

Federal Bankruptcy Act of 1867 Petitioners from Jackson County, Alabama

Transcribed From the National Archives

At the beginning of the Civil War, the Confederate government demanded that all citizens and businesses owing money to the northern citizens and businesses remit that payment to the Confederacy rather than provide "comfort and support" to the enemy. After the war, those northerners who were owed these funds came looking for remittance.

The large mercantile houses were especially affected. When the large merchant houses called for payment from smaller merchants throughout the region, the smaller merchants then passed demands for payment down to individuals.

Then, along with the economic after-war depression throughout the region, the result was Congress passing the Bankruptcy Act of 1867. The court for the following cases was held in Huntsville, Alabama. The case files usually contain a petition giving all assets and liabilities.

The House of Happiness in Scottsboro, AL

The House of Happiness was founded in 1923 in Scottsboro, AL as a mission of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Alabama. Its purpose was to provide medical, educational, material assistance and religious instruction to impoverished families of the highland area of North Alabama. Children and their needs were a primary focus. Temporary residential care was given to a number of children needing such care. The House of Happiness received its name shortly after inception when a young girl named Rosa pronounced on her first night there that this was "shore a happy house."

In 1923, Augusta B. Martin came from Montgomery to explore area needs and to set up an early mission that would serve the area until 1953. Miss Martin stayed for several years and in 1925 saw the program move from a house in Scottsboro to a small shack nine miles west of town in Sauta Bottom. The original purchase of 160 acres included the shack, a barn and an occupied tenant house that was later to become a school and a church. In time, a large and more permanent log home was built just beyond the shack up the side of July Mountain. Birdsong Spring at the foot of the mountain supplied water by virtue of bucket and pulley to the house 200 feet above.

The work of the mission was vast and encompassed meeting basic needs of many impoverished families, offering a kindergarten and other schooling opportunities for children and adults,

providing an Episcopal chapel for Sunday afternoon services, and even acting at times as an early child welfare intervention program. At such times, Miss Martin worked with resources across the state to locate permanent homes for House of Happiness children. In one of her last reports she stated that 130 children had been cared

for at one time or the other at the House of Happiness.

Miss Martin was a tireless worker and teacher, intrepid in her search of and service to those in need, often arising in the middle of the night to respond to some sickness or other emergency need. Families assisted were not only from Sauta Bottom, but often came from many miles away. Dr. Hugh Boyd, a Scottsboro physician, was well known in the area and provided medical services to the families coming to Miss Martin's attention.

Throughout its history numerous workers and volunteers were recruited to carry out the work of the House of Happiness. Many came from afar while, after warming to the program, youth and adults from Sauta Bottom pitched in to help in various ways. Community men harvested logs from the property for construction of the large, 1½ story log edifice that was to become the permanent House of Happiness structure. Donations of food, clothing, shoes, bedding, other necessities and financial support were received from across the diocese and from as far away as New York City. A piano for the school was sent by a lady from Demopolis, AL. The House of Happiness farm provided some provisions. Barter and sharing within the community were a common way of life. Although free to anyone in need, a stick of firewood or exchange of labor would yield a voucher with which a family could purchase clothing or other items available at the House of Happiness.

Miss Martin remained at the House of Happiness until approximately 1933 when health necessitated her permanent departure. Miss Nellie Barnwell of Mississippi, who had worked at previous times with Miss Martin, had returned to Scottsboro and served as acting director while hoping for Miss Martin's return. Miss Barnwell was named Director in December, 1934.

In the summer of 1934, Captain Charles Leslie Conder of the Church Army, an evangelical arm of the Episcopal Church, came to assist with religious outreach. He became Director in January, 1936, at which time the work of the House of Happiness became that of the men of the Church Army. Captain Conder and wife, Mary, were followed by Captains Moss, Kast, Thomas, Austin and Wheat. Under the Church Army the House of Happiness no longer provided residential care but continued to provide a viable social service and community program until 1953. Miss Martin died in Montgomery, AL in 1964. Miss Nettie Barnwell went on to serve a mission in North Carolina and died in Mississippi in 1971.

During its 30 years of existence, the House of Happiness property came to encompass the barn, a small farmhouse at Birdsong Spring, the community church/school building, and a privately-owned community cemetery. Refinements had been made to the original log structure and an enclosed sun porch, compliments of a donor, and a worker's addition had been added to the main dwelling.

Early in her tenure, Miss Martin had been asked by the Board of Education to teach at the nearby McCutchen School. She later persuaded the Board of Education to provide for a teacher at the House of Happiness School, or Happy Hollow School as it came to be called. An addition was made to the rear of the original tenant house for school and church purposes. The school continued to operate under the auspices of the County Board of Education until about 1939 when roads improved and children could travel to

larger area schools. In its peak year of 1931-32, Miss Martin reported Happy Hollow School to have an enrollment of 127.

In later years, the House of Happiness became not only a resource for families in need, but a beloved community center, providing a place of social interaction for the many youth of Sauta Bottom. Friday night socials were for many years a common part of community life. In a 1938 report, Captain Conder spoke of Sauta Bottom. At that time there were 80 families living in the area of which 18 owned their farms. Another 31 were tenant farmers and 31 were day laborers. In 1938 there were seven automobiles, five radios and two telephones in Sauta Bottom.

Around 1953, when the Church felt its mission to the area was complete, the property was sold to a neighbor, Thurmond Richie, who had purchased the first 40 of the original 160 acres in 1951. A later owner was Beatrice Smith Abercrombie Callahan, a community girl who attended the House of Happiness School and later became a teacher in Birmingham. Upon her acquisition, the farm and buildings became rental property. The house and barn burned in separate accidental fires in the 1960s. As of 2010, Smith heirs retain ownership of the original property, including Birdsong Spring, the House of Happiness Cemetery, and an additional five acres just below the school that were purchased from the County Board of Education.




Birdsong Spring near the House of Happiness 2003 (Photo by Liz Bennett, Smith Family Photos)

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
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House of Happiness Circa 1960 (Smith Family Photos)




House of Happiness, 1953, from the front, facing west (Smith Family Photos)


Madison County "JOHN BYRD MURDERED"

These were the headlines on the first page of *The Huntsville Herald* on July 4, 1902. John Byrd and family were living in the Monrovia community of Madison County in 1902. Byrd and his family did not have a good well on their farm. John would have his son go to the adjoining farm house, belonging to the Johnsons, to get a bucket of water from their well.

On Saturday, prior to this July 4 news article, Byrd sent his son to the Johnsons to get a bucket of water. Mr. Johnson refused to let him get water, giving the reason that his well water was low and the well may run dry. Byrd's son returned home with the news. John Byrd, known for having a fiery temper, went into the house and retrieved his double barrel shotgun and a bucket and said, "I will go get water and no one will stop me."

