He was ardently devoted to the Democratic cause, but while he was firm in the support of his political views, he ever demeaned himself with a generosity and a spirit of amenity, that won for him alike the approbation and affection of his friends and opponents. He was an esteemed citizen, and kind and affectionate husband, an indulgent father and a devoted friend, few men indeed could have left a better recollection and a purer name. He has left an esteemed and amiable wife, and three promising children, to mourn his bereavement and his loss!
