John,

The last burial at the Simpson Cemetery was that of Henry Clay Simpson who died February 26, 1918 at his home near Green Grove, Alabama. According to Ed Peters, Public Affairs Office at Redstone Arsenal in May 1989, he talked to Walter Cooney Penland, in 1983, who was then 80 years old a scion of a Madison County pioneer family that settled near the Simpson place told him that as a 16 year old he had helped dig the grave of a neighbor, Henry Simpson, whom he described as a wealthy bachelor with a 400 acre farm.

The last burial at the Dickson-Rankin Cemetery was that of Nancy Tyree (Dickson) Graham who died October 10, 1891. Her monument reads: Nancy T. Graham, Relict of James B. Graham, Born Amherst County Virginia February 3, 1808, Died October 10, 1891, Rest in Peace Beloved Mother. In the monument peak, "Christ Is Our Refuge" is inscribed in an arching pattern.

Facing Nancy Graham's grave is Dickson Graham's. (Her son) It has an ornate white marble marker, broken in half in such a manner that the date of death is somewhat illegible but appears to read: Dickson Graham, Born February 15, 1837, Died March 11, 186? (67). The face of this marker is raised to represent a scroll (as is Nancy Graham's). It has a wreath in relief at the top.

Dickson or Dewitt C. Dickson Graham was the first child of James B. and Nancy Tyree (Dickson) Graham. He was, according to the 1860 census of Madison County, a law student under the tutorship of David Campbell Humphreys and Edward Dorr Tracy. He was a Lt. in Co. D, Russell's 4th Alabama Cavalry, CSA. He was captured and interned

at Camp Douglas in Chicago. He caught consumption and died a couple years after the war. His photo, made while he was sitting next to his brother Joe Graham, is on page 107 in my book about Doctor William Simpson.

About 10 feet laterally from Nancy Graham's grave is Virginia G. Dickson's grave. This marker is a tapering cylindrical shaft from which a top fixture of some sort appears to be missing. Inscribed on the shaft: Virginia G. Dickson, August 22, 1811, March 4, 1877. Inscribed on the base: "Having Finished Life's Duty She Now Sweetly Rests". This stone faces west while the others face east.

The fourth marker is in a corner of the cemetery somewhat apart from the other three. A plain marker in comparison to the others, it reads: Charles S. Fowler, Born Mobile, Ala. March 27, 1827, Died December 11, 1889.

Charles S. Fowler was an educator, the husband of Juriah James (Graham) Fowler, who is buried next to her father at the old Somerville Cemetery, Somerville, Morgan County, Alabama.

There was a fifth monument for another sister of Nancy and Virginia Dickson, that of Sarah A. Dickson, whose birth was recorded on the marker as October 29, 1813, but her date of death was not mentioned when the DAR asked Frank Jacobs to record the information for them. Frank was a neighbor of both the Simpson's and Dickson's. He was a Free Black, whose ancestor by the name of Jacobs freed his slaves. Frank was a descendant of a White master and a former Black slave. During the War they helped a lot of Slaves in the area with freedom.

Sallie or Sarah A. Dickson was never married. She resided at the Troup Store in Somerville, where she probably died before October 27, 1873, when letters of Administration were issued to John Simpson.

I also have some history on the Timmons Cemetery if you need more information on that. William H. Timmons was living in the Simpson home after his parents died. John Simpson was his legal guardian.

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The above communication came as a result of an offer to exchange information about pioneers and cemeteries of Redstone Arsenal lands with Dennis Simpson of California. Dennis is a descendant of the Simpson family, as represented by the Simpson – Jones Cemetery, 65–3. He is also a thorough and dedicated researcher of the early history of the area, having published a book about Doctor William Simpson with many related family

details and photographs. Pertinent pages of his book have been digitally photographed and included in this series of Redstone Arsenal cemetery Summary Reports, with Dennis' kind permission.

