The above deed shows Alfred Howell's purchase of town lots in Liberty (immediately west of Ditto's Landing) from pioneers Timmons and McLeod, who were nearby landowners to the Lacy family on pre-arsenal lands. The town of Liberty was apparently never populated, as it was a speculative venture that fizzled due to the growing importance of the town of Triana for shipping cotton from Huntsville. The prominence of Triana