As he departed his family, consisting of his wife, son, father and two or three others followed close behind. Whether they were trying to get him to stop or urging him on is not known. When Johnson and his brotherin-law, Stevens, saw the party coming they armed themselves. Johnson yelled to Byrd to stop coming to the well. Byrd came on and leveled his gun at the two men. Johnson opened fire with a pistol at some distance, none of the bullets having any effect. Stevens then fired his shotgun and Byrd fell dead riddled with shot. Mrs. Byrd was struck in her arm badly wounding her. Byrd was shot twice. Tension between Byrd and the brothers-in-law previously developed when their cattle had frequented the Birds'



crops, but the water situation was the last straw.

The men came to the city after the killing and turned themselves in to the sheriff, who had no warrant for their arrest. The sheriff advised them to come back in the afternoon and appear before Judge Stewart for preliminary trial.

Warrants for the arrest of Johnson and Stevens were sworn out by the dead man's father, and a preliminary trial was held before Squire David Phillips, who held the men for further investigation.

The regular preliminary hearing was held Monday afternoon and Judge Stewart bound the defendants over to await the action of the grand jury. Their bonds were fixed at \$1,000 and were easily made.

The State of Alabama vs. Fred Stevens and Robert Johnson was recorded as case #6267 in the Circuit Court of Madison County August 14, 1902. Witnesses for the state were Murphy Clutts, Eli Moore, Eunice Bird, Mason Taylor. Mrs. John Bird, George Moore, Solon Phillips, Matilda Bunch, L. N. Ivan (?), John Brimley, D. E. Kelley, G. M. Bird, Martha Bird and Mand Bird. The grand jury returned a verdict of murder in second degree.

The grand jury reported their findings in the August term of 1902 as follows: Fred Stephens, alias Fred Stevens and Robert Johnson unlawfully and without deliberation or premeditation killed John Byrd by shooting him with a gun."

The court met February, 1903. Due to the death of Bob Johnson the court admitted prosecution abate as to him and defendant Stevens ordered tried separately. On August 24, 1904 the jury reached a verdict of guilty to defendant Stevens. Stevens was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail and fined \$50.

John William Bird was born April 16, 1870 in Walker County, Georgia. His parents were George Marshall Bird and Martha S. Clark who settled in Georgia after the Civil War. John William Bird married M. Canzada Pierce on December 23, 1887 in Walker County, Georgia.

John and Cannie relocated to McLemore's Cove in Madison County, Alabama where their first child, Eunice Clark Bird, was born July 22, 1888. Eunice was born prematurely and only seven months after his parents were married. Eunice was said to have been so small that he could have fit into a teacup.

Conzada, commonly known as "Cannie," was born October 3, 1780 in McLemore's Cove in Madison County, Alabama, and was the daughter of John Calvin Pierce and Lydia Caroline Harvey. John and Lydia had 11 known children – Sylvania P.C. (1854), M.D.P (1856), Calvin Berry (1857), George Washington (1859), Mary Elizabeth (1862), William Brice (1866), Frances Cordelia (1868), M. Canzada (1870), John Vigil (1873), S.C. (1875), and James Edward (1878).

Family legend has that John traveled west to Fort Worth, Texas, and upon returning to Georgia, convinced his father to pack up and move to Texas. The families worked their way westward. They were cattle farming in Hope, Arkansas when, on March 10, 1895, Cannie passed away from a sudden illness, probably a heart attack. Eunice, who was six years of age at the time, had been sent out to the pasture to bring in the herd. As he ran the cattle through the gate, Eunice saw his mother standing nearby as she fainted and collapsed. M. Canzada Pierce Bird, who was later described by her son, Eunice, as a sweet-natured, tall, slender woman, was buried in Hope Arkansas (Hempstead County).


Sometime after Cannie's death John married a woman by the name of Maggie Walker in McNairy County Tennessee. John and Maggie had one son, John Evan Bird, born in 1898, and one daughter, Ella M. was born in 1899.

John and family and John's father decided to work their way back to Georgia. They left McNairy County, Tennessee and on their travels decided to stay for some time in the small community of Monrovia, Madison County, Alabama. This is where John's life came to an end. **Madison County**

The 1880 census of Pond Spring, Walker County, Georgia has John W. Bird, age 10, in the home with his parents, George W. Bird, age 36, and Martha Bird, age 29. Three other children in the home were Mary S., 8, Claude A., 6, and Matilda, age four.

In the 1900 census of McNairy County, Tennessee John Bird was age 30 and was identified as widowed. He was in the home with his parents, George Bird, age 56, and Martha Bird, age 49. Fourteen people were in the household which included 8 children of George and Martha, and three children of John Bird. Also in the household was Sarah A. Bird, age 82, the mother of George Bird. John William Bird, son of George Marshall Bird and Martha S. Clark, father of Eunice Clark Bird and Wiley Virgil Bird, as well as Ella Bird (infant) and John Evan Bird.

Genealogy of a Family Cemetery Chandler Cemetery, Owens Cross Roads, Madison County, Alabama

Chandler Cemetery is located on the side of a country road known as Old Gurley Pike near Owens Cross Roads and New Hope, Alabama. It's a quiet place, and it appears to be almost forgotten these days – overgrown, neglected, with many of the tombstones knocked down or damaged. It was a question that was asked about the families and people buried there that prompted this index: "Who are the Cobbs buried at Chandler Cemetery?"

A cemetery is a place of solemnity and reflection, and this small cemetery is no different from larger ones. The earliest tombstone is dated 1874 for William R. Chandler, but it is possible that there are earlier unmarked graves for Chandler family members. The most recent burial was in 2007 for James Richard Manuel, a great-great-grandson of William Robert Chandler. The Chandler Cemetery is indeed a family cemetery in that the majority of the people buried here are related either by blood or marriage to William Robert and Eliza Moon Chandler.

The Chandler family members in Chandler Cemetery:

WILLIAM ROBERT CHANDLER (b. 28 Jun 1798, d. 15 Jan. 1874)

ELIZA C. (MOON) CHANDLER (b. 22 Aug. 1812, d. 28 Dec. 1891

In the 1840 U.S. census, William Robert and Eliza C. Moon Chandler reported that they had two sons and two daughters. John M. Chandler is definitely one of the sons. Recently found in the 1850 U.S. Federal Census Mortality Schedule is Jackson Chandler, age 14, born about 1836. Jackson died a "sudden" death in September 1850, and the Chandler family census was taken in December 1850. He lived in District 35 where the William R. Chandler family lived, and there were no other Chandler families listed in Madison County, Alabama in 1850. Eliza's brother was Jackson Moon and was her sibling closest in age. All of these factors make it likely that Jackson Chandler was the unknown son of the 1840 census.

