins Cemetery behind Morton Hall on the UAH campus, it was not placed until the 1970s. There is no headstone for him at the Jones-Donnell Cemetery in Greenbrier either, but it would make more sense that he would be buried there.

Although the letters indicate that J.N.S. Jones decided to take the Huntsville property known as Avalon, he was living in Greenbrier (Druid's Grove) later where he and his wife, Eliza Ann Haywood Jones raised their many children.

While Alexander P. Jones moved into the plantation known as Avalon, apparently daughter Frances Perkins must have died fairly young. The plantation she and her family lived in, located in Lawrence County, was known as Seclusion. The large debt was not ever fully paid and it was bought by J.W.S. Donnell from Limestone County, who married J.N.S. Jones' eldest daughter.

The graves of Frances Perkins has not been found – her children are buried in the Jones-Perkins Cemetery behind Morton Hall.

Question marks will be placed after names that cannot be readily interpreted.

Deed

James M. Moore to Arthur C. Beard Pages 291-292

This Indenture made February 11, 1839 between James M. Moore and Dianah S. Moore, his wife, of the first part and Arthur C. Beard of the other part. Witness that the same James M. Moore and Dianah Moore, his wife, for and in consideration of the sum of \$340 to them in hand paid hereby give, grant and bargain and sell to the said Arthur C. Beard that certain tract of land described as the west half of the NW quarter of fractional Section 18 of Township 7 in Range 4 east in the district of land subject to sales at Huntsville, Alabama containing 87 acres.

Signed by James M. Moore and Diana S. Moore. Booker Smith, Justice of the Peace, witnessed the signatures and he called Dianah Moore apart and separate to assure that she signed the same of her own free will and accord. Richard S. Randles recorded the above in Deed Book A on pages 291-292 on the 23rd day of February 1839.

Deed of Trust Zachariah Baily to John J. Bain Pages 293-294

Whereas Zachariah Baily is justly indebted to John J. Bain in the sum of \$260 as appears by note of hand. Witness that the said William Higgins is justly indebted to the said Nathan Long in the sum of \$500 and is desirous of securing the payment of the same to him the said Nathan Long. The said Joel Higgins for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar paid to him by the said Joel Higgins the said William Wiggins doth bargain and sell the following described personal property: 50 head of stock hogs, 14 head of cattle, four hogs and two Negros, Thomas, aged 60 and Lydia, aged 60.

Joel Higgins shall permit William Higgins to keep the same in his use and possession until January 1, 1840 in further trust that if said William Higgins makes default in the payment then the said Joel Higgins shall, after giving three weeks notice, the property will be sold to the highest bidder.

More Scottish Records On-Line

Familyrelatives.com has announced that they will soon be adding Parish records, Australian and Scottish records, Army and Navy records, and school directories, just to name a few. They have recently added over 250,000 Victorian Scottish Trade Directory known as Slater's Royal National Commercial Directory from 1889. These records include a variety of valuable information from 35 Scottish Counties such as professions (trades and occupations), nobility, gentry, and clergy information, including addresses.

They also offer information on Army lists dating back to 1798 and medical registers that date as far back as 1858.

Subscription rates vary: for access to all records, the cost is \$50 per year, or you can purchase units. For 60 units, the cost is \$10 and is only good for 90 days. For 150 units, the cost is \$20, again for 90 days.

Substitute Census Records

1940 census records will be released to the public on July 2, 2012. In the meantime, you may have seen that the census substitute for 1940, and soon 1950, have already been published. Census substitute seems to be a misnomer in that it actually refers to city directories, and in some cases, tax lists. They certainly do not list names of everyone in the family, as the census does, and then again, only those who owned property and those who had telephones.

On-Line Search Engines for Genealogists

Ancestry.com is a good website for genealogy and reference material. however the monthly subscription can be a bit pricey (depending on what amount of time you sign up for or taking advantage of specials, it can run \$20 per month). If you are close enough to Huntsville, or can get there often enough, it would be worth your while to use your library card (or get one if you don't have one already) and use their computers to do your research for free. You can reserve a computer or take a chance on an available computer in the Heritage Room for a 90-minute session to browse Ancestry.com.

One of the huge advantages to it is that new collections are being added periodically, and you should be checking for more information, or even better resolution of what they already have, on a routine basis – for free!

Footnote.com has just added native American Indian records. Your Indian ancestors may appear in several categories, such as the Dawes Packets (applications for tribal enrollments), Ratified Indian Treaties from 1722, Indian Census Rolls (includes percentage of Indian blood, the Guion Miller Roll which contains Cherokee genealogical research, and other miscellaneous records that refer to the Five Civilized Tribes.

Reality Genealogy Program on NBC

There is a strong possibility this information may change by the time you receive this issue, but it was recently announced that an interesting new reality series will fill the time slot once occupied by the Jay Leno Show. It will be called "Who do you Think you Are?" and will trace the genealogy of a number of celebrities. It is based on a British show which goes by the same name. Don't know what to expect or what we can learn from this, but perhaps it will help others who are just getting started, and it is predicted that it will start a new rush to learn one's history similar to the upswing after Alex Haley's movie "Roots" aired in 1977.

