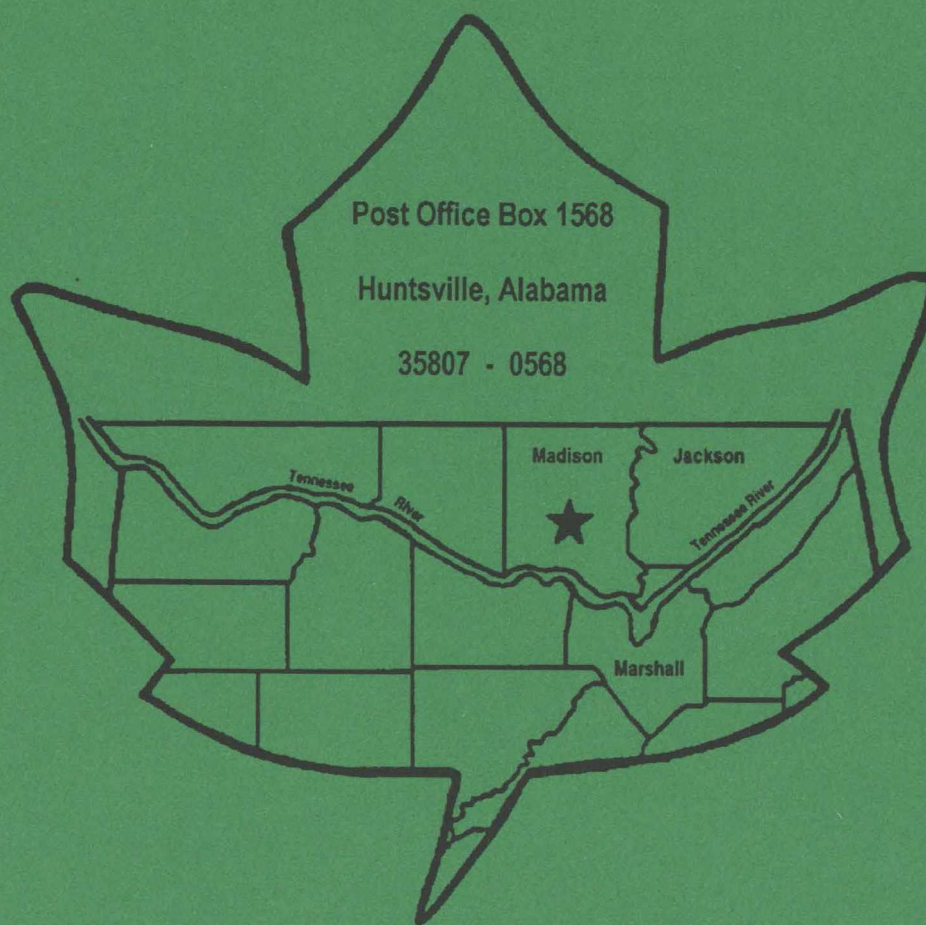

Revolutionary War Soldiers

Note from Ralph S. Mackey: These citizen soldiers fought for eight years before defeating the British Army, the most powerful military force of its time. As pioneers migrated westward following the end of the war, some of these soldiers were in their ranks. A number of them traveled into what later became Jackson County. This list was made of those men who came. Identification has been made for some who were buried in the county graveyards, or at their homes. The list of Revolutionary War veterans was originated by Eunice Matthews and Ann B. Chambless in 1976, and we have endeavored to add details found in various local records. Cindy Swagler provided more information that she obtained from the World Connect Project.

Holland, William (married Martha Sherill who was born 1750), born 1760, died 1835, buried Holland-Card Cemetery, member of 9th Virginia regiment.

Jackson, John (married Ann Mitchner, born 12/27/1756, died 2/3/1838, married circa 1775), born 11/12/1751, died 11/30/1833, buried Allen Robertson Cemetery, member of South Carolina Continental Line.

Jenkins, William (married Margaret L.), born 1762, died 10/14/1842, buried Arkansas, member of South Carolina State Troops, lived in Jackson County from 1832 to 1834, died in Pike County, Arkansas, though some reports say he died in Jackson County.