Their known children are:

- 1. Almira Chandler (b. 1831, d. 1870-1880) m. William H. Moon
- 2. John M. Chandler (b. 1834, d. abt 1879) m. Nancy Eason
- 3. Hester Ann Chandler (b. 1840, d. 1910) m. Thomas Carpenter
- Nathaniel Green Chandler (b. 1841, d. 1918) m. Alice Emma Isora Taylor
- 5. Eva Virginia Chandler (b. 1847, d. 1929) m. John Preston Maples
- 6. Harriet C. Chandler (b. 1848, d. abt 1874) m. Edward F. Patterson
- 7. Allen Clement Chandler (b. 1851, d. 1910) m. Harriet Branum
- 8. Eliza America Chandler (b. 1855, d. 1939) m. 1st Eleazer Cobb, m. 2nd George Washington Maples.

All of these children are buried in marked graves at Chandler Cemetery with the exceptions of Almira Jane Chandler Moon and Harriet C. Chandler Patterson. It is likely that both Almira and Harriet rest in unmarked graves at Chandler Cemetery.

Nathaniel Green Chandler's family – Verna Marie Smith was the great-granddaughter of Nathaniel Green Chandler and Alice Emma Isora Taylor; granddaughter of Eliza America Chandler and Absolom Perry Divicus "Dike" Baker; the daughter of Gertrude Flossy Baker and Charlie Gordon Smith; wife of James Manuel. Great-great granddaughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon. Verna Marie Smith Manuel was also the great-granddaughter of Thomas Carpenter through Mary Elizabeth Carpenter Baker b. 1852 d. 1925, daughter of Thomas Carpenter and first wife, Phebe White Tabor.

Maples, Eliza America Chandler – b. Oct 16, 1855 d. Dec 31, 1939

William Robert Chandler's family – Eliza America Chandler was the daughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon; wife first of Eleazer C. Cobb (1861-1881); after his death, she was wife second of George Washington Maples. George Washington Maples was the brother of John Preston Maples who married Eva Virginia Chandler, Eliza's sister.

Eva Virginia Chandler's family – John Preston Maples was the husband of Eva Virginia Chandler; son of James Maples and Edith Caroline Patterson. Son-in-law of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon.

Patterson, Edna Lillian – b. Nov 9, 1911 d. Jul 7, 1918

Almira Chandler's family – Edna Lillian Patterson was probably great-granddaughter of Almira Chandler Moon; probably granddaughter of Elizabeth Charlotte Moon and Edward F. Patterson; Most likely, she was the daughter of either Paul L. Patterson or John Will Patterson, sons of Elizabeth Charlotte Moon and Edward F. Patterson. Probable great-great granddaughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon.

Patterson, Edward F. – b. Jul 13, 1848 d. Mar 8, 1912

William Robert Chandler's family – Edward F. Patterson was first the son-in-law of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon. He was married to Harriet C. Chandler, daughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon until her death about about

d. Mar 23, 1955

1874. After Harriet's death, he married Harriet's niece, Elizabeth Charlotte Moon, the daughter of Almira Chandler and William Moon. With this marriage he became the son-in-law of Almira Chandler Moon and William Moon; Edward F. Patterson was the son of John Patterson and Lydia Maples. Son-in-law first, grandson-in-law second of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon.

Patterson, Elizabeth Charlotte Moon – b. Oct 1855 d. Oct 13, 1924 – unmarked grave

Almira Chandler's family – daughter of Almira Chandler and William Moon; wife of Edward F. Patterson; Granddaughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon; No grave marker but death is reported on Alabama Deaths and Burials Index and burial site is Chandler Cemetery. Charlie Gordon Smith was also the great-grandson-in-law of Thomas Carpenter through Mary Elizabeth Carpenter Baker b. 1852 d. 1925, daughter of Thomas Carpenter and first wife, Phebe White Tabor.

Smith, Gertrude Baker – b. Jun 2, 1897 d. Dec 24, 1940

Nathaniel Green Chandler's family – Gertrude Flossy Baker was the granddaughter of Nathaniel Green Chandler and Alice Emma Isora Taylor; daughter of Eliza America Chandler and Absolom Divicus "Dike" Baker; wife of Charlie Gordon Smith; great-granddaughter of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon. She was also the great-granddaughter of Thomas Carpenter through Mary Elizabeth Carpenter Baker b. 1852 d. 1925, daughter of Thomas Carpenter and first wife, Phebe White Tabor.

Smith, Lillie L. – b. Sep 26, 1906 d. Sep 6, 1911

Allen Clement Chandler's family – Lillie L. Smith was the granddaughter of Allen Clement Chandler and Harriet Elizabeth Branum; daughter of Mary Etta Chandler and George Washington Smith. In a 1994 letter to Jan Chandler Traller, Jack Campbell, a grandson of George Washington Smith and Mary Etta Chandler reported that they were buried in unmarked graves at Chandler Cemetery. She was also the great-niece of John Preston Maples who married Eva Virginia Chandler and George Washington Maples who married Eliza America Chandler; granddaughter of Robert W. Smith and Christina Maples; Christina Maples was the sister of George Washington Maples and John Preston Maples.

Walls, Matilda Jane Lacy – b. Aug 24, 1854 d. Aug 5, 1934

Almira Jane Chandler's family – Matilda Jane Lacy was the daughter-in-law of Almira Jane Chandler and William Moon; wife of Nathan "Natty" Moon who died about 1874; daughter of Andrew B. Lacy and Minerva Brannum. Married Dock M. Walls in 1908. Granddaughter-in-law of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon.

Worley, Willie Connally Chandler – b. Sep 9, 1872 d. Aug 23, 1951

John M. Chandler's family – Willie Connally was the daughter-in-law of John M. Chandler; wife of William Allen Chandler; daughter of Nathaniel D. Connally and Diana Catherine Flanagan. Granddaughter-in-law of William Robert Chandler and Eliza Moon. After William Allen Chandler died in 1908, Willie Connally Chandler married William Penn Worley, the brother of Henry F. Worley and brother-in-law of Bernice Cobb.

She was the half-sister of Joseph Dickson Cobb who is buried at Chandler Cemetery.

Almira Jane Chandler was the oldest known daughter of William R. and Eliza Moon Chandler. She was born abt 1831 in Madison County, Alabama and married William H. Moon on November 18, 1851 (date of marriage license) in Madison County. Almira is shown living with her husband and family in the 1870 U.S. census but is not listed on the 1880 census with the family still in Madison County.

William H. Moon was the son of Nathaniel and Charlotte Troup Moon and was a cousin of Almira's. Almira probably died in Madison County sometime between 1870 and 1880. At some time after the 1880

census was taken, William H. Moon and his grown children, Hester, William, and John T. moved to Arkansas. William H. Moon died sometime after 1901 in Arkansas and had been approved in 1901 in Pike County, Arkansas for a Confederate Pension based on his service in the Civil War with Co. E of the 37th Tennessee Infantry. William is shown living with his son, John T. Moon in Arkansas in the 1900 census.

