That one JOHN S. BOGCESS and RICHARD S. RANGLES had prior to that time kept a public ferry. That JOHN S. BOGCESS has departed this life some time in the year 1842 leaving the following brothers and sisters his heirs at law to wit: JAMES BOGCESS (43 T) and ELIZABETH BOGCESS intermarried with ELI CAMPBELL of Marshall Co. In 1811 or 1812 she moved to Madison County, Alabama where she united with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Canaan in 1814, then under the care of REV. ROBERT DONNELL who had organized a C. P.
