ABERCROMBIE; (was lying in wait for a chicken thief and mistook the Colonel for the prowler.) The remains were carried to Tuskeegee, his former home, for interment. (tombstone: born September 17(?), 1838, died June 8, 1881)

OSCAR STRONG, aged 19, killed by lightning...son of THOMAS R. STRONG.

July 15, 1891
MR. CHARLES M. FENNELL died suddenly at Woodville. He was a brother of MRS. GEORGE F. SCRUGGS. MR. FENNELL recently resided at Bessemer, but he and his family have been in Huntsville for several weeks, visiting relatives. A day or so before his death he went to Woodville on business, found dead in bed. Supposed to have been heart failure (complained the night before of pains.) The remains were brought to this city and interred in the Cemetery Monday.

The News reached the city last evening of the death of MR. TOM CAWTHORN (43 in Tennessee) at his home near Maysville last Friday. MR. CAWTHORN was about 80 years of age. The deceased was a good man

and had a legion of friends who will regret to hear of his death.

DR. HUMPHREY received a telegram announcing the death of EDIE

HUMPHREY at Aspen, Colorado on the threshold of manhood. Buried in Mt. Olivet, Nashville. (mentions friend in this city, his former home.)