John M. Chandler married Nancy A. Eason (1837-unknown.) Nancy was the daughter of George Eason and Elizabeth Jenkins. John M. Chandler and Nancy married on October 10, 1865 (date of marriage license) in Madison County and were on the 1870 census but do not appear on the 1880 census or afterwards. They had one son, William Allen Chandler, and he is living with Thomas and Hester Chandler Carpenter on the 1880 census. It is unknown whether Nancy Eason Chandler died or moved elsewhere. John's occupation is listed as physician on the 1860 and 1870 censuses. He served in Co. E of the 37th Tennessee Infantry, CSA, as a physician and was known as "Dr. John Chandler." The birth of William Allen Chandler, their only known child, is listed in the Thomas and Hester Chandler Carpenter family Bible.

John M. Chandler was likely buried in an unmarked grave. In recent years, a marker commemorating his service in Co. E of the 37th Tennessee Infantry, CSA has been placed in Chandler Cemetery. Nancy Eason Chandler may also be buried in an unmarked grave at Chandler Cemetery.

Eliza America Chandler

Eliza America Chandler (1855-1939). Eliza America married Eleazer C. Cobb (1861-

1881) on Dec 23, 1879 (date of marriage license.) He died on July 21, 1881.

Eliza America then married George Washington Maples (1837-1910) on Oct 18, 1887 (date of marriage license.) George Washington Maples was a widower whose first wife, Sarah Jane Manning, had died in 1875. There were no children born to either marriage of George Washington Maples. He was a brother of John Preston Maples who had married Eliza America Chandler's sister, Eva Virginia Chandler, in 1872. George Washington Maples is buried in Bethel Cemetery where his first wife is buried.

William R. Chandler was born June 28, 1798 in Virginia. It is believed that he was born in Halifax County, Virginia. Parents' names are not confirmed, but he was possibly the grandson of William Chandler Jr. (1734-1789) and Judith Roberts (1744-1809). There were nine sons in the family, and it is thought that one of these sons may be the father of William Robert Chandler.

The first record for William Chandler in Madison County, Alabama is a marriage license to Eliza C. Moon in 1830. She was the daughter of John Moon (1789-1844) and Mary "Polly" Lewis.

Family lore told by three of William Robert Chandler's grandchildren was that he and three brothers came to Alabama from Virginia with a slave trader named "Jack Burns." These brothers "thought highly" of Jack Burns. After returning to Virginia for personal items, they made their way back to north Alabama to settle. Researchers have been unable to link William R. Chandler to other Chandlers in the area who could possibly be brothers though it is thought that Luke Randolph Chandler of Jackson County may have been related.

By 1827, John Byrne, born 1798 in Halifax

County, Virginia, was living in the Maysville area of Madison County, Alabama where he married Martha Johnson. John Byrne's mother was Nancy Chandler Byrne, wife of William Byrne, of Halifax Co., Virginia. She was a daughter of William Chandler Jr. (1734 – 1789) and Judith Roberts, (1744 – 1809) of Halifax County, Virginia.

At some time in her later years, Nancy Chandler Byrne moved to Alabama and was shown living with her son, John Byrne, and his family in Maysville in Madison County on the 1860 census. She died in 1867 and was buried at the Chambless-Byrne Cemetery near Maysville. This cemetery is practically lost, heavily overgrown, and very difficult to find. Nancy's tombstone reads that she was "100 years, 5 months, and 21 days" old. Her grave and the small cemetery were discovered by Jan Chandler Traller, a descendant of Allen Clement Chandler.

Was it possible that John Byrne was the "Jack Burns" of family lore and that he was possibly a first cousin of William R. Chandler? Another link that tied the Chandler and Byrne families together was that Andrew Jackson Byrne, a son of John Byrne, was a witness on the 1914 Confederate Pension application for Nathaniel Green Chandler, a son of William R. Chandler.

The question and answer: "Who are the Cobbs buried at Chandler Cemetery?"

Of the Cobb and Worley families, only Bernice Cobb Worley is related directly by marriage to the William R. Chandler family. Her daughter, Kate Marie Worley, married Arthur C. Chandler, the son of Allen Clement Chandler. Kate and Arthur moved to El Paso, Texas and are buried there. There are 11 graves in the cemetery that are directly related to Bernice Cobb Worley and husband, Henry F. Worley. Two daughters of Bernice Cobb Worley and their families are also buried at Chandler Cemetery. Even though there is not an exact, direct line to William R. Chandler, it can be assumed that the Cobbs, Worleys, and other families who buried loved ones here felt a kinship even if it was not a blood kinship.

Cobb/Worley/Chandler family links:

Newton Columbus Worley, b. 1822 d. 1900 was the father of at least 10 children. Three of his sons have direct ties to family members buried at Chandler Cemetery:

Worley; Joseph Dickson Cobb was the son of Bryant Cobb and first wife, Mary Polly Grayson.

3. **Julia Vafemia "Julie" Inman Kelly**– b. 1851 d. Jan 30, 1927

Cousin of Henry F. Worley; granddaughter of Francis Worley and Charlotte Cobb who were grandparents of Henry F. Worley also; daughter of Louisa Worley and James Inman; Julia was also the great-grandmother of Gordon Wilson Kelley b. Nov 14, 1916 d. Jul 26, 1921.

4. **Andrew Jackson Cobb** – b. Apr 22, 1858 d. Oct 26, 1928

Brother-in-law of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; married to Charlotte Worley, sister of Henry F. Worley. Charlotte is buried at Merrimack Cemetery in Huntsville, Alabama; Andrew Jackson Cobb was son of Adams A. Cobb and Nancy Marytine Nell Vann.)

5. **Amanda Caroline Worley Cobb** - b. Aug 7, 1873- d. Mar 14, 1941

Amanda Caroline Worley Cobb is the daughter of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; wife of George William Cobb; mother of Effie Christine Cobb.

6. **George William Cobb** – b. Jan 19, 1871- d. Apr 3, 1937

George William Cobb was the sonin-law of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; husband of Amanda Caroline Worley; son of John Cobb and Mary Ellen Christian; father of Effie Christine Cobb.

7. **John Bowen Cobb** – b. Nov 21, 1885 d. Sep 7, 1920

Nephew of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; son of Andrew Jackson Cobb and Charlotte Worley; husband of Magnolia "Maggie" Kilgore. Maggie was sister of Silas Edward Kilgore whose wife was Ethel Beatrice Cobb, daughter of Amanda Caroline Worley and George William Cobb.

8. **Maggie Lee Worley Kelley** – b. 1887 d. 1936

Daughter of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; wife of Clarence Gordon Kelley; mother of Gordon Wilson Kelley.

9. **John Isaac Cobb** – b. Feb 28, 1888– Dec 23, 1956

Grandson-in-law of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; son-in-law of George William Cobb and Amanda Caroline Worley; husband of Effie Christine Cobb; son of Bryant B. Cobb and Annie Nash.