Jones, John, born 1765, private Alabama Militia, lived in Jackson County (age not given).

Jones, William (spouse unknown), born 1738, died 8/14/1834, assumed to be buried in Jackson County where he died, however grave site is now unknown.

Matthews, Benjamin (married Mary who died after 1840), born 1764, is assumed to be buried in Jackson County. He enlisted in Virginia Troops, Continental Line and Militia, moved to Alabama in 1818, Jackson County in 1840, and died in Jackson County, place of burial unknown.

McCormick, Joseph (spouse unknown), born circa 1745, died after 9/25/1840 in Jackson County. He was a member of Georgia Troops, lived in Dodsonville from 1835 to 1840, perhaps even later. His place of burial is unknown.

McCravey, John (married Mary), born 9/1752, died 1840/50, buried in Roach or Bryant Cemetery. Member of North Carolina Troops, moved from Franklin County, Tennessee and was living in Jackson County in 1840 with his daughter, Mrs. Thomas Coleman.

McCutcheon, John Ames, Jr. (married first Ann Morgan Woodall, born 1758 and died 6/20/1822, and married secondly on 1/22/1823, Cassandra Gray, who died 1842), born 3/8/1755 and died 1/10/1835. All three are buried in Allen Robertson Cemetery. He was a colonel of the North Carolina Militia and was a prisoner of war.

McDearman, Thomas, born 6/12/1752, died after 1839, assumed to be buried in Mississippi. He was a member of the South Carolina Militia, lived in Jackson County in 1/17/1834, and was living in Lauderdale County, Mississippi in 1839. It is assumed he died there.

McGehee, William (married to Direna Shelton), born 1756, died 5/1836, buried in Jackson County. He was a member of the Virginia State Troops, was living in Jackson County from 1821 until his death in 1836.

Morris, John Sr., (married Elizabeth Barbee), born 8/13/1764, died 7/16/1844 and is buried somewhere in Jackson County. He was a member of the North Carolina State Troops, died in Jackson County, and was a member of the Mud Creek Primitive Baptist Church.

Perry, Dee, buried in Hill/Pleasant View Cemetery.

Peyton, Daniel, (married Mary Roach, born 1765, married 9/24/1785), born 1763, died 5/5/1826, is assumed to be buried in Jackson County. He served as a major in the war and died in Jackson County.

Pierce, James (married Celia Bartlett, born circa 1770, died after 1850), born 12/25/1765, died circa 1840, buried in Pierce Cemetery. He served in North Carolina, settled in Jackson County in 1821, served less than 6 months.

Rice, Ned, a black man who was born circa 1752 and died at age 107 in 1859. He is assumed to be buried in Jackson County. He was born in South Carolina, was a prisoner of war, and a servant in the Army during the war. He died in Jackson County, Alabama.

Rounsavall, John Sr., (married Sarah Randall, born circa 1760, died 8/17/1840, married circa 1782), born 1/24/1758, died 8/13/1840, buried in Woods Cove-Freeman Cemetery. Served

as a colonel in South Carolina Militia, Sumner Regiment.

Rowan, Samuel, (married Elizabeth in 1788 or 1789; she died 9/1/1847), born 1736, died 3/18/1837, is assumed to be buried in DeKalb County. He served in South Carolina Continental Line, was living in Jackson County in 1832, died in DeKalb County, place of burial unknown.

Russell, Matthew L. (married Verlinda Lamar Jenkins, born 1751, died 3/12/1843), born 1750, buried at Dorans Cove. His death is not shown in the cemetery file.

Russell, Thomas Sr., (married Tabitha Jenkins, born 6/18/1770, died 1/13/1861), born 6/7/1761, died 7/11/1850, buried Dorans Cove. He served in Cavalry, 3rd Regiment of Light Dragoons in North Carolina.

Sampley/Sample, Jesse (spouse unknown), born 1761, died circa 1840, served in South Carolina Troops, was living in Jackson County in 1839, burial place unknown.

Smith, James (married Jinnet, born 1770), born 10/12/1760, died 11/4/1840, died in Jackson County, member of Virginia Troops, burial location unknown.

