Madison County. He leaves a widow and eight children. He was for

many years a member of the Methodist Church. "A Friend."

Madison County Journalism. In 1806 CAPT. JOHN HUNT erected the first log cabin and six years later the first newspaper was published. called the Madison Gazette and a MR. PARHAM who came here from
Nashville, Tennessee was the Editor and Publisher. In 1816 MR. THOMAS B.
GRANTLAND took over the Gazette and called it the Huntsville Republican. The Republican was merged in the Southern Advocate and the Advocate absorbed by the Mercury.

In 1823 the Democrat was established by PHILIP WOODSON and the first issue appeared October 8th. MR. WOODSON was succeeded by

J. WITHERS CLAY in 1849

The Huntsville Independent was established December 1, 1855 by JOHN J. DEW and JOHN J. YOUNG. MR. DEW went to Memphis and MR. YOUNG was forced to the wall, and it was then taken in charge by W. P. NEWMAN and FRANK COLEMAN. When the Advocate was absorbed by the Mercury MAJOR SLOSS attempted to start a new Advocate but was unsuccessful and sold the plant to CHARLES P. LANE who started a Republican weekly called the New South but it went down unhonored and unsung. Two decades ago MESSRS. CARUTHERS and WRENCH started the North Alabama

Reporter but it was not a success.

JAMES WESLEY FARLEY (20 in Alabama; son of MICHAEL and SARAH) died at Madison Station Tuesday. He was born July 12, 1829 (59?), and was nearly 61. When only 16 he united with the Methodist Church. He leaves a wife and five sons. He will be buried this afternoon at the family burying ground on his place. (tombstone--JAMES WESLEY FARLEY born July 12, 1829, died March 11, 1890; FANNIE A. FARLEY born July 19, 1834, died August 6, 1906; married FRANCES ANN CRUTCHER February 9,

1853)

In Memoriam. THOMAS GEORGE died March 19, 1890 on his plantation in Madison County, Alabama. He was 65 years of age and a lawyer by profession, a native of the state of Virginia. He graduated at the University of Virginia at the age of 21 and that same year married MISS MARGARET LEE, a daughter of CHAPMAN LEE of the renowned LEE family, and moved to New York; the same year two children were born, LAURA and HELEN. LAURA married your fellow townsman, JAMES H. BONE, late of the Federal Army. HELEN was a member of St. Mary's Episcopal Sisterhood of New York and with two other sisters, was sent to Memphis in the yellow fever epidemic of 1878 to assist stricken orphans in the Episcopal orphanage; a few days after her arrival she died with the fever. His wife died about 1873 and about four years ago he married MISS HAMMOND of Madison County and since has resided on the plantation where he died. He practiced in New York, served two terms on the bench in Orange County, and about fifteen years ago went to Denver.