10. **Effie Christine Cobb** – b. Sep 5, 1894- d. Jul 25, 1927

Granddaughter of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; daughter of Amanda Caroline Worley and George William Cobb; wife of John Isaac Cobb.

11. **Agnes Inez Cobb** – b. Nov 25, 1911 d. Jan 13, 1912

Great-granddaughter of Henry F.

Worley and Bernice Cobb; granddaughter of Amanda Caroline Worley and George William Cobb; daughter of Effie Christine Cobb and John Isaac Cobb.

12. **Gordon Wilson Kelley** – b. Nov 14, 1916- Jul 26, 1921

Grandson of Henry F. Worley and Bernice Cobb; son of Maggie Lee Worley and Clarence Gordon Kelley; Also great-grandson of Julia Vafemia "Julie" Inman Kelley.

Genealogy is always a work in progress. With online resources such as ancestry.com, familysearch.org, fold3.com, genealogybank.com, and records available online from public libraries, research is readily available at all times. Subscriptions to these web resources are invaluable aids to research especially when you live away from the area where your ancestors resided. Records such as pension applications, court records, marriage documents, and death certificates are also available online or in libraries. Bit by bit, life stories can be put together.

Some researchers are fearful of posting family trees online, but we all have pieces of the puzzles. If we share information, we can help each other. Unshared information will be lost, no matter how much research has been done by someone who won't post a tree or write a narrative. If you find a mistake on a posted tree, don't hesitate to ask questions. Most genealogists strive to have good information and accurate records on their family trees.

The people buried at Chandler Cemetery were descendants of some of the earliest settlers of Madison County, Alabama. Many living descendants do not even realize the family ties that intertwine and connect

together the families of the area. The people resting in the graves at Chandler Cemetery were important to their loved ones, were deeply missed when they died, and are important to descendants today trying to ascertain genealogy stories and histories. Please share your information with others.



Marshall County James Monroe Jackson, M.D.

In Guntersville, Alabama on Christmas Night 1891, there came a knock at the doctor's door. The doctor's son, James L., opened the door and a fine-looking old gentleman asked for Dr. Jackson. The doctor, being ill, had retired to bed, so the stranger was escorted to Dr. Jackson's bedside.

"Do you know me?" asked the stranger.

"No," said the doctor, "I don't believe I do."

"I am your long-lost brother" replied the visitor.

Such was the brothers' meeting after 42 years. That night, Dr. James Monroe Jackson discovered that his long lost brother had become a successful merchant. After the Civil War, Mr. Joseph T. Jackson had moved his family to Texas and had not known, until recently, the whereabouts of his brother, James. It was a delightful meeting and much information was shared.

EARLY LIFE

James Monroe Jackson was born in Maury County, Tennessee on April 12, 1826. He was the third child of Harbard and Martha Gill Jackson. Harbard Jackson had come from Georgia with his father, Mark Jackson, during the early settlement of Tennessee. In addition to James Monroe, Harbard and Martha had three daughters: Elizabeth, Susan, and Priscilla; and two sons, Floyd and Joseph. Harbard was a farmer who raised and educated his children on the farm. James Monroe was then sent to Jackson College in Columbia, Maury County, Tennessee.

After graduating from college in 1844, James Monroe traveled to Somerville, Morgan County, Alabama to begin the study of medicine with his cousin Dr. William G. Gill. In 1848-49, he completed his medical degree and graduated from the Medical College of South Carolina at Charleston. After obtaining his medical degree, James returned to Somerville where he had a successful medical practice. In November 1850, Dr. Jackson married Eliza D. Wilkinson, daughter of Dr. James and Martha (Berry) Wilkinson of Somerville. Both Dr. and Martha Wilkinson were natives of Georgia.

In 1856, the Jacksons left Morgan County and moved to Guntersville, Marshall County, Alabama. Here they found a peaceful, delightful community of spirit-minded people. Dr. Jackson soon became a prominent citizen, known for his compassionate care for his patients and his community.

MILITARY CAREER

But alas, the Civil War was growing closer and closer to beginning. Around April 1, 1861, Dr. Jackson enlisted in the Confederate Army with Capt. Isaac Henry's infantry company and was assigned to Clarksville, Tennessee. There, with the help of Mrs. Gus Henry and other noble ladies, he organized the Stuart Hospital, of which he became chief surgeon. He remained there until ordered by

General Floyd to Fort Donelson where General Grant was laying siege. He left all his effects at Clarksville, except the clothes he had on, including his instruments. He did not even have a blanket or a cent of money with him.

When the garrison surrendered, Dr. Jackson was made a prisoner of war. The Confederate prisoners were loaded on over-crowded steamboats and sent to a northern prison at Camp Chase, Columbus, Ohio. Many of the prisoners were suffering with acute dysentery. On the morning after the arrival at Columbus ,the prisoners awoke to find a heavy snow which covered their blankets with a small hole above their heads kept open by the warmth of their breath.

While a prisoner at Camp Chase Prison, Dr. Jackson wrote a letter to his associate in business, Dr. W. B. Harrison of Guntersville, Alabama. He wanted Dr. Harrison to relate to Judge Louis Wyeth and others to try to get him a speedy exchange. Also, he wanted his friends at home to take care of his family and give them aid if needed. He mentioned Judge May and Colonel Lamar, explaining that he

believed they would be willing to help with his requests.

The doctor's letter from Camp Chase Prison included news of a man named Leroy from Marshall County, Alabama, and revealed that he had been sent to Chicago, Illinois, where he was doing well. There had been a lot of sickness and some of Captain Henry's company had died since being at Camp Chase. In all, there were about 700 prisoners in the prison. Gardner Ledbetter was there and had just had a hard spell of sickness, but was up and doing well.

An example of Dr. Jackson's compassionate character was related to the editor of *The Guntersville Democrat* several years after the war was over:

"Dr. Jackson was a young surgeon and did not adhere to the Federal treatment of dysentery and he refused to go to the hospital at Columbus. After several days, there was a heavy death toll at the hospital and many times the young doctor was asked if he would accept help and he still refused their treatment. He lay weak and helpless until a Yankee Captain came along and made the usual inquiry. Dr. Jackson gave an angry reply "I have been neglected and am tired of replying to the same question."

The Yankee was Captain Terrell, who had a great degree of kindness of heart and strength of character. He realized the doctor was very near death and asked him again "What can I do for you?" Dr. Jackson replied, "My stomach craves buttermilk."

Captain Terrell called his orderly and gave orders to ride to a farmhouse and buy a gallon of buttermilk. This was done day after day and in due time Dr. Jackson was well enough to be sent to Johnson's Island, Lake Erie, where he was, by Federal authority, placed in charge of the hospital with the freedom of the whole island.