Smith, John, born circa 1763, buried possibly in Colbert County, was living in Jackson County in 1840 at age 77.

Summers, John, born 5/1760, died after 1837, is probably buried in Jackson County. He served in Virginia Militia, lived near Bellefonte in 1826 or after. He did not serve 6 months.

Temple, Jesse (married secondly, on 1/14/1807, Lydia Rush who was born circa 1792 and died circa 1845 – 1850), born 11/13/1763, died circa 1836 – 1840, buried in Old Taliaferro/Tolliver? Cemetery. He was a member of the South Carolina Provincial Troops, Cavalry, South Carolina Militia and moved to Jackson County in 1828. His grave has not been located.

Townsend, Joshua (married Elizabeth Caperton, born circa 1763, married 6/19/1784), born 3/5/1762, died after 1841, is probably buried in Jackson County. There is no record of him receiving a pension.

Tribble, Elija (married Rachel 10/1/1813, she was born circa 1777, died after 1857), born 1/1755, died 5/22/1840 and is assumed to be buried near Bridgeport. He was a member of the North Carolina Militia. His family says he is buried in Jackson County while his wife Rachel was living in Oregon County, Missouri in 1857 and it is assumed she is buried there.

Vaughn, Abner, born 1/10/1765, died after 1832. He volunteered in Virginia and North Carolina Militia. He lived in Jackson County for 12 years, according to his pension application, which was ultimately rejected.

West, Samuel, born circa 1737, is probably buried in Marshall County. He had lived in Jackson County, and was living in Marshall County in 1840 at age 103. Date of death is unknown.

White, James (spouse unknown), born circa 1761, died 8/1840. He served in Virginia Continental Line, may have

died in Jackson County where he was a resident for 16 years.

Williams, Thomas, born circa 1745, was living in Jackson County in 1830, age 80-90.

Wilson, William, (married on 6/12/1786 Huldah Sherrill, born 1777, died before 1829) born 1757, died 1845, buried in Roach Cemetery. He settled near Bellefonte in early 1800s. Huldah's mother was judged to be a Cherokee. William and Huldah Wilson were members of Mud Creek Primitive Baptist Church.

Wood, John, born circa 1751, is assumed to be buried in Jackson County. He was living in Jackson County in 1840 at age 89. There is no record of him receiving a pension.

The following veterans *may* have ties to Jackson County. Ralph Mackey, who compiled this information, is still in the process of verification. If you have any proof, please let us know!

Boykin, Solomon, Jr.

Cotton, James, Jr. (married on 10/20/1786 Nancy Johnson, born 1765, died after 1850), born 10/1765, died 2/18/1838, buried in McNairy County, Tennessee. He enlisted at age 15 in Virginia and later served with Regiment of Light Dragoons. He died in McNairy County, Tennessee, his wife Nancy died at Woodville, or perhaps near Bellefonte. Cotton Cove was named for James Cotton, Jr.

Doran, Alexander (married Elizabeth Lowery).

Jaggers, Jeremiah (married Nancy Ceberry, born circa 1776), born circa 1748, died 1/25/1832, is assumed to be buried in Madison County. He was a member of the South Carolina Continental Line. His wife lived in Jackson County for some time, though she was living in Madison County in 1834 at age 86.

McAnnelly/McInally, Jonah (married Joanna, born circa 1788), died before 1840. Joanna was a Jackson County resident on 6/1/1840 (assumed to be age 52), and drew a pension.

Owens, Evans (married in 4/1784 Agnes Wilson), born 5/9/1765. His pension application was issued from Jackson County.

Proctors of Jackson County

The first known member of the Proctor family to migrate to the United States was John Graye Proctor, who boarded the *Sea Venture* in England on June 2, 1609, bound for Jamestown, Virginia. The *Sea Venture* broke up in a storm and landed in Bermuda. Among the men on that same ship was John Rolfe. After 9 months, a new ship had been fashioned from the scraps of the *Sea Venture* and the surviving travelers continued on to Jamestown. Among those who did not survive were the wife and child of John Rolfe. He would later marry Pocahontas.