Peckham Family Genealogy

We have recently received a copy of *The Peckham Family* by Charles Wesley Peckham, Sr. At first glance, it is beautifully put together, hard-bound, and well-documented, with an impressive 904 pages. Unfortunately, after checking about 10 references from the index against the pages indicated, they do not match. If you are interested in seeing this book however, it will be available in the Heritage Room of the Huntsville-Madison County Public Library.

World War II Draft Records

Coy Michael has run across the following information, written by Richard H. Rayburn, Region Archives Director, National Archives Southeast Region, regarding the location of early draft records:

"Cards for the 4th registration of WWII destroyed during the 1980s were according to agency approved records schedules. These cards were destroyed because the information they contained overlapped with that of the 3rd registration for WWI. Other registrations from WWII are indeed extant and were recently transferred to the custody of the National Archives and Records Adminstration by the Selective Service Administration. This transfer covers registrations for birth years between 1897-1957. Draft cards for the period up to 1940 are open for general reference. Cards for the period from 1941-1957 are subject to the privacy act and must be screened by NARA personnel prior to release to the public. The National Archives Southeast Region maintains custody of cards for all states in its region except Kentucky for the period from 1897-1922. Cards for Kentucky during this period are held in the custody of our Chicago facility."

Percy Brooks Keel (1924-2010)

Percy B. Keel, a member of First Families of Madison County, was a longtime TVGS member. He never missed a meeting, seminar, or other activity sponsored by the Society. When asked to volunteer to do something, he said, "Okay."

Percy was our treasurer and on occasion served above and beyond the call of duty. One time the Society had a prima donna printer to whom we owed a small amount (around \$30) and even though said printer had been asked numerous times for a bill he did not respond – until one Sunday afternoon when he called and demanded payment NOW. Percy left a large family gathering at his residence, drove several miles to the printer's home with check book in hand and paid the bill.

A resident of Madison, Percy was active in researching families and their cemeteries in the area. He did extensive Keel family research and freely helped researchers throughout the United States until his eyesight became so bad he could no longer use the computer. He was also one of the originators of the Keel-Whitaker Reunion and a co-author of *Keel-Whitaker and Related Families*.

Through Percy's efforts, a genealogical society in Madison was organized and he became the first president. Unfortunately for us, their meetings were held on the same night as ours and his efforts and talents were transferred to that organization – much to our loss. His support and contributions to TVGS, however, should not be forgotten. The above is merely a drop in the bucket of his many contributions.

Percy was born April 11, 1924 and died Jan. 2, 2010. He was preceded in death by his wife, Helen Finley Keel and a son, Ricky Brooks Keel. He was survived by a daughter, Kathy Ann Keel of Smyrna, Ga. and a son, John Brooks Keel and his wife Julie and grandson, Jesse Brooks Keel, all of Portland, Oregon; brother, Ralph Hardy Keel Sr. of Huntsville; four nieces and one nephew.

Ann E. Cochran

There is not enough space to list all the contributions Ann Cochran made to TVGS, thus only a few are listed here.

Ann was a charter member of TVGS, a past president and our third editor (Vol. 3 and 4). She helped set the standards for future editors. As editor, she researched and typed her quarterlies then used an offset machine at her church to print them. After taking the printed pages home, she enlisted her husband, son and daughter to help collate the pages into books by walking around the dining room table many, many times. She then typed the labels and took the books to the post office. No editor since has put forth that kind of effort for the benefit of the Society

One of the most important articles ever published in Vallev Leaves was a 43page list of residents in Madison County, Mississippi Territory. It was a compilation of all tax payers during the territorial period from 1810 through 1815. [The 1814 tax was forgiven because of the depression.] Madison County, of course, was then the only northern county established in what later became Alabama. Ann and Catherine Gilliam researched these records and Ann wrote an eleven page introduction. This monumental work was carried in Vol. 4, issue No. 4. These records have been erroneously referred to as the "1816 census" by other respected researchers but Ann and Catherine proved

this was a tax list, not a census, and that there is no such thing as an "1816 census."

Ann was generous to a fault. She typed and indexed the Lawrence County, Alabama 1820 Census, then wrote the introduction but was not given the credit she deserved. Instead, she insisted that the current editor's name appear.

Ann studied the archaic Bylaws in use by TVGS at the time of her presidency. She chaired a meeting in which those Bylaws were rewritten and are still in use today. They were so good that other organizations have used them as a pattern for their own organization.

Roy Jackson "Jack" Cochran claimed Ann as his bride on June 10, 1950 and they settled in Huntsville in 1958 where he began working for what later became NASA. They shared each others' hobbies and "outside activities."