An exchange of prisoners gave Dr. Jackson his liberty and he reported to the Surgeon General at Richmond, Virginia. While there, and just before being sent to General Joseph E. Johnson's Army of the Tennessee, Dr. Jackson visited the prison for Federal soldiers. Presently, he saw a familiar face. Low and behold it was Captain Terrell, the Federal officer who had saved his life at Columbus!

Dr. Jackson stopped. "Do you remember a buttermilk transaction with a sick Rebel at Columbus last year?" The reply was: "Is that Dr. Jackson standing here?" In a second Jackson's arms were thrown around Captain Terrell and they both were sobbing in a fraternal embrace.

"What can I do for you Captain Terrell?" "I would like to be exchanged." That same afternoon Dr. Jackson had Captain Terrell paroled and set free with transportation furnished to his Ohio home.

Dr. Jackson was ordered to Jackson,
Mississippi, to take charge of all returning
prisoners, sick and wounded, exchanged from
the battlefields of Perryville and others in
Kentucky. When no longer needed in that
capacity he was ordered to Port Hudson,
Louisiana, and on to Vicksburg. After the
battle of Franklin, Tennessee, he was left with
the wounded of that combat and with the aid
of the noble women and men of that city
organized McBeth College Hospital.

Dr. Jackson spent the remainder of the war at Camp Morton in Indianapolis and was there in solitary confinement until President Lincoln issued his peace proclamation. At last, he returned to Guntersville, Alabama, where he resumed his practice of medicine.

FAMILY

Dr. and Mrs. Jackson had two children live to maturity and one who died at birth. Their daughter was Alice Lee Jackson and their son was James L. Jackson.

Alice Lee Jackson married Robert B.
McKinney around 1883. They had one son,
Robert J. McKinney, born in 1885 in
Mississippi. Robert J. had two sons: William,
born in 1921 in Ohio, and Robert, born 1922
in Alabama.

James L. Jackson married Annie Steger on May 22, 1883, in Madison County, Alabama. They had two children reach maturity: a daughter, Alice Jackson and a son, Robert Jackson. He lived in Tennessee most of his life.

Miss Alice lived in Guntersville, Alabama, until her death. She had a good friend, Mrs. Grant, who lived next door. They both were fond of cats, gardening and talking about old times.

Dr. Jackson's obituary was printed in the *The Guntersville Democrat* on December 31, 1914:

"Dr. James Monroe Jackson was one of the oldest doctors in town. He died at his home in Guntersville, Alabama, on December 28, 1914. He was 89 years old and had recently

given up his practice. He played a big part in the Civil War, having saved many lives by his surgical skills. He was survived by a son, J. L. Jackson, and a daughter Mrs. Robert McKinney."

Dr. Jackson's long-lost brother Joseph had married Martha E. Bryant on February 10, 1847, in Tennessee. According to the 1880 Ellis County, Texas, Federal Census they had had several children: Bedford, born in 1864; Thomas S., born in 1867; and Joseph, born in 1871. On other census records, three other children appear: Nancy, Mary and James. Nancy married a Willis and had three children, Robert G., born in Arkansas 1875; Joseph born in Tennessee 1882; and Marvin born in Tennessee 1884.

Joseph Jackson died in Ellis County, Texas, on January 16, 1918, and his wife Martha died at Confederate Woman's Home in Ellis County, Texas, on March 31, 1925.

On April 10, 1935, the obituary of Dr. Jackson's son, James L. Jackson, was also printed in *the Guntersville Advertiser-Democrat*:

"James L. Jackson passed away in April, 1935, at his home on Hill Street following an illness of two weeks of pneumonia. The remains were taken to Nashville, Tennessee, his former home. Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Watkins, a relative, with interment in Mt. Olivet cemetery, ten miles from Nashville. Masons J. P. Willis and C. F. Dodson of Guntersville, Alabama, joined the Masonic body in Nashville in the services.

Mr. Jackson was one of Guntersville's oldest and most highly respected citizens. He was 83 years old, a Mason and member of the Methodist Church. He was the son of Dr. J. M. Jackson. Prior to his father's death, he moved from Nashville with his daughter Miss Alice Jackson. His wife had preceded him to the grave. His other survivor was his sister Mrs. Alice McKinney of Florence."

James L.'s daughter, Miss Alice Jackson died in Guntersville, Alabama, 1981-82.

This index was compiled by researchers at the Marshall County Archives in Guntersville, AL. *The Advertiser* still operates in Guntersville as *The Advertiser-Gleam*. The newspaper has been in operation since 1880 and now covers Guntersville, Albertville, Boaz, Horton, Grant, Arab, and Union Grove. The *Boaz Leader* operated in multiple iterations from at least 1915 until 1983.

Thomas J. Cochran, Ninth Sheriff of Marshall County (1859-1862)

Thomas J. Cochran was born October 15, 1827 in Alabama. He was the first child of William Alexander Cochran and Matilda Swann Johnston. William was born in Antrim County, Ireland. He came to America in 1810. At the age of 18, he became a Private in the New York Militia during the War of 1812. During this period he served in the State of Maryland.

William moved to what is now Madison County, Alabama while this was still a territory. He married Matilda Swann Johnston on March 24, 1824. Matilda was born in Tennessee October 17, 1807 to John J. and Rosanna Johnston. William and Matilda became the parents of nine children: Thomas J., John D., Robert E., William A., Martha D., Isaac Newton, Isabella, James M. and Margaret A. William was listed as a farmer in the 1850 Madison County Census. He died September 23, 1858.

The 1850 Marshall County, Alabama Census shows Thomas J. Cochran living as a boarder in the household of Arthur Beard in Bluff Beat, District 41, and page 23, household 469. His occupation was listed as being a merchant and he was single at this time.

On November 29, 1858 Thomas married Nancy Ann Manning in Marshall County. Nancy Ann was the daughter of Thomas M. Manning and Lucinda Parker. It was not long after Thomas and Nancy married that the War Between the States began. Nancy was born October 19, 1838 in Marshall County and died June 2, 1868. It is believed she is buried in the Manning Cemetery around Grant, Marshall County, Alabama.

Cochran enlisted in the 49th Alabama Infantry Regiment, Co. E. This Regiment was also called the 52nd Regiment and was organized at Nashville, Tennessee in February, 1862, according to Family Search and the National Park Service. It originally mustered into service as the 31st (Hale's) Alabama Infantry. Its designation was changed to 49th during the spring of 1863. The men were recruited in the counties of DeKalb, Jackson, Marshall, Madison, Limestone, Lawrence, Colbert, Lauderdale, Blount, and Morgan. It took an active part in the conflicts at Shiloh, Vicksburg, Baton Rouge and Corinth. Some of the Marshall County men in this Regiment were: Lieut. Colonels M. Gilbreath, and William H. Davidson. Majors B. Johnston and Thomas B. Street, Captains William H. Wright, William H. Davidson, James Fletcher, W. H. Smith, Thomas B. Street, J. S. Bain and F. A. Pouge.