The coat of arms of Bermuda contains an image of the *Sea Venture*. The Proctors who settled in Jackson County are descendants of John Graye Proctor. Other descendants spell their name Procter. In early days, the spelling was not considered especially important.

It is not known for sure, but it is believed that this Proctor line is related (though not directly descended) from

John Proctor, executed as a witch in Salem, Massachusetts in August, 1692. He was proclaimed innocent by the governor of Virginia, along with the others accused of witchcraft, on October 31, 2001.

Jeremiah Proctor came to Jackson County, Alabama in about 1817 after his father-in-law, William Davis, came and built his home at Maynard's Cove at the foot of the mountain. Most of the Proctors from this line remained in Virginia for several generations before settling in Lincoln County, Tennessee, and ultimately in Jackson County, Alabama.

Jeremiah built his home near the home of his father-in-law; the two houses being built exactly alike. Jeremiah's home burned and another house was built on the same spot. A short distance from there was the home place of **Micajah Alexander Proctor**, son of Jeremiah. Near the home of Micajah was the home place of **Robert Franklin Proctor**, Micajah's son. Within a few miles on the same road were the original homes of four generations.

The following information is about early Jackson County settler **Jeremiah Proctor** and some of his descendants. Proctor was buried at Maynard's Cove, though the marker, if there ever was one, is now gone. There is a government-issued marker for him at Cedar Hill Cemetery in Scottsboro.

This information is available at the Heritage Center, located at 208 South Houston Street in Scottsboro in the Proctor family file.

There are still many family members in and around Jackson County.

Jeremiah Proctor

Jeremiah Proctor, born 1777, Albemarle County Virginia, died before March 4, 1842 in Maynard's Cove, Jackson County, Alabama. He was a veteran of the War of 1812. He married **Jane (Jennie) Davis** who was born January 7, 1786 in Virginia and died January 18, 1865. She was the daughter of **William Davis**, born 1753 in Hanover County, Virginia and died August 19, 1848, Jackson County, Alabama and **Mary Jane Pogue Black**. William Davis served as a private in the Revolutionary War (pension \$12738) and lived in Virginia, Kentucky, and Tennessee before locating in Jackson County, Alabama. All are buried in the Proctor Family Cemetery in Maynard's Cove.

Other children of **William Davis** and **Mary Ann Pogue Black** were:

- Polly Davis, married ___ Scott
- Lucy Davis, born 1785, Virginia; married William Polson who died in 1842. Both are buried in Old

Liberty Churchyard Cemetery, Jackson County, Alabama, in unmarked graves. William Polson served in the War of 1812 from Tennessee.

- Nancy Davis who married William Proctor of Canada, assumed to be unrelated to Jeremiah Proctor.
- William H. Davis.
- Rhoda Davis, married John Holland, son of William Holland.
- Myra Davis, first wife of James Holland, son of William Holland. He married, secondly, Barbara Frazier.

Known children of **Jeremiah Proctor** and **Jane (Jennie) Davis**:

- Mary B. Proctor, born 1807, married William Tubbs and moved to Perry County, Alabama, died 1887
- **Micajah Alexander Proctor**, born October 7, 1808
- William Davis Proctor, born circa 1810, died 1844 in Arkansas, married Malissa ___ and moved to Huntsville, Madison County, Arkansas.
- Eliza Proctor, married ___ Cowger/Couger. Died in Arkansas.
- Robert Tinker Proctor, born November 9, 1814, Lincoln County, Tennessee, died December 21, 1890, married February 10, 1848, Lincoln County, Tennessee, Margaret Lee Thomas, born September 29, 1820, Lincoln County, died January 14, 1884, daughter of William Thomas and Rebecca Lyon. Buried Proctor family cemetery. Their children were: Jeremiah Proctor, Thomas Proctor, Eliza Jane Proctor (1849-1921), Elizabeth Proctor, Albert

Gallatin Proctor, and Hugh Alexander Proctor.

