HENRY RIGNEY CEMETERY

Location: Section 7-3-2E. W/2 NE NE.

These two graves were the only ones evident here. They were beside a house on Maysville Road. Henry Rigney's Last Will & Testament was dated 27 March 1832 and he died three days later. On 9 May 1832, Albert C. Kennedy was indicted for Rigney's murder with a change of venue to Jackson County. The governor pardoned him. The *Southern Advocate* of 7 April 1832 stated Rigney died from a stab wound inflicted by a man named Kennedy. Henry's will also mentions his wife "Liddy." and a brother John Rigney. John Rigney was indicted for assault with intent to murder Thomas Johnson 10 November 1831. The current Hinds family says Henry Rigney "was mean."

The *Huntsville Independent* of 2 December 1880 states Lydia was the daughter of Levi and Huldah Hinds. She was born in Knoxville, Tennessee moved to Madison Co., Alabama about 1809 and married Henry Rigney 28 September 1817. The 1870 census shows her making her home with a son, Charles, and helping raise his children.