Following the war, Thomas and Nancy became the parents of three children. Martha or Mollie as she was called, was born about 1862, Isabella or Belle was born August 19, 1863 and Thomas M. was born about 1867 and died in 1869. He may be buried in the Manning Cemetery near his mother. All of these children were born in Claysville.

The obituary of Thomas Cochran was printed in the January 18, 1893, Marshall

County, Alabama paper <u>The Democrat</u>. It reads as follows:

Thomas J. Cochran

The news dashed over the wires Monday morning that the spirit of Thos. J. Cochran had winged its flight from its tenement of clay. He had been removed by his brother, Dr. Robert Cochran from the World's Dispensary at Buffalo to New York City in the expectation of securing better medical attention but in vain. He continued to grow worse and then came which sooner or later is the fate of us all. Dr. Cochran brought the remains home and the funeral services will take place today. Mr. Cochran was the senior member of the firm of Jordan, Manning & Co, of the place, and was sixtyseven years old at the time of his death. He was a native of Madison County and moved to Marshall while young. He was sheriff of this county from 1859 to 1862, replacing John J. Sibley. He has been closely identified with the material interest of the county all his life. Mr. Cochran leaves two children, Mrs. J. L. Jordan and Mrs. T. L. Farrow, his wife having died when these were quite small. He has been in failing health for several years and his death was unexpected. With his loved ones will be joined in their sorrow by a host of friends and acquaintances.

On February, 1893 a Lamar County, Alabama newspaper, The Vernon Courier, stated that a telegram was received from New York City announcing the death of Thomas J. Cochran. He was a prominent merchant of Guntersville. He was a member of the firm of Jordan, Manning and Company and had gone to New York for treatment for Bright's disease.

Mollie, Cochran's oldest daughter, married James L. Jordan in Marshall County on

October 30, 1877. This couple can be found on the 1880 Guntersville, Marshall County census. James L. was born September 9, 1851 and died December 6, 1890. Mollie C. was born September 1, 1861 and died September 13, 1910. They are both buried in the Guntersville City Cemetery.

Isabella Cochran was the second daughter of Thomas J. Cochran. She went by the name of Belle and was born August 19, 1863. She married Thomas Lynard Farrow on October 8, 1889 in Guntersville, Alabama. There were three children from this marriage. Robert Lusk Farrow, born February 3, 1859 and died October 18, 1925. Mattie (Martha) Lee Farrow, born August 13, 1894 and died March 15, 1962. Isabella and Thomas were expecting their third child but because of an accident, this child was not saved. While Isabella was expecting the child she climbed on a chair to straighten a curtain and fell. Because of this fall, Belle and the child both lost their lives. This family is buried in the Guntersville City Cemetery.

Thomas M. Cochran was the third child of Thomas J. and Nancy Ann. He was born August 30, 1867 and died July 20, 1869. He is believed to be buried in the Manning Family Cemetery with his mother.

Reuben Hampton, 10th Sherriff of Marshall County (1862-1865)

The first record of Reuben Hampton is the license to marry Sarah Adeline Kennedy and Reuben Hampton. It was issued 26 October 1852 and the couple were joined in marriage on the same day by Peter Wood. This marriage took place in Marshall County, Alabama. Sarah Adeline is probably the daughter of Robert J. and Martha Kennedy. The other children of Robert and Martha were: Joseph, Lorenzo P., James, Charles, and Robert.

It is not known at this time who the parents of Reuben Hampton were. It is known that Reuben was born in Alabama. This information was taken from census records. Reuben lived in the Western District of Marshall County in the 1860 Agriculture Census. This is in the area of Guntersville. His value of Farming Implements and Machinery was \$30. He had 2 horses, 3 milk cows, 4 working oxen, 9 other cattle and 25 swine. The value of his livestock was \$390. He also had 300 bushels of Indian corn. In the 1860s, he was a well to do farmer.

Hampton was made Sheriff of Marshall County by Civil Appointment on 13 August 1862. This record can be found in the Alabama Archives, Civil Register of County Officials, Vol. 3, (1844-1867), page 385. The film is M 81571. He signed a poll list on 15 November 1862, along with Judge of Probate W. T May and John M. Scott.

Hampton became a widower in January 1860 when Sarah Adeline died of Pneumonia Fever at the age of 27. This record is found in the U.S. Federal Census Mortality Schedules, 1850-1885. The family was still living in the Western area of Marshall County. At the death of Adaline, Hampton was left with two young daughters, Martha K., age 3, and Sarah A., age 5 months. These girls were possibly named for their grandmother and mother. Nothing more could be found about these children.

The United States Federal Census Mortality Schedules, 1850-1885 shows the death of Reuben Hampton in August 1879, age 48. He died of Dropsy of the Heart. At the time of his death he was a grocery keeper. His doctor was listed as Dr. L. D. Lusk. He had been a resident of the county for 40 years. He lived in Township 8 of Marshall County.

Margene Black is a prolific family history writer who has written biographies for Marshall County's first 10 sheriffs. The first Marshall County sheriff took office in 1835, just before the municipality was officially created by the state legislature on January 9, 1836. These sheriffs served three-year terms and lived varied lives. Some of their varied lives are better recorded than others, but Margene has researched diligently to record the lives of each sheriff in as much detail as the historical record allows.

Federal Bankruptcy Act of 1867 Petitioners from Marshall County, Alabama

At the beginning of the Civil War the Confederate government demanded that all citizens and businesses owing money to the northern citizens and businesses remit that payment to the Confederacy rather than provide "comfort and support" to the enemy. After the war, those northerners who were owed these funds came looking for remittance.

The large mercantile houses were especially affected. When the large merchant houses called for payment from smaller merchants throughout the region, the smaller merchants then passed demands for payment down to individuals. Then, along with the economic after-war depression throughout the region, the result was Congress passing the Bankruptcy Act of 1867.

The court for the following cases was held in Huntsville, Alabama. The case files usually contain a petition giving all assets and liabilities.

Tennessee Valley Genealogical Society Proposed By-Law Changes

Proposed: January 2017 Membership Vote: April 27, 2017 Status: Passed

The following TVGS By-Law changes were passed unanimously on 27 April 2017 at the quarterly membership meeting.

Article III – Membership

Sec 2 reads: Individuals, institutions and societies within and outside the Tennessee Valley region shall be eligible for membership in the Society.

Proposed Change: Individuals within and outside the Tennessee Valley region shall be eligible for membership in the Society.

Article IV – Dues

Sec 1 reads: The annual dues for individuals, societies, and institutions shall be established by the Executive Board and approved by a majority vote of the membership at any regular meeting of the Society and shall be published in the journal.