The subject cemetery appears as shown below:

View toward southeast from NW corner of cemetery, which is behind Igloo #8741 off Buckeye Road, west of the southern portion of Patton Road. There are four inscribed tombstones plus one base with the tombstone missing. Since early maps show the name of the cemetery as Rankin - Dixon or Rankin - Dickson, it may well be that the missing tombstone was for a Rankin, as no Rankin tombstones were found.

After the caption was added to the photo above, Dennis' communication indicated that the tombstone base with no marker would have been for that of Sarah A. Dickson, a sister of Nancy and Virginia, who have markers in the cemetery. Additional overviews of the cemetery are provided below:





Even though James Graham had an imposing image and his family had impressive tombstones in the Dickson – Rankin Cemetery, his own tombstone in the old Somerville Cemetery in Morgan County was rather plain and unimpressive, as shown below:

Nancy Tyree Graham is the key to understanding the Dickson – Rankin Cemetery. She was, as Dennis Simpson stated, a Dickson before she married James Graham. The word "Relict" on her tombstone was the old term for "widow" and is often found on the older markers. [The word "consort" was used for women who died <u>before</u> their husbands.]

There are several Ahnentafels found on Ancestry.com's web pages to trace the history of the families represented in this cemetery. However, the most thorough treatment of their history found to date is Dennis William Simpson's book about his ancestor, Madison County pioneer Doctor William Simpson. Pertinent pages of that book have been photographed and are included in the CD files given to the Army offices. In fact, several additional resource folders of historical data files have been provided in digital form on CDs for the history of the families of this cemetery.

Researchers will find that the history of the Laniers is strongly intertwined with the Dickson and Graham history, so review of the various Lanier cemetery Summary Reports for Redstone arsenal is also recommended. In particular, William Dickson was the father of Mary D. Lanier of pioneer arsenal land days, and Joseph Dickson was the father of Ann D. Lanier. There are several extensive Ahnentafels for the Dickson family history

included on the CD-ROM provided to the Army offices for expanded historical data on the family. Selected files are included in the pages that follow to give a brief overview of the available information that has been collected on the Dickson, Graham, and Rankin families for which the cemetery is known.

Comments:

Information on Early Settlers of your county. I am a descendant of Dr. William Simpson, first white surgeon in Madison County, Alabama from Londonderry, Ireland, settled near Ditto's Landing in 1807. He and his wife Marguerite (McAlpine) Simpson were suppose to have been buried at Hobbs Island, but there is no tombstone marking their graves. There son, John Simpson is buried with several members of his family at Redstone Arsenal, including my great-grandfather Arthur Marcus Simpson, one of ten children of John and Margaret Ann (Dickson) Simpson.

Margaret Dickson was a daughter of James and Keziah (Wood) Dickson. James Dickson was one of the 241 signers of the petition requesting the government to allow them to stay on Indian land in 1819. Dr. Simpson's daughter Mary Simpson married the Hon. George W. McLeod, Justice of the Peace and Postmaster of Ditto's Landing. One of their daughters, Margaret McLeod married the Hon. David Campbell Humphreys, later US Justice of the Supreme Court for the District of Colombia, and famous for his stand against Alabama joining the Confederacy during the Civil War. After Dr. Simpson died in the springtime of 1816, his widow married the Hon. Hopkins Lacy, former member of the Tennessee House of Representatives and attorney who represented both Andrew Jackson and John Coffee in several legal matters. Their daughter Martha Jane Cocke Lacy married Dr. Albert Russell, member of the same family who founded the Russell Erskine Hotel.



The above Ahnentafel shows how the Fowler and Rankin names became associated with the Dickson and Graham lines of this cemetery. What is not shown is the extent of the Rankin involvement with the control of the land. Since Dr. James Cofelt Mitchell Rankin has common ancestry with the writer of this report (John P. Rankin), much data is available about him. He eventually owned the land around the cemetery, along with the rest of the Dickson estate, and he added more lands around Belle Mina, Alabama, where he lived. He is buried with his wife and several of his children in Decatur. A photo of them from Dennis Simpson's book about Dr. William Simpson is shown below:

He married <u>Julia Alabama GRAHAM</u> 1877 in Alabama, daughter of James B. GRAHAM and Nancy Tyree DICKSON. She was born 9 Aug 1843 in Pond Beat, Madison County, Alabama, and died 27 Feb 1927 in Belle Mina, Limestone County, Alabama.