- Clarissa Proctor, born 1819, Jackson County, Alabama, married John Shankles, a Baptist preacher. Lived on Sand Mountain, died and was buried in DeKalb County, Alabama.
- Elizabeth Ann Proctor, born 1824, Jackson County, Alabama, married Reuben Wilmouth. Lived in Benton County, Arkansas, buried in Arkansas.

Micajah Alexander Proctor, 2nd child of **Jeremiah and Jane Proctor**, was born October 7, 1808 in Kentucky. He died August 2, 1881 and is buried in the Proctor family cemetery. He married, circa 1840, **Margaret Minerva Davis** who was born circa 1816 in Tennessee. She died after the 1860 census was taken and is buried in the Old Liberty Church Yard in an unmarked grave. She was the daughter of John P. Davis and Ann _____. Their children were:

- John Proctor, born circa 1841, died after 1860 census, unmarried, buried in Old Liberty Church Yard.
- Zebulon Montgomery Proctor, born May 14, 1842, died December 21, 1911, married first on March 18, 1869 to Martha Jane Bynum who was born April 24, 1844 and died 1878. She was the daughter of John Wesley Bynum and Rachel Campbell. Zeb married secondly on October 2, 1882 Mary Elizabeth Precise who was born April 30, 1858 and died September 9, 1933. He served in the Civil War. Zebulon and both wives are buried in the Proctor family cemetery.
- Mary Jane Proctor, born January 16, 1845, died May 13, 1914 and

married April 11, 1872 to George W. Campbell who was born August 4, 1840 and died January 30, 1918. He was the son of James Campbell and ___ Elledge. Both are buried in Harris Cemetery on Duncan Hill, Hollywood, Jackson County, Alabama.

- Robert Franklin Proctor, born March 7, 1847, died September 8, 1911, married on September 18, 1864 to Mary Elizabeth Bynum who was born April 1, 1849 and died October 1, 1930. She was the daughter of John Wesley Bynum and Rachel Campbell. Both are buried in the Proctor family cemetery. Robert Franklin Proctor served in Co. I, 4th Regt. TN Vol. Inf., CSA.

Their son, Robert Walter Proctor (1877-1945) married Sara Jane Cornelison (1877-1928) and their children were: Lawrence Edward Proctor (1901-1968), Ina Elizabeth Proctor (1903-1930), Nola Eula Proctor (1905-1995), Irene Proctor (1907-1942), Robert Thomas Proctor (1909-1965), S.Q. Proctor (1911-1992), Mary Elizabeth Proctor (1913-1913), infant daughter Proctor (1915-1915), Paul Oran Proctor (1916-1989), Marjorie Jo Proctor (b. 1920), Walter Franklin Proctor (1922 - 2011).

With Robert Walter Proctor's second wife, Roberta Bertha Precise (1904-1989), he had 6 more children: Mary Lou Proctor (b. 1932), Mildred Sue Proctor (b. 1934), William Jackson Proctor (b. 1936), Raymond Wheeler Proctor (b. 1939), Ruby Lee Proctor (b. 1942), Canna Mae Proctor (b. 1944). Robert Proctor had a total of 17 children!

- Eliza Ann Proctor, born October 1849, died February 1909, married December 16, 1867 to Anthony Mack Foster who was killed in 1877. Both are buried in the Proctor family cemetery in unmarked graves.
- **Finis Davis Proctor**, born January 27, 1855, died July 30, 1899 of typhoid fever, buried in Sanders Cemetery near Kyles, Jackson County, Alabama. Married May 2, 1875 to Sarah Rhoda Jane Sanders,

born June 22, 1857 on Coon Creek, Jackson County. Died July 15, 1943, buried Cedar Hill Cemetery, Scottsboro. She was the daughter of Jesse Elbert Sanders and Mary Elizabeth Bean.

Finis Davis Proctor and Sarah Rhoda Jane Sanders were married May 2, 1875. He had a spinning wheel made in June or July 1875 for her and paid \$5.00 for it. It was the first article of household furniture that he bought after their marriage. The first thread spun on it was cotton to be woven into cloth from which was made four pairs of pants for summer wear. Two pairs of pants were for Finis Proctor and two pairs were for his father, Micajah Proctor. They all lived together at this time in Maynard's Cove in the Micajah Proctor home.

