About 1835, with her husband, she removed to Sumter Co. Ala. recently purchased from the Choctaw Indians and were among the first settlers of Sumterville, and, we may say, of the county. Their names were the first enrolled on the record of the Methodist Church in that village, BRO. WILEY THOMAS preaching. She died March 10, 1876...To her only living daughter she said "Train your child right." To a son in Texas: "Tell ASBURY to meet me in heaven." Turning to Mrs. WILSON she said: "You must pray now for ASBURY in my stead."
