Died at the residence of his father in Coosa County on the 21 inst., JAMES A. WALL aged 30 years. He had for the last nine years been severely afflicted with the rheumatism, but permitted at times to enjoy short intervals of ease; his last illness which was of three months duration, was unusually severe, yet not a murmur escaped his lips. Conscious of the near approach of death, he evinced no fear, but on the contrary hailed it as a welcome messenger, as a deliverance from this world of pain and woe to one far more glorious eternal in the skies; never did man die more perfectly resigned to the will of his maker. As a son he was all the parent wish never during his life, giving the least cause for regret; as a neighbor and friend, kind and benevolent to a fault, he was truly the friend of all, possessed of an active and enterprising disposition, with a mind well cultivated, he bid fair, had health been granted him of being an honor to his family and country; but he is gone and that too it is hoped and believed to the bright abode of the just made perfect; long will his loss be felt by his family and numerous friends. September 23, 1840

Died of congestive fever at the residence of his father near Wetumpka on Sunday Evening 13th instant, AYDELOTT SYNDENHAM, eldest and only son of DR. SAMUEL H. and MARY H. BILLING, aged six years and five months.

He suffered a severe and unremitted illness of five or six days, without murmur or complaint, thus exhibiting the most remarkable patience for one of his age. He was in life amiable, intelligent and dutiful, his father's hope, his mother's joy. But the destroyer came, and claimed him for his own. His spirit has gone hence to swell the angelic choir of the redeemed, and his parents loss is his eternal gain.