Their children were:

- John P. Proctor, born March 4, 1876, died May 5, 1876, buried Mud Creek Cemetery.
- Charles Albert Proctor, born August 27, 1877, died September 5, 1899 from typhoid fever, buried Sanders Cemetery beside his father. Died unmarried.
- **Jesse Alexander Proctor**, born September 1, 1879, died October 15, 1963, Scottsboro, Alabama. Married first on May 29, 1905 in Chattanooga to Audrie Frances Skelton, born August 14, 1886 and died May 4, 1921, daughter of John William Skelton and Nellie Diona Kelly. Both are buried in Cedar Hill Cemetery, Scottsboro. All children were by first marriage. He married secondly on June 30, 1927 to Annie

- Elizabeth Coleman, born October 14, 1884 in Rutherford County, Tennessee.
- Allie Mae Proctor, born August 28, 1885, married April 1904 to William Thomas Hunt.
 - Ira Pearl Proctor, born December 17, 1887, died April 12, 1925, married April 1904 to Flora Knight.
 - Robert E. Montgomery Proctor, born December 25, 1889, died June 1, 1890, buried Sanders Cemetery.
 - Virgil Milton Proctor, born August 30, 1894, married August 1, 1926 to Annie Elizabeth Winston.

Children of **Jesse Alexander Proctor** and **Audrie Frances Skelton** were:

- **John William Proctor**, born April 10, 1906, died December 22, 1976, in Cherokee County, married June 30, 1927 to Caroline McClain Carpenter who was born September 27, 1904 in Remington, Indiana and died December 26, 1984 in Cherokee County, Alabama. She was the daughter of Arthur Lyman Carpenter and Lucinda Caroline McClain. They were the parents of John William Proctor, Jr., (1929 -) who married Dona Maxine Munson (1933 -).
- Thomas Worth Proctor, born December 13, 1907, married May 3, 1938 to Evelyn Ethel Couch.
- **Finis Dozier Proctor**, born January 13, 1910, married May 14, 1934 to Margaret Hunt.

- **John William Proctor, Jr.**, born July 2, 1929, married December 28,

1953 to Dona Maxine Munson who was born August 24, 1933.

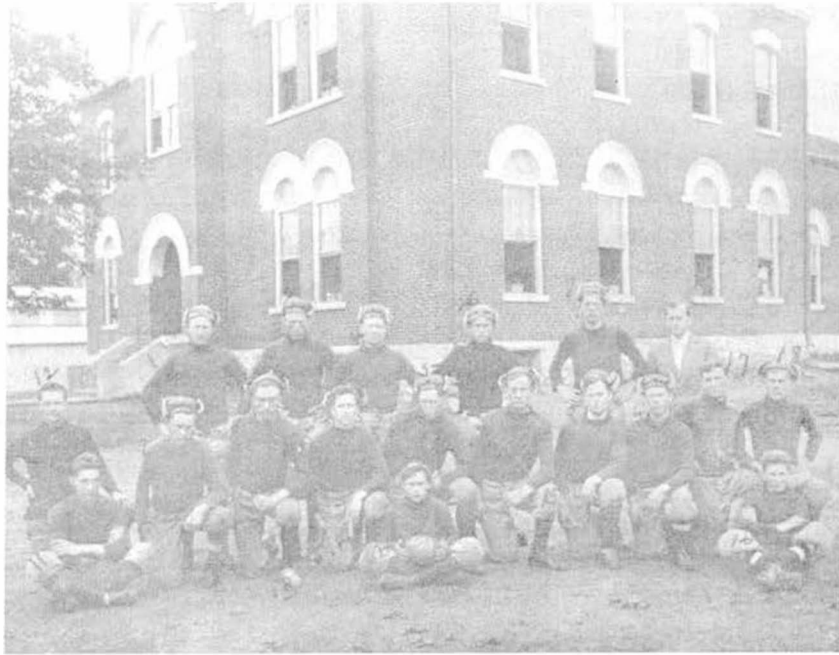

Most of the deed books now are replaced by electronic duplication and printed to letter sized paper and placed in small books. Unfortunately, these recent copies are much more difficult to read. Question marks will be placed after names that cannot be readily interpreted.