Dr. Rankin bought the house in Belle Mina that was built for a grandson of Thomas Bibb, the second governor of the state. Belle Mina in fact derived its name as a community from the name of the mansion of the governor,

where the village grew. Dr. Rankin became a noted physician, serving the area from Decatur to Madison, north to Athens and south to Triana. Considering that he owned land (inherited by his wife Julia Graham) at Pond Beat, Dr. Rankin probably also treated others who lived in that area as the need arose. Since it is known that he is buried with his wife in Decatur and not in the Dickson – Rankin Cemetery, it is not known why old records use the name Rankin associated with the cemetery. However, sometimes it is the practice to name a cemetery according to the current landowner's name, whether anyone of that surname is buried in the cemetery or not. It is also possible that one or more of Dr. Rankin's children may be buried in the cemetery on the arsenal, but there are no markers to substantiate that. The story published in the book *LURE AND LORE OF LIMESTONE COUNTY* about Dr. Rankin adds more detail:

memory is kept alive in the furnishings and portraits which are widely scattered among the descendants. Two pair mirrors once stood in the entrance hall at "Drust's trave" one is now in Waco, Texas, and the other was inherited by Benjamin Donnell Peck of Athens

The first record of the Binford family in America available was in the granting of acreage to Anthony Binford by Governor Berkley in 1665 in Lower Norfolk County. Va. Anthonyle son, James, bought land in Charles Cry County (later Prine George County), Va., for which he paid two pounds of inbacco per acre. James' grandson James Binford, married Margaret Mosby in 1745 and their son, John Mosby, came to Alabama before 1820.

BIBB-RANKIN-DUKE (ca. 1865)

The Memphis and Charleston Railway postoffice at the end of Bibb's Lane was first named "Fertilis" at the suggestion of Thomas Hobbs. "It has this recommendation at least, that there is no other office in the Union of the same name," wrote Thomas Hobbs in 1856.

When the proposed route of the Memphis and Charleston was first made, the railroad would have come much closer to Mooresville, but the villagers opposed the noise

and dirt of the locomotives and the line was laid on the Bibb property some two miles north of the town. The colloquialized name of "Belle Mina" was given to the post-office in 1872. Thomas Bibb had named his palatial mansion "Belle Manor," but local pronunciation soon changed it to "Belle Mina."



Thomas Bibb's son, Porter, presumably built this house around 1865 for his son Porter, Jr., soon after his marriage to Amelia Bradley in 1863. Amelia was the daughter of Nathan and Amanda (Taliaferro) Bradley, who had left Madison County several years previous to this time and settled in Marengo County, Ala. The house was sold in 1870 by Robert Bibb to Dr. J. C. M. Rankin.

Dr. Rankin, a native of Wayne County, Tenn, graduated in medicine from the University of Nashville in 1858. He married and lived in Tennessee for several years. Among his children by his first wife were William, who died unm.; Quinton, who according to family tradition was killed by nightriders; and Vichlorine, who married Henry Kellog Peebles (see Peebles-Zeitler-McCrary House). Dr. Rankin came to Alabama soon after the death of his first wife, married Julia Graham and had:





ADDENDA - SOUTHEAST

The land transactions of Dr. Rankin and his wife in Madison County also shed some light upon their prominence in the area:



The land purchases recorded per this index in Madison County prior to 1898 were not for Dr. JCM Rankin or his family. They are for another branch of the Rankin clans in America.



This index of land sales by the Rankins in Madison County shows when Frank Jacobs got the land around the cemetery – 1914 – from Dr. Rankin's heirs.

One other interesting note about Dr. Rankin's 2nd wife, Julia A. Graham, is that her 1st husband was Frances Marion Windes. Colonel Windes served in the Confederate forces that defended north Alabama. He was in command

of many of the troops who were engaged on December 23, 1864, at Indian Creek, just east of the town of Madison. His familiarity with the area no doubt served him well, but the Confederates still lost the battle in a decisive Union victory. This battle and the only other significant engagement to occur in Madison County during the Civil War are both commemorated with an official Historical Marker on the Village Green along the railroad tracks in Madison.