As avid fishermen, they spent many relaxing hours fishing from the West Coast to the Gulf and especially looked forward to catching bream at Madison County Lake. They enthusiastically attended Auburn football games and the Huntsville Stars baseball games. They were dedicated to their children and took an active role in their lives. Jack died peacefully in his sleep in 1994.

Ann was born in Fairfield, Alabama on January 9, 1929 and after an extended illness, died on January 30, 2010. She graduated from Auburn University in 1949. She was the daughter of Arthur Graham Esslinger (a lawyer) and Annie Laurie Martin (a teacher). Ann followed in the footsteps of her mother and seven aunts to also become a teacher.

Ann is survived by her sister, Catherine E. Vilece and husband, of Greenville, South Carolina; children, Laura Cochran Mickels and husband, Mike, of Madison, Alabama, and Roy J. Cochran, Jr. and wife, Susan, of Weatherford, Texas. Grandchildren are Stacy Staples and husband, Greg, of Huntsville, Alabama, Jonathan Cochran of Plano, Texas and Elliott Cochran of Conroe, Texas. Great-grandchildren are Lucas and Gracie Staples of Huntsville, Alabama and many close cousins, nieces, and nephews.

Book Reviews

Milus Eddings Johnston, author and Charles S. Rice, editor and annotator, <u>The</u> <u>Sword of Bushwhacker Johnston</u> – Huntsville: Flint River Press. 1992 reprinted with additions 1998. Paperback, 228 pages. \$19.95 plus tax and shipping. Order from Shaver's Bookstore, 256-536-1604, <u>shavers@mindspring.com</u>.

This rare first person account of Bushwhacker Johnston's military memoirs was first published in weekly installments in the *Guntersville Democrat* between April and December, 1902. This second issue includes all 35 installments, many annotations, a photograph, a map of Johnston's "New Confederacy" and a complete roster of Mead's Battalion, Confederate Cavalry, (eleven companies).

In April, 1862, Union soldiers seized Huntsville and severed the strategic Memphis & Charleston Railroad. This was a key component in seizing Chattanooga and using it as a base for the push to Atlanta. Huntsville's citizens responded by cutting telegraph lines, railroad tracks and picking off Union soldiers. In return, the Union soldiers began destroying property of Confederate sympathizers. Much of Madison and Jackson Counties were put to the torch, except Huntsville.

The Confederate soldiers usually stayed south of the Tennessee River, crossing north for supply runs, raids and skirmishes with small groups of "Yanks." The Union did not recognize these "guerilla soldiers" regular Army, calling them as "bushwhackers." In the late fall of 1863, Milus Johnston, after having his home burned three times. ioined the bushwhackers of Colonel Lemuel Mead's company. He quickly rose to the rank of Major, playing a leading role in the partisan struggle.

Johnston and his men surrendered on May 11, 1865, marking the end of the Civil War in North Alabama. He had been promoted to Lt. Col. and named to head the 25th Alabama Cavalry, but failed to receive his commission before the end of the war. He lived to the advanced age of 92, dying on October 8, 1915.

This book, an easy and informative read, gives a picture of life in Madison and Jackson Counties during the war years 1862-1865, skirmishes of Johnston's troops, information from various sources about soldiers and private citizens, and as complete a muster roll as is possible today. – Reviewed by Bettye Perrine, Huntsville, Alabama

Nancy M Rohr, Editor & Annotator, Incidents of the War: The Civil War Journal of Mary Jane Chadick. 10012 Louis Drive, Huntsville, Alabama 35803, Silver Threads Publishing. 2005. 379 pages. Paperback, ISBN 0-9707368-1-9

The Civil War diary of Mary Jane Chadick of Huntsville, Alabama, was published first in serial form in the Huntsville Times in 1937, then in small book form and reprinted in 1947 in the Alabama Historical Quarterly. Nancy Rohr's new edition with extensive annotations places the diary in context and illuminates Mrs. Chadick's life and the wartime world in which she lived.

This is an easily readable, informative and valuable primary source on women, northern Alabama and the Civil War. The diary is presented just as it was written but placed in italics with the annotations following each day's passages. There are also extensive endnotes, numerous photographs, multiple maps, several web sites, and a bibliography. Rohr's introduction sets the historical stage for the diary and the concluding epilogue follows Mrs. Chadick and her family until her death in 1905.

Mrs. Chadick, northern born, but solidly for the southern cause, wrote in her journal during Huntsville's periods of occupation by the northern army. It is more a journal than a diary in that she wrote of people, events and hardships rather than her personal anger, fear, or anxiety even though the unknown was always present for the citizens of Huntsville and the surrounding area as they were repeatedly ravaged by the war. Huntsville, suffering less, was a garrison and the officers utilized the houses for living quarters instead of destroying them, as was most of the rest of northern Alabama. Mrs. Chadick's observations, occasionally witty, of life under military occupation and of the trials and tribulations of women and children living in the war-torn south, coupled with Nancy Rohr's notes and historical insights, present a uniquely fascinating and illuminating perception of the Civil War era in Alabama, north of the Tennessee River and southern Tennessee.