## **Deed of Trust**

**William T. Coffee, Richard L. Lockett, Henry K. Raney, and Horton Romans**  
**Pages 334-336**

This indenture made March 2, 1839 between Horton Romans of the first part and William T. Coffee and Henry K. Raney, trustees, of the second part and Richard Lockett of the third part. Whereas the said Horton Romans is justly indebted to the said Richard Lockett in the sum of \$80 payable in two payments, the first on the first day of May next and the second payment on the twenty-fifth of December next. The said Horton Romans is willing and desirous to secure this note.

Witness that for and in consideration of one dollar to the said Richard Lockett in hand paid by the said William T. Coffee and Henry K. Raney, the receipt is hereby acknowledged that the said Horton Romans hath given, granted, bargained and sold to the said William T. Coffee and Henry K. Raney, one Bay Mare, two years old with white in her forehead.

The said William T. Coffee and Henry K. Raney shall permit the said Horton Romans to remain in quiet and peaceable possession of the said Mare until default be made in the payment of the said sum of \$80. If upon default the Mare will be conveyed to the highest bidder for ready money after having fixed the time and place of sale and giving notice as the law directs.

Carter the following described property to wit: one Sorrell Mare, one Sorrell Colt, three hundred bundles of fodder to have and to hold.

The said K. C. Carter, Trustee, shall sell the stated property to the highest bidder upon default of payment of said note by the due date after giving notice by advertisement in three different places in the neighborhood.

This document was signed by Jesse Jones, K. C. Carter and B. Snodgrass. Witnesses were L. M. Coffee, Joseph M. Horton and Frances Martin.

Rachel Dickson and six female children, all under the age of 21 years of age to wit: Mary, Martha, Elizabeth, Lucy, (?), Mahala and Rhonda and also one male child to wit: Benjamin Franklin and to provide for the education of the children do hereby sell and convey to the said Isaac Wilburn the following property to hold on the trust and condition hereafter mentioned to wit: four slaves – James, a man aged about 24 years, Cloe, a woman about 34 years old and three of her children to wit: Emily, a girl six years old, Charles, a boy, four years old and Sam two years old.

The trust and conditions that the said Willburn (?) shall hold the property free from the control of said Dickson and apply the labor profits of him thereof annually for the support of the said Dickson and his wife and children and the education of the latter.

Secondly, the said trustee shall at the time the said Benjamin Franklin Dickson arrives at age 21 years deliver over to him the negro boy, Charles, to his separate use.

Thirdly, at the death of the said Joel Dickson the trust hereby created is to cease and the other property mentioned in this deed is to be divided among his wife and other children then alive according to law.

Fourthly, if the said Rachel Dickson dies during the continuance of this trust hereby created the same shall be performed for the benefit of the said Joel and his children.

Signed by Joel Dickson and Isaac Wilburn (?). Richard S. Randles, Clerk of the Court who certified the signatures were witnessed by himself and the above document was recorded in Deed Book A on pages 338 and 339 on March 27, 1839.

Now this indenture witnesseth that for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar in hand paid to the said Joseph Hinds by the said David A. (illegible), Trustee, the receipt of which is acknowledged and hath bargained and sell to the said David A. (illegible) the following property to wit: one bed and furniture, one man's saddle, one grindstone, one table with six chairs, one clock, two sows and nine pigs, 3 head of cattle and 500 bundles of fodder to have and to hold.

The said David A. (illegible) shall permit the said Joseph Hinds to remain in peaceable possession and use of the above described property and upon further trust the said David A. (illegible) shall on December 25, 1839, after giving twenty days notice by advertisement at three or more places in the county proceed to sell at auction for ready money to satisfy the above described debt. If the debt is paid by the due date of the note this indenture will be void.