Another item of particular interest is the will that Nancy T. Graham wrote. It was the instrument that ultimately put much of the extensive Dickson and Graham lands under the control of Dr. Rankin by providing that his wife Julia and their children inherit lands from Julia's siblings after their deaths.




Note that the witnesses to the will above were H. C. Simpson plus Z. M. and A. G. Proctor. These are names associated with the Simpson – Jones Cemetery (65-3), which is located about a mile and a half to the northwest of the Dickson – Rankin Cemetery. A photo of the Proctors is shown below:



In addition to the details of Nancy T. Graham's will, there is much more data, including many of the estate papers of James Dickson, on the CD-ROM database for this cemetery that was supplied to the Army offices at Redstone Arsenal. The name of the cemetery actually hides the true identity of the known burials there. At first glance, it would seem to be more appropriate to call it the Graham Cemetery, acknowledging that there is a marker for a Fowler and a Dickson in the cemetery. Of course, it is possible that people of other surnames were also buried there. In particular, the Dicksons may have even begun the cemetery as such for their family by interring family members there while James Dickson owned the land.

The land record data below shows the transitions of the land ownerships. First, it was obtained from the government by Benjamin S. Jones. This was recorded on 21 June 1831, when he patented the Southeast Quarter of Section 21, Township 5 South, Range 1 West. (See Cowart's "Old Land Records" page image below.) Benjamin S. Jones sold the land in 1833 to George McLeod, as shown in the "Index to Lands" by G. W. Jones & Sons, Inc. (image below). According to this index, George McLeod sold the land to Hughy Smith in 1837. Smith sold the land to James Dickson in 1847, and the Adminstrator of James Dickson's estate transferred it to Joseph D. Graham ("and others") in 1855. Therefore, the land was held under the Graham surname far longer than any other owner in the 1800s. Joseph D. Graham was, of course, a son of Nancy Tyree Dickson and her husband James B. Graham (who died in 1849, before his widow and her children inherited the land from the Dickson estate). Likewise, Nancy T. Graham was a daughter of James Dickson and Keziah Wood.

Since Nancy Graham was one of the heirs of James Dickson, and that is how the Grahams got the land, it strongly supports the claim that both James Dickson and his wife Keziah are buried in the family cemetery, as stated by Dennis Simpson in the Dickson Ahnentafel shown earlier in this report. That information can be found on page 16 of this report, in Ahnentafel Generation No. 3, for persons numbered 6 and 7. While they have no tombstones remaining to mark their graves, James Dickson and Keziah Wood Dickson are almost certainly buried there beside the graves of their known children who are interred in the cemetery. This deduction additionally supports the name of the cemetery including "Dickson", even though there is only one tombstone visible in the cemetery today with that surname inscribed. Considering all of these things, it now appears that the most descriptive name for the cemetery would be the **Dickson – Graham Cemetery (87-2).**



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A cautionary note to any future researcher of the Graham family on arsenal lands: there are two different Nancy Grahams who were pioneers of the arsenal lands, and they lived close to one another, as well as being contemporaries. The other Nancy Graham was born as a Graham, not married into that name. She married in 1849 at age 17 to Abraham Beadle, who was 72 at the time. Abraham was childless, having been deserted by his first wife, Susan Grimes. It was reported in the divorce petition that

Susan had "run off to Tennessee with another man and resides there". The 1850 census shows Nancy Graham Beadle with her mother and a sister living in the household headed by Abe. Abraham died in 1858 after 9 years of this marriage, and Nancy inherited his plantation and considerable wealth. She married John Jordan (of another pre-arsenal family) in 1860 and later became involved in litigation over land with the Matkins associated with the Matkin Cemetery (37-3). As would be expected, there is extensive history available in the old land and court records for the Grahams, the Beadles, the Jordans, and the Matkins. Most of those records are also on the CD-ROM provided to the arsenal offices.