Proposed change: The annual dues for individuals shall be established by the Executive Board and approved by a majority vote of the membership at any regular meeting of the Society and shall be published in the journal

Sec. 2: No change.

Proposed Sec 3: An exchange of publications only (i.e. *Valley Leaves* journal) with other historical/genealogical societies and institutions shall be approved by the Executive Board. There will be NO CHARGE for this exchange as it is reciprocal.

Proposed Sec 4: Individuals, societies and institutions may purchase available publications (*Valley Leaves* journal) for an amount established by the Executive Board.

Rationale for changes: To better define current membership status and procedures, as well as projected income and expenses.

TVGS Hosts Annual Seminar



The 2017 TVGS Spring Seminar featured two speakers: Charles A. Sherrill, State Librarian and Archivist of Tennessee, and Gordon T. Belt, archives advocate, public historian, and founding editor of *The Posterity Project*, an award-winning blog devoted to archives and history in Tennessee.

Mr. Sherrill presented two workshops:



Analysis of a Case File: A long trail has led you to that hefty packet of old papers filed in your ancestor's lawsuit. But how do you wade through the legal jargon and cull the valuable research clues hidden in a hundred pages of cramped handwriting? Learn how to systematically identify, sort and read case files for effective use.

Using Original Court Records: A Hands-On Workshop: Files of the Tennessee Supreme Court formed the basis for this workshop. Participants gained hands-on experience in identifying and interpreting original records. Exercises using copies from 19th-century minute books, dockets, estate packets and court cases helped develop skills for effective research among these records.

Mr. Belt gave the following two presentations:

Stories from the Stacks: Evidence of our past is found in the documents, photographs, maps,

and artifacts left behind by our ancestors. They help us tell a story about our collective history. Participants learned about a wide range of historic items and collections discovered "in the stacks" of the Library and Archives, each item with a unique story to tell.

John Sevier: Tennessee's First Hero: A celebrated soldier, admired politician and founding father of the state of Tennessee, John Sevier led an adventurous life. He commanded a frontier militia into battle against British



Loyalists at King's Mountain and waged a relentless war against the Cherokees in his effort to claim America's first frontier. He forged the "State of Franklin" from the western lands of North Carolina, and later became Tennessee's first governor. Following his death, Sevier's accomplishments faded from public memory, but years later, writers resurrected his image through romanticized accounts of his exploits, relying heavily on folk tales and recollections from aging pioneers. Participants examined John Sevier's extraordinary life through the lens of history and memory, shedding new light on this remarkable Tennessee figure.


Two distinguished local authors, Robert Davis and Butch Walker, also attended to sell their publications and speak with attendees.



Robert (Bob) Davis is well known to North Alabama for his genealogy courses at Wallace State College and his historical and genealogical presentations. Bob has written over 1,000 articles/publications in research, records, genealogy and history. Bob is especially noted for his publications/research on Georgia to include A Researcher's Library of Georgia, The Wilkes County Papers, Georgia Citizens and Soldiers of

the American Revolution and Civil War Atlanta. Bob's latest publication on Alabama is entitled Tracing Your Alabama Past.

Rickey Butch Walker is a noted North Alabama historian, researcher, and Alabama authority on Native American-Celtic history. Among his publications are Doublehead Last Chickamauga Cherokee Chief, Warrior Mountains Indian Heritage, Warrior Mountains Folklore, Boy of the Appalachia and Chickasaw Chief George Colbert. Mr. Walker will present to TVGS at the October quarterly membership meeting.

First Families Certificates Awarded

During the 2017 TVGS Spring Seminar, TVGS awarded two new certificates for their First Families of the Tennessee Valley program, which recognizes descendents of families who settled the region before Alabama statehood. Past-president Rhonda Larkin presented certificates to distant cousins Martha Ann Whitt and Kim Johnson.

Many families moved into the area now called the Tennessee Valley well before statehood, when it was still Indian Territory. In 1798, an act of Congress created the Mississippi Territory, which included all the area now in Alabama and Mississippi north of 31 degrees and south of 32 degrees, 28 minutes. Madison County became a county in 1809. Finally, during the war of 1812, Congress seized the Mobile District of West Florida and thus completed the Territory.

The Act of March 3, 1817 created the Alabama Territory, establishing its boundaries, making Mississippi Territorial law applicable, and making St. Stephens the new capital. Alabama grew so rapidly that there were only two sessions of the territorial legislature before statehood. President Monroe signed the bill for Alabama's admission as a state on December 14, 1819.

First Families is a project of the Tennessee Valley Genealogical Society to find those persons who lived in the Tennessee Valley prior to December 14, 1819. If one of your ancestors qualifies please submit your application and join us by visiting tygs.org.

Rankin Digitizing Roberts Papers at UAH



At the quarterly membership meeting on January 26, 2017, local historian John Rankin presented "Findings in the Frances Roberts Papers." Mr. Rankin has been digitizing the collection, which spans from the 1830s to the 1930s and is housed at the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

Dr. Frances Cabaniss Roberts was the first woman to receive a Ph.D. in history from the University of Alabama and was instrumental in establishing the humanities department at the



Huntsville extension. Her collection contains many interesting accounts of local history, including many Civil Warera accounts and salvaged legal documents. A full catalog of the records housed in the collection is available at http://libguides.uah.edu.

"Making History Local"



Dr. Chris Paysinger presented "Making History Local, a Better Context for Approaching the Past" at the TVGS Quarterly Membership Meeting on Thursday, April 27, 2017. His presentation revolved around how to find relevance with and through history. Too often history becomes disjointed facts, separate and lacking interest. Through contextual framing of events and authentic questioning based on specific locality, history can become real and exciting. Every person finds unique viewpoints in the same written history, depending on their life and educational experiences. Dr. Paysinger utilizes this approach with his students in the Athens School District

The son of Sherry Paysinger of South Alabama and Bobby Paysinger of Athens, Chris grew up in Elkmont and graduated from Elkmont High School before attending Auburn University. He graduated from Auburn in 1998 and taught history in South Alabama for a year before accepting a job at Sparkman High School. He is currently on the Athens City School Board. Chris is married to the former Suzanne Clem.

Chris was named Outstanding Graduate Student in History at the University of Alabama in Huntsville for research on his thesis, "Let the Family Circle Be Unbroken: The Transformation of Republican Patriarchy Athens, Alabama, 1818-1870." Chris's research and his enthusiasm for his subject matter have made him a popular speaker locally and in several areas throughout the state. He has given talks to the Sons of Confederate Veterans and the Daughters of the American Revolution, and the Alabama Association of Historians, and lectures in the UAH Lifetime Learning Program. He lives in the Mason-Looney Home (c. 1825) in Athens and maintains a blog dedicated to telling the local history of Athens from its incorporation in 1818 through the end of Reconstruction in 1877. He is also a historical marketing consultant for Reconstruction South, a firm that strives to connect businesses with the history of their locality and industry.