Rogers to remain in quiet and peaceable possession and use of the above described property and upon further trust the said Armstrong Donaldson shall on the first day of September 1839, after giving 20 days notice by advertisement at three or more public places in the county proceed to sell at auction for ready money all or sufficiency of the said above described property to satisfy and pay the sum of \$430 with all legal interest.

The document was signed by Caleb W. Rogers, Armstrong Donaldson and Alexander Donaldson. Justice of the Peace, Tate (?) Robinson witnessed the signatures on March 12, 1839.

hand paid by the said B. D. Woodall, Trustee, it is acknowledged that the said James Childress hath given, granted, bargained and sold to the said B. D. Woodall the following described property to wit: three bright Sorrel horses, six or seven years old, one dark Sorrel horse, one bay mare five years old, one gray mare six years old, one gray colt with a bald face, one road wagon, five pair (illegible), one fifth chain, two red cows and their calves, one (illegible) three years old, one red heifer yearling, one white yearling, one bull yearling all marked with Swallow fork in each ear, four head sheep marked as the above described cattle, one small cherry table, one cherry sugar chest, one wooden clock, one feather bed and furniture, two pair fire irons, one bureau to have and to hold all of the above described property.

The said B. D. Woodall shall permit the said James Childress to remain in quiet and peaceable possession of the above described property and take the profits as his own until the first day of April 1840 and in case of default of payment the said B. D. Woodall shall proceed to sell the above described property giving 20 days notice by advertisement in two of the most public places in the neighborhood in the Town of Warrenton to the highest bidder for ready money.

This document was signed by James Childress, John B. Finley and B. D. Woodall.

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Things You Should Know

U.S. Federal Census Mortality Schedules, 1850 – 1885

These records include much valuable information for researchers. With these schedules, you have access to a person's name (of course), sex, age, race, marital status, place of birth, month of death, occupation, disease or cause of death, number of days they were ill before death, parents' birthplace (added in 1870), place where disease was contracted and how long the deceased was in the area.

For those of you who have been reading the extremely interesting information in our Madison County section featuring burials in Maple Hill Cemetery, you now know why some of the strange information is contained therein. Of course the person filling out the information may not have known the answers, every little bit helps.

The following information tells you which agency collected these facts for Alabama and neighboring Southern states. Be advised that not all states have this information available:

Alabama: U.S. Census Mortality Schedules, Alabama, found in the Alabama State Department of Archives and History, Montgomery.

Arkansas: Eighth Census of the U.S., 1860, Arkansas, Mortality and 10th Census of the United States, 1880, Arkansas, Mortality. Microform: F410.C46 1850a, 1860a, 1870a, 1880a. University of Arkansas Libraries, Fayetteville, Arkansas.

Florida: Schedules of the Florida State Census of 1885. Schedule 5, Mortality. M845, 13 rolls. National Archives and Records Administration, Washington, D.C.

North Carolina: Nonpopulation Census Schedules for North Carolina, 1850-1880: Mortality and Manufacturing. M1805, rolls 1-5. National Archives and Records Administration, Washington D.C.

Military Records

More records are available for men and women who fought in World War I, World War II, the Civil War, and the American Revolution. The Alabama Adjutant General's Office holds records of the State Militia, known as Military Registers for 1820 – 1861; Military Returns, 1818 – 1861; Reports of Equipment of the Militia,

1822-1832; and Military Reports of Officers, 1839-1844.

There are two books about Mexican War Veterans: *A Complete Roster of the Regiments and Volunteer Troops in the War Between the United States and Mexico from 1846 to 1848* by William Hugh Roberts. This book only lists officers. Another book is *Known Military Dead During the Mexican War, 1846-1848*, by Clarence Stewart Peterson.

Missing Air Crew Records, 1942-1947

Over 16,605 case files of missing World War II Army Air Force records are now on file with Footnote.com. Reports were filed within 48 hours of the declaration of destroyed aircraft or missing in action crew members. These files are known as Missing Air Crew Reports (MACRs). As much information as possible was recorded on these forms for future identification purposes. For those of us looking back some 60 years, it helps to add some missing pieces to the puzzles that may never be completed.

Some records are dated as early as 1941, and others as late as 1948.
