May 6, 1891

Died at Decatur, Wednesday April 29th, MRS. REBECCA HUGHES, wife of MR. JOHN HUGHES, formerly of this city, aged 40. Remains brought to this city for burial. The Mercury extends sympathy to her husband and little son.

May 12, 1891
